according to the Original Plan of the Survey of the said Land, returned to the GENERAL LAND OFFICE by the Surveyor General, which said Tract has been purchased by the said William Whitney Now know ye, That the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in consideration of the payment, and conformity with the several Acts of Congress, in such case made and provided, Here Grant and Guarantee, and by these presents Do Give and Grant, unto the said William Whitney a d to his heirs, (the said Tract above described), TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities and appurtenances of whatsoever nature thereunto belonging, unto the said William Whitney and to his heirs and assigns forever.



In testimony whereof, I, Franklin Pierce PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, have caused these letters to be made Patent, and the Seal of the GENERAL LAND OFFICE to be hereunto affixed.

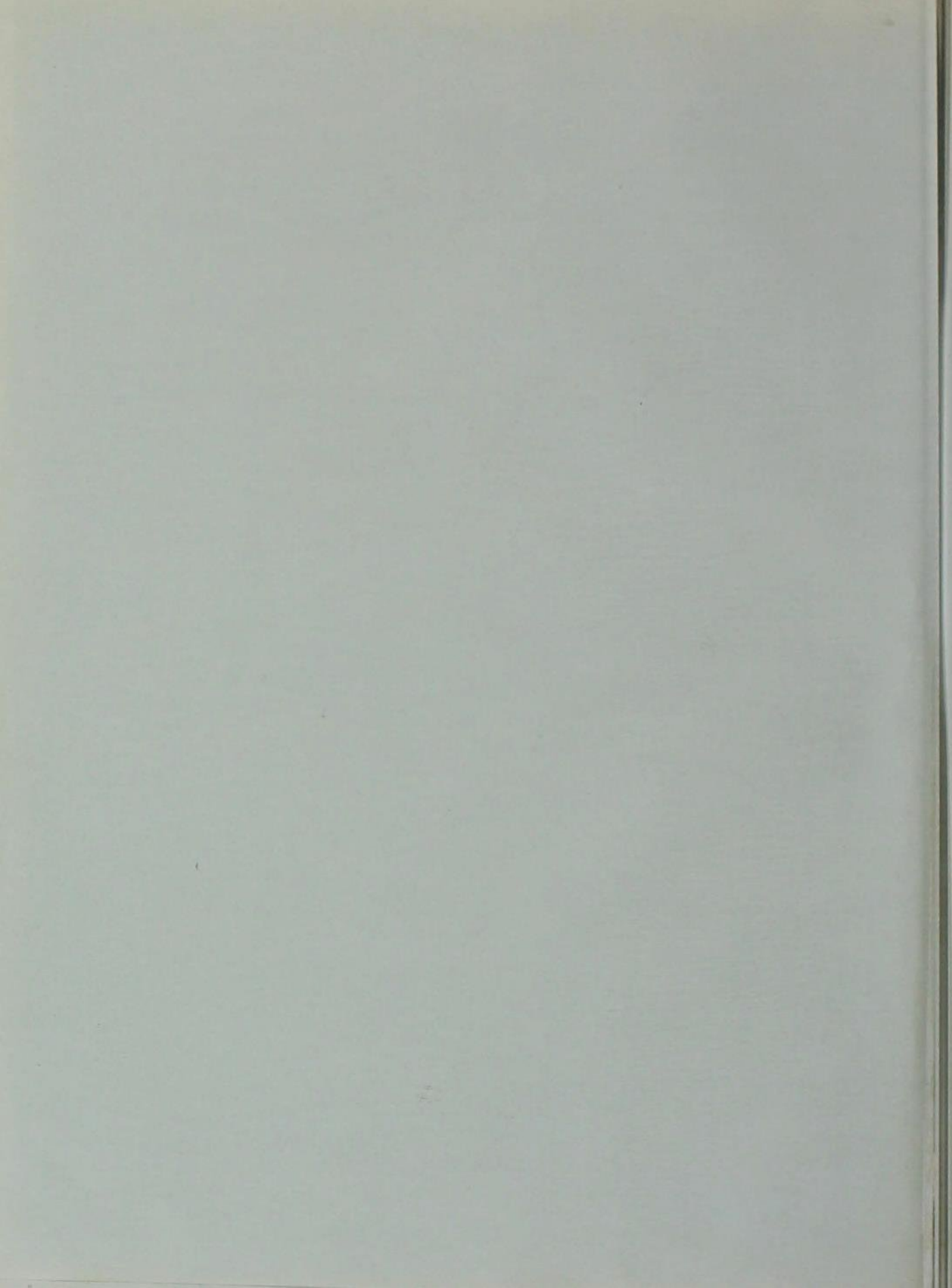


# FOREWORD

It is our hope that this Bomb may help to keep the 1933 highlights shining.







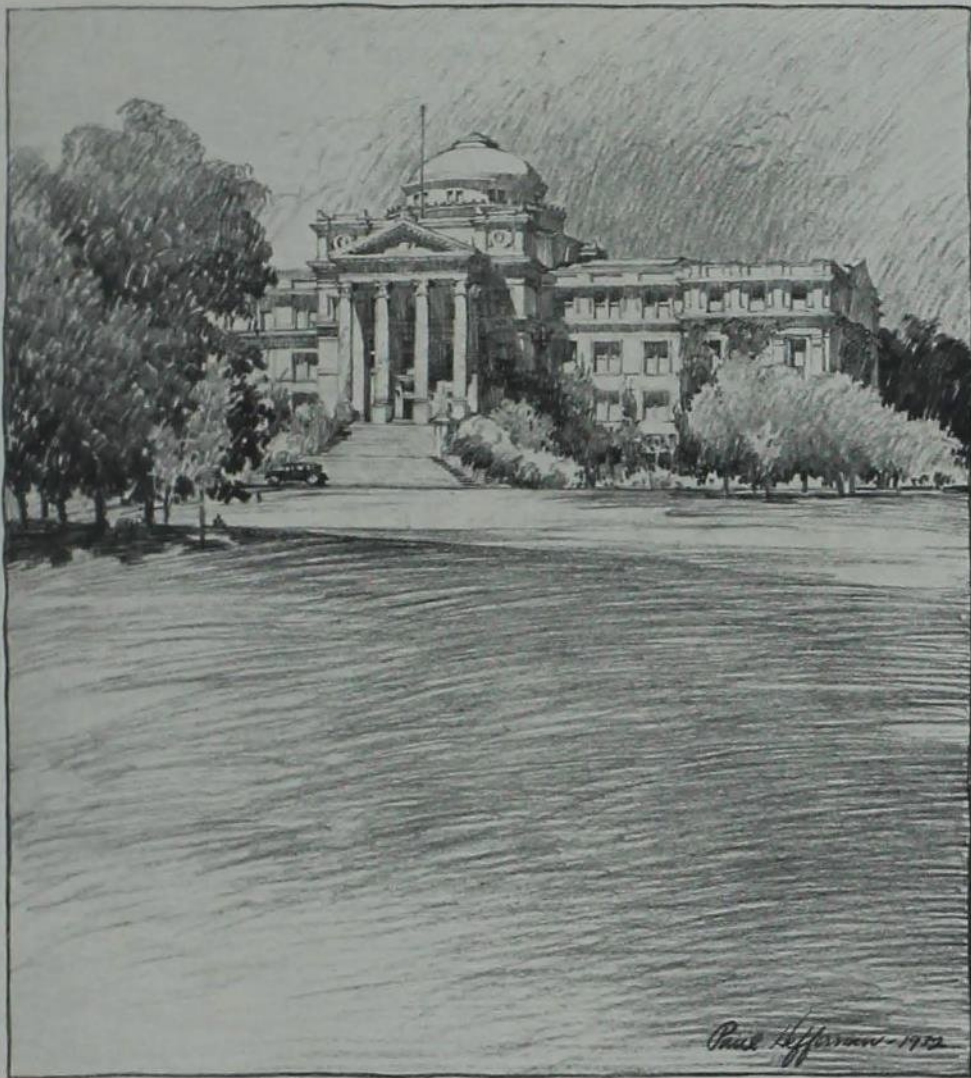

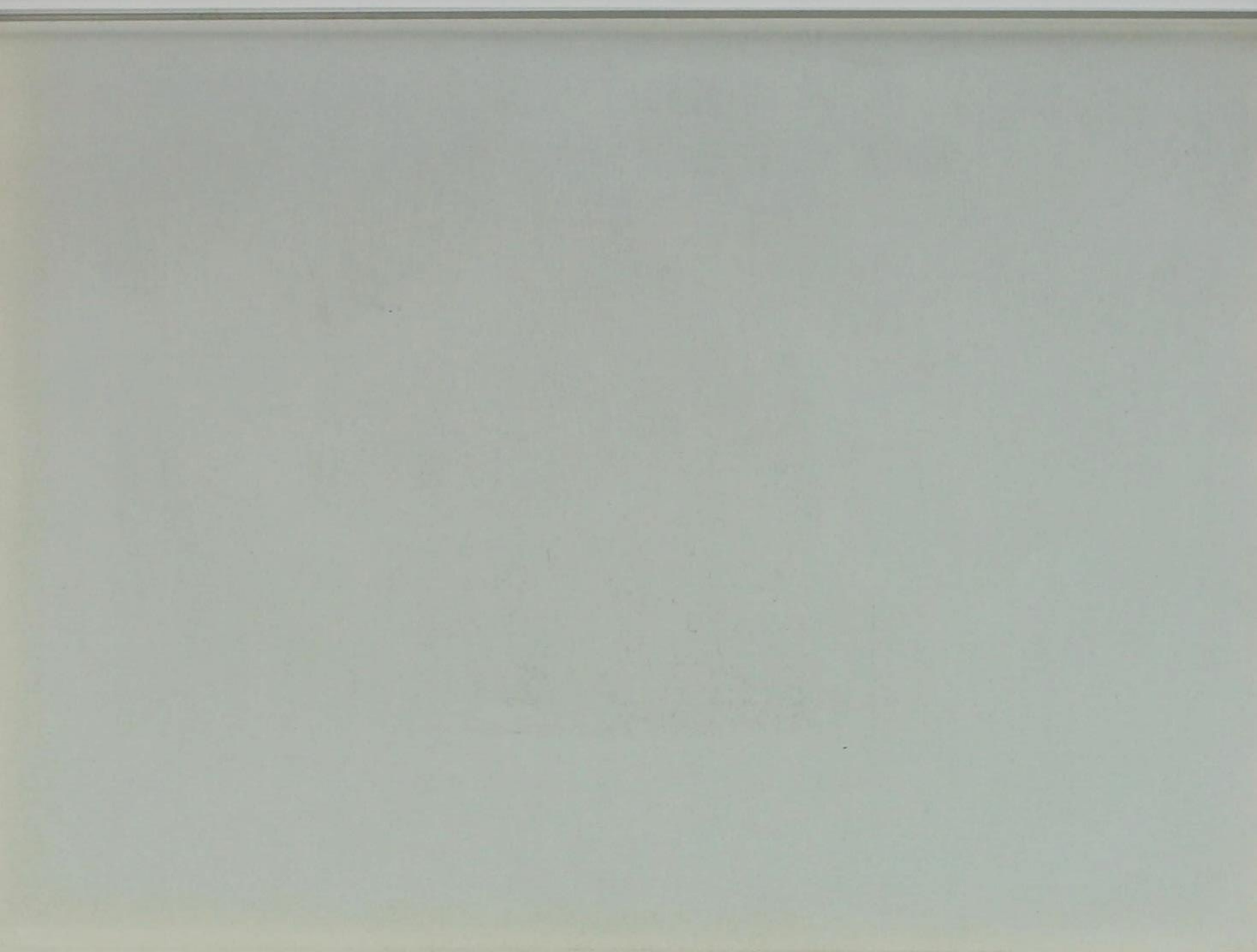


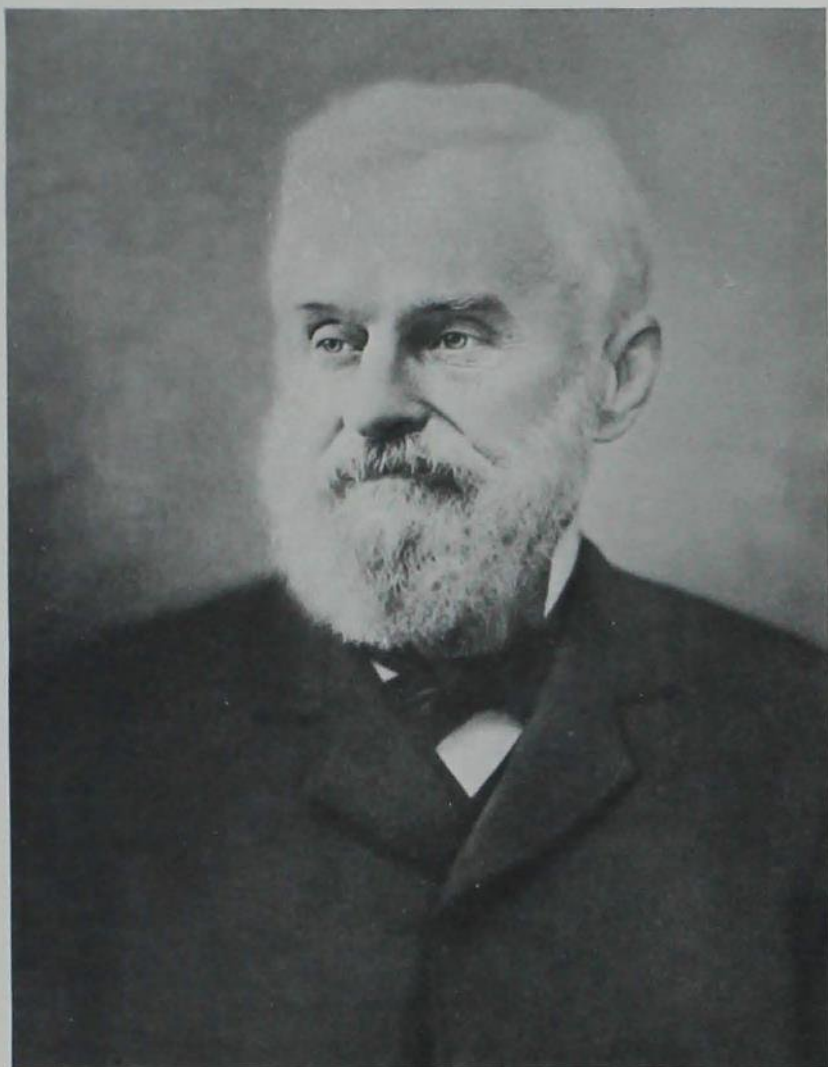

# GRADUATE COLLEGE

◆◆ **B**ACK in 1872 one lone candidate for an advanced degree formed the entire student body in the newly-organized Graduate College.

Last year more than a thousand students seeking masters' and doctors' degrees were registered in this highest division of Iowa's institution for higher technical education.

For many years the graduate work of the college was administered by a committee on graduate work. But as the enrollment grew, higher degrees

became more and more attractive. Finally the difficulties of administration increased to such an extent that the administration of all graduate work was placed in a separate division to be known as the Graduate College (so the catalog of 1913 states), presided over by a dean.

The largest number of degrees was given just before the war—in 1917—but during the war the attendance was cut about 40 percent.

Although it has been only in the last two decades that graduate students have enrolled in considerable numbers, Iowa State College ranks thirteenth in the list of universities in the number of degrees of Doctor of Philosophy conferred in the sciences and technical subjects.

# A G R I C U L T U R E



R. M. HUGHES  
*Acting Dean*

◆◆ THE president of the College—A. S. Welch—who lectured on landscape gardening, and Dr. Norton S. Townsend, professor of agriculture and horticulture, comprised the entire agricultural faculty when the College was formally opened in 1869. Now over 60 members of the agricultural instructional staff are necessary to take care of the largest agricultural enrollment of any institution in the United States.

◆ There were many handicaps to impede the early agricultural work—meager equipment, limited fields of pursuit, and a period of administrative instability in which a definite administrative policy was decidedly lacking. But in 1891, with the coming of Wm. M. Beardshear as president of the College and James Wilson as professor of agriculture (Wilson was later to become Secretary of Agriculture in McKinley's cabinet), a new era dawned for agriculture and for the entire institution.

◆ Enrollment in the College passed the 1,000 mark; more liberal state appropriations for buildings and support were obtained; various important buildings were erected and equipment purchased. And the name of the institution, in 1898, was officially changed to the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts.

◆ Today Iowa State's fame as an agricultural institution has grown to be world-wide. This is demonstrated by the fact that of the 59 students coming from 31 different countries to Iowa State College last year, 23 enrolled in agriculture.

# E N G I N E E R I N G

◆◆◆ **T**wo instructors, a meager workshop, and less than a score of students enrolled in one small Department of Mechanical Arts were everything necessary to found an engineering school that later grew into the largest west of the Mississippi. Now the Engineering Division boasts of over 100 instructors and trained investigators, 11 engineering buildings of the finest type, and over 1,000 students of collegiate grade!

It is interesting to note in the history of this division that financial furries have periodically caused a decrease in enrollment, and that panics and low peaks have been followed by rises.

Strangely enough, however, it took the fall of 1918 to prove the popularity of engineering on the campus. That fall the Student Army Training Corps was established in connection with the engineering school. And it was then that a great influx of freshman engineering students—over a thousand strong—came to Iowa State College. All of them were too young to enlist direct, but all were confident that training in the Student Army Training Corps would lead directly and speedily to their participation in the World War.

The 15 years since that fall have shown a remarkable increase in the number of engineering graduates. Of the total number of graduates from this division, 92 percent have been graduated in the last 25 years.

For those who cannot come to the College for acquiring industrial trade information the Engineering Extension Department was organized. Now short courses for plumbers, metermen, firemen, janitors, telephone operators, bakers, painters, dyers and cleaners are held throughout the year.

# HOME ECONOMICS



GENEVIEVE FISHER  
*Dean of Home Economics*

♦♦ **F**ITTINGLY, Mrs. Mary B. Welch, wife of Iowa Agricultural College's first president, was the "mother" of home economics instruction on the campus. When the college opened in 1868 she offered to women students 3 hours of work a week in practical homemaking, and so the college became the first institution of its rank in the country to give instruction in home economics.

A kitchen in the basement of Old Main—said to be the first of its kind in any college—was Mrs. Welch's first "laboratory." The weekly work of a home economics student (and in 1868

that meant all women students) was divided into three sections—practice in the kitchen, the dining room and the laundry.

From this homely beginning has developed Iowa State's highly modern Home Economics Division, with its laboratories, classrooms and facilities that Mrs. Welch can hardly have imagined. Gradually it has been built up. The course in institution cookery, for instance, may be traced back to 1877, when cooking classes prepared and served meals for one table in the main college dining room. A home management house (now there are four, and don't call them practice cottages!), added in 1916, was one of the first of its kind in the United States.

And the Division has awarded 2,503 bachelor's degrees, 266 master's, and three doctor's. Early in 1933 hundreds of holders of these degrees were called upon by Dean Genevieve Fisher to aid in the important emergency relief work of planning dietaries for families receiving relief.

# INDUSTRIAL SCIENCE

◆◆ I DEDICATE these halls to the progress of industrial science," said President A. S. Welch in his inaugural address on March 17, 1869. He went on to suggest that the name "Industrial College" might well be applied to the fledgling institution.

From that time to this the Industrial Science Division has been the parent trunk from which have emerged the other branches of the College. The fundamental major sciences of the Division—bacteriology and hygiene, botany, chemistry, economics, geology, mathematics, military science and tactics, physics and zoology—have appeared in every catalog and biennial report from the beginning of the College.

Strangely enough, the course in bacteriology, first taught at Iowa State College in 1888, was the first regular course of its kind given in any institution in the United States, including medical schools!

The Botany Department, too, did its bit of pioneering. It was the first in the country to use the compound microscope in the study of plants and the first to conduct regular laboratory instruction.

Athletics today receive much consideration from the entire College, but not so always. For 20 years organized athletics received no financial assistance and very little encouragement from the College. The department moved from the basement of Morrill Hall to a temporary training shed near the water tower, later to the third floor of the Engineering Annex and finally to the new gymnasium.

# VETERINARY MEDICINE



C. H. STANGE

◆◆ **I**T TOOK only 2 years to make a veterinary surgeon when, in 1879, the "School of Veterinary Science" was established as a part of Iowa Agricultural College. Eight years later the course grew to 3 years; in 1903 it took rank with other phases of college work by demanding 4 years.

And in 1931 it grew another step. One year of pre-veterinary work of collegiate rank was required at that time, so that now a would-be veterinarian must go to college for 5 years.

The first veterinary hospital—where students as well as horses sought pills—was an old frame build-

ing on the site where Memorial Union now stands. Since that time the Division has changed homes five times.

The first was the original home of President Welch (South Hall); the second was North Hall; the third later became the student hospital and finally Music Hall; the fourth was Old Agricultural Hall; and fifth, the present Veterinary Quadrangle.

During its history, there have been but three veterinary deans at Iowa State. Dr. Millikan Stalker was the first dean, serving from 1880 to 1890. In 1909 the present dean—C. H. Stange—came.

It was during his deanship that the highest point in enrollment was reached. In 1930-31, 234 students set the high mark.

Although Iowa State's Veterinary Division has attained world-wide fame, it is interesting to note that of the 697 veterinary alumni, 331 of these are located in Iowa.

# AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION

◆◆ **S** EED corn trains, demonstration plots, short courses and lectures conducted all over Iowa were early made a part of the supplementary work of the College.

This type of extension work had no precedent. In fact, according to records, "President Welch organized and conducted the first farmers' institutes in the United States."

Mrs. Welch, wife of the first president, sympathized with her husband's interest in educational work of this nature, but believed it should be extended to include women, too. In a report made in 1883 she calls attention to a series of lectures on domestic science given in Des Moines to a class of 60 women.

By 1912 the demand for extension work had grown to such proportions that it was impossible to care for it efficiently through the College. Accordingly, a representative of the College was permanently placed in each county—thus the plan of county agents began.

During the war, the Agricultural Extension Department played a big part in stimulating food production. United States government statistics show that during these 2 years Iowa produced more foodstuffs than in any other 2 years in her history and more than any other state.

Today the service of the Agricultural Extension Department to the state may be measured in terms of better farming methods used throughout the state, the greater interest in better homes, interest in educational radio talks, demonstrations, or lectures and the response to the bulletin service sponsored by this department.

# HYGIENE DEPARTMENT

◆◆ IN THE early years of the College a student with "wheezles and sneezles" sought the only doctor on the campus—a teacher of bacteriology in the Veterinary Division—for his pills.

Now the student goes to our modern, well-equipped College Hospital—rated among the first four or five institutions doing health work. Instead of the part-time physician, who spent only the minor part of his time doling out "cures," there are now five physicians, six regular nurses, a dietitian, a pharmacist, a chemistry and bacteriology laboratory technician, and

an X-ray and physical therapy technician devoting their full time to *prevent* students from having "wheezles and sneezles."

Prevention is the keynote to the work of our present College Hospital staff. By teaching students how to take care of themselves, by requiring yearly physical examinations, and by stemming illness in the early stages, the hospital has eliminated the necessity of cure treatments.

The success of its work is measured, not in the number of patients treated each year, but in the number of might-have-been patients eliminated. This year there are scarcely one-third the patients there were 12 years ago!

Students, as a matter of fact, have been improving the condition of their health since physical examinations have been required each of their 4 years here. Formerly many out-going seniors were unable to fill positions because of ill health. Last year not a senior failed to take a position because of a low grade in health.

# COLLEGE LIBRARY

◆◆ **T**HE library today has little in common with the small collection of books tucked away in a college building and practically unused by the students of 50 or even 25 years ago.

In 1876 the salary of the two librarians, both students, was increased from 7 to 9 cents an hour. But at that munificent rate they were required while on duty "to give their whole attention to the duties of their office."

Two years later the demonstrator in botany and zoology became librarian at a salary of \$200 a year. Apparently the duties were too arduous or the salary too low, for in 1879 he was succeeded by the professor of physics.

At one time the collection of books was housed in Morrill Hall in connection with the museum—a location quite consistent with the usual conception of college libraries in the 19th century.

The first appropriation for the purchase of books was made by the Board of Trustees in 1869, but the amount appropriated, \$2,500, was not expended at once "because the President could not leave Ames for the purpose of buying books."

Now in a year the additions to the library are 10,000 volumes. The collection has increased in the last 10 years from 90,000 to over 200,000 volumes.

The use of the library has increased 500 percent since the new building was opened. In 1921-22 the number of books lent for home use was 22,000. In 1931-32 the number lent was 113,636.

◆◆ STUDENT loan funds, the lake and much of the present scheme of campus planting, several works of art, Alumni Hall and Memorial Union are but tangible expressions of a deep and abiding alumni interest in the welfare of "our College."

Iowa State alumni organized an active alumni association within 5 years of the graduation of the first class. From modest beginnings alumni efforts in support of the highest interests of the College have grown and multiplied until their manifestations are numerous.

Last June alumni incorporated their association with provisions for an Alumni Fund, through which every alumnus has an opportunity to share in the responsibilities and the satisfactions of the College. About three-fourths of all Iowa State men and women have permanently identified themselves with the College through life membership in Memorial Union, largest of the alumni organizations.

◆◆ THE R. O. T. C. 2-year course was made compulsory for land grant colleges when Morrill wrote his law, and ever since non-militarists have been trying to find loopholes by which they may escape the training, or physical defects which will make them unfit for service.

Advance course students sign voluntarily, and graduation therefrom entitles the student to a second lieutenant's commission in the Organized Reserve Corps.

Mechanical and civil engineers are taught the rudiments of army engineering, and all other students are enrolled in the artillery unit.

◆◆ **L**ong before physical education and exercise were the mode for young college women, coeds at Iowa State College drilled in regular military fashion if they so wished. The Ladies' Company was first organized in 1894, when Gen. James Rush Lincoln came to the college as steward and professor of military tactics.

General Lincoln, himself, trained the young ladies on the green lawn which would now be between Central Building and Agricultural Hall, on warm summer evenings after the dinner hour. Drill was held two evenings each week, and on one afternoon of the week this distinguished company appeared on dress parade with the four companies of men.

Members of the company wrote competitive examinations for their rank and the officers received commissions from the governor of the state, who not infrequently attended the regular dress parades on the campus.

Spears took the place of the rifles ordinarily used by the men enrolled in military training. Only officers carried the mighty swords shown in the picture. The visors on the caps also distinguished officers. Other members wore plain, rimless caps which were dubbed "stiff collar boxes."

White cotton gloves and wide belts gave the military air to the blue serge dresses that all but caught in the prairie grass of the drill ground as the young "soldier-ettes" stiffly obeyed the commands of their general.

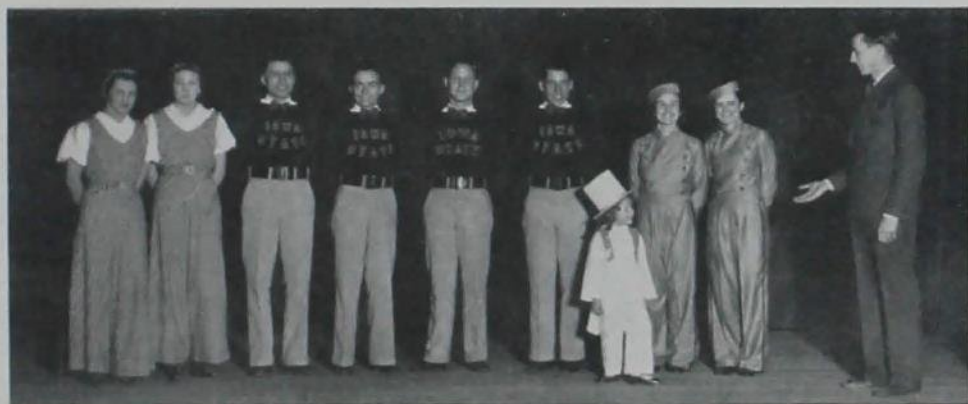
The series was closed by a minstrel show for which a small admission price was charged.

# WHERE IOWA STATE LEADS

◆◆ IOWA STATE'S Cyclones last year placed at the top of the Big Six "all-sports rating"—which means that Cyclone teams averaged a better record in conference competition than those of any other member. A Cyclone wrestler was an Olympic contestant, and he and two other Cyclones won national championships. The Cyclone football team beat Drake for the first time in years and years. Cyclone swimmers, golfers, tennis players, track men have, in the last 12 months, established themselves as dangerous contenders in any company.

Yet—in the face of the records of the wearers of the Big I—these accomplishments do not, perhaps, mark Iowa State's outstanding athletic achievement. It has remained for the rank and file of the student body—the men who never get nearer varsity competition than the grandstands or the sidelines—to do that. And they've done it by helping Athletic Director T. N. Metcalf and one of his assistants, Harry J. Schmidt, to build up one of the strongest programs of intramural sports known in American collegiate circles.

In this school year of 1932-1933, more than 80 percent of I. S. C. men have taken part in intramurals. Fraternities have played touch football, handball, basketball, playground ball, baseball, tennis; they've participated in wrestling, volleyball, track, swimming, pentathlon, relays. Wards have come into most of these sports. Freshman teams have been organized; class divisional teams have had their competitions.

The result has been that a vast majority of Iowa State men have had at least a taste of sports. Faculty, too—they go in for handball, squash, other sports. If the ideal is "mens sana in corpore sano," Iowa State comes very close to it, for you *have* to study, and there are so many forms of athletics available that you find it very hard to keep out of them!

# METCALF RESIGNS

◆ Coach Louis Menze is popular because of his drive and enthusiasm. Since he became Cyclone basketball coach in 1929 he has maintained a record that shows a larger number of victories than defeats and a decided superiority over non-conference quintets.

◆ Cyclone athletics. Iowa State as a whole is sorry to see him leave, but is glad that George Veenker consented to be his successor.

The scheduling of two football games with Iowa, one in 1933 and the second in 1934, brought joy to thousands of Iowa football fans, and ranked as one of the best sports stories of the year for Iowa newspapers. The game should mean much in generating enthusiasm and in benefiting finances at both institutions.

Little can be said of the great record made by the 1933 wrestling team that is not already known by sports fans. The team, under Coach Hugo Otopalik, won five of six dual meets, and the Iowa Collegiate, Midwest A. A. U., the Big Six and the National Collegiate tournaments.

◆◆ THERE were three outstanding happenings in the major sports program at Iowa State during the 1932-1933 season—the resignation of Director T. N. Metcalf and appointment of Coach George Veenker as his successor, the resumption of football and other major sports relations with the University of Iowa, and the brilliant record of the 1933 wrestling team.

Director Metcalf chose to accept an invitation to succeed A. A. Stagg at the University of Chicago as Director of Athletics. During his 9 years at Iowa State he accomplished much for

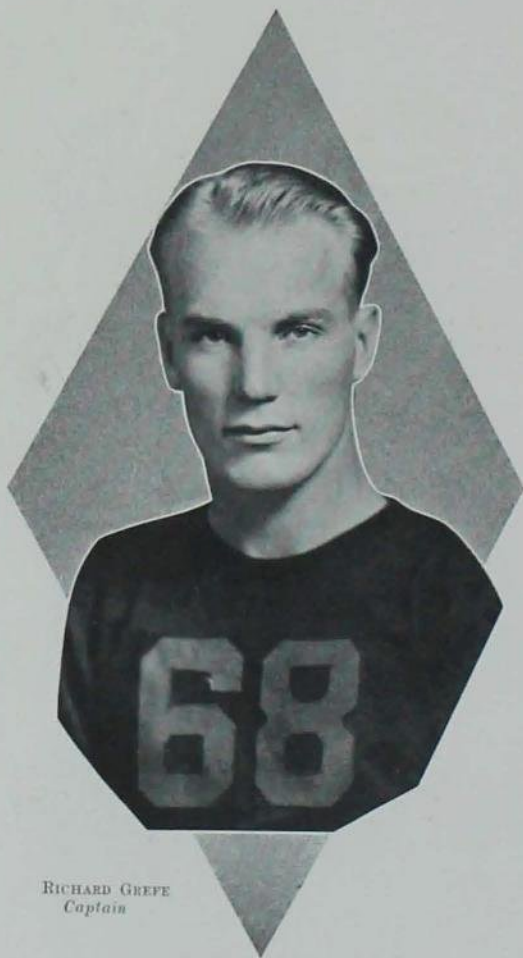

◆◆ **A** SQUAD of more than 40 men reporting regularly, and only six lettermen among them—that was the problem Coach George Veenker, the man who guided the Cyclone football team to second place in the Big Six conference in 1931, faced in 1932. Only two of this half dozen lettermen were backfield men, flashy Captain Dick Grefe, quarterback, and Ed Schafroth, hard-blocking halfback. The other four, Gerald Smith, William Dixon, Harold Templeton and Ivan Impson, were distributed in the line.

◆ But Coach Veenker set about his task with the enthusiasm and determination which marked his first year at the Cyclone stronghold. He bent his efforts to developing sophomore players to fill the vacancies left by graduation in 1931, with the purpose not only of building a winning team, but also of preparing them for 1933.

◆ When he announced his lineup for the opening game of the season with Simpson on September 24, there were five sophomores among the starting eleven. The other six were five lettermen and one minor letter winner. This aggregation defeated the Methodist team with little difficulty, the final score being 21 to 0.



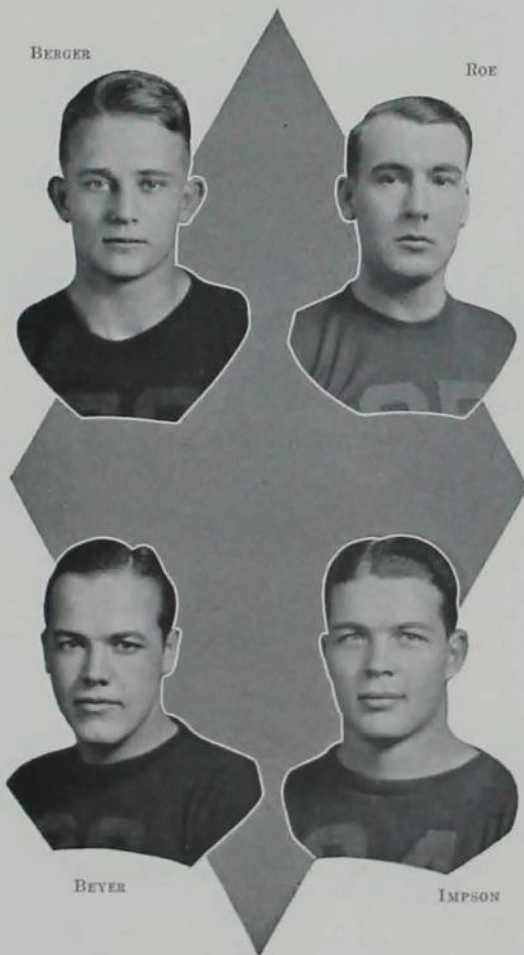
Grefe breaks away for a long gain against Simpson.

◆ In scoring the first touchdown the Cyclone backs marched almost the entire length of the field behind beautiful blocking to the 25-yard stripe, where a lateral pass from Impson to Grefe netted 24 yards to place the pigskin on the one-yard marker. Theophilus, sophomore fullback, plunged over for the score.

◆ Impson climaxed the second march down the field by breaking through center to collect the last 15 yards and the second touchdown. Then Dick Grefe closed the day's scoring by returning a punt through the entire Simpson team for a touchdown, one of the greatest runs of his career. The blond captain took the punt on his own 40-yard line, hesitated for a moment, then began his brilliant dash around right end, reversed the field, and crossed the goal without a Simpson player near him.

◆ Heartened by this decisive victory the Cyclones went into the game against Morningside the following Saturday set to win again. But the Morningside eleven was prepared for them, and during a large share of the first half rushed the Iowa State defense for consistent long gains, and held the Cyclones to a single touchdown—and that on a fake placekick.

◆ A fighting second team took the field the second half and Howard Harlan, reserve fullback, climaxed a long drive nearly the full length of the field with a 33-yard dash for a touchdown, the second of the game. Then, in the fourth quarter, the first string backs sifted through gaping holes in the Morningside line, and followed deadly interference for three touchdowns, boosting the final score to 32 points while the visitors went home scoreless.

◆ Cyclone fumbles were costly in the Big Six opener with Nebraska on October 8. Before the game had gone 2 minutes, the Cornhuskers scored on an Iowa State fumble made on the second play after the opening kickoff of the game. The Huskers' second touchdown came with but 30 seconds of the first half left, when Sauer intercepted a pass on Iowa State's 45-yard line and ran through the entire Cyclone team to the goal.

◆ During most of the second half the Cyclones played the Nebraskans fairly even, and toward the end of the game it was a very nonchalant Husker fan who could relax for a second. Iowa State's only marker came in the third period. The Cyclones, with the wind at their

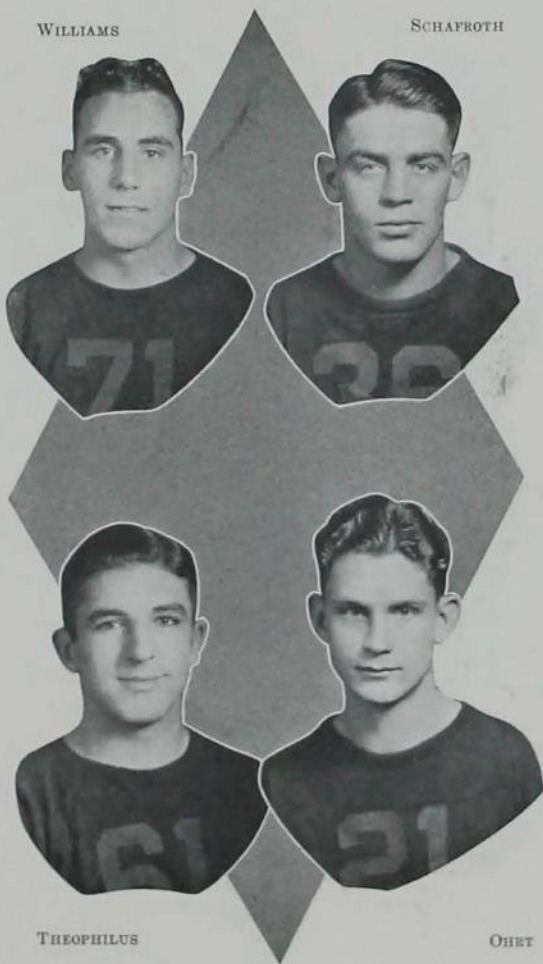
backs, had gradually forced the Cornhuskers into Nebraska territory, when Schafroth dropped back and threw a 45-yard pass directly into the arms of Ivan Impson, who ran the remaining few yards to the goal. The final score was 12 to 6 for Nebraska.

◆ Homecoming day was a disastrous one for the Cyclone football team, for it lost to the University of Kansas, 26 to 0. Little can be said of this game except that an Iowa State eleven, playing under par, was matched against a Jayhawker team of veterans that was clicking. The Kansas team was also aided by the psychological effect of a new coach, Ad Lindsey, who cut out the double wingback formation—a formation useless for a team with such powerful, heavy men. With the discovery of their offensive power in driving over the first touchdowns, the Jayhawkers exploded and ran wild.

◆ Although handicapped by an injured list which had grown longer in every game, the Cyclones held the Tigers of Missouri to a scoreless tie at Columbia on October 22. The two teams were evenly matched and played on a wet field, which weakened the offense of both elevens.

◆ Following an open date, the only rest of the season, the battered Cyclones journeyed to Manhattan, Kan., where a Kansas State eleven, still irking from the 7 to 6 defeat at the hands of Iowa State in 1931, handed the Cyclones a 31 to 0 trimming.

◆ Although doomed to bottom place in the conference, the Cyclones had one more chance to make a mark for themselves in the Big Six conference—the game with Oklahoma at Ames on November 12. The Sooners, however, were too strong and won a thrilling contest, 21 to 12.

◆ Only one game remained on the Iowa State schedule, but it was a chance for the Cyclones to redeem themselves, for it was the traditional fray with Drake. It has often been remarked that the outcome of this annual game determined whether a season had been a success or not.

◆ If that is true the 1932 Cyclone football team was a success, for it sent the Bulldogs scurrying back to Des Moines with the small end of a 34 to 13 score. This great victory was a thrilling climax to a comparatively disastrous season and forced fans to forget past games. It was a grand finale for the renowned Dick Grefe and his teammates. They outpassed and outran the

Bulldogs for fully three quarters, then held them even for the final period. Except for their aerial attack, the Bulldogs were never dangerous, but that was very dangerous in the final quarter.

◆ In spite of the poor showing in the Big Six, a review of both conference and non-conference games for the 1932 season revealed that the Cyclones scored a total of 110 points to 111 for opponents.

◆ A squad of more than 40 enthusiastic candidates reported throughout the spring season of 1933. Among these two-score men were 13 lettermen from the 1932 squad. Only five major letter winners, Richard Grefe, Ivan Impson, George Martin, Andrew Farrell and Wendell Johnson, and two minor letter winners, Bob Hess and Marvin Zeller, were lost by graduation.

◆ In the spring workouts the Cyclone squad appeared to be considerably stronger than the inexperienced one that greeted Coach Veenker in 1932. The line will undoubtedly be much stronger with veterans Magnus Lichter and Jack Beyer eligible for center, Dwight Garner, Gerald Smith and Russell Gute for guards, Vernon Loyd, Hiram Roe, Paul Barger and Robert Beatty for tackles and Harold Templeton, Amos Dana, Gilbert McQuern and Don Grefe for ends. Veterans returning to the backfield are Marlowe Williams, Herbert Ohrt, Wilbur Winter and Donald Theophilus.

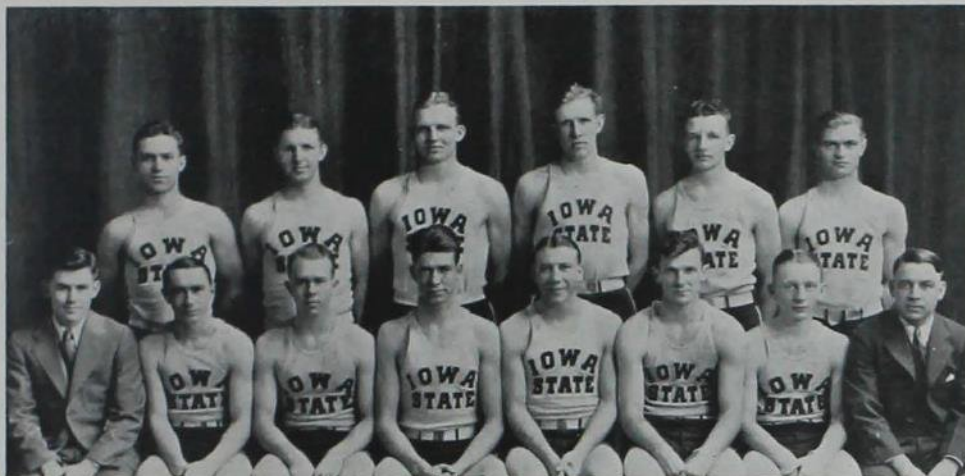

◆◆ **E**ACH year the freshman football team is heralded as the greatest in history. In 1931 that statement was made by one sports writer, speaking principally of the backfield material. The fact that more than one-half of the regular varsity team in 1932 was composed of sophomores bears out this statement.

◆ We won't go to the extent of calling the 1932 freshman squad a still greater outfit, but we do believe it is as good as any ever appearing on Iowa State fields. In contrast to the 1931 squad, which was markedly good in backfield material, the 1932 squad seemed to be strongest in the line, although there were several outstanding backfield men. It is the sincere belief of several football fans who followed the prep squad closely, that there are freshmen capable enough to handle both ends, both tackles, one guard, and at least two of the four backfield positions in 1933.

◆ The squad included many more heavy men than the average freshman squad, there being 10 numeral and honorable mention winners scaling over 190 pounds, 5 of whom weighed more than 200 pounds.

◆ With this promising squad of more than 60 men to pick from, Coach Louis Menze and Assistant Coaches Bob Smith and Warren Deussenberg had considerable difficulty in selecting men for numeral awards. Thirty-five men were recommended for the numeral awards and 10 men were given honorable mention.

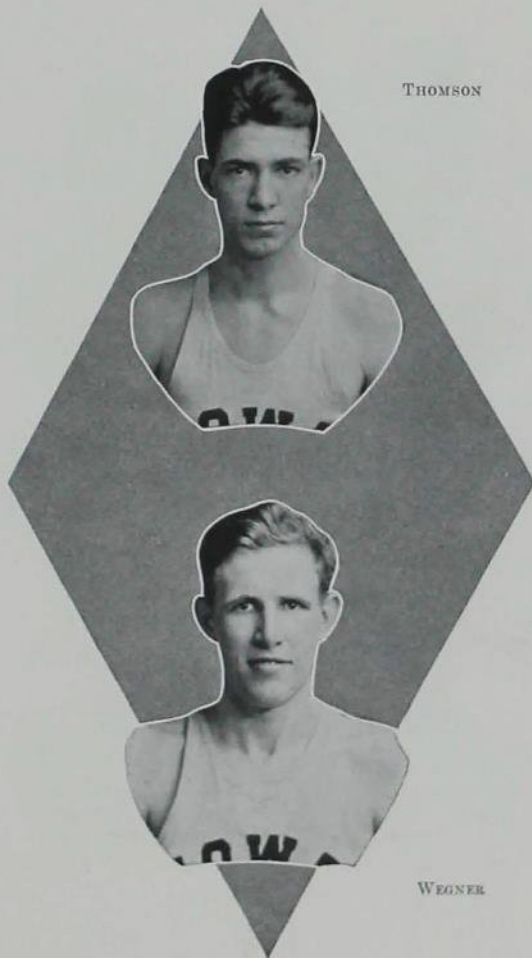

## 1933 BASKETBALL

◆◆ **W**HEN Louis Menze, basketball coach, called roll for the first practice of the 1933 season he found himself facing the same problem that Coach George Veenker faced on the football field just a few months before. He had plenty of promising men, but only one, Captain Ralph Thomson, was a letterman, and only two or three others had had any experience to speak of.

◆ Prospects looked dark, for the rest of the Big Six teams, with but one exception, were boasting a long string of veterans from which to build their teams. Coach Menze went to work, however, and kept a sharp eye on the sophomore candidates.

◆ From this inexperienced squad he built a team that won five out of six non-conference games before opening its Big Six schedule. Faith in the Cyclone quintet, which had been rising with every new non-conference victory, ran high when the Cyclones flashed a championship brand of basketball to defeat Oklahoma at Ames in the first Big Six game, 31 to 25. As the Sooners had been doped as possible 1933 conference champions, this upset fired the hopes of many Cyclone basketball fans.

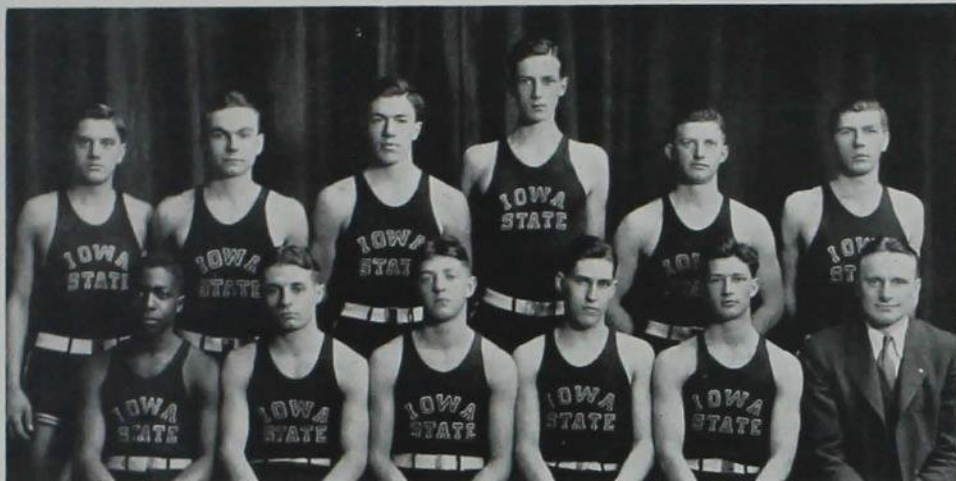

## 1933 BASKETBALL

◆ But this victory was destined to be the last for the Cyclones until near the end of the season. They lost two games each to Kansas, Kansas State and Nebraska and one each to Missouri, Oklahoma and Drake. The only other victory was a breath-taking win over Missouri in the next to last game of the season.

◆ Within the Big Six conference the season was very unsuccessful for the Cyclones. They placed last in the conference and failed to place a man on either the first or second All-Big Six teams in most selections. Outside the conference the Cyclones won four in six games, three of which were with Drake. They defeated Central and Iowa State Teachers once each and Drake twice, losing one game to Drake and one to Coe.

◆ During the season, however, Coach Menze developed some fine basketball players, who will be valuable next year. Waldo Wegner, 6 foot 4 inch sophomore center, was one of the stars of the team. He was high scorer of the Cyclones with 109 points. Frank Hood was an outstanding junior guard, and Chester Anderson was a speedy sophomore forward. Men who played fine basketball throughout the season, but who will not be back next year are Clyde Dills, Ralph Thomson, captain, and Adolph Ludwig.

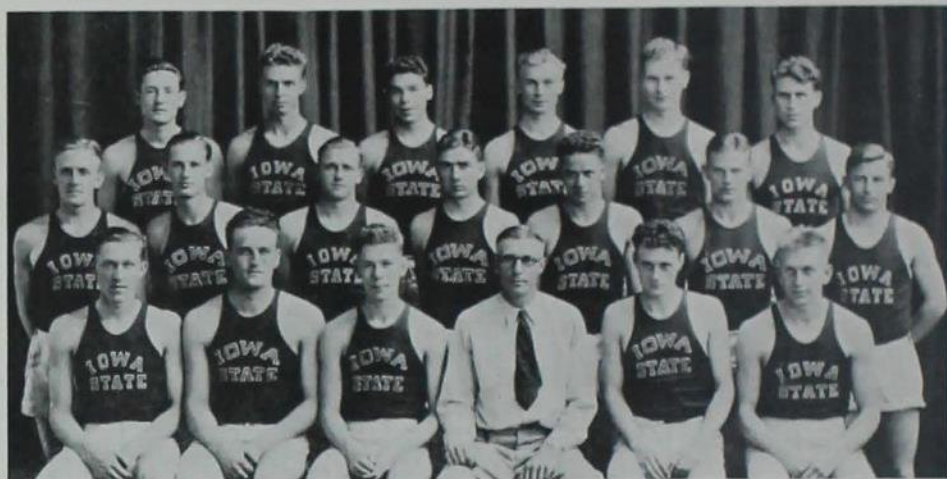

◆◆ **B** RILLIANT performances by the distance runners, individually and as relay team members, gave the mediocre record of the 1932 Cyclone track team a bright aspect.

◆ The indoor track season opened February 27 with a 65 to 38 victory over Grinnell in the Iowa State Gymnasium. In the track events Chapman took first in the mile, Nagel won the 880, and the 12-lap relay team—Chapman, Wessling, Henderson and Way—took a close race from the Pioneers. In the field events Cooper won first in the pole vault; Meyers won the shotput; Loufek won the high jump, and Nelson took first in the broad jump.

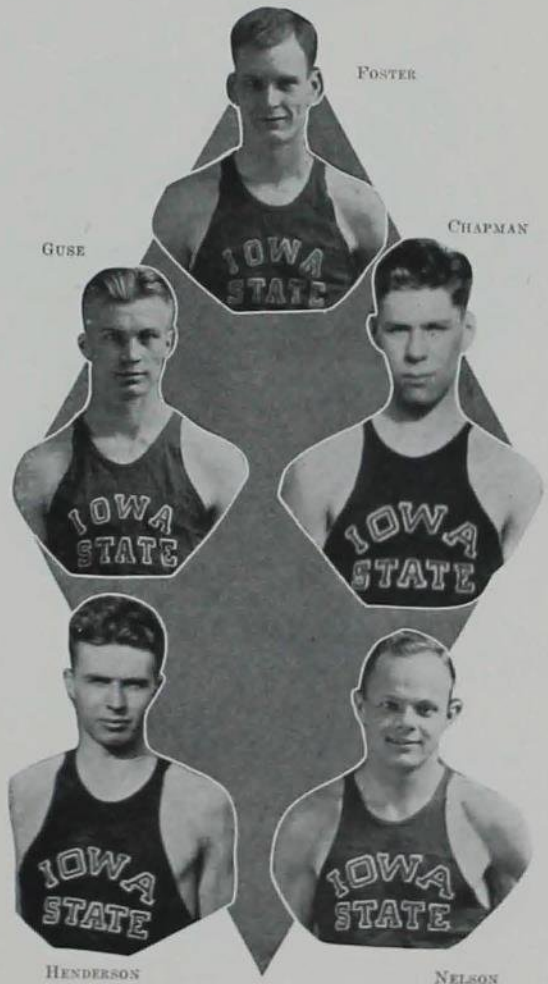
## 1932 TRACK

◆ Lyle Chapman stamped himself as one of the greatest college milers in America the following week when he defeated Glenn Cunningham, the Kansas ace, at the annual Kansas City Athletic Club indoor meet in the fast time of 4:18.4. In this thrilling race Chapman hung up a new Iowa State indoor mile record. This performance was the third fastest indoor mile run by an American college man in 1932.

◆ The Drake Bulldogs surprised the Cyclones March 4 by walking off with a 66 to 38 win in a duel meet held in Des Moines. Iowa State won first place in three events.

◆ Nagel won the 880-yard run title at the Big Six indoor meet at Columbia, Mo., March 12, as the Cyclones placed fifth with 13 $\frac{3}{4}$  points. Chapman lost his first mile race of the season when Cunningham, the Kansan, beat him to the tape in record time. Henderson won third place in the 440. Iowa State placed third in the mile relay. Cooper tied with two others for third in the pole vault and Heitman tied for third in the high jump to complete the scoring.

◆ Iowa State finished fourth with 29 $\frac{1}{2}$  points in the quadrangular meet held in the Iowa University field house, March 19. Featuring the Iowa State performances was the record set by Sheetz, Nelson, Henderson

and Wessling in the half mile relay with a mark of 1:31.8.

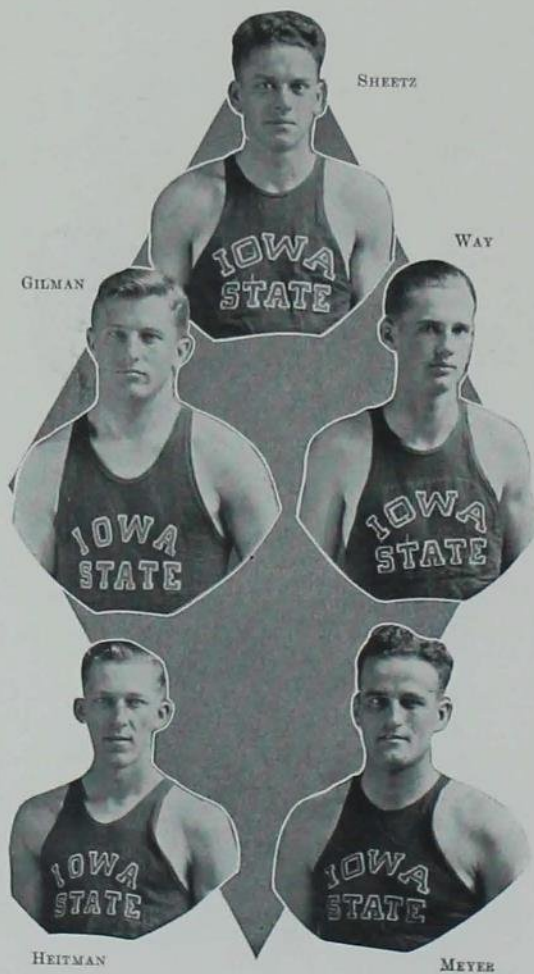
◆ The outdoor track season opened with the Kansas Relays at Lawrence, Kan., April 23. The Iowa State 2-mile relay team composed of Guse, Nagel, Labertew and Chapman finished a close second to the winning Notre Dame team.

◆ The following week at the Drake Relays the Cyclone 2-mile team forced Notre Dame to a new record in a sensational race which became an Iowa State-Notre Dame duel. Iowa State finished fourth in the mile relay, also won by Notre Dame.

◆ The Cyclones opened their outdoor dual competition with a 75-56 victory from Missouri.

◆ Chapman and Labertew tied for first in the mile. Nelson won the 100, and Foster took first in both the high and low hurdles for the Cyclones. Guse won the 880 and Meyer set a new Iowa State record of 136 feet 8 inches in the discus to win this event. Cooper in the pole vault and Ossian in the javelin also won first for the Cyclones.

◆ Drake snatched off a 75 to 58 win on State Field, May 19. First places were won by Nelson in the 100, Chapman in the mile and two-mile, and Foster in both



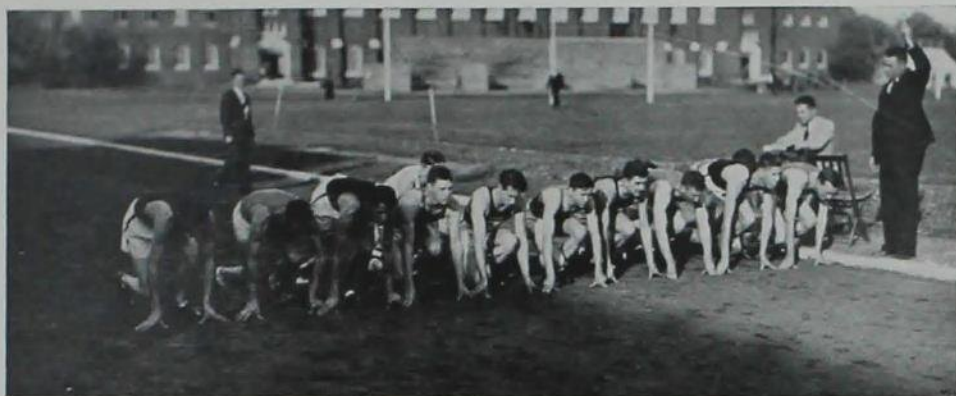

hurdle events. Heitman and Loufek tied for first with Schneeman of Drake in the high jump.

◆ The Cyclones took third place in the annual Iowa Intercollegiate meet held in Iowa City, May 26, with 25 2-7 points. Iowa handily won the meet.

◆ Labertew and Chapman were the outstanding Iowa State stars, Chapman winning first place in the mile run in the fast time of 4:21.2, and Labertew showing his heels to the other half-milers in the equally fast time of 1:56.0.

◆ Iowa State finished fifth at the Big Six conference meet won by Nebraska and held at Lincoln.

◆ Chapman fell before Cunningham, the Jayhawk star, who set a new record in the mile. Labertew and Guse finished second and fourth in the 880, also won by Cunningham.

◆ Foster finished fifth in the 220-yard low hurdles and Meyer took fifth in the discus to complete the Cyclone scoring.

◆ The Cyclone track season ended at the National Collegiate meet in Chicago, June 11. The four points earned in the meet came from Labertew's fifth place in the 880 and Chapman's fifth place in the mile.

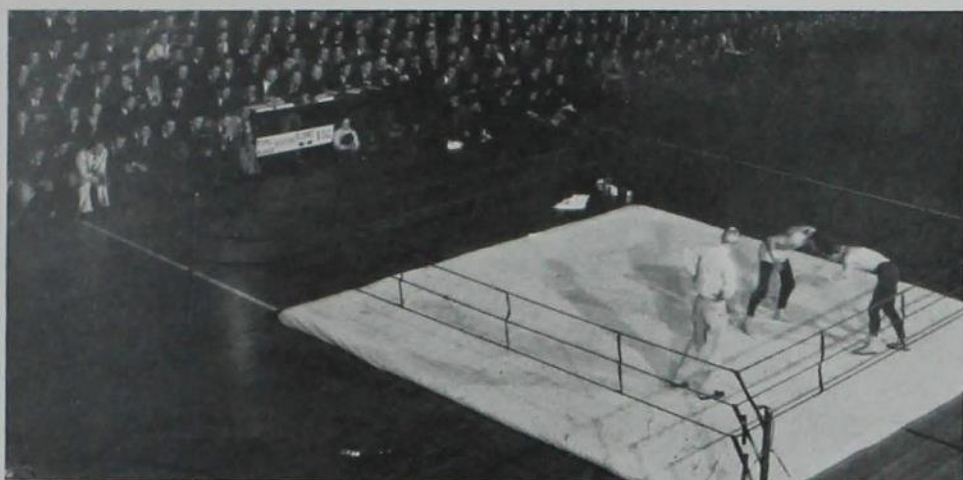

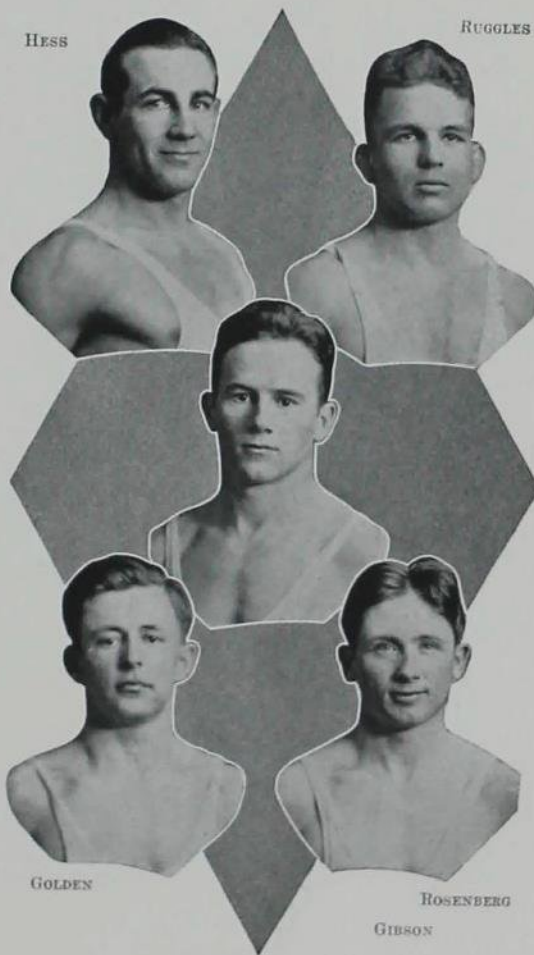
## 1933 WRESTLING

◆◆ IOWA STATE'S 1933 wrestling team carried off first honors at four major meets to lay undisputed claim to the United States team championship. The team was one of the greatest ever produced at Iowa State, either by that great producer of champion individuals and teams, Coach Hugo Otopalik, or any other coach. Its members were superior to opponents in their knowledge of wrestling, endurance and spirit, and exhibited a flashy, aggressive style of wrestling that was unbeatable and fine to witness.

◆ The team got off to a slow start and lost its first clash with the University of Indiana, 1931 national champions,  $16\frac{1}{2}$  to  $9\frac{1}{2}$ . Following this meet the Cyclones were not defeated in five more dual meets and four major tournaments, and in a return meet defeated Indiana by the decisive score of 20 to 8.

◆ Other victims fell before the Cyclones in rapid succession. Missouri succumbed 31 to 3, Minnesota 25 to 3, Iowa State Teachers 27 to 3, and Nebraska 38 to 0. When the season had closed a review of dual meets disclosed that the Cyclones had accumulated a total of  $149\frac{1}{2}$  points to opponents' combined points of  $33\frac{1}{2}$ .

◆ Coach Otopalik's pupils nearly monopolized the Big Six tournament when they won six championships and

one third place in the eight weights, and set a new record for high scores with 48 points.

◆ At the Iowa Collegiate meet the Cyclones were again the masters. They won five championships, two thirds and one fourth for a total of 35 points and the state team title.

◆ Again, in the Midwest A. A. U. tournament the Cyclones dominated the field with three championships and four second places. But it was at the National Collegiate tournament that the Cyclones definitely proved their claim to the national title. They won three national championships and six falls during the course of the meet for 21 points. The Oklahoma Aggies was the only other team to win three championships.

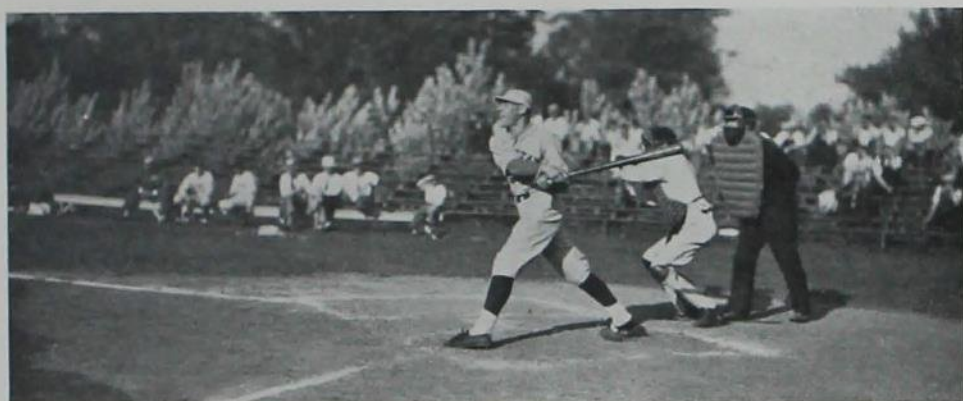
◆ In these four meets the Cyclones won a total of 17 individual championships. Golden, Rosenberg, Ruggles, Frevert, Martin and Hess won Big Six championships; Gibson, Golden, Martin, Frevert and Hess won state championships; Gibson, Frevert, Martin and Hess won Midwest A. A. U. championships; and Frevert, Martin and Hess won National Collegiate titles.

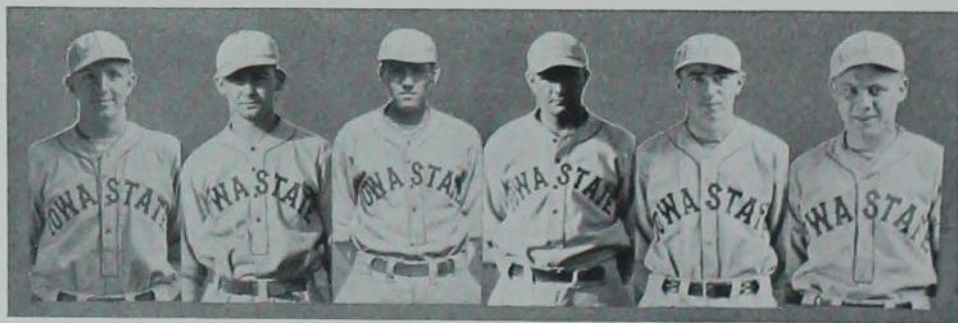

◆◆ **E**LEVEN victories and five defeats—that's the record made by Iowa State's 1932 baseball team. And that record won the team the distinction of being the greatest Cyclone team in 8 years. In fact, that record is one of the three best in the last 21 years.

Better records since 1911 were established only in 1919 with eight victories and no defeats, in 1923 with 10 victories and 2 defeats, and in 1924 with 12 victories and 4 defeats. The 1932 team was the first since 1924 to win at least one-half of its games.

There has been considerable speculation as to the cause of this fine record. The best explanation can be found in the combination of two factors—Coach Louis Menze and a team of capable veterans. From the beginning of the 1932 season Coach Menze concentrated upon remedying the principal weakness of the team during the last several years—weakness in batting. He held batting practice for at least an hour nearly every day. This year's team batting average of .253 against that of .209 in 1931 shows that this intensive drill was not in vain, and had much to do with the success of the 1932 nine.

Another factor which reflects the skill and experience of the Cyclone team, and offers one of the best explanations for the fine record, is the fielding record for the season. In the 14 regularly scheduled contests Iowa State fielded but 32 errors, an average of little more than two a game, while opponents committed 80 errors, an average of nearly six a game.

# MINOR SPORTS

◆◆ **W**HILE other colleges throughout the United States were eliminating and reducing minor sports appropriations, Iowa State maintained its program of minor sports on the same high level of previous years. The minor sports program at Iowa State has never been neglected. Coaches for tennis, golf, swimming, two-mile and polo have been selected with the same care as that taken in choosing coaches of the major sports.

The result has been, and the 1932-33 season is no exception, that Iowa State has always ranked very high in minor sports competition. Since the organization of the Big Six conference 5 years ago, the Cyclone swimming team, under Coach C. E. Daubert, has won three conference championships, a tie for first, and a second place.

Cyclone tennis teams have always ranked high, and the 1932 team lost only one match in 12, that to the University of Kansas team, which was captained and coached by the great amateur, Junior Coen.

Golf is a relatively new sport at Iowa State, but promises to become a popular sport in Iowa and the Big Six largely through the promotion of Coach Hugo Otopalik. The Big Six golf meet in the spring of 1932 was the first ever held in the Big Six conference.

The Cyclone two-mile team was not defeated since the introduction of that race to displace the five-mile cross country run 3 years ago until this year, when defeated in the Big Six meet at Kansas.

Polo is another relatively new sport at Iowa State. Polo, although it is played under the direction of the Military Department, is included with the minor sports because it is a competitive sport that is attracting considerable interest at Iowa State. The Cyclone poloists are improving rapidly under the coaching of Lieut. John Lewis, who came to Iowa State in the fall of 1932.

◆ Merle Robbins, one of the cleverest of Cyclone tennis players, was selected to coach the Iowa State tennis team upon his graduation. His 1932 team won nine, tied two and lost one match in competition with Big Six and Iowa teams.

**C. E. DAUBERT**

◆ No Cyclone coach has proved himself more capable as a producer of championship sports teams than C. E. Daubert, swimming coach. His swimmers have won the Big Six championship three times in five years, losing but one conference meet and tying one.





# 1 9 3 2 T W O - M I L E

◆◆ **C**OACH BOB SIMPSON's two-mile team completed a successful season in the fall of 1932, finishing second in the Big Six conference meet and losing but one dual meet. The team was greatly handicapped by the loss of Captain Lyle Chapman, who was bothered with rheumatism throughout the entire season.

The season opened with a dual meet with Grinnell at Grinnell, the Pioneer runners winning by the close margin of 29 to 26. Captain Mike Pilbrow and Pfeiffer of Grinnell came in first in 10:08.5. Guse, the first Cyclone runner to finish, was 20 yards behind the winners. Gordon of Grinnell finished fourth and Labertew, Highsmith, Rooks and Chisholm of Iowa State finished in order behind Gordon.

The Cyclones took things easy in the second dual at Des Moines at the Drake stadium, drubbing the Drake Bulldogs by a score of 15 to 45. Six Iowa State men, headed by Vernon Guse, finished ahead of the first Drake man, Thompson. Guse's time was 10:16.

Iowa State men finished as follows: Guse, first; Labertew, second; Eichelkraut, third; Chisholm, fourth; Rooks, fifth, and Highsmith, sixth.

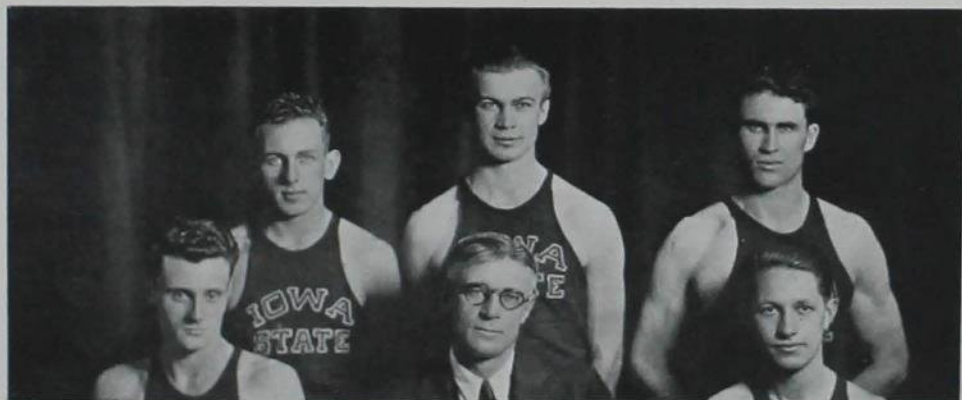
Iowa State runners performed remarkably well in the Big Six two-mile meet at Lawrence, Kan., as they finished second to Kansas State, the winner. The Kansas Aggies scored 29 points to 40 for Iowa State.

Glenn Cunningham, sensational Kansas University Olympic team member, won the race by a comfortable margin in the fast time of 9:32.4. Landon of Kansas State, Ayres of Nebraska, Pierce of Oklahoma, Eichelkraut and Labertew of Iowa State finished in order behind the Jayhawk star. The unusually high quality of the distance runners in the Big Six was evident from the fact that Eichelkraut and Labertew, who finished fifth and sixth, respectively, were unofficially timed in 9:48 and 9:50.

Guse, who finished ninth for the Cyclones, was unofficially clocked in 10:05. Chisholm finished twentieth in the race and Rooks, the other Cyclone competitor, finished outside of the first 20.

Following Iowa State in scoring order were Nebraska 43, Oklahoma 53, Missouri 70, and Kansas 73.

Three lettermen will be lost to the two-mile team for next year due to the graduation of Earl Labertew, Lyle Chapman and Arthur Eichelkraut. Guse, Chisholm and Duncan, lettermen, and Highsmith have another year of competition. Rooks was the only sophomore to win an award.

# 1 9 3 3 S W I M M I N G

◆◆ IOWA STATE enjoyed another successful swimming season in 1933, tying with Nebraska for the Big Six championship and winning two out of four dual swimming meets.

Although four of the eight lettermen graduate at the end of the year, the future strength of the Cyclone tank team is insured by a powerful freshman squad. Since the Big Six conference was formed Coach C. E. Daubert's swimmers have monopolized the conference, losing the championship only once in 5 years.

The swimming season opened January 27 with the Midwest A. A. U. championships in the Cyclone pool. With a total of 17 points, Iowa State finished second in team scoring. Grinnell College won first place with 23½ points.

Murphy led in scoring for Iowa State, taking second in the 500-yard race and third in the 220. Zimmerman placed third in the junior low board diving championships and Sands placed third in the 220-yard breast stroke.

The 400-yard relay team composed of Lowder, Murphy, Daubert and Sands placed second, as did the 300-yard medley team composed of Gerry, Sands and Starbuck.

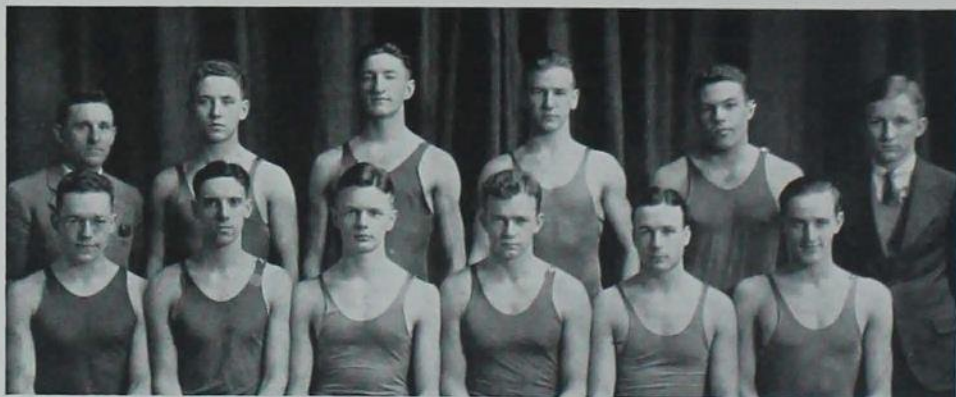
The Cyclones took a grand slam on first places February 4, as Creighton University fell 67 to 16 in the first dual meet of the season in the Iowa State pool. Iowa State also took second in every individual event but the fancy dive. Three new pool records were made during the meet. Captain Sands set a record of 2:45.6 in the 200-yard breast stroke, and Murphy, the sophomore flash, shattered the 440 record with a mark of 5:44.5, and came back to swim the 220 in 2:36.7 to better the old mark.

Iowa State defeated the Nebraska Cornhuskers by the narrow margin of 44 to 40 a week later at Lincoln, Neb. The victory came when the Cyclone 300-yard medley relay team won the final event, setting a new meet record of 3:32.5.

First places were won by Sands in the 200-yard breast stroke and 100-yard free style, Gerry in the 150-yard back stroke and Lowder in the 220.

The Cyclones ended their dual competition with two defeats from Grinnell College. The first meet held at Ames, February 18, was lost by a margin of 45 to 38. Two weeks later at Grinnell, in a nip-and-tuck battle, the Pioneers won by the slim margin of 42 to 41.

In the first meet Zimmerman and Murphy won the only individual races for the Cyclones. Zimmerman easily won the diving event, while Murphy beat out Elbert of Grinnell in the 440. The Iowa State 300-yard medley and 400-yard relay teams were both victorious.

At Grinnell, two weeks later, Sands and Gerry retaliated for losses in the meet held at Ames. Sands beat Elbert 40 feet in the 200-yard breast stroke, while Gerry turned back Malbrough in the back stroke.

Zimmerman had little trouble in winning the fancy diving, Murphy won the 220, and the 300-yard medley relay team took first to complete the list of first places won by Iowa State.

Iowa State smashed three conference records and tied another in sharing the Big Six tank title with Nebraska, 46 to 46, March 11 at Nebraska.

Murphy led the attack on records, hanging up two records, a 5:48.8 in the 440 and a 2:40.5 mark in the 220. Sands equalled his own record of 2:48 in the 200-yard breast stroke, while the 300-yard medley relay team composed of Gerry, Sands and Daubert, clipped 2.7 seconds off the old record of 3:34.7.

Gerry outclassed the field in the 150-yard back stroke in 1:58. Daubert, Starbuck, Murphy and Lowder won the 400-yard relay for Iowa State from Nebraska and Kansas State. Lowder won second in the 50-yard dash and fourth in the 100; Feise won second in the breast stroke and fourth in the 440 and Zimmerman placed third in the fancy diving event to complete the scoring for Iowa State.

Captain Sands, for three years one of the leading breast stroke swimmers in the Big Six, finished his swimming career in fine style. Besides winning first in the breast stroke in nearly every meet in which he participated, Sands also was one of the main cogs in the 300-yard medley relay team for three years and in his senior year proved to be one of the fastest free style swimmers on the squad.

Charley Lowder, who began his varsity competition as a distance swimmer, ended his career as one of the most versatile free style swimmers on the squad, winning points in every event from the 50-yard dash up to the 440. Leroy Daubert and Phil Starbuck were invaluable relay and dash swimmers.

Captain-elect Gerry developed rapidly during the season. He came within .3 of a second of the Big Six record when he swam the 150-yard back stroke in 1:58 at the conference meet.

Richard Murphy performed brilliantly as a sophomore, breaking existing Big Six and Iowa State records in the 220 and 440, and proving his worth as a relay man. Harlie Zimmerman's rapid improvement throughout the season stamped him as a sure point winner in the diving events. Carl Feise, second place winner in the breast stroke at the Big Six meet, should step into Sands' shoes next year and lead the Big Six.

◆◆ **L**IKE all of the minor sports at Iowa State College, tennis has been played with considerable success, especially the games with opposing Iowa teams. In the Big Six conference the Cyclones have been consistently near the top of the ladder, but in matches with Iowa teams the Cyclones have an overwhelming advantage.

Although the Cyclone tennis teams of the last several years have all been very successful, none was more successful than the 1932 team composed of Wendell Johnson, Ralph Thomson, Rodney Snyder and Gene Wallar. This skillful quartet won all of eight non-conference meets, including two with the University of Iowa, but within the Big Six lost to the University of Kansas and tied Missouri and Kansas State to finish third in the conference.

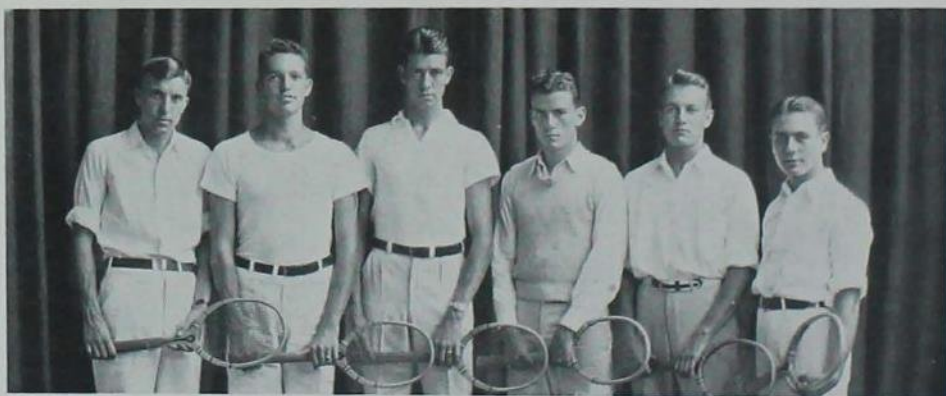
Ralph Thomson, Cyclone number one player, smashed through to 11 victories in 12 matches, losing only to the great amateur ace, Junior Coen of Kansas, in a dual with the Jayhawkers. Under the leadership of Coen, coach and number one player of the Kansas team, the Jayhawkers were successful in handing Iowa State its only defeat of the season.

Thomson plays a hard game, and loves "kills" at the net. His serves are extremely fast, and he depends upon speed rather than "cut" to bewilder his opponent. He plays much of his game in the front court, and it is generally a point in his favor when he gets an opportunity to "kill" one from this position.

Of the other three members of the Cyclone team, Wendell Johnson won 9 in 12 singles matches, Rodney Snyder won 7 in 12 and Gene Wallar won 10 in 11. These three players played a little more conservatively than Thomson, and established their fine records by consistently good, conservative playing.

Johnson paired with Thomson to win 9 of 11 doubles matches, while Wallar and Snyder teamed to win 8 of 11. A summary of both singles and doubles matches for the 1932 season reveals that Iowa State won 54, while opponents won only 17.

Merle Robins, former Iowa State tennis star, coached the 1932 team, and the Cyclones acquired much of their winning technique by copying his style.

◆◆ I NTEREST in golf as an intercollegiate sport has grown swiftly during the last 2 years at Iowa State and throughout Iowa and the Big Six conference. Much of this interest is a result of the promotion of Coach Hugo Otopalik, who majors in producing champion wrestling teams, but who has proved that he is also capable of producing winning teams in less strenuous sports.

Coach Otopalik organized a Cyclone golf team in the spring of 1931, and began campaigning for matches. He was successful in getting several dual matches with Iowa and Big Six colleges, and was one of the leaders in promoting a state collegiate meet at the University of Iowa in 1931.

The impetus given the sport by Coach Otopalik has not only aroused the interest of the students, but has caused the college officials to seriously consider the construction of a college golf course. The plans have been drawn for a course, the site of which is to be an ideal, partially wooded area northeast of the campus.

Coach Otopalik, with the aid of enthusiastic golf supporters in Iowa and the Big Six conference, was successful in scheduling six dual meets, a Big Six tournament and a state tournament in 1932.

The Cyclone team won four of the six dual meets, and placed second in both the Iowa and Big Six tournaments. It defeated Iowa 12 to 6, Kansas State 10 to 8, Coe 15 to 3, and Simpson 15 to 3, and lost to Iowa once, 12½ to 5½, and to Minnesota, 16 to 5. Nebraska placed ahead of Iowa State in the Big Six tournament, and Iowa in the state tournament.

Although no admission is charged for witnessing the dual matches, the sport has been an inexpensive one, since the Ames Golf and Country Club donated the use of its beautiful golf course south of the campus for both practice and matches.

◆◆ "ATHLETICS For All" is the slogan at Iowa State, and toward that end the Department of Physical Education, by means of Intramural Athletics, offers a varied program of sports to all groups of students. There are now enough established organizations that every student is included in some group and may compete in as many sports as he wishes.

The system of grouping the students includes wards, fraternities and dormitories. The wards include all men not affiliated with fraternities or dormitories and are divided geographically; the fraternities include all members and pledges, and the dormitories include all occupants.

◆

During the school year of 1931-32, 75 percent of the entire male population of Iowa State College competed in the many team and individual sports, including football, touch football, wrestling, track, handball, swimming, tennis, horseshoes, golf, pentathlon tests, basketball, bowling, volleyball, baseball and playgroundball. Although definite statistics are not available for the 1932-33 year as yet, all indications are that the intramural sports are attracting even more participants than the previous year.

Iowa State's intramural program serves as a model for others throughout the United States. Much of the credit for this distinction goes to Harry Schmidt, director of intramural athletics and assistant football coach. He now has more than 80 percent of the men of Iowa State College participating the year around.

The bit of water got bitter and bitter—bitterly speaking—and they stopped using the word “enhance” under the photographs in the booklets. There wasn’t but a bitter of water left in the lake, but what is a bitter or two to a publicist? The next year—that would be, let us see, 9 years ago or more—they overlooked the lake as much as possible and the caption under the view booklet picture said: “Lake LaVerne—a lagoon which will be overlooked by the new million dollar Memorial Union.” The year after that—that would be, oh, you’re as good at arithmetic as we are—they bitterly hated to let go of that picture of the lake, but they didn’t yet have a photo of the Union, so they said: “Lake LaVerne—a lagoon which is being overlooked by a new million dollar Memorial Union.”

◆ The thing got to be a farce. Alumni came back to the campus to take their families canoeing. One summer school student packed up and left for the University of Wisconsin the second day here. He said he’d seen a picture of Lake LaVerne in the booklet and he was hanged if he was going to go all summer without a bath. And besides he thought they had better bathing bushes at Madison. If they had used more pictures of the bit of water,

the Bally Rot conductor would have been justified in sneaking into the Journalism Department office and substituting the caption: “Lake LaMud—a lagoon which was overlooked by the Memorial Union.”

But to get back to the beginning of things, and back to probably the best swamp hay field this side of the Florida Everglades: One LaVerne W. Noyes graduated from this college in the class of 1872. Some say it was the first class ever to leave the institution. Others snicker and ask how could any class have been so dull as to have entered in 1858—the 75 years ago we are celebrating—and not have graduated for 14 long years.

◆ Noyes knew a thing or two about campus gardening. For two years while he was in college he had charge under President Welch of the planting and the work on the ornamental grounds. He boasted that he had never worked for anyone, so we suppose that was all just a bunch of fun. But regardless of that he went to Chicago and began making windmills and dictionary holders. His heart soon went out to his alma mater—to use the Alumni Association interpretation of the term—and when the college sent word that it needed a flag pole, he resolved to do something about it.

What, thought Alumnus Noyes, in the midst of his windmills, dictionary stands, gas engines and electric transmission towers, would do more to grace the central campus than a windmillish flag pole? A bright new windmill tower was sent, and with a long iron pipe

through its center was all laid out on the central campus, about 30 years ago, ready to raise the next morning to an upright position.

◆ But the morning never came—for the would-be flag pole. It was hooked by a bunch of students with advanced ideas about flag poles. Some say it was dragged to the site of future Lake LaVerne, others declare it met its end on the banks of Squaw Creek. Somewhere in the hinterland it was placed on a nice hot fire and bent all out of flag pole shape.

Naturally that made Windmill Noyes a bit indignant. Little was heard of him for 20 years except that his indignation became adulation in another direction and he began to stroll about the ivy-clad walls of the University of Chicago. Things took their natural course. When he entered the University gates he was greeted by a gang of undergraduates emitting nine rahs for LaVerne Noyes with a lustier rah than ever greeted Coach Stagg. Whenever he entered a building—more nine rahs. It might be explained that the students knew the campus short cuts. After all, students can't spend all their class time emitting nine rahs for interested Chicagoans. The effect was overwhelming to Mister Noyes. Result: A women's dormitory on the Midway.

A couple of decades pass. That brings us up to—where is that piece of paper we had it added up on?—oh, maybe 20 years ago. Mister Noyes hired a landscaper, Simmons, who said one thing that was most needed to modify and complete Dr. Welch's original campus plan was a sheet of water. That, you see, was because the original radial scheme of Dr. Welch had been changed to a modified quadrangular court plan. So a couple of years later Mr. Noyes consented to foot the bill for

a sheet, yes, the same that later became a bit, of water.

Ole Davidson, of the class of 1897, who hailed originally from Marshalltown, and is a Stone & Webster civil engineer, designed the culvert that carries the Fort Dodge, Des Moines & Southern Railroad, or what is left of it, and the Lynn avenue entrance over College Creek. If there are any errors in that culvert Mister Davidson can be pardoned. Up on the top of the hill, about where you sit in the alcove that lets you look down back of the soda grill in the Commons, stood the Veterinary Barn. And just south of it smelled the pit where they stored their animals when the students got through cutting them up.

◆ The convicts from Anamosa came down and dug out the centuries of accumulated silt, carted it across Lincoln Way—it was Boone street in those days—dumped it around 115 Lynn avenue, to make a lawn for that residence, and spoiled that lovely hay field and a couple of meadow larks' nests. Somebody else built a dam at one end of the culvert and there they had—some said a lake, but the college publicists insisted that it was a bit, later relenting to call it a lagoon.

And it was a lake, with canoes, Isaac Walton casting bees, Military Department pontoon bridge building exhibitions, and occasional swimming—no, we did not say wading—until the next spring. Then the upper end began to fill with silt, just like it always had done for centuries past. The campus civil engineers built a filter dam near Welch avenue, but heck, people who turn out graduates who rebuild the Mississippi river, construct ocean bridges to Key West and dredge channels for sea-going steamships can't be expected to control rampagous College Creek. So it continued to fill up—clear to the dam. They flushed it out once or twice with a fire hose, before times like Veishea, but it always went hayward.

◆ Mister Noyes came back to the campus in 1915, when the lake had a lagoonish sheen that was not to be made sport of, and they made him a Doctor of Engineering at Commencement time. He died in 1919, before the thing got to be the mess that it is now, or, as we said back there, oh, we've forgotten how many pages ago, before it got to the state where the booklet writers would save said "a lagoon that was overlooked by a new million dollar Memorial Union." And as a constructive suggestion for Hello Day, might we not greet eac hother with the cheery phrase next spring: Have you overlooked Lake LaVerne today? We want'o.

*A drama in one act and an epilog, strictly up-to-date and interspersed here and there with sprightly comments.*
