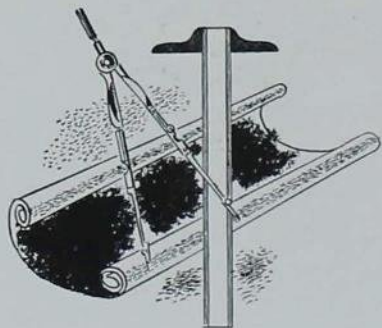






Dean P. Mabel Nelson,

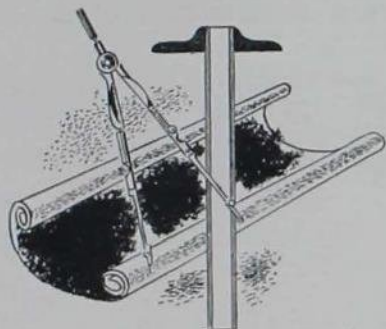




## Dean H. H. Kildee

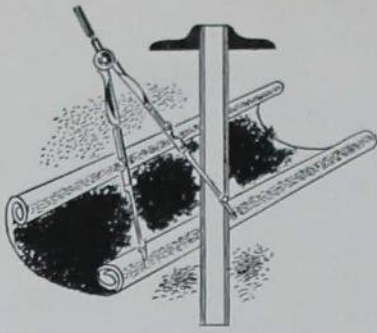


## Dean T. R. Agg

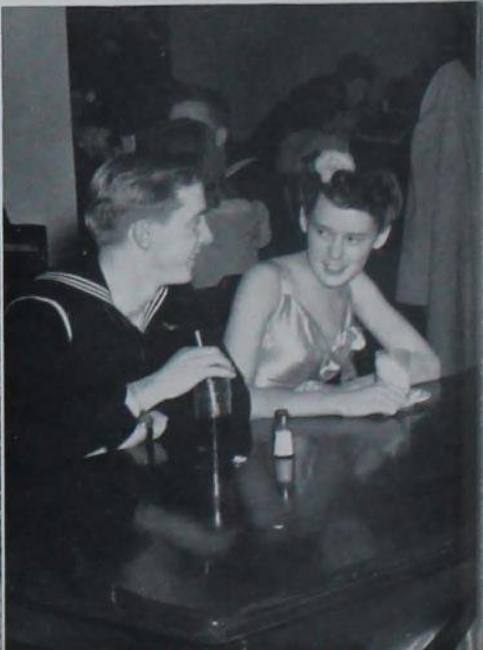

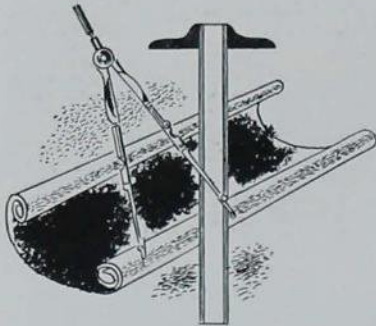

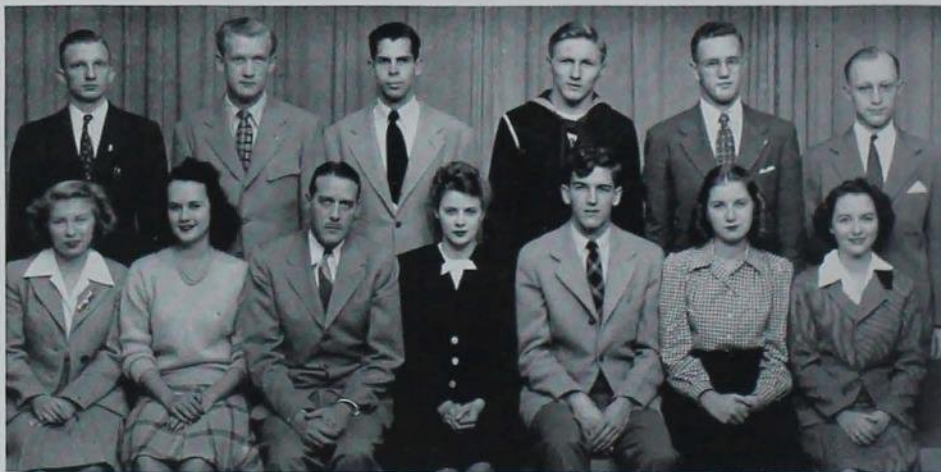

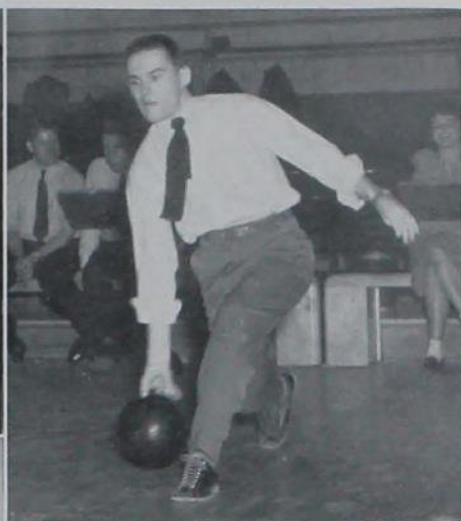

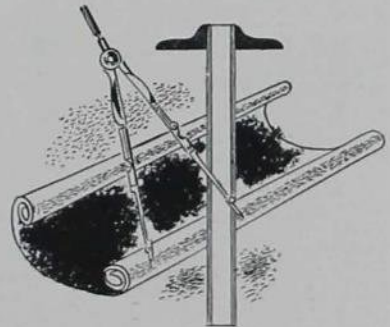

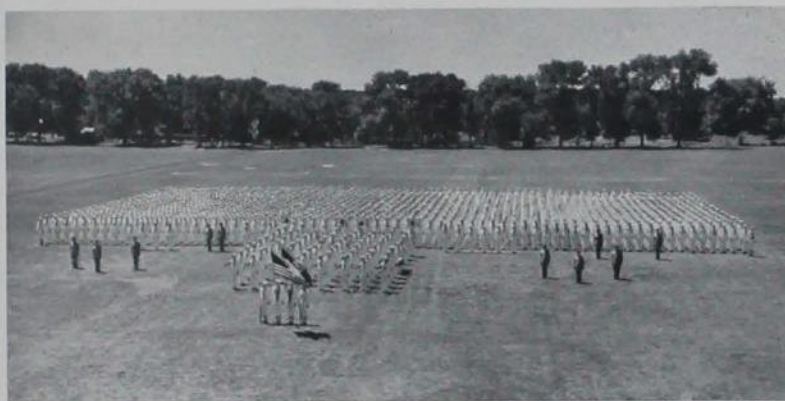

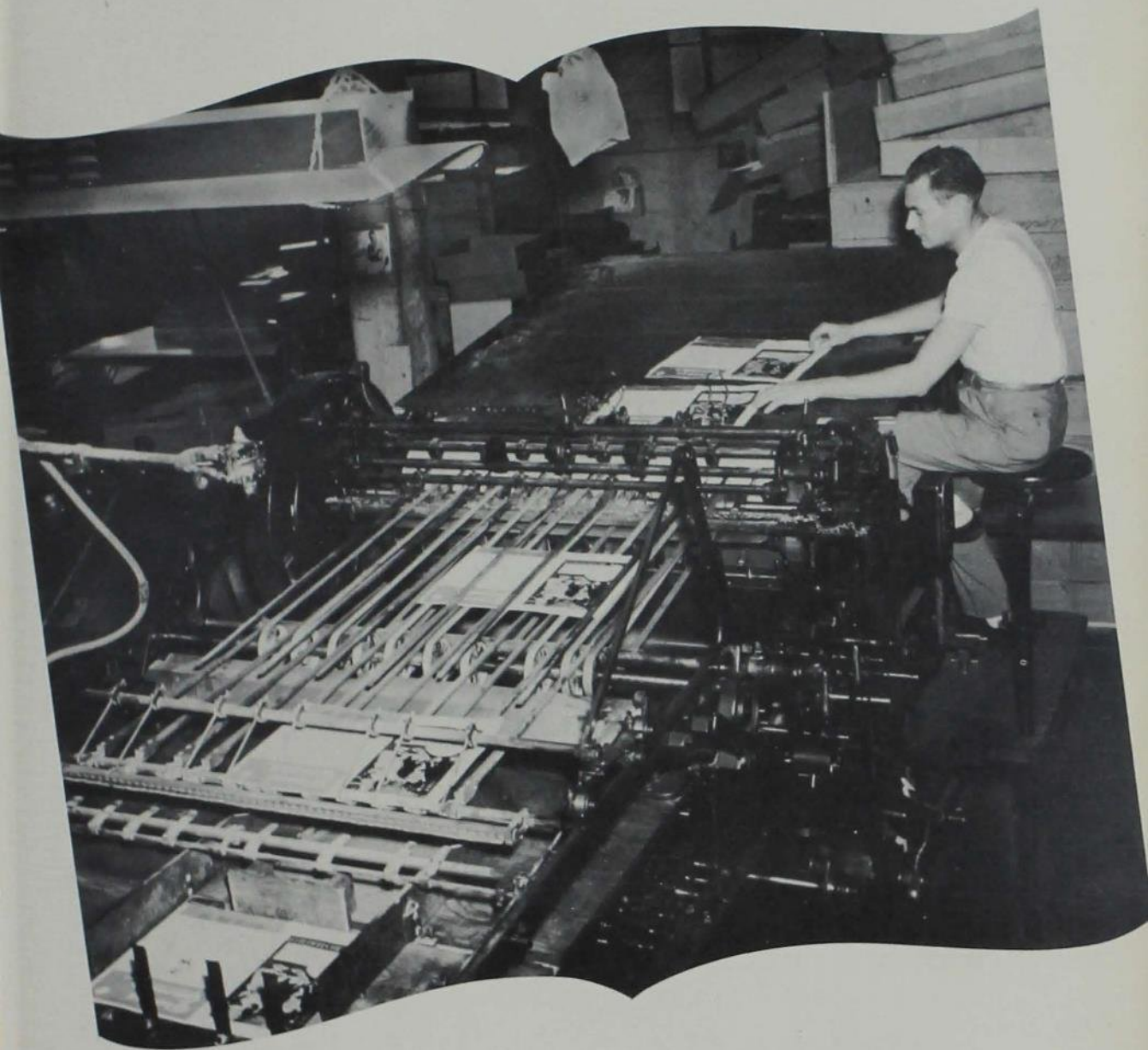

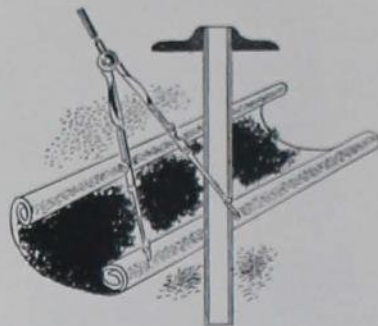

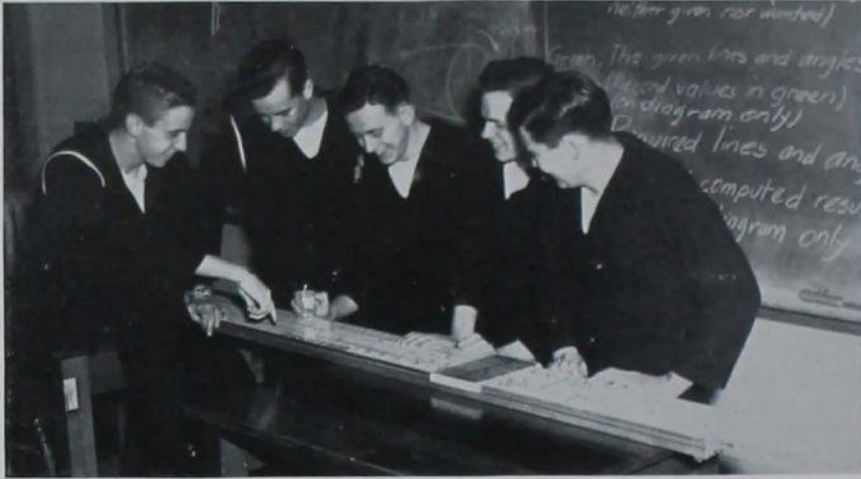

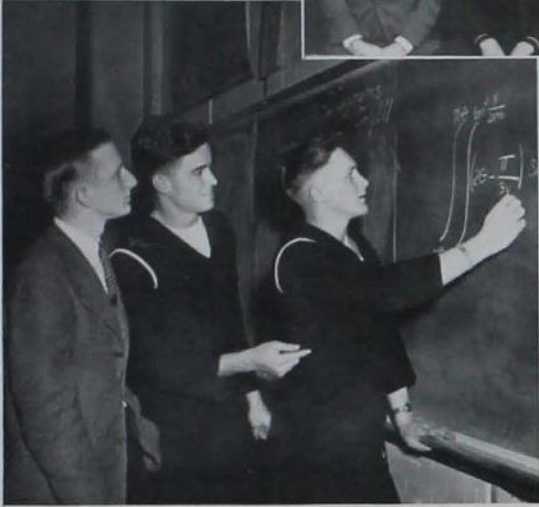

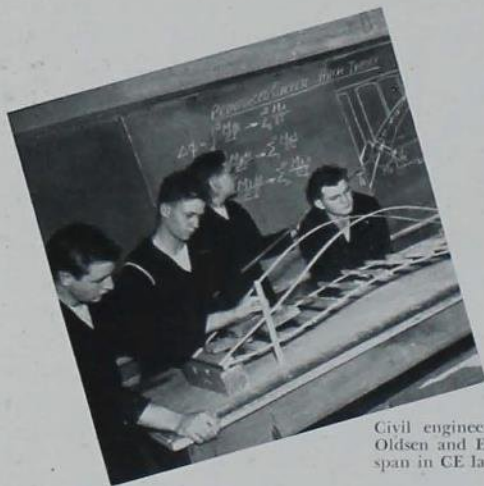

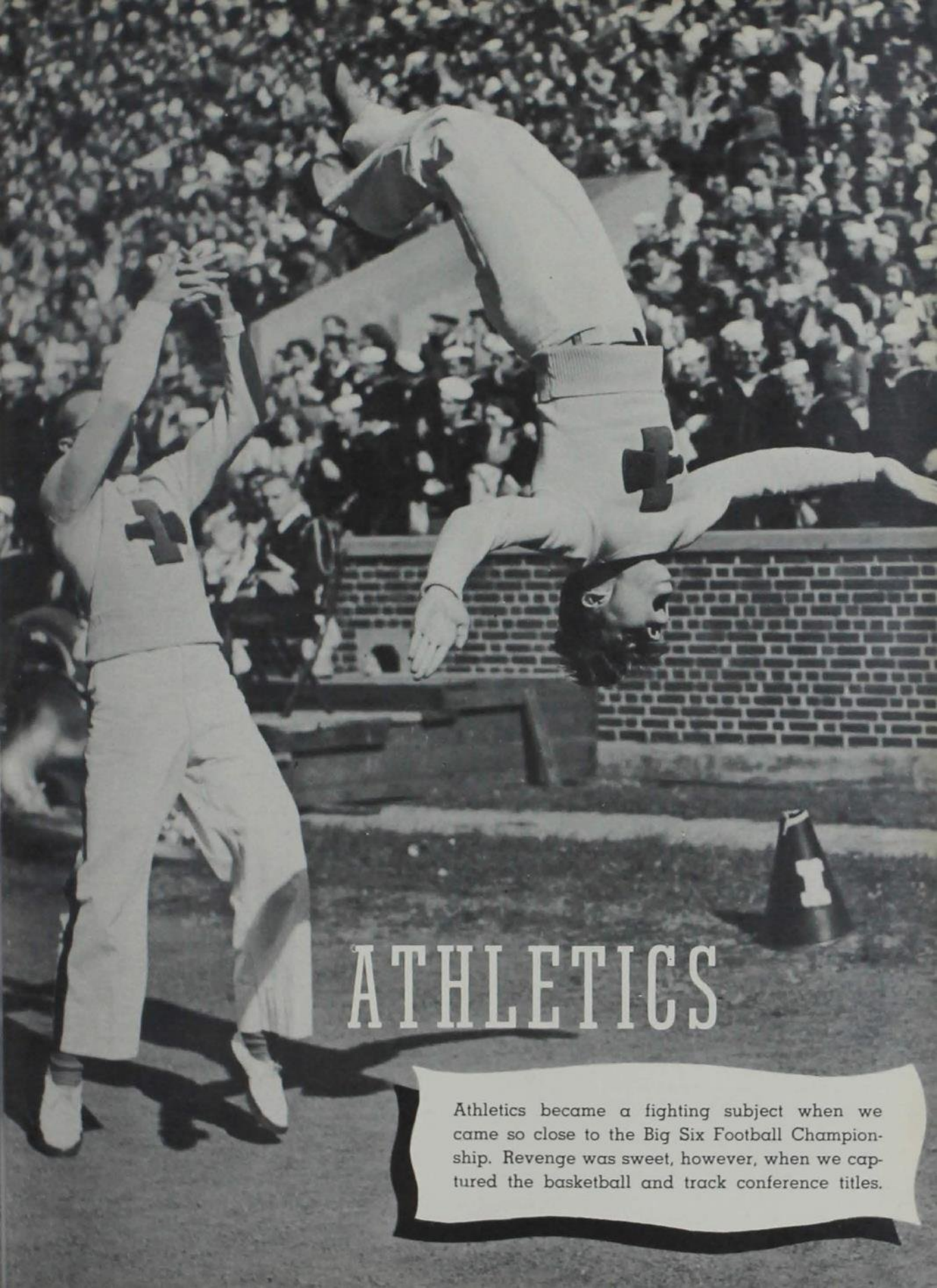

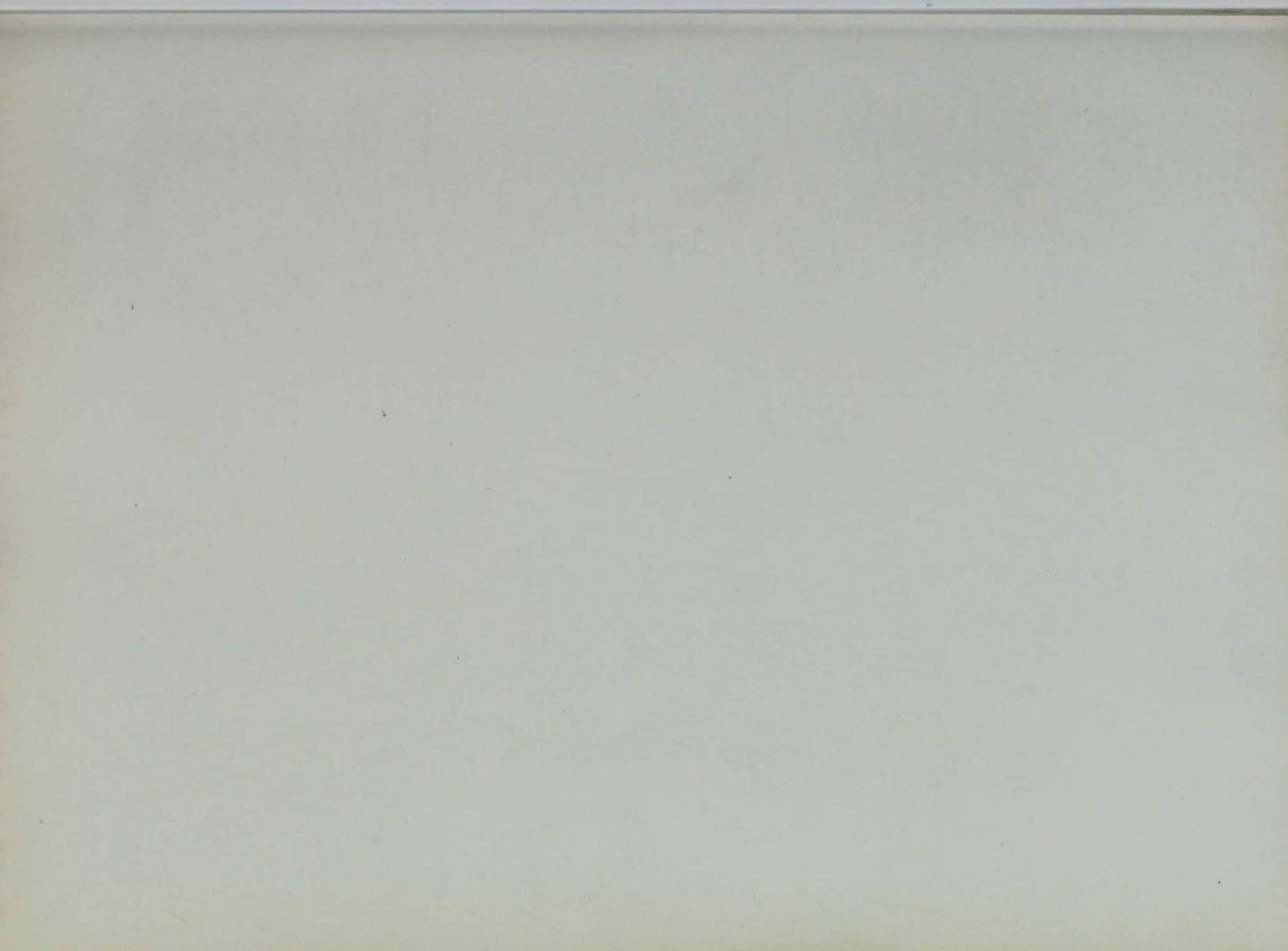

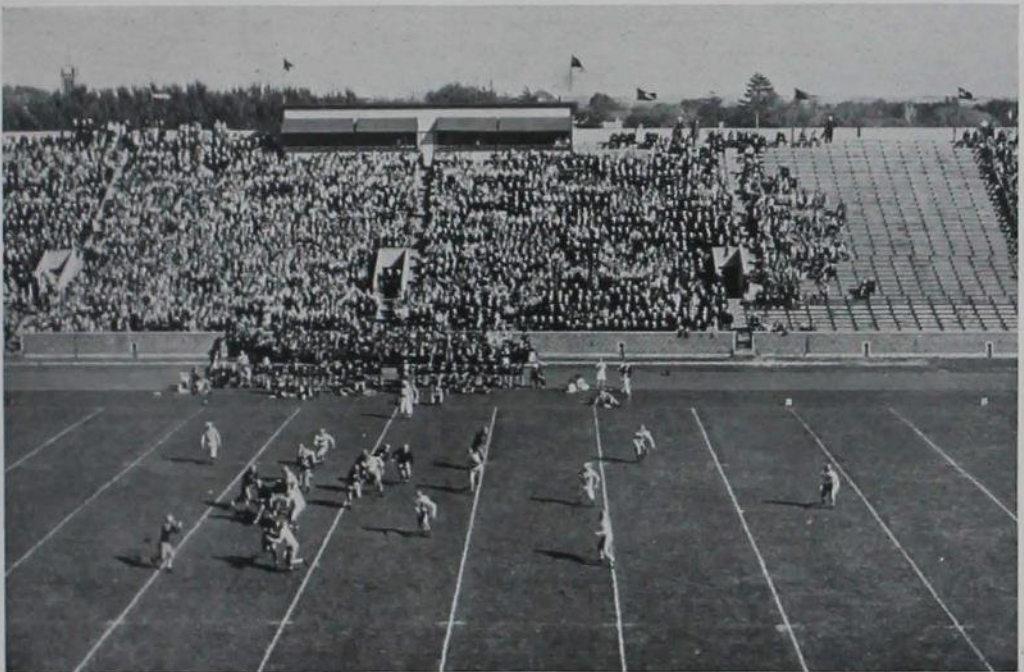
# HOMECOMING

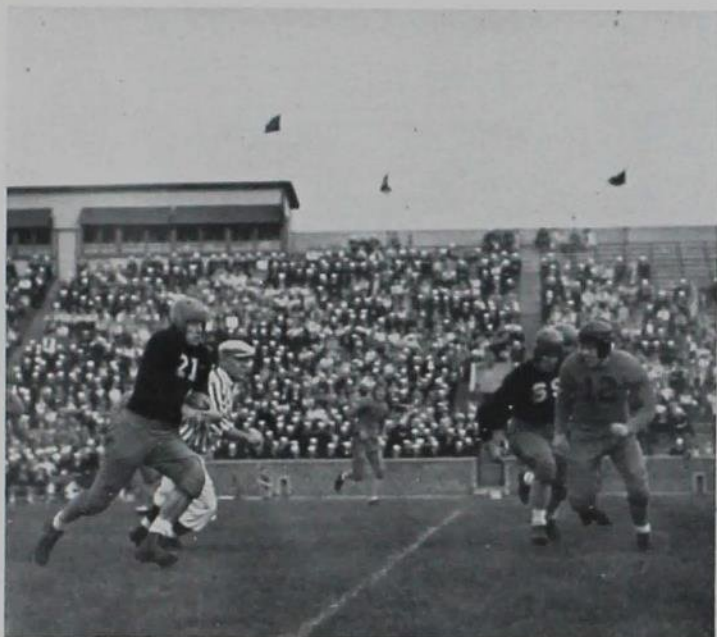

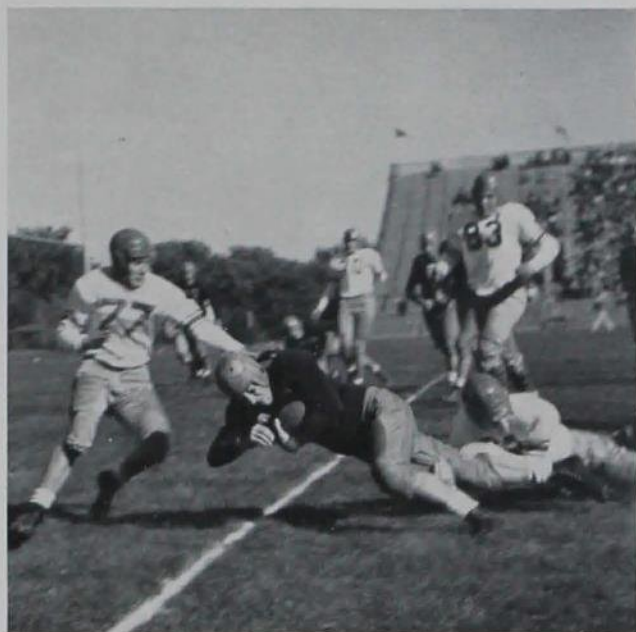

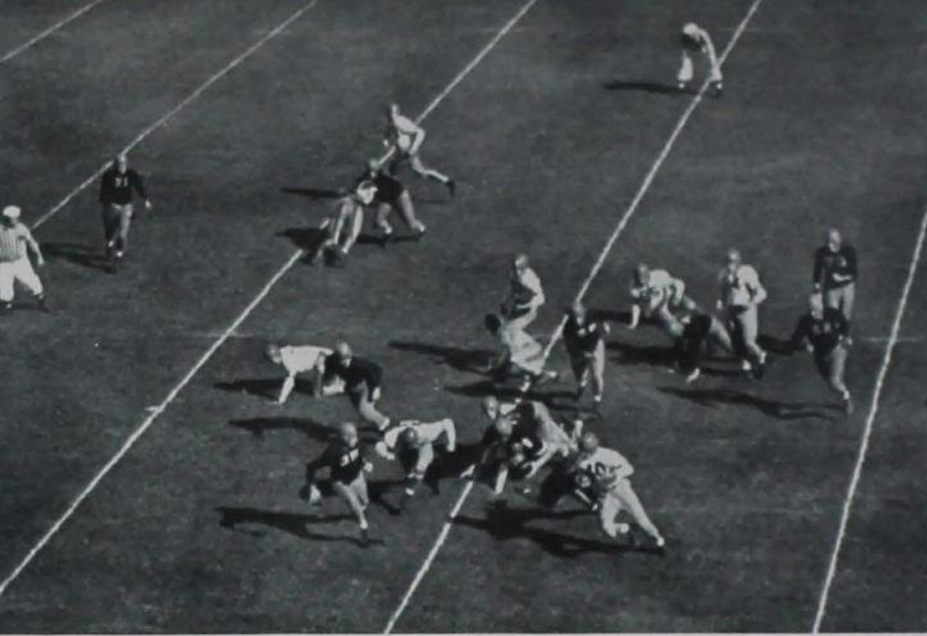

Jack Fathauer attained national prominence as he made the second team on Bill Stern's *Look* and *Fortune* magazine all-American selections. Wright missed all-American attention as he was transferred by the navy after the Oklahoma contest.

In the Missouri game, Iowa State went into the lead, lost it, went ahead again, had the Tiger's go into the lead and finally pulled up to tie in the closing minutes. Against Nebraska, quarterback Gene Phelps scored all three touchdowns while paving the way for the Cornhuskers' only points with a fumble.

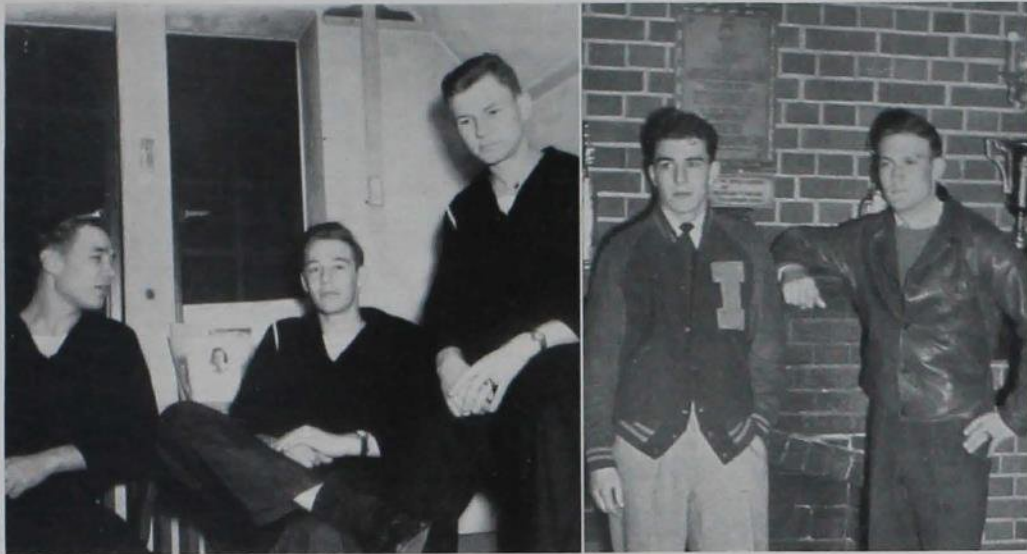

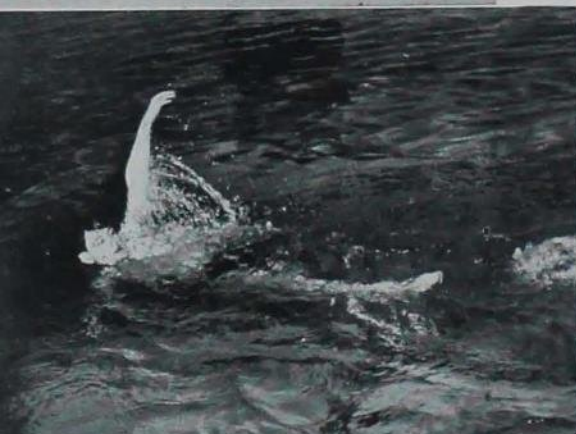

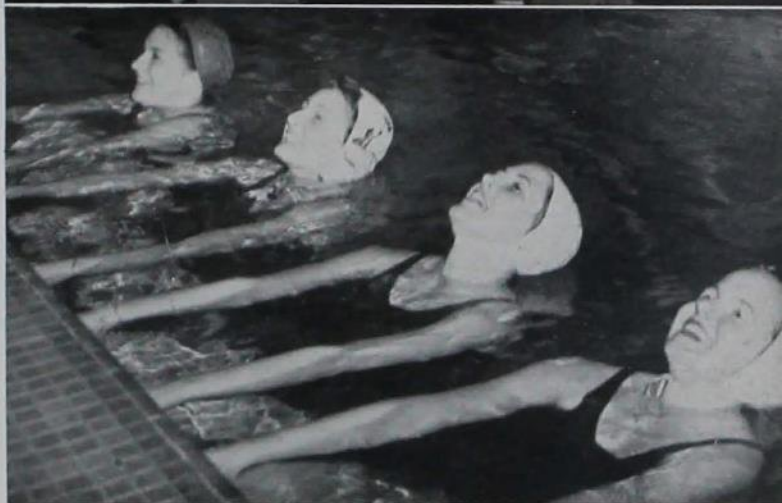

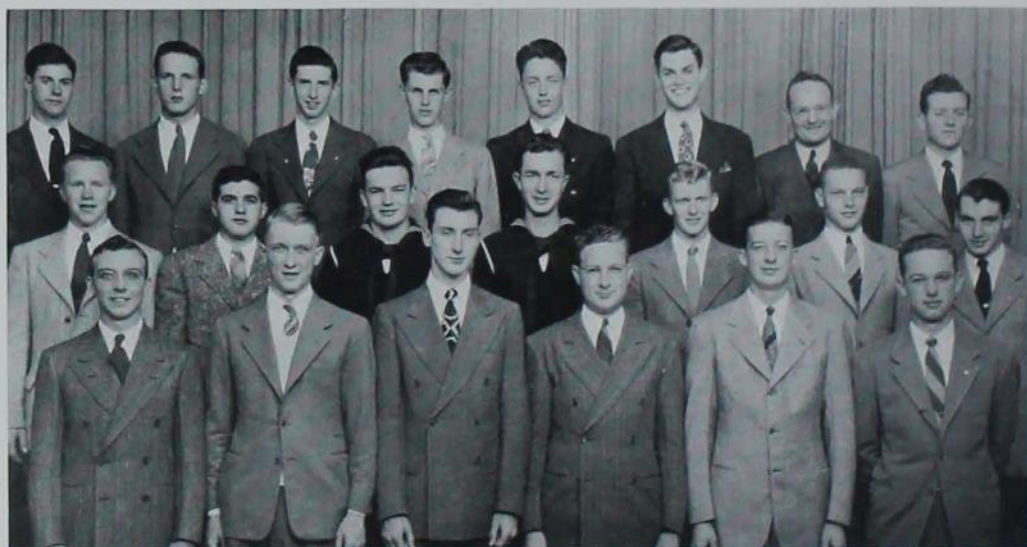

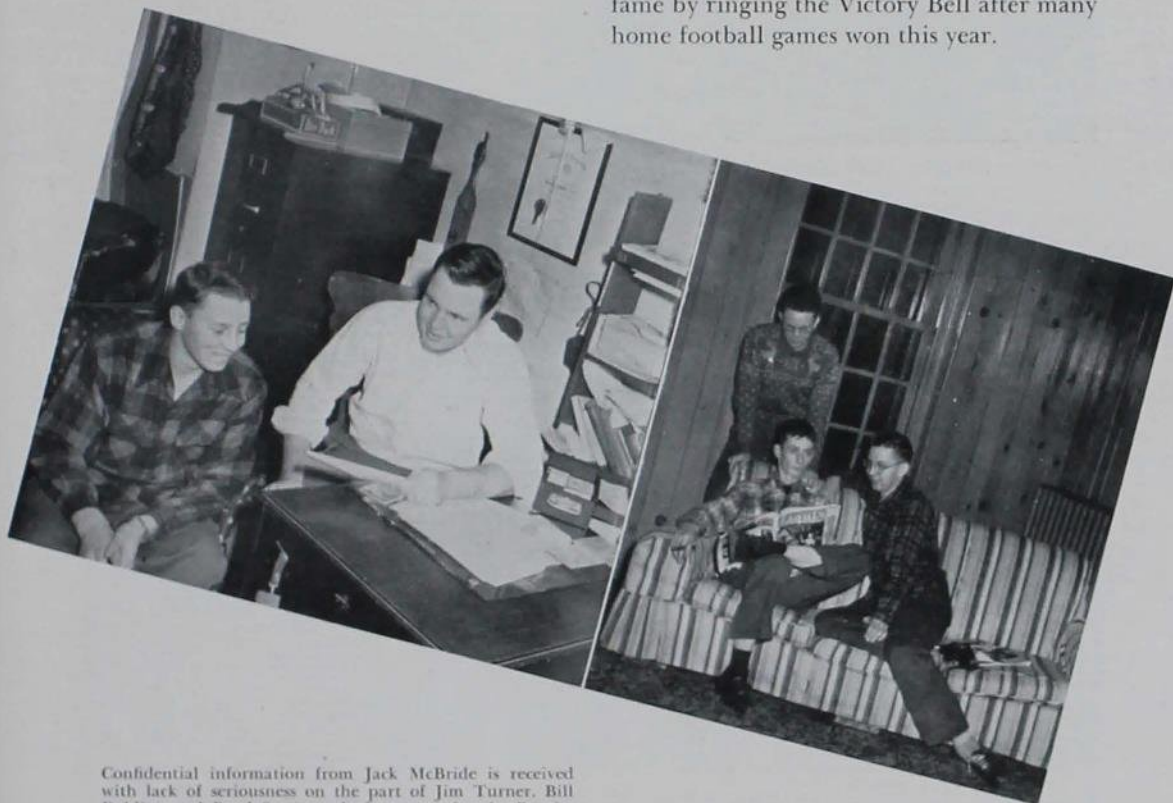
