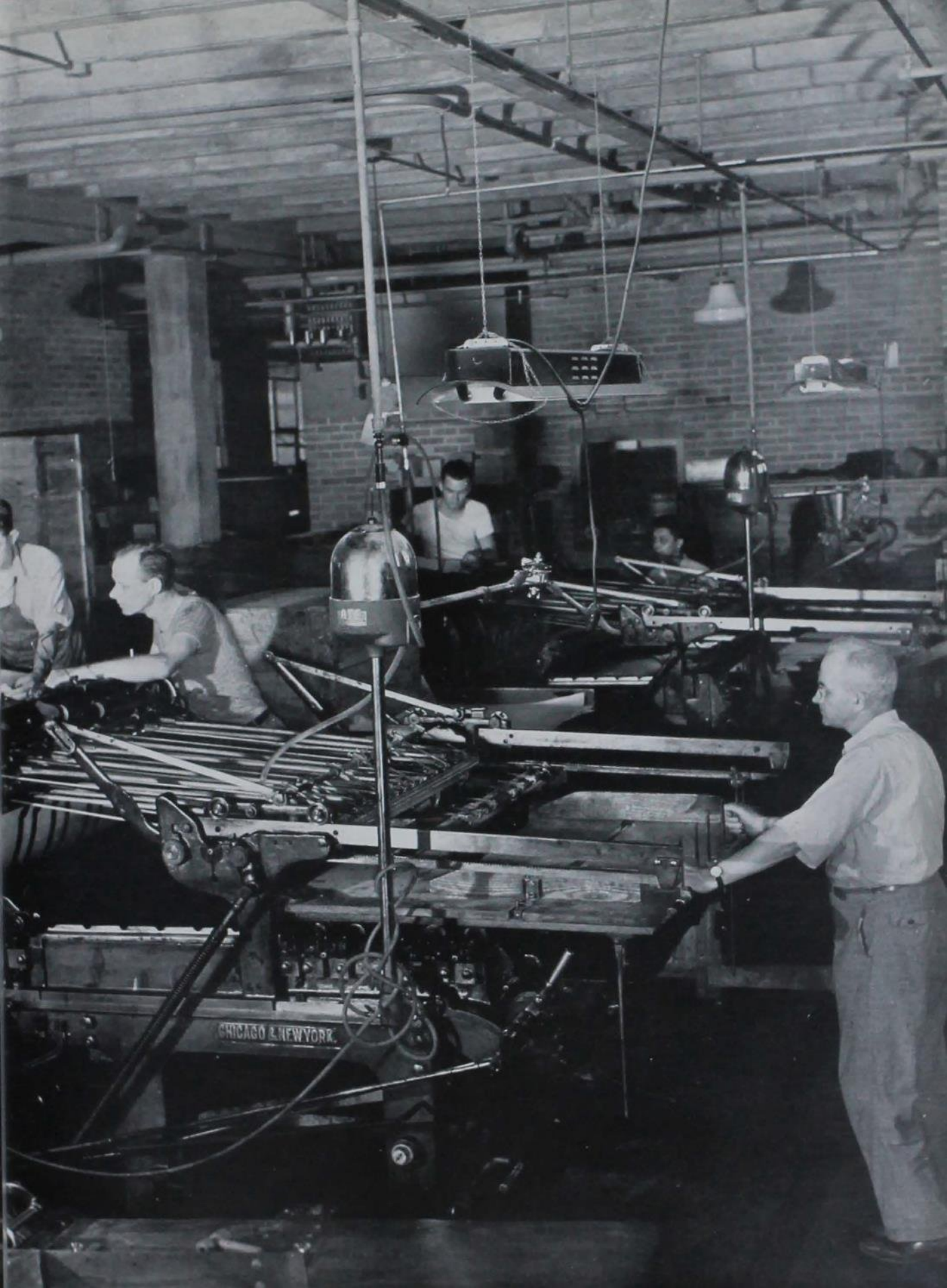

engineering courses and wait for openings in OCS—most of them were gone by February.

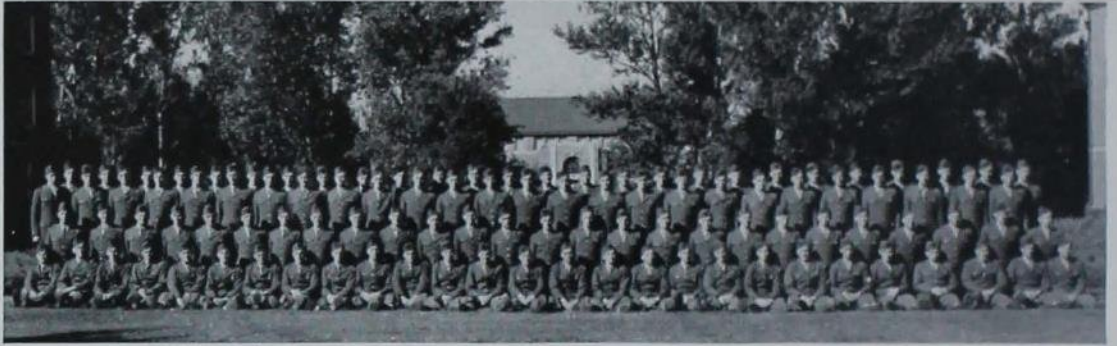

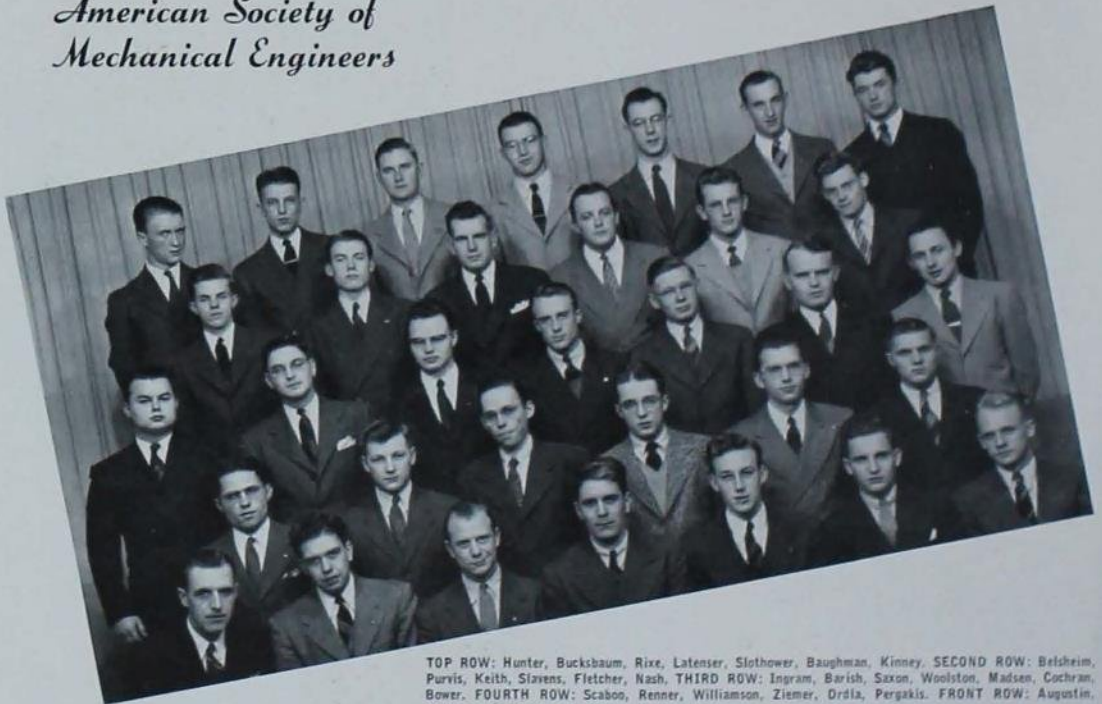

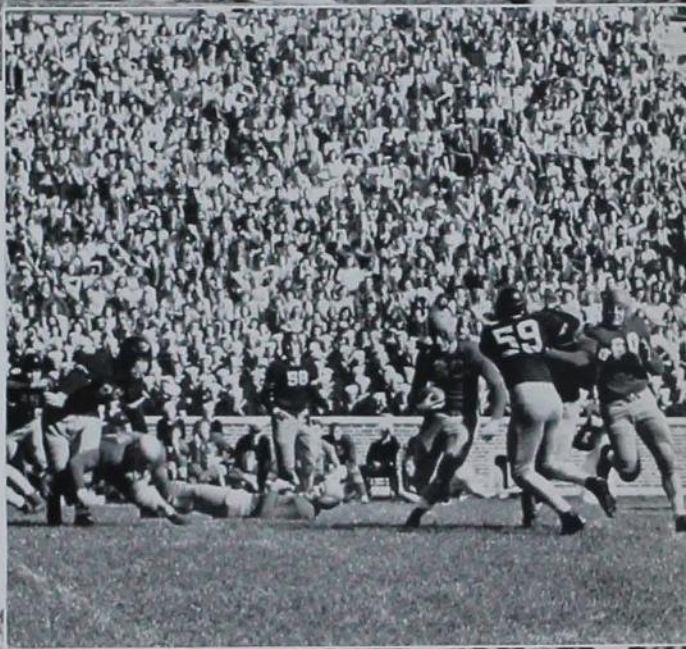

Scoring an average of 21 points per game, Cyclones held their opponents to 14.

During Coach Michalske's first full year as coach, he produced one of the best teams the Cyclones have seen. They tied for second in the Big Six with three wins and two losses and finished their rugged schedule with four victories and four defeats.

Howard Tippee's accurate passes highlighted the season, accounting for half of the Cyclone touchdowns and setting up many of the others. He completed 56 passes out of

122 tries for an average of 114 yards per game.

Leading scorer on the Cyclone eleven was George Gast, superb blocking and pass-snatching back who scored 36 points. Meredith Warner, speedy fullback and place-kicking artist, scored 32 points, followed by Tippee's 24. Paul Keckley was the team's leading ground gainer with 107 yards in 17 tries for an average of 6.3 yards per try.

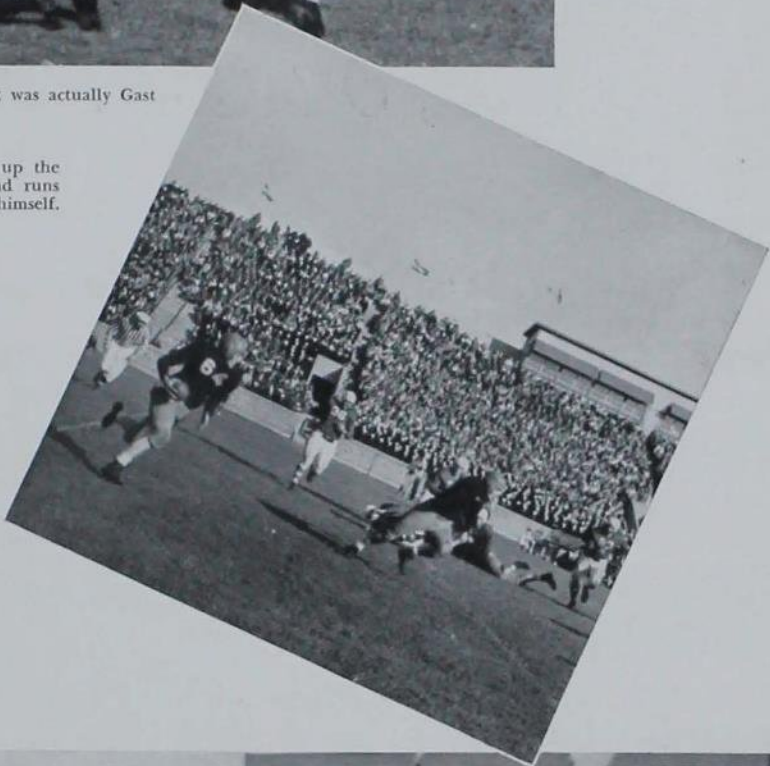

Drubbing Kansas State, Nebraska and their arch rival Drake, the Cyclones won a hard fought battle from the tough Kansas team 13 to 6. In the first game of the season they met the number two ranking team of the nation, Iowa Pre-Flight, and were defeated by the Seahawks 33 to 13. 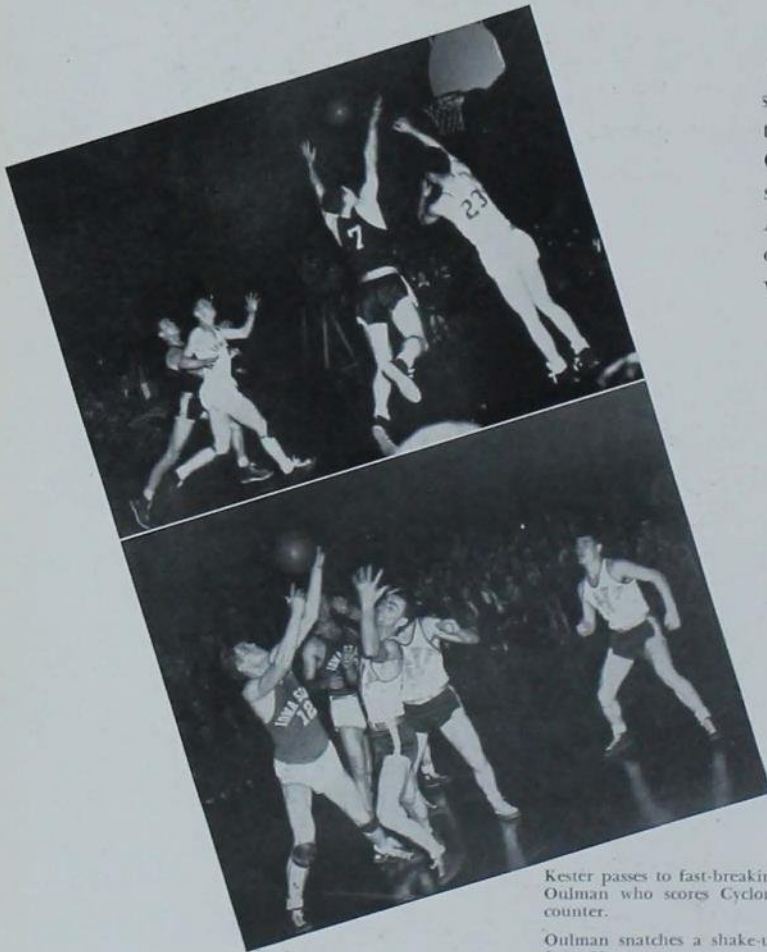

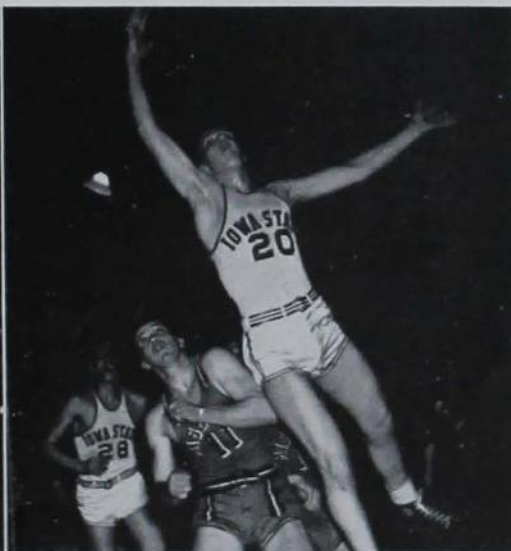

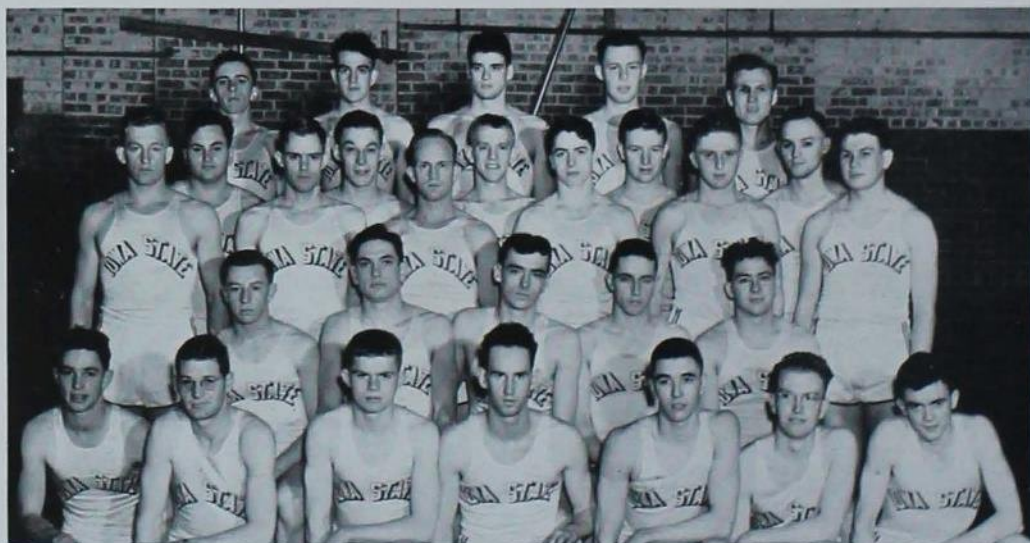
Cyclones take Big Six track title for first time in history.

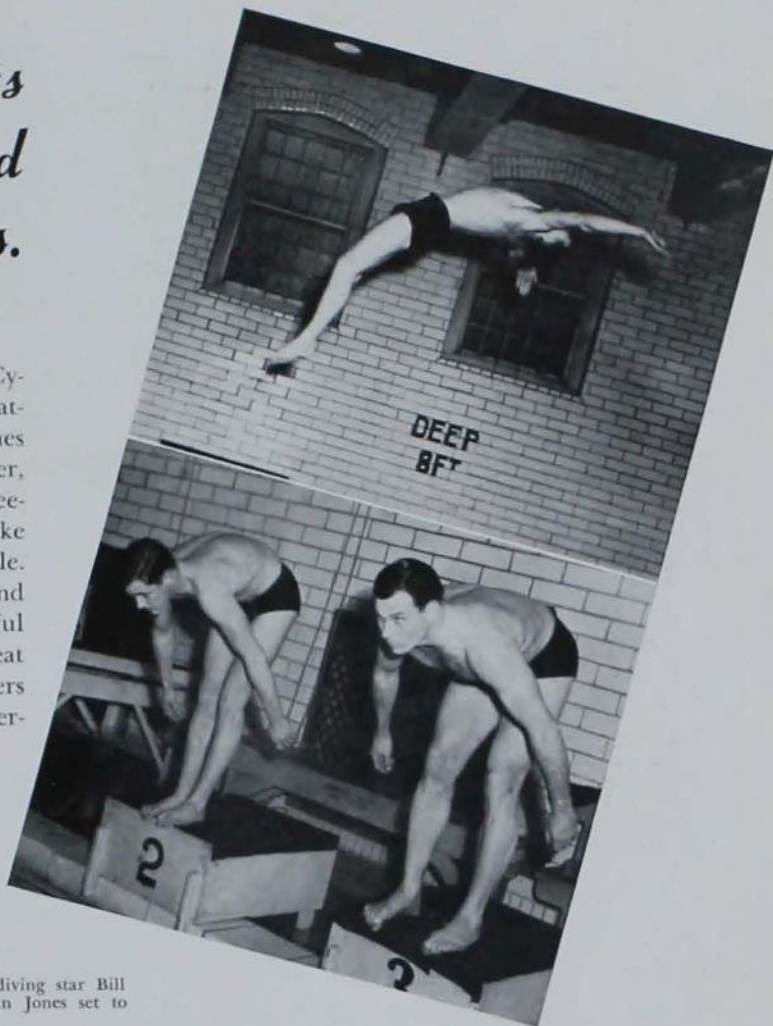

Traveling to Chicago for their second meet, the Cyclones met the most powerful swimming team in the nation. The Great Lakes Naval Training School swimmers broke three world's records as they overpowered the Cyclones 67 to 17.

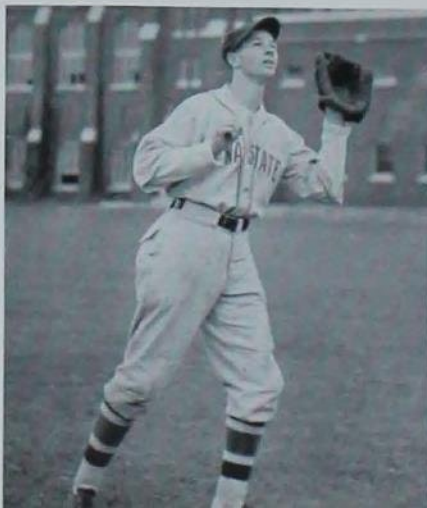

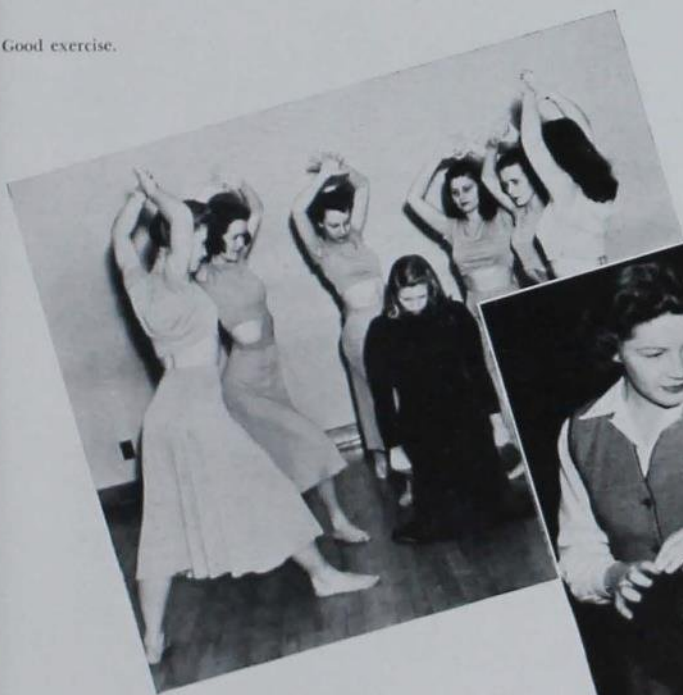


