### IOWA STATE IN A WAR YEAR


Six thousand men and women from 48 states, Hawaii and South America, China and Japan, Germany and France, working side by side. # Holds Two Degrees

Inaugurated as governor of Iowa this year, Bourke B. Hickenlooper holds degrees from Iowa State College in the Division of Science and from the law school of the University of Iowa. He served 21 months in the army during World War I, spending a portion of that time overseas. He was elected to the governorship after four years as lieutenant governor under George Wilson.

Wielding the gavel of the Iowa State Board of Education for the fourth year, Henry C. Shull presides over this group that regulates the actions of five state colleges and universities. The nine members of the board are appointed by the governor and approved by the senate, serving 6-year terms.





Our president, who travels extensively in the interests of the college war effort, is giving his enthusiastic support to the student War Council, and offering all possible assistance to the newly founded Naval Training School. While giving fullest cooperation to the army in its specialized training program and to the Curtiss-Wright Aircraft Company in its plan to train women, Dr. Friley wrote this letter to the students.

# Proposes Changes

Dr. Charles E. Friley, president of Iowa State College, spent many extra hours in 1942 and 1943 keeping the college on an even keel during the crucial war period. He proposed and carried through the elimination of the Thanksgiving vacation and lengthening of the Christmas holidays to solve transportation problems. Advising young men to complete as much work as possible, he nevertheless gave complete cooperation to all selective service boards over the country.



# Maria M. Roberts Frank D. Paine

On April 12, 1942, Iowa State's busy professors, students and administrators stopped for a moment, hats in hand, to pay tribute to the small, white-haired woman who for 50 years had given the utmost in service and loyalty to Iowa State College.

Throughout those 50 years, Maria M. Roberts had been assistant to the college preceptress, vice-dean and dean of the Junior College, professor and head of the mathematics department, and dean emeritus of the Junior College. On June 10, 1940, Miss Roberts received the honorary degree of doctor of laws in recognition of her service.

As a student, she distinguished herself by selection for membership in Phi Kappa Phi, Pi Mu Epsilon, Sigma Delta Epsilon and Mortar Board. Roberts Hall, completed in 1939, stands as a permanent reminder of the woman whose belief in young people and her desire to help them will make for her a lasting place in Iowa State College traditions.

Funeral services for Frank D. Paine, head of the General Engineering Department, were held in Great Hall, Memorial Union, July 2, 1942. Paine served Iowa State continuously, with the exception of the three years following his graduation, as instructor and professor in electrical engineering. In 1929, he was made head of the newly organized Department of General Engineering.

Entering Iowa State in 1905, he was graduated with a bachelor of science degree in electrical engineering. He became a member of Eta Kappa Nu, Tau Beta Pi and Delta Upsilon, and in 1940 was made an honorary member of Cardinal Key. Veishea owes its name to Mr. Paine, who coined the word from abbreviations of college divisions.

Probably the only head of a department in the Engineering Division who so won the confidence and friendship of students that they called him by his first name, he was a teacher, not of subjects, but of students.

# Guild Initiates Activity Point System



To distribute activities among a greater number of students, the activity point system was put into effect this year by the Cardinal Guild, student governing body. The ban on negro orchestras was removed and the curtailing of library hours because of the shortage of labor, was prevented. To divert corsage expenditures toward war stamps and bonds, corsage dances were designated as Stamp Corsage Dances.

Adjusting to the changes brought about by the war, the Guild moved the 1943 allcollege election and the Senior Prom into the winter quarter. The Guild attempts to represent true opinions of the student body.

# Handle \$1,400 Through War Chest

Born out of the emergency created when the United States entered the war in January, 1942, the Student Defense Council, now called the Student War Council, has grown in proportion until it now handles \$1,400 in its War Chest Fund, and contains 12 committees embracing every phase of campus war activity. The 19 members are presidents of major campus organizations, with Student Body President John Slater serving as chairman, Marian Loofe as secretary and Dick Moehl as finance chairman.

War bond and stamp sales, headed by Irwin Nathlich, netted over \$1,700. Sales were conducted by Twisters and Yel-Jax at football games and by volunteers at concerts and lectures. The newest campaign features were balloting for Bond Queen, with each stamp and bond allowing votes for a candidate, and a baseball game between the naval trainees and the college team.

# Graduate 185

Donning coveralls and gas masks as a part of their training, over 185 women have been graduated from six sections of Ambulance Driving, supervised by Dr. A. R. Lauer under the sponsorship of the Student War Council. Classes, which are held one evening each week for two hours, cover such emergency conditions as changing tires and oil, checking fan belts and spark plugs, greasing cars and blacking out headlights. Also included in the 20 hours of work required for certificates are lectures by faculty members on gases and abnormal conditions of patients, discussions by experienced ambulance drivers and actual night driving experience.

One hundred sixty-five tons is the mark just passed by the Salvage Committee of the Student War Council in cooperation with the college in collecting scrap metal and rubber. The first major drive collected over 500 pounds of scrap rubber at a dance held in the Memorial Union during the first summer session. Alpha Phi Omega, service fraternity, supervised two collections, one in the organized houses, wards and dormitories for scrap metal, and one in campus buildings for tin foil. The Salvage Committee solicited student cooperation last fall to uncover a 5-ton testing block buried on the campus and formerly used by the railroad engineeers.

### Social Council Revises Exchange System

A new system of sorority and fraternity exchanges was effected by the Joint Social Council this year. The exchanges are now being arranged by purely mechanical rotation; the 29 fraternities divided into 18 groups have an exchange every other week with one of the 9 sororities.

The council is composed of representatives from every college organization. This year an executive board was organized to facilitate the planning of programs and to decide questions of policy for the council. The representatives to this group are Harriet Swift, women's dormitories; Robert Himmel, men's dormitories; Margaret Hanson, sororities; Roger Henrich, fraternities; Frederick Smith, wards, and Paul Mongerson, chairman. This committee met once a month to outline the year's business and programs for the monthly council meetings.

Campus Varieties, Friday night fun-fests featuring student talent, were again sponsored by the Joint Social Council. Wilbur Layton and Barbara Hornaday were cochairmen of the Varieties. Competition Night, with skits submitted by the organized houses, climaxed these Friday night programs. The summer social program, intensified by the increased number of students, was sponsored by the council. Street dances, twisters, mixers and other dances were held in the Memorial Union for summer students.

### Board Allots Profits To War Fund

A generous contribution to the War Council was made by the Memorial Union Student Board of Directors when they voted to allot a portion of the profits of all major dances to the care of the Student War Council. The board has also been active in giving student opinions on ways to handle the 1600 naval trainees and 105 women employed by Curtiss-Wright, who are fed by the Memorial Union cafeteria. The Union will also operate the kitchen at Friley Hall, where many of the naval trainees will be accommodated. The board is also represented on the Student War Council, and weekly luncheons have been arranged at the Union for these meetings. Representatives from each of the

five divisions on the campus make up the Union Board. The selections are made at the all-college election held each year, with three students being chosen from Engineering and Agriculture, two from Home Economics, and one each from the Science and Veterinary Medicine Divisions.



### Plan For Women

With food production and distribution assuming a front line role during the past year, the Division of Agriculture has found it necessary to make alterations in its program. Each department in the division has made a careful study to determine the most pressing research needs, the areas in which extension work should be expanded, and the short courses which should be provided.

Intensive poultry and dairy courses for women are being developed, and a course in meats is planned for enlisted men at the request of the army's Quartermaster General.



Though busier than ever, the hand of Dean H. H. Kildee can be found expertly guiding many new activities directly associated with the war effort. His position as head of the Agricultural Division enables him to actively assist in making essential adjustments to a war-geared world both on the campus and in the various fields of activity over the state. Named by the Code of Iowa as an executive committee member of several state agricultural associations, he makes many vital addresses before farm and chamber of commerce groups concerning war-time agricultural problems. Working with national breed associations on programs of adjustment and education, he helps develop integrated radio programs dealing with ways and means of meeting 1943 food production goals. He spends many additional hours promoting agricultural courses in Iowa high schools. As a member of a committee appointed by the American Farm Bureau Federation to study and recommend improvements in livestock marketing, Dean Kildee works with Iowa market hog producers and packers on problems involved in the national meat rationing program.

### Survey Holst Tract

Membership in the Forestry Club was given new importance last January when Lyle F. Watts of the class of 1913 was appointed head of the National Forest Service. Watts is the first graduate of a school other than Yale University to become chief of the U. S. Forest Service.

Members of this year's club have made a systematic survey of the 300 acre Holst Tract, managed by them, to determine the value of its timber for production of much-needed native hardwood lumber for war purposes.

In addition to the usual activities of the club in sponsoring the Foresters' Hoedown and the *Ames Forester*, the program has been expanded to publish a news letter for the graduates and men in the armed forces. Co-editors are responsible for turning out the quarterly paper mailed to servicemen.




#### A. S. AGRONOMY

### Teach Naval Men

Thirty-one hundred navy men, enrolled in electrical and diesel training courses and an enrollment of 105 Curtiss-Wright women, in addition to the 2,000 students usually accommodated, produced a grave strain on both the staff and the equipment of the Engineering Division this year. Besides this, forty civilian pilots are graduated every two months, and about 2,500 students have completed 12-week short courses especially designed for war industry service. Supplying a steady flow of engineers to the armed forces and to industry, the division also trains 60 electrical engineers every two quarters in the new field of Radar aircraft warning systems.



Choosing to fight his battle on the education front, Dean T. R. Agg, head of the Engineering Division, holds the rank of Colonel in the Army Officers' Reserve Corps. It rests within his power, however, to hold or send his key faculty men to active duty. Several times he has recommended the induction of some of his most needed assistants, because he thought they could do more for their country in another position. As chairman of the Faculty War Council Advisory Board, Dean Agg reviews countless student draft situations, recommending deferment where he feels it is best. Numerous occasions find the dean speaking to large groups of civilians and trained instructors. As vice-president of the third zone of the American Society of Civil Engineers, he was called upon to clarify several conditions at a meeting in St. Louis. Many of the naval trainees stationed here graduate from their 16-week electrical course with Dean Agg giving the final commencement address. Fishing, golf and bridge are diversions he enjoys.


# "House of Magic" Show Appears Here





# Shorten Plans

Shortened programs, from seven to eight quarters, are the newest arrangements of the Home Economics Division for students wishing to prepare for nursery school teaching in war areas, assisting in industrial cafeterias and working in laboratories of electrical manufacturing plants. Engineering drawing courses, under the war-time curricula for textiles and clothing, applied art and home management majors, are now preparing women for drafting positions in war industry. A child development course in organization of war-time nursery schools is now offered to undergraduates in that field.



Reorganization of home economics curricula and course content to meet special needs of young women in their preparation for war service has had much of the attention of Dean Genevieve Fisher, of the Home Economics Division, and her department heads this year. Army and navy training schools offering opportunities for assistantships for institutional management majors, and the shortening of the army dietitians' internship to 4½ months in a civilian hospital followed by 4½ months in an army hospital have created urgent problems in course content that must be met with immediate changes. New emphases in the Home Economics Division, pointed out by Dean Fisher, are consideration of food rationing in meal planning problems, preservation of food by canning, home freezing and drying, designing and construction of clothing to conform to W.P.B. regulations, Red Cross sewing and basic work for textile testing. Dean Fisher finds an occasional moment away from her desk to read latest books and enjoy outdoor sports.



# Increases Span

Because of the span and content of the 21 departments in the Division of Science, over three-fourths of the students enrolled in the college take some courses in it. The objectives of the division are twofold: to provide study courses in the major biological, physical and social sciences, and to instruct students in the basic sciences and other general studies to provide a background for future professional life. Forced, as other divisions, to appoint instructors to replace men inducted into the services, this fourth largest division is going ahead on the full four-quarter plan, which includes a full summer quarter.



Under the hand of Dean H. V. Gaskill, the Division of Science functions in two ways: first, to train students in the division intensively in fields such as mathematics, chemistry, physics, geology, economics, history, government, psychology, botany, bacteriology, entomology and zoology; second, to serve as a service division to the entire college in such fields as hygiene, library, modern languages, military, music, English, physical education and science research. This division also operates a personnel service for its graduates, for alumni wishing to change their positions and for undergraduates seeking summer employment. This year Dean Gaskill, recognized nationally as an expert in applied psychology, has spent many additional hours supervising the war production being carried on in connection with the chemistry and physics departments in his division. A gracious host and enthusiastic sportsman, especially fond of fishing, the dean has written books in the fields of personality, physiological psychology and higher education.

### Begin In Summer

The oldest veterinary college in the United States has gone all out in realizing its responsibility in the war effort. Starting in June, 1943, the Iowa State Veterinary Division will run on a full year basis. New freshmen will begin in the summer quarter, allowing these students to complete the normal 4-year course in three years.

The curriculum of this division of 245 men prepares them for general practice work and for work in food, hygiene and disease control. Most of the 58 graduating seniors will go directly into the Veterinary Corps of the army, or assume private practices.



Through the work of Dr. Charles Murray, dean of the Veterinary Medicine Division, all Iowa State veterinary students have been inducted into the army as second lieutenants, and will finish their training before going into active service. Heading this oldest college of veterinary medicine since 1936, Dean Murray has organized the work of the students so that cases from nearby farmers and townspeople are taken at the Charles H. Stange Memorial Clinic. Iowa State, one of the 10 accredited veterinary schools in the nation, offers additional training facilities through the Veterinary Research Institute, the state diagnostic laboratory and the Ames milk inspection service. These give the students excellent opportunities to investigate current animal disease problems, to observe and assist in diagnostic techniques and to work on official milk sanitation control. Dean Murray's hobby is gardening, and he is a lover of animals, especially his pedigreed scotties. His other interests include an active part in the Research Workers of America.

Weekly campaigns conducted by the Junior chapter of the American Veterinary Medical Association to stimulate the sale of war bonds and stamps resulted in increased sales with every student starting a war stamp buying plan. Because of their interest in the advancement of the medical profession, and because they believed it their patriotic duty, the Iowa State chapter went out one-hundred per cent for donation to the American Red Cross blood bank collection.

Holding a unique position this year on the campus, the Junior A.V.M.A., which claims every veterinary student as a member, has every member a commissioned officer in the Medical Administrative Corps. These commissions were granted by the army in an attempt to maintain a supply of specialized and qualified men for present war needs, as well as to assure the public a sufficient quantity of trained men to guard the health of the nation after the war. Every effort is made by the Junior A.V.M.A. to make their bi-monthly meetings hinge directly on the war effort by inviting specialized men to speak.

Being the first class to graduate without paying diploma fees, the 1,000 seniors had an extra quirk of feeling when the sheepskins hit their hands.



Dr. I. W. Arthur's contribution to the war effort has been two-fold this year. During August, September and November his work was with the O.P.A. where he aided in determining prices on beef. In the Economics Department, he published a memo in a series of pamphlets on economics issues confronting the country in war.

Lieutenant Jack Rector, a graduate of Texas A.& M. and Lieutenant William Seay, a graduate of Georgia Tech, head the new Signal Corps Unit of the Reserve Officers Training Corps established at Iowa State this year. 

Besides conducting the Freedom Front program, a report covering America's efforts on many war fronts, Sid Stone is news editor of WOI, has charge of news coverage of war events and works with students on the news staff.

# Expand Night Classes



Bright lights glowing from windows that have been dark in former years furnish the most concrete evidence of the changes that have come about in arrangement of class schedules in 1943. Evening classes are no longer an oddity, but an accepted part of students' days. Many engineering drawing classes, for both men and women, are held from seven to ten in the evening because of crowded daytime laboratories. Finals in some courses have even been given after dinner because of the necessity of reporting grades on time coupled with the inability to find room space in the day time. Lack of classroom space has been another wrench in the wheels of class schedules, with the naval trainees occupying many electrical and diesel laboratories, and essential war work taking space in the Chemistry Building.

#### NAVAL TRAINING SCHOOL



Arrivity in June, 1942, the first contingent of haval trainees—200 in number—represented the first movement at Iowa State in the specialized training of men for active service. Since their arrival, Navy Aviation Cadets, Curtiss-Wright women and many special war industry workers have begun

training here, but the sailors now outnumber all others, being a familiar sight both on the campus and on the streets and busses of Ames. Classes all day, a free hour spent on the "ship" each evening, and liberty to leave the campus on Saturday and Sunday constitute the chief activities of these sailors.

## Duernberger Commands Training School

Commander A. F. Duernberger was made commanding officer of the Iowa State College Naval Training School in February replacing Lieut. George C. Ray, the Officer in Charge. Supervising the activities of the 15 commissioned officers and the 1,500 trainees of the school, Duernberger became commanding officer when the training school was designated a command by the Bureau of Naval Personnel, Washington, D. C.


An executive officer, and four batallion commanders constitute the military command under the direction of Commander Duerenberger.

The navy "sick bay" in the college hospital and the general health of the trainees is supervised by two medical officers and three dental officers, while the disbursing of pay and clothing, and record keeping is the responsibility of three naval supply officers.

Nearly half the civilian instructors in the Electrical School of the Naval Training School are Iowa State graduates, with civilian teachers having been secured from electric utilities companies, manufacturing firms, civil service, construction firms and other educational institutions. The Electrical School is the only division of the Naval Training School in which civilian instructors are employed.

A number of the instructors have enlisted in the navy with various ratings from specialist, third class, to chief specialist, with a teacher's classification.

Class instruction in the Electrician's School is conducted similarly to the college program, with 50 minute standard classes daily for their training period of 16 weeks.

An ensign in World War I, Commander A. F. Duernberger has served in the navy 24 years. He came to the Iowa State College Naval Training School in February from Detroit, Michigan, where he was executive and education officer at the Electrical, Diesel and Marine Engineering Training School at the United States Naval Reserve Armory. The Commanding Officer was appointed when the school was designated a command, replacing Lieut. George C. Ray, the Officer in Charge at that time.

Commander Duernberger received his training as an electrical engineer and in civilian life was in the electrical machinery business. As commander of the Iowa State station, he supervises 15 commissioned officers and 1,500 naval trainees at one time.

#### NAVAL TRAINEES

Arms swinging in rhythm to their brisk steps, naval station trainees marching from the railroad station to the Naval Training School are a familiar sight when the new contingents of several hundred trainees arrive every few weeks.

A mimeographed 10-page paper edited by a former Iowa State student, Yeoman third class Max Hedrick, '37, makes its appearance every two weeks. The paper, the *Nautilus*, keeps the different companies informed about the general activities, sports and recreation and talents of the various trainees.

The physical fitness program at the training station incorporates all kinds of sports, with swimming and calisthenics, taken at the Men's Gymnasium located directly behind Friley Hall, as the compulsory items. Trainee intramurals in touch football and basketball, and bowling intramurals for the officers, trainees and the ship's company were highlights of this athletic program.

The facilities of the Memorial Union were also used to feed the navy under the supervision of Miss Fern Gleiser, head of the Institutional Management Department, and Ensign G. D. Hartnett. Helping prepare meals for the navy are the 60 members of the Bakers' and Cooks' School.

Hughes Hall and Friley Hall, transformed as nearly as possible to resemble ship's quarters, serve as living quarters for the navy men. There are no doors on the rooms, double and triple decker bunks are used and, according to navy regulation, clothing and gear are kept in ship shape and in the smallest space possible in the ship's quarters.







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




## IOWA STATE BAND



## Labor Shortages Hamper Publications

Lack of labor, paper shortages, difficulty in getting cuts. These are the most serious problems which faced every publication in the Collegiate Press Building this year.

The Daily Student, suffering the loss of a managing editor, business manager, sports editor, reporters and men working in the back shop, besides having to consider a possible paper shortage, was forced to cut the paper from an eight-page daily to four pages four times a week with one eight-page edition.

The *Iowa Homemaker* lost none of its feminine staff and increased both circulation and advertising, but had difficulty in getting cuts, as did the *Green Gander*. The *Iowa Agriculturist* also lost staff members and changed to a self-cover printed in two colors.

Most judicious spending of the \$21,000 budget is the largest regular task of the four student members and two faculty advisors who comprise the board. Losses of the board this year were Phillip Jennings, faculty advisor who joined the staff of Iowa State Teachers' College at Cedar Falls, Fred Phillips and Edward Covert, newly elected student members, now serving in the armed forces.









## ATHLETICS





One of the largest college physical education programs ever undertaken in the United States was inaugurated at Iowa State during the fall of 1942. Every student was subjected to three hours of physical education a week, which included calisthenics, cross-country running, touch football, obstacle racing and special sports for underclassmen. Members of the coaching staff built an obstacle course patterned after the navy's pre-flight courses, which drew national attention in several physical education magazines. Students are now ranked high in physical fitness.






## Marquette Strips Iowa State 34 to 12

# Cyclones Stop Drake With 29 to 6 Win



















The Iowa State swimming team split even in the season's six intercollegiate meets and two freshman meets. After nipping the yearlings 33 to 32, the varsity dropped the second meet 38 to 37. Wisconsin State Teachers lost a postal match to the Cyclones 60 to 15. The medley relay team, Salmon in the 220-yard free-style and the 100-yard freestyle, Wells in the 150-yard backstroke, Slater in the 200-yard breastroke, Pickens in the 440-yard free-style and the 400-yard medley relay team took first places for the Iowa State crew. ### Tankers Battle In Six Dual Meets

Cancellation of the Big Six swimming crown for the duration left Coach Jack Mc-Guire's tankers with only six intercollegiate dual meets for the season, and none of these against Big Six foes. The Cyclones had aimed for their sixth straight Big Six crown until the championship winner was dropped. The season's record indicated the Cardinal and Gold crew could have made a good account of themselves in any tourney. In the last contest of the season, a telegraphic meet with Washington University of St. Louis, three new varsity records were smashed and one tied, three Big Six records were bettered and one tied, and all but the breast stroke time were new meet records. The medley relay team of Robison, Slater and Wilson splashed to a 3:05.6 record, 1 tenth of a second better than the old varsity record. Ted Salmon tied the 100-yard free-style record at :54.1. Doug Robison, a freshman who was permitted to swim on the varsity squad the last meet as a result of a new conference ruling, reduced the 150-yard backstroke time from 1:45.1 to 1:41.1. The 400-yard relay crew set a new record in that event at 3:40.0. Savage, Robison, Wilson and Salmon competed on the team.

Feature meet of the season saw Coach McGuire's predecessor, Charles McCaffree, bring his Michigan State squad to the state pool. The experienced Spartan swimmers trimmed the Cyclones in both meets of the doubleheader, winning 63 to 21, and 57 to 27.




The high jumpers also ranked high in the competition with the aerial artists capturing 31½ points out of 36 possible counters. Versatile Paul Darling picked up 16 points going

## Track Meet Begins

Intramural competition got its first start at Iowa State back in 1895 when a track meet was held between the junior and senior classes. In 1912 competition was inaugurated in baseball. Three years later the Interfraternity Council organized competitive athletics between the fraternities. In 1920 a member of the athletic staff was appointed to supervise intramural activity, which had been limited largely to baseball, track and basketball. Frank Williman was the first full-time intramural director and pioneered the first year around program. The present director, Harry Schmidt, assumed the position in 1926 while holding the line-coaching job. In 1928 he added intramural competition to include independent men as well as fraternity and boarding club men.



### Three-Fourths Of Men Participate

Believing that students needed more than a physical conditioning program, the athletic department this year put additional emphasis on the competitive angle of the college's athletic program. More than 75 per cent of the men students donned athletic togs and took part in the 26 sports offered in the intramural program. Participation was entirely voluntary and competition was arranged for students through three groups: fraternity, fraternity freshmen, and ward, the dormi-

tory division competing with the ward groups. The winners of these divisions then competed to determine the all-campus winners. Further competition was made available through club organizations of special sports and by divisional class tournaments. The Iowa State Swordsmen Club was available to fencing enthusiasts, the Bowstring and Cyclone Archer's Club held regular archery classes and meets and the Winter Sports Club held skating tournaments.

## Managers Arrange Play Schedules

Backbone of the vast intramural organization at Iowa State is the Intramural Council which is composed of the managers from each division in a competition group. Managers from each ward, dormitory, fraternity and fraternity freshman team form a council to assist Harry Schmidt, director of intramurals, in making schedules, arranging playoffs and settling disputes.

Proof that Iowa State students took their physical fitness seriously was shown in some tests conducted by Ray Donels of the athletic staff. At the close of the winter quarter, Donels gave his classes in calisthenics four physical tests to determine their physical condition as compared to the standards used by many of the armed services' athletic instructors. Every participant in the tests was above the average standard, which is based on 200 points, and the lowest Iowa State participant scored 203 points. The average number of times for each event, according to the standard, was 27 for sit-ups, 15 for pull-ups, 22 for squat jumps and 16 for push-ups. Leaders in the test were Edward Hess who scored 274 points, Olin Howie with 269 points, Paul Bame with 266 points and three tied for 265 points in the final count.





The buzzer rings, the doors to the diningroom open, and a houseful of excited women rush in, each anxious to be the first to find the chained pins, the box of candy. Fivepound parties have announced over 158 engagements since last September—a substantial increase over the number revealed last year.

When a fraternity man is involved, the first step in a romance is the pin-hanging, usually done after a big dance, but often accomplished ten minutes before curfew, in a brightly lighted parlor. The pin is meant

to affirm the process of "going steady." A class ring, or a bit of jewelry serves the purpose for an independent man. The next step is chaining the pins, which sometimes occasions a five-pound party—sometimes not.

In past years, romances have usually budded in the proverbial "sweet springtime," but with their favorite uncle calling them, many men have affirmed their engagements earlier. So in the spring of 1943, instead of finding dormitories void of women on weekend nights, there are lights in every room—real evidence of a war change at Iowa State.






also served on the salvage committee of the Student War Council in their recent scrap drive








In her early years, Delta Upsilon was anti-secret, but this policy was later modified to one of non-secrecy. The chapter roll now numbers 64 chapters with four in Canada. The Iowa State chapter was begun as the forty-fifth in the group by a local fraternity called the Collonnades. Although 55 members have left for the armed forces, the chapter now numbers 20 actives and 10 pledges. Warren Lueder led the DU's as president this year, while Don Anderson was vice-president and Gene Walker was the fraternity secretary.

Heading the list were two Cardinal Key men, Paul Visser, president of Cardinal Key and Don Marek, editor of the 1942 Bomb. Miller, Burgy, Opperman, Barger, Krogh, Kester and Armstrong were members of the Agricultural Council, with Kester and Armstrong as representatives to Cardinal Guild. Sidles and Crees served on Engineering Council, and Dean Huston occupied a seat on the Memorial Union Student Board of Directors. On the publication side of the campus,

Sitting behind the managing editor's desk of the Daily Student was Ken Krogh with Hazen handling cuts for the paper. 


Nurre took part in freshman basketball; Robert Reigh played with the tennis squad; and Nurre, Watkins, Weber and Georger ran with the thin-clads.




Born at the College of Charleston in South Carolina, December 10, 1904, Pi Kappa Phi was organized with the definite

Sigma Chi, now claiming 34,000 members, was begun 87 years ago when seven men banded together at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio. While still in its organization period, it found its members separated by the Civil War, with brother fighting against brother. Realizing the need to keep Sigma Chi alive, seven brothers in the Confederate Army formed the Constantine chapter, the only fraternal organization of its kind to operate under such conditions.

Beta Omicron had its beginning when it was formed from Rho Sigma Gamma (local fraternity) in 1916, becoming one of 101 chapters of Sigma Chi. Most of its members lived in boarding houses until 1927, when the present chapter house was built. Brush, Libbey, and Baker served as house president.

Sigma Nu had its founding immediately following the Civil War, at the Virginia Military Institute in 1869. The three founders were western men attending an eastern school, and the organization claimed men from seven states during the first year. Today 98 chapters make up the national organization with at least one house in every state except New Mexico and South Dakota. 45,000 answer national roll call.

Gamma Sigma, founded in 1904, was the first national fraternity to be permanently established on the Iowa State campus. Since its founding, 427 active members have been initiated into the chapter. To contact all alumni and keep them informed of the chapter activities, Gamma Sigma News is published once each year by the group.

In addition to leaders of bands, other alumni familiar to most people which the Sigma Nus claim are Zane Grey, novelist, and Ellsworth Vines, tennis player as members.





Founded in 1856, the national fraternity of Theta Chi was begun at Norwich University, Norwich, Vt.


Founded at Union College in 1847, Theta Delta Chi is known as the fraternity of

Jack Gieck, another activity man, was a Cardinal Guild representative and social chairman of Alpha Chi Sigma. Other members of Alpha Chi Sigma in the house are Bob Baumert and Dan Goodfellow, who is also president of the A.I.Chem.E. Bob Brinkman was a member of Tau Beta Pi, Phi Mu Alpha, and a member of the recently formed Mechanical Engineering Honorary, Pi Tau Sigma. Eric Schweim and Don Spaulding, two veterinary medicine seniors, are both members of Phi Zeta and Spaulding is on the staff of the Veterinary Student.

Al Bianco, a member of Eta Kappa Nu, was intramural manager for the house, seeing that Friley Hall won in its swimming competition.

Burton Flick, a junior, became the president of the A.I.A., and Stan Zager joined Phi Mu Alpha. John Foster, an advanced military student, was in the Pontoniers and on the Engineering Council. The senior football manager, Bob Ettinger, was also a resident of Friley Hall, and joined in the feeling of the men that the division of Friley Hall into two houses really made for strength.

The dormitory to which Friley Hall men will return after the war is the newest addition to the campus building program. Begun in 1939, the north wing was constructed and housed 150 men. In June, 1941, the contract was let for the remainder of the building, the general contractor being C. C. Larson & Sons of Council Bluffs. Plumbing and heating work was done by the Wheatland Company, Cedar Rapids, and the electrical work by Maier Electrical Company of Minneapolis. Located on college land, the total cost of the structure was \$753,457.

Built to house 645 men, the dormitory was planned by Oren Thomas and Brooks and Borg, architects. Plans for the building were checked by A. H. Kimball, head of Architectural Engineering Department, Mrs. Madge McGlade, housing director, B. H. Platt, superintendent of buildings and grounds, and President Friley. Covering 141,350 square feet and occupying 1,323,100 cubic feet, the hall contains 345 dormitory rooms and three big lounges. The diningroom, designed to accommodate 800, is located at the front of the dormitory, and was planned to feed both the men of Friley Hall and Hughes Hall.

Thirty navy cooks and bakers and thirty civilian workers under the guidance of Dean Marshall Hossle, manager of the Friley Hall kitchen, are necessary to prepare the meals for the 1,000 navy men now housed in Friley Hall. Meals are served from two cafeteria lines, where steam-controlled counters keep food warm until served. In the baking department, two mixing machines with 30 and 60-gallon bowls have attachments for mixing bread and pie dough, whipping potatoes and mixing batter. Refrigerators line the wall between the cafeteria and the kitchen, opening into both rooms, to eliminate unnecessary handling of the food. College water, light and power are used in the kitchens.

#### HUGHES HALL

WICE moved from their quarters by changing college conditions, members of Hughes Hall, now occupied by naval trainees, were first moved to the top floors of the Memorial Union, and were then obliged to scatter to private homes when Curtiss-Wright women were brought there. They have maintained their identity, however, and have upheld their campus position by claiming the all-college championship in basketball and touch football, and by winning the Sinfonia Sing trophy.

Claiming six musically inclined men, Hughes Hall saw Robert Young, Virgil Hanson, Edwin Hawyer, Clarence Bockhopp, Robert Himmel and Owen Scheldorf join the ranks of Phi Mu Alpha. Dick Utterback, president of Hughes, is a member of Scabbard and Blade, while Don Lippenberger, Robert Wahl, Robert Crawford and Robert Gerber represent Hughes in Tau Beta Pi.




