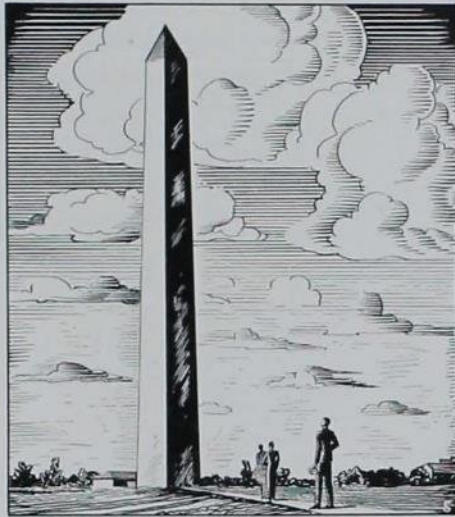

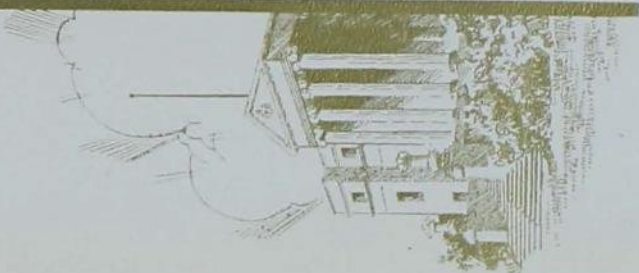

NINETEEN hundred and thirty two! The two-hundredth anniversary of the birth of George Washington, engineer, agriculturist, soldier

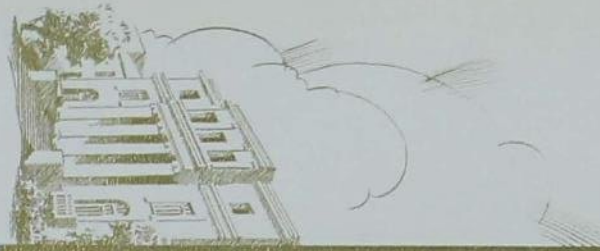

day have the same high-minded and high-spirited loyalty, what can we not do for our College and our Country?



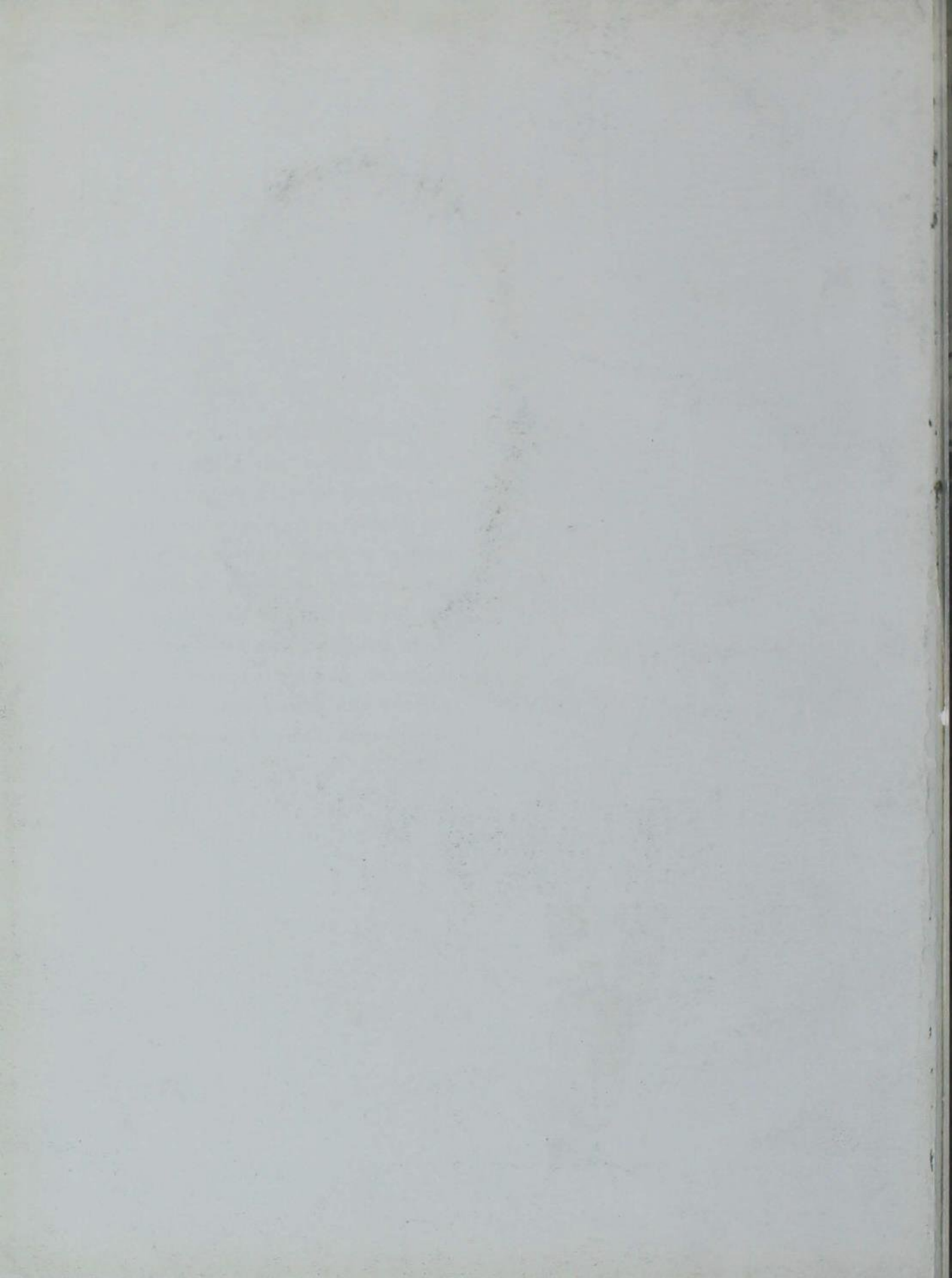

RAYMOND M. HUGHES, President

**P**RESIDENT RAYMOND M. HUGHES was graduated from Miami University at Oxford, Ohio, in 1893. After teaching science for two years in the Hamilton High School he held a teaching fellowship in chemistry at the Ohio State University for two years and studied chemistry at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology during the following year (1897-98). He then was called back to his alma mater as Professor of Chemistry and Physics in the fall of 1898, where he served successively as Professor of Chemistry and Registrar, Dean of the Liberal Arts College, and President until 1927, when he resigned to accept the Presidency of Iowa State College.

During this period he has been active in the service of the Association of American Colleges, the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the National Association of State Universities, and the American Council on Education, in each of which organizations he has at one time served as secretary.

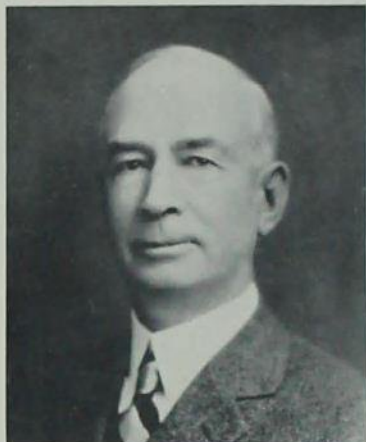

## Division of Agriculture

THE DIVISION OF AGRICULTURE comprises the following departments: Agricultural Engineering, Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology, Animal Husbandry, including Dairy Husbandry and Poultry Husbandry, Dairying, Farm Crops and Soils, Genetics, Horticulture and Forestry, Landscape Architecture, Floriculture and Vegetable Crops, Technical Journalism and Vocational Education.

For many years, beginning with the founding of Iowa State College, all the work of the Agricultural Division was under the supervision of two departments, which were called the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Horticulture.

Four-year collegiate courses are offered, embracing the work in all of the major lines, and research work is conducted in practically all phases of technical and practical agriculture.

The enrollment of students in the Division of Agriculture is the largest in that subject in the United States. The enrollment of graduate students in agriculture is in excess of 100. Many students from other institutions and foreign countries come to Iowa State for graduate work.

Student judging teams afford opportunity for twenty-five to thirty men to participate in Intercollegiate Judging Contests annually. The consistent winning of our teams has brought distinction to our college.

In addition to the buildings and laboratories and other extensive equipment, the various departments of the division have over 1,500 acres of land used for educational and research work.



## Division of Engineering

UNDERGRADUATE instruction in the Division of Engineering is given in ten four-year courses, which have uniform requirements for entrance: Agricultural Engineering, Architectural Engineering, Ceramic Engineering, Chemical Engineering, Civil Engineering, Electrical Engineering, General Engineering, Mechanical Engineering, Mining Engineering, and Trades and Industries (Industrial Arts). Each of these courses leads to the B. S. degree.

In addition to this instruction, the Division of Engineering carries on work in Engineering Extension and Engineering Experiment Station Research. Iowa State College was the first engineering institution in the United

States to systematically organize its work along these three major lines.

In each of the collegiate branches of instruction, except Industrial Arts, a year of graduate work has been definitely outlined, completion of which entitles the student to a M. S. degree. In addition, two years of graduate work, leading to the Ph. D. degree, are offered in several courses. An increasingly large number of students are taking advantage of these additional years of training.

The student activities of the Engineering Division are directed by the Engineering Council. Members of the council, at the end of their sophomore year, serve two years. Each of the nine departments has two representatives, and the Iowa Engineer and the Cardinal Guild each have representatives.

## Division of Home Economics

ment, Household Equipment, Textiles and Clothing, and Home Economics Education. In addition, work leading to the Ph. D. degree is offered by the Department of Foods and Nutrition.

The courses in Home Economics aim to prepare students for intelligent citizenship, efficient homemaking, and economic independence. Graduates from these courses are securing positions as high school and college teachers, extension workers, dietitians, institution managers, nursery school directors, home service directors for utility companies, research workers in commercial laboratories, and members of editorial staffs of publishing companies.





## Division of Industrial Science

THE DIVISION OF INDUSTRIAL SCIENCE serves as an administrative unit for those departments whose work, while not in itself technical, is necessary to a well-rounded education in any of the technical courses at Iowa State College. These departments comprise Bacteriology and Hygiene, Botany, Chemistry, Applied Economics and Social Science, Geology, Mathematics, Military Science and Tactics, Physics, Zoology and Entomology. In addition, the work of the departments of English, History, Psychology, Modern Languages and Public Speaking is under the supervision of the Dean of Industrial Science.

In the early days of Iowa State College, when no distinction was drawn between the different divisions now existing, all of the instruction offered in the institution was given by this Industrial Science Division. When the growing need for specialization and the number of students enrolled made this administrative scheme inadequate, the four other divisions were created. When, in 1879, the Division of Veterinary Medicine was created, the Division of Industrial Science assumed the status it possesses today.

The Industrial Science Council is made up of students of the different departments, who are elected at the divisional convocation in the spring quarter. The council acts as a governing body for the Industrial Science Division and sponsors such activities as Industrial Science Barbecue, the Industrial Science Club and the Divisional Open House during Veishea.



## Division of Veterinary Medicine

WHEN the Veterinary Medicine course at Iowa State College was made a separate division and a Dean of Veterinary Medicine appointed in 1879, Dr. Walker, the first Dean of the division, was confronted with the impossibility of obtaining competent instructors. It became necessary for him to establish a graduate course, the chief purpose of which was to train instructors for Iowa State College.

The twenty years from 1880, when the first class in the division was graduated, to 1900, were full of advancement for the science of Veterinary Medicine. Growth has been steady and at the present time the work of the

division comprises: Anatomy, Medicine, Pathology, Physiology, Surgery and Veterinary Investigations. Each is a separate department, and, together, they offer the instruction which was originally administered by a single unit.

In 1884 the Veterinary Medical Society was first established. The membership is composed of all students enrolled in the division. Meetings are held in the Auditorium of the Veterinary Building twice each month and are presided over by the president, who is elected from the senior class. Various committees are appointed to consider matters of special importance. Outstanding events of the year are: the freshman mixer during the fall quarter and the faculty picnic held during the spring quarter. Faculty members aid in planning and suggesting interesting programs for meetings, but the meetings are always conducted by and for the benefit of the student members.



## The Extension Service

IOWA STATE COLLEGE has become a great repository of scientific information concerning agriculture and home economics. This information has been gathered through extensive experimental and research investigations in Iowa and through access to the work of investigators in other states, including the United States Department of Agriculture. The Extension Service is conducted in order to make the workable part of this information available to the people of the state. Its purpose is to place within reach of farmers and homemakers the latest and best information concerning agriculture and home economics.

In order to accomplish this purpose a staff of workers representing each department in the Divisions of Agriculture and Home Economics and certain phases of Industrial Science, Veterinary Medicine and Engineering are maintained at the college. These workers are available to the people of the state for lectures, demonstrations and consultation.

A staff of workers is maintained in the field through cooperation with county farm bureaus. As a result of this arrangement each county is provided with a county extension agent and in addition to this about one-third of the counties have either home demonstration agents or club agents. Assisting the county extension agents are a large number of farm men and women who serve as organizers and leaders of junior clubs, home project training schools and farm project demonstrations. In this way practically every community in the state is put in touch with and receives some of the practical benefits of the college.

## Hygiene Department—Health Service

GRADUATES of fifteen years ago would scarcely recognize the college infirmary of their day, tucked in, as it is now, behind our modern hospital. The old hospital is now used only for contagious diseases.

The first or north wing of the newer hospital, built in 1915, has a capacity of forty beds and includes the kitchen and dining rooms and operating rooms. The east wing, built in 1924, more than doubled the capacity and gives added dispensary and laboratory facilities so that now the college has ample facilities for caring for those needing hospital or ambulatory care.

The Hygiene Department is also a teaching department and gives classroom instruction in hygiene to all freshmen in Industrial Science and Home Economics.

It must not be thought, however, that the care of the sick is the only or even the most important part of the work of the Department of Hygiene. It is even more important that it prevent illness and improve the health of the students while here and give them positive knowledge of health principles and practices.

As the first step, all entering students are given a careful "once over" during the entrance physical examinations. Such as show physical defects or health impairments are followed up in further conferences, and advice and treatment are given with a view of correcting or improving their condition. The students are given another physical examination before entering each class and again before graduating.



## The College Library

**T**HE COLLEGE LIBRARY is designed primarily to serve the needs of the faculty and the students of Iowa State College in their research and study.

The library is the most used building on the campus, loaning on an average of three books per student per month during the college year.

The new building, opened for the use of the public in the spring of 1925, is designed to meet adequately the needs of both graduate and undergraduate students. The library affords facilities for bibliographic research in the scientific literature of the departments giving graduate instruction. The single class subject offered may be allowed as either major or minor credit in any department.

The library collections consist of about 200,000 carefully selected volumes. A special attempt has been made to strengthen the library in sets of periodicals and society publications. The library is receiving currently over 3,000 periodicals, principally in English, French and German, although nearly every language is represented. The collections in the library adequately represent the specialized research work of the college.

The two most important branches of the program, the social and athletic activities, have shown considerable progress. The social activities have included forty-two separate and distinct social functions having a total attendance of 1,850 men. These functions have been made up largely of exchange parties, which are social meetings of one or two wards with a girls' dormitory or sorority as hostess. The individual wards also sponsored social gatherings such as fire-sides, radio parties, movies, illustrated talks, smokers, bridge games and home parties. As a group and in cooperation with the Women's Social Council the wards planned and conducted the quarterly Cyclone party. The Inter-Ward men also sponsored its first Inter-Ward dance, which was attended by 190 couples.

The administrative and controlling body is the Inter-Ward Executive Council, composed of the presidents of all the wards and the president or representative from each of the other two councils. Regular meetings are held every two weeks.

Approximately 1,800 men constitute the membership of the 24 wards. Each ward includes about 75 men within a given geographical district and are designated, respectively, as Alpha Ward, Beta Ward, etc. Every man not living in an organized house is a member of the ward in which he lives, whether he is a fraternity member, a pledge or a man without fraternity affiliation. Fraternity men are encouraged to take active part in the ward work. Socially they are not limited in any way but in intramural sports. They must designate for each sport with which group they wish to associate, either their fraternity, dormitory or ward.

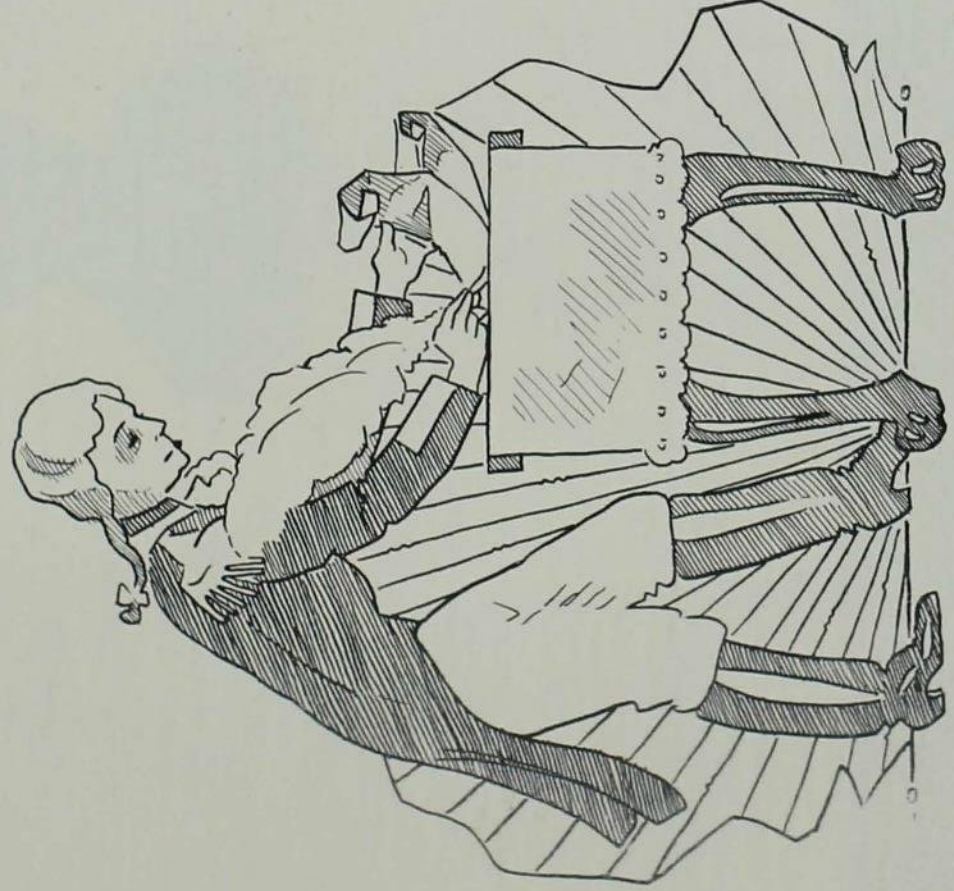

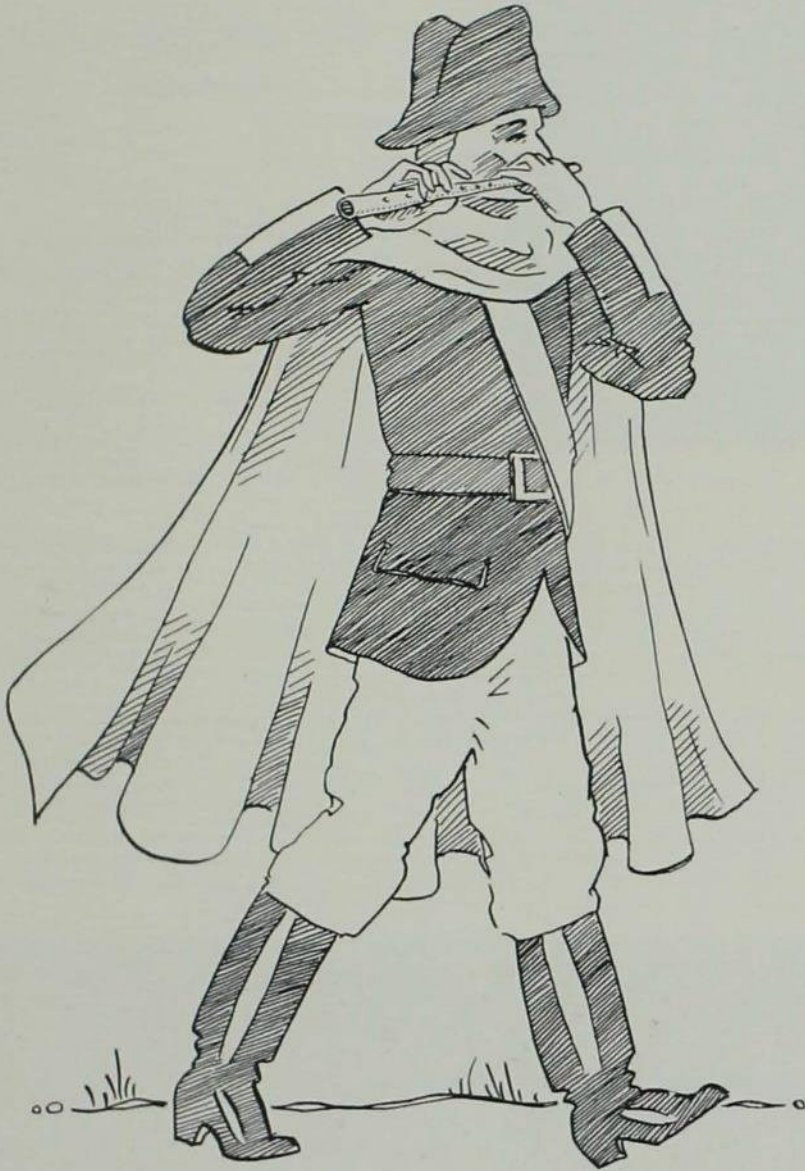

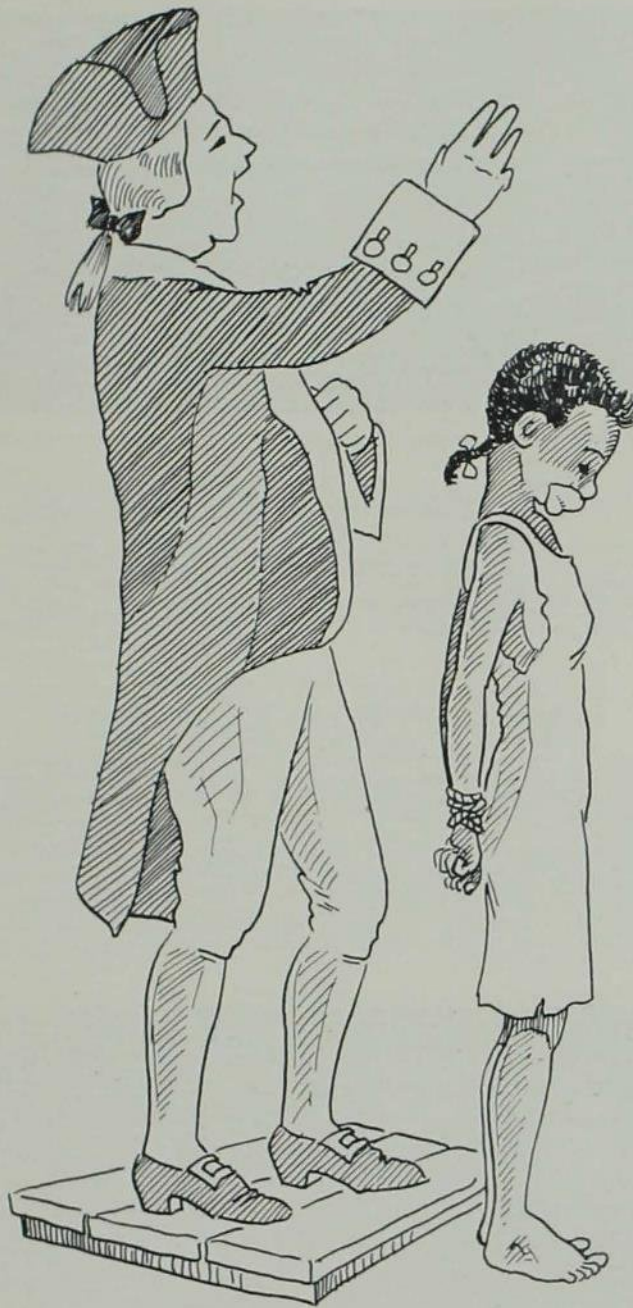

Prizes won were: \$27.50 in cash, a true-type model, two silver trophies, two brief cases, an engraved cane and eight medals.

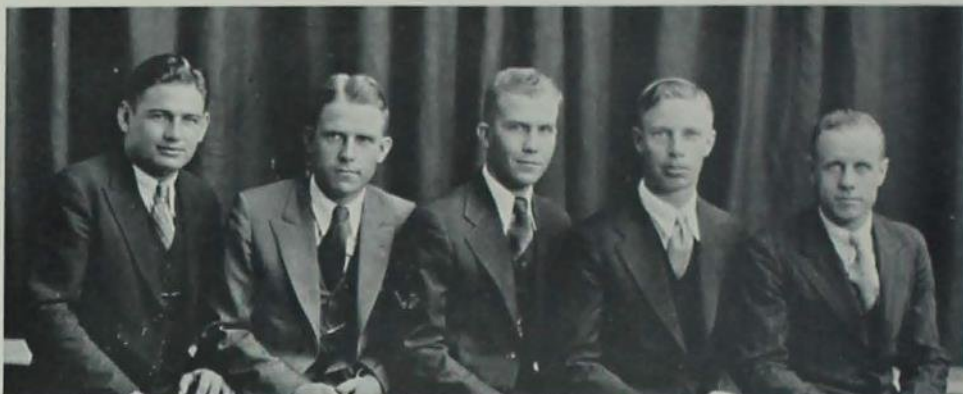

The team was not first on any class of livestock in either contest, but won both contests by taking high rank on all classes. ## Meat Judging Team

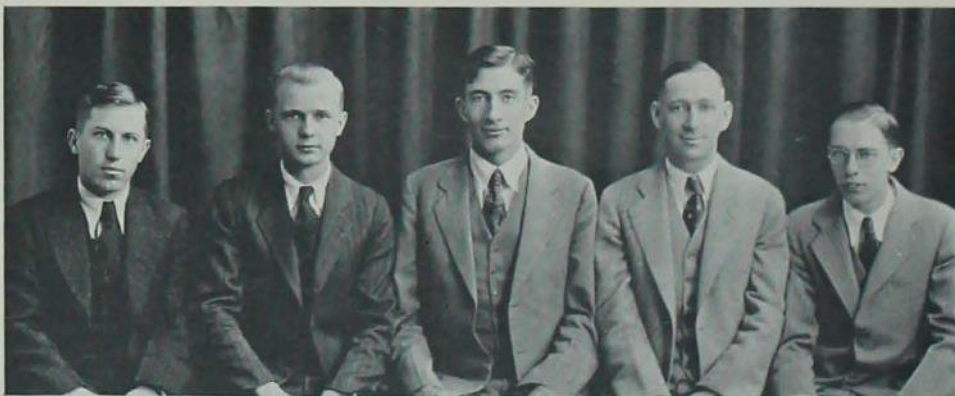

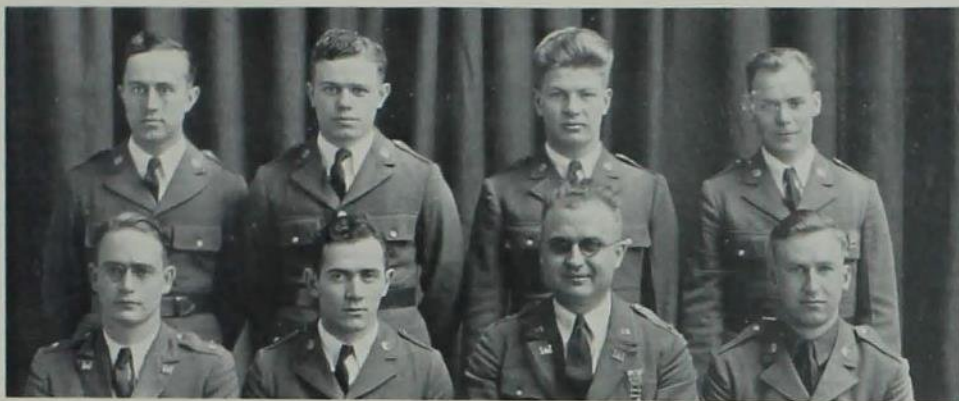

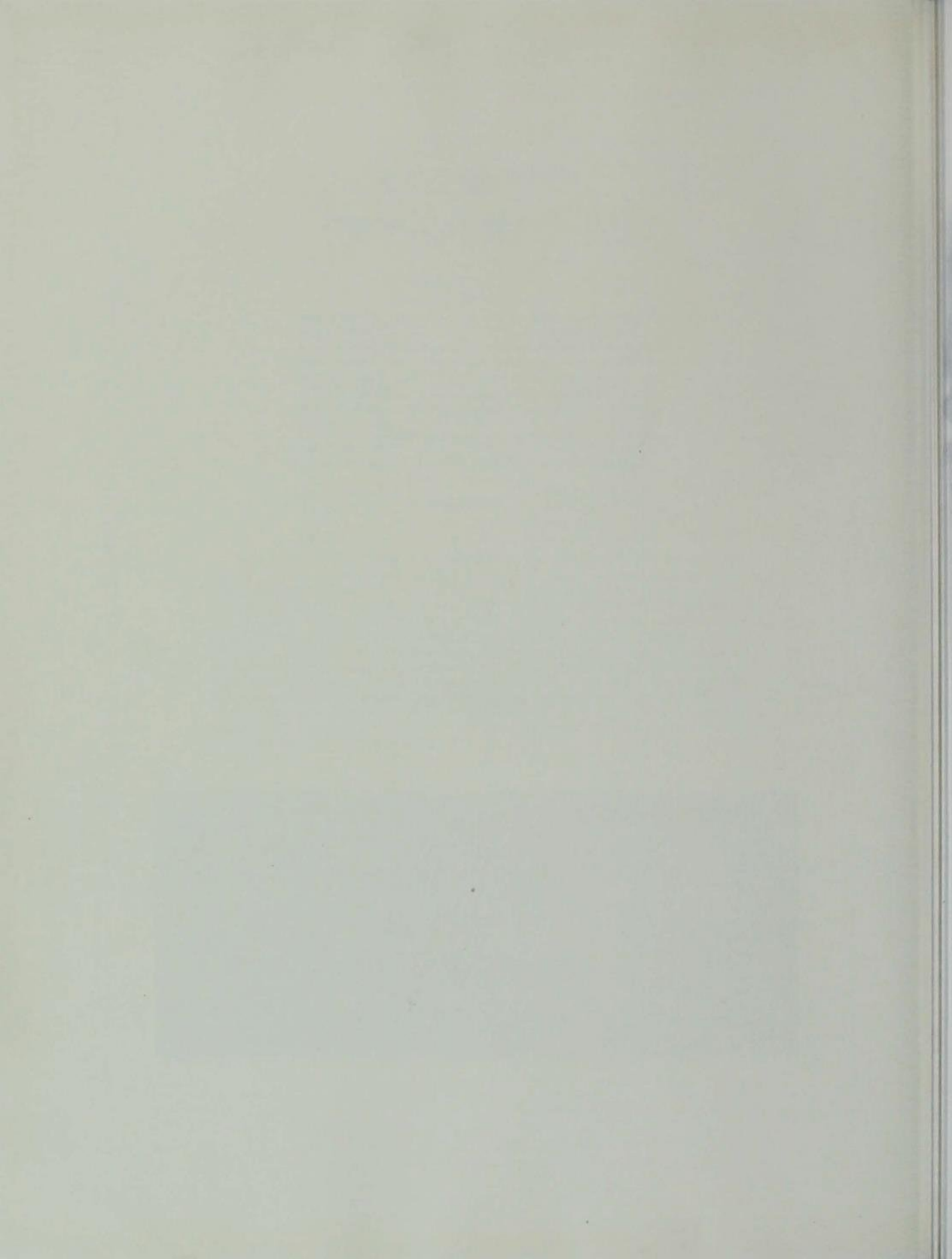

Sport scribes have named him "The Moses of Football." This title has been bestowed upon our own George F. Veenker, Iowa State's new football coach, because he led the Cyclones from the depths of two seasons of defeats to second place in the conference. Iowa State is justly proud of her new coach.

Coach Veenker came to Ames from Michigan University, where he coached football and basketball, serving as head coach in the latter sport for three years, his team winning the title once during that period. Fielding H. Yost, veteran director of athletics at Michigan, has named Veenker as one of the most outstanding defensive football coaches in the country.

Coach Veenker really is an Iowa product, having spent his boyhood days in the little town of Ashton. As an undergraduate at St. Lawrence U. and Hope College, Holland, Mich., he won letters in football, baseball and track. During the war Mr. Veenker served with the air corps. Upon his return to civilian life, he coached football for a year and a half at Hammond, Ind., and then went to Emerson High, Gary, Ind. During that time his record was outstanding. During eight years of football coaching in high schools, his teams won two state championships and were undefeated for four successive seasons. In 1926 he was secured by Michigan.

During his stay at Michigan, Coach Veenker wrote a book entitled "Basketball for Coaches and Players." It is considered by many in authority that this is the best book in its field ever published. With such a person guiding our football destinies the Iowa State student body rests assured that football is on the upgrade at our institution.

## Simpson and Morningside

All the eyes of Iowa's sport-world were focused on Ames when Iowa State opened the 1931 football season with Simpson. Two years of defeats—a new football coach—what did the future hold for football at the Cyclone institution?

Although the score, 6 to 0, showed very little difference between the teams, yet the Cyclones showed a spirit and potential power that boded ill for opponents to come. The game was played on a regular summer day and the heat served to slow up the game. Numerous substitutions were made on either side. Coach Veenker seemed especially anxious to try his men under fire and used practically two teams.

Simpson had three all-conference men in its line-up and put up a game battle. The first quarter was practically even. Shortly after the start of the second quarter, the Cyclones advanced the ball to Simpson's 10-yard line. Here Veenker showed one of his tricks and on an end around play that

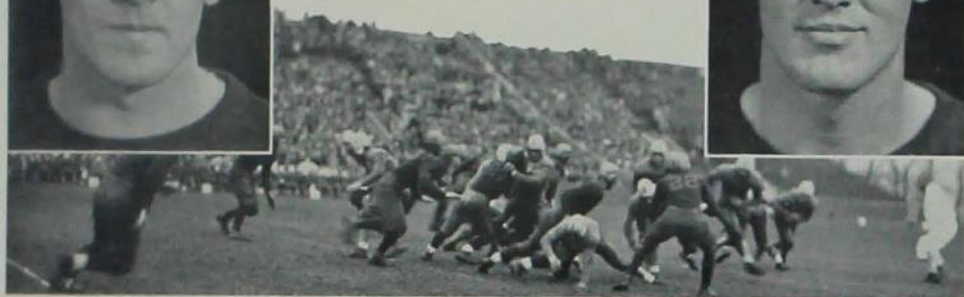
caught Simpson flat-footed, the veteran Wells scampered untouched for the first touchdown of the season. Grefe failed to kick goal. Although threatening several times, the Cyclones seemed content to protect their lead.

All of the lettermen performed in good style and several sophomores showed exceptional promise. Coach Veenker indicated that he would shift Duesenberg back to his old position at fullback instead of using him at guard.

Morningside was next in line, the game being played at Sioux City and Iowa State winning 20 to 6. In this game Dick Grefe brought the crowd to its feet with several long gains. Dick showed flashes of the form that so startled Nebraska last year. The Cyclones received their first bit of misfortune in this game when Impson, star back, broke a small bone in his ankle that kept him out of the game the rest of the year.

## Detroit and Drake

The first loss of the 1932 season came when the Cyclones invaded Detroit University, only to come out on the short end of a 19 to 0 score. The fact that the game was played at night seemed to bother the Cardinal and Gold gridders. The defensive play of our line was a redeeming feature, all of the Detroit scores coming as the result of long, sensational runs in the open by their star backs. The Cyclone offense failed to get started during the evening. Bowen did a great job of kicking and the all around play of Templeton, giant sophomore end, was especially pleasing to Coach Veenker. "Temp" had shown flashes of ability in the first two games, but did not come into his own until this game. Detroit sport writers named him as the outstanding player of the game.

The fourth non-conference game was with Drake. This game, coming as it did between the Kansas Aggie and Nebraska games, found us in rather bad

shape. The Cyclones were pointing for the championship game with Nebraska a week later, and being doped to win over Drake, appeared a little over-confident and were nosed out 6 to 7.

The game was played on a heavy, slippery field after hours of a soaking rain. The Bulldogs came up here on their toes and outgained and outrushed the Iowa State team most of the game. During the fourth quarter, after threatening several times, Lansrude broke through to score their only touchdown. The same Seiberling that spoiled things last year with a one point victory, proceeded to boot the oval nicely over the cross-bars for the winning point.

This seemed to waken the Iowa State team, which immediately scored six points on a pass, Grefe to Templeton. Another scoring threat was ended by the final gun when it seemed as though a Cyclone victory was within our grasp.

A great crowd viewed the most pleasing spectacle of seeing the Missourians trounced on the gridiron by Iowa State for the first time since 1923. It was a great victory for the Cyclones and a triumph for Coach Veenker. Score, I. S. 20—M. 0.

It was not until the second quarter that Iowa State's superiority became apparent. The Tigers never seriously threatened to score, mainly because Stuber, their flashy back, never had an opportunity to get started. In the second quarter, by virtue of a pass, Schafroth to Templeton, the ball was placed on Missouri's one-yard line. On the fourth attempt Grefe plunged over and then made it 7 with a perfect place kick.

Bauman, Nagel and Etzel starred in the line for the victors, while Duesenberg was also in every play.

The following weekend, the Cyclones journeyed to Oklahoma and won their second straight conference victory by the score of 13 to 12. The game was a thriller from start to finish. Oklahoma opened up the scoring out of a clear sky. Panzie, Sooner safety man, took one of Bowen's spirals on his 20-yard line, sidestepped two onrushing Cyclones and sped down the sidelines to the goal line 80 yards away. The attempted place kick failed.

In the second half the Iowa State team came back with vengeance. After a series of exchange of punts, it was our ball on our own 45-yard line. On the next play Schafroth took the ball from center, faded back ten yards and hurled the pigskin 50 yards down the field into the outstretched arms of the speedy Grefe, who traveled the remaining 15 yards for a score. In catching the ball, Grefe did not have to break his stride as it sailed over his shoul-

Twice they attempted place kicks from within the 10-yard line, only to fail, and on a third occasion Wells recovered a fumble in that territory to assure Iowa State of victory. Two weeks later the Kansas Aggies came to State Field, undefeated, an outstanding team of the middlewest and favored to win by two touchdowns. The Cyclones were undaunted by such a reputation and sent the Wildecats home on the short end of a 7 to 6 score.

In the first quarter, with the play favoring Iowa State to date, Auker, star Wildcat back, stepped back to punt from his 10-yard line. Instead, he drew in the defensive right end of the Cyclones, circled it and dashed 80 yards for a score; the goal was missed. From then on Kansas State had the ball most of the time and found little difficulty in gaining ground between the two 30-yard lines, but when threatened, the Cyclones always tightened up. Auker and Hursh were as classy a pair of ball carriers as had appeared on State Field in years.

After the Aggie score, the Cardinal and Gold warriors took the matter into their own hands and scored a touchdown in the second quarter. With the ball in our possession in

Auker and Wells both raced for the ball, Auker reached it first, deflected it into the air, only to have the oval come down into Wells' hands, who dashed the remaining 10 yards over the goal line. Dick Grefe was equal to the occasion and place kicked the winning point.

It looked like an Aggie score in the third quarter when they had first down on the Cyclone 4-yard line. Two line smashes through the stocky Saddoris failed to gain an inch. On the third try the play was directed at big "Buz" Nagel, who stopped the runner like the Rock of Gibraltar. The Wildcat strategy then elected to try a wide end run, but the whole Iowa State team, headed by Wells and Nagel, swarmed all over Auker for a loss, and it was the Cyclones' ball on the 14-yard line. The game ended with Kansas on our 6-yard line, again threatening to score. The Cyclones put up so much fight that day that greater power went for naught.

This stage of the game found Iowa State and Nebraska leading for conference honors, with the title to be decided when the teams met. Two weeks later the team entrained for Nebraska, supported by 500 loyal students, who hoped to see their favorites win the Big Six title.

Nebraska's great team was pointed and primed for the contest. The greater part of the first quarter Iowa State outplayed Nebraska and gradually drove them back. Then suddenly the tide changed. Brown, midget enemy back, found a hole at tackle and aided by beautiful interference, sprinted down the side lines 80 yards for a touchdown.

This run seemed to upset the Cyclones and from then on they failed to show their customary speed and teamwork. They made occasional drives into Nebraska territory, but they were never sustained long enough to bring about a score. Every Cyclone fought like a Tiger, but the Nebraskans were not to be denied. Led by the All-American Rhea in the line, with Sauer, Kreizinger and Masterson carrying the ball, they scored two more

Several Cardinal and Gold stars were honored by sports writers on all-star teams. Dick Grefe and "Rog" Bowen were placed on the All-Big Six first team and Nagel was placed on the third team.

Templeton, brilliant sophomore, was named by some scribes on the All-Conference team and by one writer was All-American honorable mention.

The season developed promising sophomores such as Templeton, J. Smith, Bauman, Schafroth, Beyer, Rae and Truesdell, who are expected to ably fill the vacancies in stardom left by Nagel, Nolte, Bob Smith, Etzel, Duesenberg, Wells, Saddoris, Bowen and Swoboda.

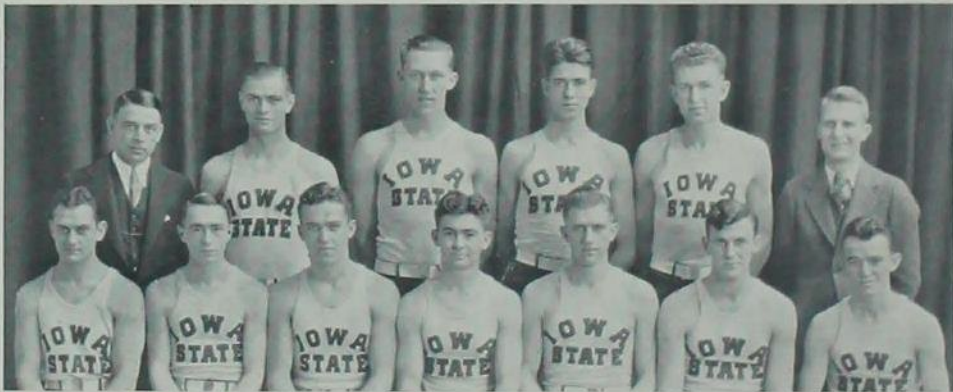

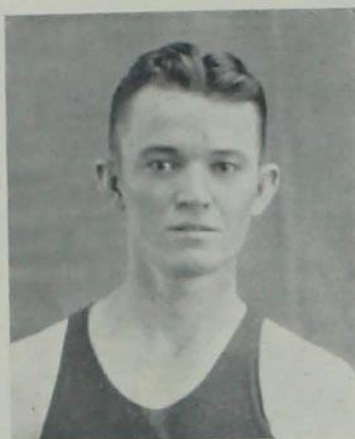
## Basketball

With a veteran team of five seniors and one junior with which to form the nucleus of his 1932 basketball team, Coach Louis Menze opened the season with one of the strongest teams which the conference had to offer. Veterans Roadcap, Heitman, Hawk, Rieke, Holmes and Thompson were all proved and seasoned warriors at the game, and their passing and breaking attack combined with their deadly accuracy of hitting the hoop were qualities feared by all of their foes.

But pre-season predictions were not to hold sway, for fate put in her say-so and struck the Cyclone camp with sickness before the season had even gotten under way. The first week of winter quarter found Roadcap, Thompson and Heitman in the hospital suffering with a flu attack, and from that time on until the end of the season, the Iowa State basketball squad was afflicted with sickness and injuries. Practically all of the members of the squad were attacked by flu at some time or another during the 1932 basketball campaign, and Hawk received a wrenched shoulder and back during the Kansas State game, in the middle of the season, which kept him out of action for several games and crippled him for the rest. Besides this, Thompson fought a bad knee all through the season and Roadcap was bothered by an eye which was hurt during the 1931 season and which caused him no end of trouble this year.

Al Heitman, lanky center and co-captain of the 1931 team, again played his consistent game this year and led the team in scoring. Heitman tied for fourth place in conference scoring with Beck of Oklahoma. Al was awarded the center position on the all-conference second five. Thompson, Cyclone captain-elect, finished second in scoring among his teammates and tied for fifth place in conference scoring with Main of Oklahoma. Captain Jack Roadcap, handicapped by sickness and injuries, failed to successfully defend his 1931 season accomplishment of being conference high scorer and had to be content with sixth place in the list of conference high scorers.

That the conference basketball play during



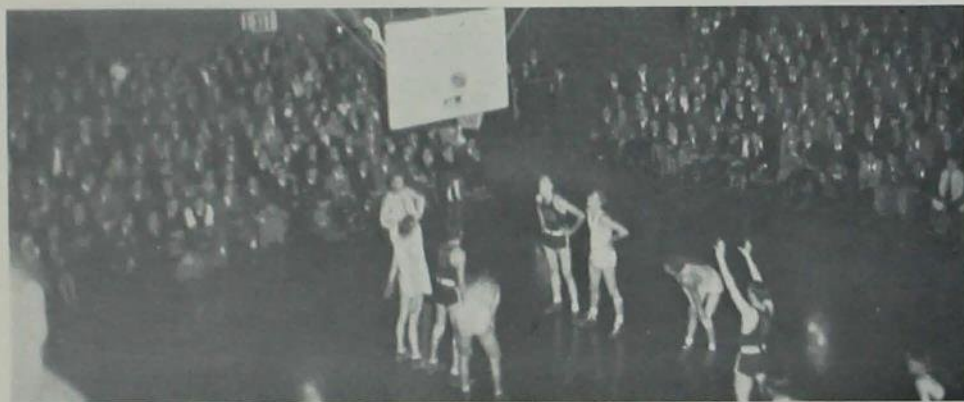

the 1932 season was very close is evinced by the fact that every Big Six team lost at least three conference games.

Even though the team was hampered by misfortune, the Cyclone fans witnessed eight games on the home floor which provided thrills and sport which equalled that of any other season.

The fact that Coach Menze was forced to substitute generously due to the inability of his regulars to play at various times revealed a wealth of hidden material in his substitutes. Jones, as an unknown, surprised basketball fans at Iowa State this season with his consistent ability to sink field goals at long range, and Sieben, Templeton and Levine displayed qualities which mark them as players of varsity caliber. Ludwig, Dills and Holmes, the more experienced of the substitutes, also proved very valuable in filling in the vacancies left by the veterans at various times.

Brigham Young University of Salt Lake City, Utah, a western team of highly touted ability, opened the season here December 15. Although they showed great strength and coordination,

they were easily vanquished 47 to 26. The Cyclone team's performance delighted the fans and the outlook for the season was made exceedingly bright by this victory.

Three days later, Central College of Pella sent their quintet to State Gym with the hope of not allowing the Iowa State five to spoil their creditable record of thirty-seven successive victories. Their hopes were in vain, however, and although they launched out in the first half very strongly, they were finally vanquished 44 to 32. The Cyclones' fast floor work and close-in-shot accuracy proved far superior to their distance shot accuracy and was their final undoing.

New Year's Eve, the Drake feud was renewed at Des Moines. Iowa State finally won the closely contested tilt, 32 to 30. The game was marked by its languidness until the final minutes, and the inability of both sides to take advantage of set shots and charity tosses. Several of the Iowa State regulars were absent from the game and this probably accounted in part for the small margin of victory, since

later in the season the Drake team proved no match for the Cyclones.

The conference season was opened the next week on Friday evening, January 8, in State Gymnasium. The Nebraska Cornhuskers, the foe, finally took the tilt 28 to 24. It was anyone's game all the way through and was outstanding for its roughness and horse-play. This was the first game which the Cyclones played under the handicap of illness. Their chief scorer and mainstay, Roadcap, out of the fray, the Iowa State quintet showed noticeable signs of being crippled, and it took several combinations of players before the right one was tried which could effectively oppose the Cornhuskers.

Eight days later Oklahoma was encountered at Norman, again with ill results. The score was 32 to 27. Still held in check by illness, Coach Menze tried vainly to bring about a combination of players on the squad which would prove a winner. In the next game, however, he was rewarded for his efforts.

Two days after the Oklahoma defeat, the Cyclones at last tasted conference victory at the

expense of the Kansas Jayhawks, 1932 conference champions. The score of the Lawrence game was 37 to 29.

The following Friday, January 22, the Cyclones weathered one of the greatest onslaughts of the season and continued their winning streak by finally vanquishing Missouri in State Gym, 18 to 13. The game was a thriller from start to finish and was not in the bag for the Cyclones until the final minute, when two successive field goals completely shattered all Tiger hopes for victory. All through the tilt until the last three minutes, the Columbians led, but the closely trailing Cyclones were not to be denied victory and finally came through with a finish usually only related in story books. Each team was careful and guarded closely to extremes, which was evidenced by the fact that the score at the half was only 4 to 6 in favor of the Tigers. This was undoubtedly the best conference game of the 1932 season played in State Gym.

The next Tuesday Drake provided the Iowa State five "duck soup" in State Gym and the

crowd yawned and batted their eyes sheepishly while the Cyclone whirlwind made Drake feathers fly to the tune of 35 to 24. The game was a great deal more lopsided in nature than the score implies, for until the whole Iowa State regular team had been supplanted by substitutes, the Cyclones had kept their score just twice as large as their opponents. Coach Menze was saving his men as much as possible for the next conference tilt which was to come four days later and so he withdrew his regulars from the fray late in the third quarter of the game.

Journeying to Manhattan the next Saturday, January 30, to end the first half of the conference season, the Cyclones met with a 19 to 15 disaster at the hands of Kansas State. It was in this game that Hawk received a shoulder injury which kept him out of the next two games and which proved to be a white elephant to him for the rest of the season.

Not discouraged by the loss of their star running guard, Hawk, and instilled with the desire to avenge the defeat received at the hands of Nebraska earlier in the season, the Cyclones

tangled with the Cornhuskers the following Monday and emerged with a closely fought, one-point victory. The score was 33 to 32.

It was a tired and battle-worn Cyclone quintet which faced the Jayhawks from Kansas the following Friday in State Gym, and although they started out well, the Cyclones were unable to cope with the long range guns of the Jayhawks in the forms of O'Leary and Johnson. The final score was Iowa State 27, Kansas 40.

Three days later Iowa State fans heard the victory bell ring once more, for the Cyclones had outpointed the Oklahoma Sooners 29 to 22. Coach Menze had prepared his team for the chief Sooner threats, Beck and Main, and it was with extreme difficulty that they were able to get any shots at the basket other than from the charity line.

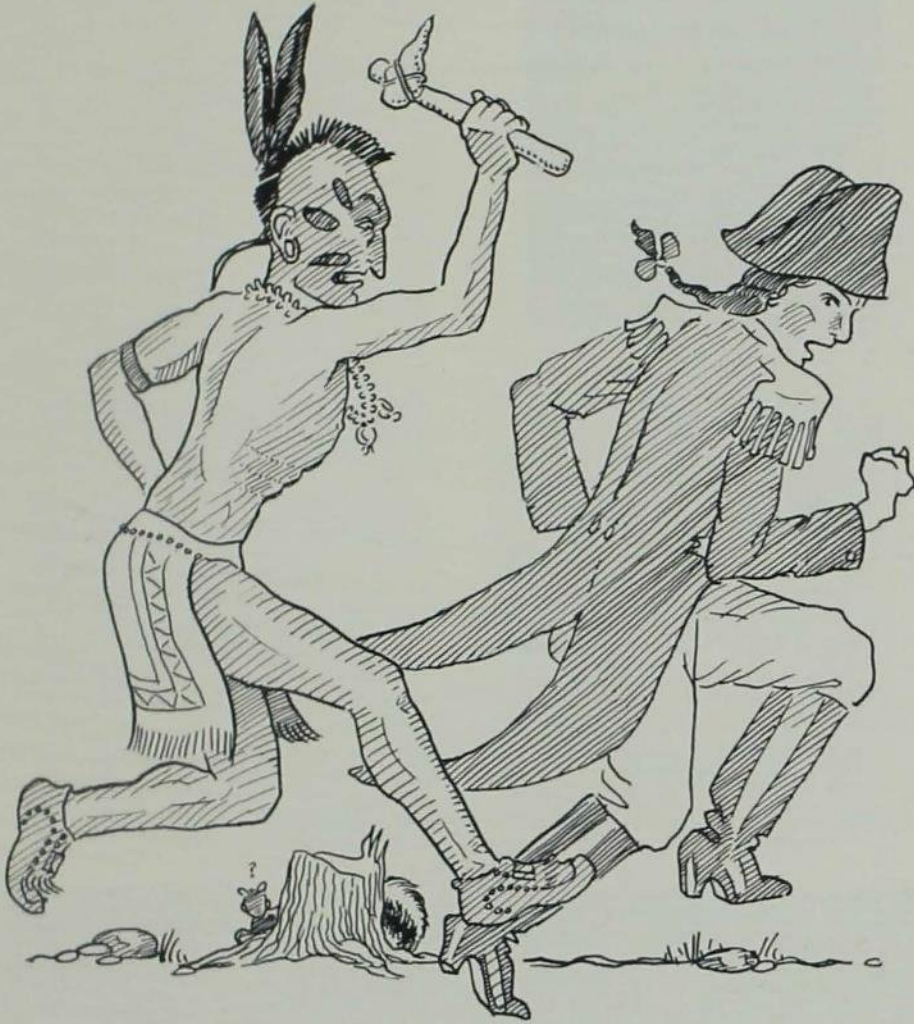
February 13 found the Cyclones playing a return engagement at Columbia, Missouri, which the Tiger fans enjoyed exceedingly. Cooper and Wagner proved the Cyclones' undoing in a closely contested game that gave the Missourians sweet revenge for the defeat which they had

received at the hands of the Iowa State team just three weeks earlier.

On February 19, in the last conference game of the season, also the last game in which five famous Iowa State stars would ever be seen in action in State Gym, stark tragedy stalked and the Cyclones were forced to bow to Kansas State, 30 to 27. It was the last home game for the five Iowa State fighters, Roapeap, Hawk, Rieke, Holmes and Heitman. Although the crowd of basketball followers yelled frantically for a victory which would crown the achievements of these five veterans, it was not to be had, for the Manhattan team was primed for the game and led from the start.

The final game of the season, on February 23, was with Drake on the Bulldogs' home floor. For the third time this season, the Bulldogs were defeated by the Cyclones, this time by the most decisive score, 31 to 19. As before, Drake showed signs of strength at first, but gradually weakened and allowed Iowa State scores to pile up until the game finally amounted to a complete rout.

Faced with the problem of producing a 1931 two-mile track team which could successfully defend the conference championship won by his men the year before, Coach Bob Simpson again tutored his harriers through another fall track season unmarred by defeat.

The loss of his anchor man, Putnam, from the lineup left a vacancy difficult to fill, but the performances of Lyle Chapman, Earl Labertew, Arthur Eichelkraut, Carl Duncan, Lyle Chisholm, Donald Saboe and William Dixon proved far superior to those of other Big Six two-mile teams, and the season's result found every other Big Six Conference team defeated by them.

October 24 gave the Iowa State runners their first taste of victory when Missouri bowed to them, 29 to 36. The race was run on State Field between the halves of the Missouri-Iowa State football game. Chapman's great finish, in which he came from behind at the final curve to pass Earl Labertew, his teammate, and D. Duncan of Missouri, to break the tape 15 yards ahead, was the deciding factor of the run.

Chapman turned in a time of 9:56.7 for the

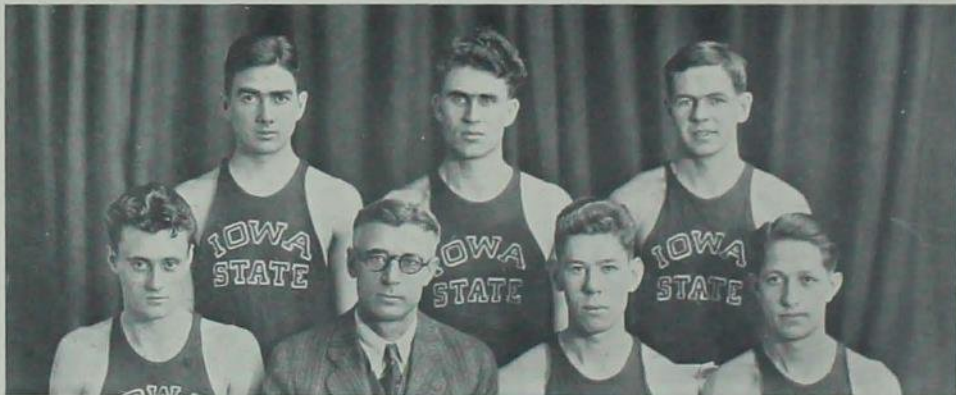

distance. Trailing him were Labertew, D. Duncan, Eichelkraut of Iowa State, E. Duncan of Missouri, C. Duncan of Iowa State, Wagner of Missouri, Chisholm and Saboe of Iowa State and Gates of Missouri, in that order.

Journeying with the football team to Norman, Oklahoma, to do battle with the Sooners on October 31, Iowa State scored its second 1931 victory over a Big Six two-mile team, scoring a 40 to 15 win. Chapman again finished first in this race, his time being 9:46.2. Only one Oklahoma man was among the first seven to cross the line. Moore of Oklahoma was second, Eichelkraut, Labertew, Duncan, Saboe and Chisholm finishing in the order named.

The week following, Coach Simpson's men won an easy 33 to 22 victory over Kansas State on State Field in the race run between the halves of the Kansas State and Iowa State football game. Again Chapman broke the tape, 9:45.8 being his time. Other men finished as follows: Landon, Kansas State, second; Labertew, Iowa State, third; Eichelkraut, Iowa State, fourth; Pearce, Kansas State, fifth; Daniels, Kansas State, sixth; Duncan, Iowa State, sev-

enth; Chisholm, Iowa State, eighth; Dixon, Iowa State, ninth; and Saboe, Iowa State, tenth.

November 14, a dismal, cold and rainy day, the Iowa State distance men again scored a 33 to 22 win over the fourth of their conference foes to fall before them, the Kansas Jayhawks, in a match run between the halves of the Drake Iowa State football feud. For the first and only time during the season, a runner other than an Iowa State man led the pack home to the yard. Glenn Cunningham, the Kansas star, was the winner, with Chapman, Eichelkraut and Labertew finishing in that order for the Cyclones. Other placings were: McComb, Kansas, fifth; Stover, Kansas, sixth; Saboe, Chisholm and Duncan, Iowa State, seventh, eighth and ninth; and Borel, Kansas, tenth.

In weather more appropriate for the running of a dog sled derby, Chapman led his teammates to the fifth win of the season and to the Big Six Conference championship when the Cyclone harriers administered a decisive 37 to 18 whipping to the Nebraska Cornhuskers' team on November 21, at Lincoln, Nebraska, between the halves of the Iowa State-Cornhusker football team.

Chapman's time of 10:2 was good, considering the weather and track conditions. The strong, cold wind which blew into the bowl from the north made it almost impossible for the contestants to run, at times, when facing it. Art Eichelkraut, Chapman's teammate, was second, with Storey of Nebraska third. Duncan of Iowa State finished fourth; Morrow of the Huskers, fifth; Chisholm was sixth; and Saboe, seventh.

The feature of the race was Labertew's feat of running the last half mile of the race with a broken leg to finish in ninth place. After the race was three-fourths run, Labertew turned his right leg in such a manner as to break it between the knee and the ankle. Suspecting a sprained ankle instead of a break, he luckily and courageously finished the race without a compound fracture resulting.

The season ended much more successfully than was anticipated, with Iowa State still the two-mile conference champion, and Coach Simpson having developed a wealth of material for the 1932 two-mile season.

## 1931 Track

Upholding their traditionally feared strength in the distance and relay events besides strengthening themselves materially in other track and field events to the extent of displaying record breaking caliber, the Cyclones completed the 1931 Indoor and Outdoor track season with the best record that any Iowa State track team has ever made.

Most outstanding of all the stellar performances of the Cyclone track squad were the record smashing exhibitions of Bob Hager, hurdler, and Ray Putnam, distance runner. In a 14.2 seconds thriller which upset all dope and broke the 14-year-old meet record established by his own coach, Bob Simpson, Hager defeated the famous Lee Sentman of Illinois in the 120-yard high hurdles event of the Drake Relays. The results of a questionnaire conducted by Sec Taylor, Des Moines Register sports editor, divulged the fact that Hager's outstanding victory in the high hurdles event at Drake was the outstanding athletic achievement of an Iowan during 1931.

1931 sports resumes all named Putnam as one of Iowa's 1931 stars and wherever he raced Putnam was regarded as one of the greatest threats in his specialties. During the season Putnam broke loose with the fastest mile of his career by traveling the distance in 4:15.3. This shattered one of the oldest of records made in the Big Six, which was made by Farquhar, another Cyclone runner, 19 years previous. Putnam also beat the cream of the country's

best collegiate milers in the tenth annual National Collegiate Athletic Association meet held at Stagg Field at the end of the spring track season.

The work of the medley mile and four-mile relay teams was outstanding. All three teams established numerous new records.

Although certain individual performances overshadowed the work of the whole team, a resume of the season shows Iowa State high up in conference and state standing. The Cyclones were victorious in the triangular indoor meet with Drake and Grinnell, lost to Notre Dame in a dual indoor meet, finished fourth in the Big Six Indoor Meet, vanquished Missouri, tied with Nebraska, fell short in the last event of the meet with Drake to lose 67 to 63 in outdoor

duals, placed third in the Big Six track and field meet at Lincoln and second in the Iowa intercollegiate track and field meet held in Des Moines. Also, high honors were won by Iowa State representatives in the Kansas City Athletic Club Games, at the Illinois, Texas, Rice, Kansas and Drake Relays, and at the National Collegiate Athletic Association track and field meet in Chicago.

The first competition of the indoor track season came for the Cyclones the second week of February at the Kansas City Athletic Club Games held in Convention Hall. The Cyclones placed in every event in which they entered. Iowa State's first victory was registered in the 50-yard hurdles, won by Capt. Bob Hager in 6.6 seconds. The two-mile college and university relay was copped by

Iowa State harriers, Nagel, Eichelkraut, Putnam and Labertew, in the fast indoor time of 8 minutes 6.3 seconds. Pittsburgh Teachers, which had one of the outstanding two-mile relay teams of the country the year previous was second. The special mile relay between Iowa State and Kansas Aggies also went to the Cyclones. Wessling, Conway, Hutchins and Henderson ran this race for Iowa State in 3 minutes 38.2 seconds. The open 440-yard dash found Henderson second to the tape. In the Shannon Douglas 600-yard run Wessling placed a close third for Iowa State in the event. Bob Smith placed fourth in the shot-put and M. W. Soultz tied for third in the high jump.

The following week-end the Cyclone runners completely outclassed the run-

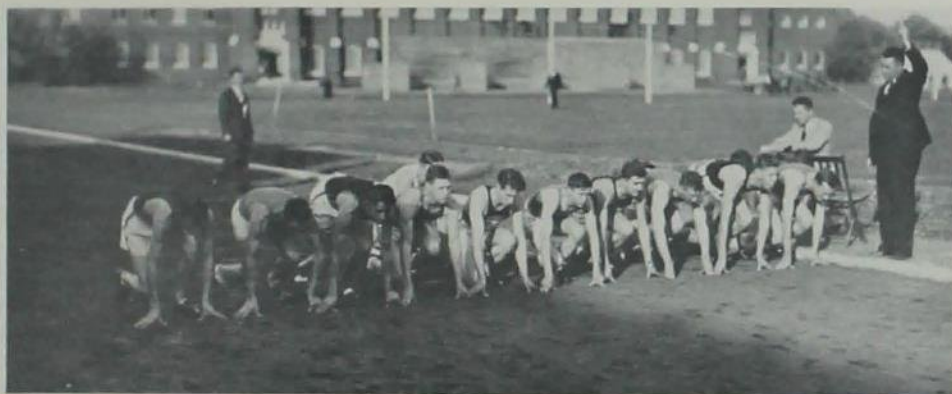

ners from Drake University and Grinnell in the annual triangular meet held at Des Moines. The final standing was Iowa State 68½, Drake 46½, Grinnell 15. Five meet records fell at this meet, three of them being broken by Iowa State men. Putnam broke the standing records in the mile and two mile events, chopping off seven seconds from both old records, the former one having stood for nine years. Clipping more than 6 seconds off the old mile relay record, the Iowa State runners, Nagel, Wessling and Labertew, established the last of the three new records made by Iowa State men at the meet.

The last day of February, the Iowa State team met Notre Dame at South Bend. Although Iowa State lost 58 to 46, our team was responsible for two

new marks, one an unofficial world's record. Hager was high point man of the meet. In winning the 60-yard low hurdles in 7.1 seconds he unofficially lowered the world's mark by one-tenth second. Captain Hager and O'Brien of Notre Dame tied for first place in the 60-yard high hurdles as Soules trailed them to the tape. The mile relay team continued its record breaking splurge and set a new track record in the time of 3:28.4. Putnam met extremely stiff competition from Gene Howery, Irish cross-country captain, and lost a close race to him in the two-mile event. The time was 9:30.3. Eichelkraut and Chapman finished second and third, respectively, in the mile run; Wells placed second in the 50-yard dash; Henderson won the 440-yard dash; Wessling placed third

in the event; and Labertew and Nagel placed second and third, respectively, in the 880-yard run. Fishleigh of Notre Dame and Chipman tied for first in the pole vault and Christy of the Cyclones and Bierman of Notre Dame tied for third. Soultz, Mensing and Christy all tied with two other Notre Dame men for second place in the high jump.

The Big Six Indoor Meet at Columbia, Missouri, won by Nebraska, was featured by the performance of Captain Hager of Iowa State, who stepped over the 60-yard high sticks in the new conference record time of :07.7. Hager also took first in the 60-yard low hurdles. Putnam of Iowa State, and Dawson of Oklahoma, the two fastest distance men in the conference, divided honors in the mile and two-mile runs. Dawson led Put-

nam to the tape in the mile, while in the two-mile Putnam displayed his superior endurance and outran Dawson. Eichelkraut also beat Dawson to the tape in this race and was fourth in the mile run. The 880-yard run found Labertew finishing first for Iowa State and Nagel finishing fourth. It was a tough race for Nagel, who led the field the first half of the race only to have a runner step on the heel of one of his shoes, causing it to come off and forcing him to complete the race with one shoe.

Five men journeyed with Coach Simpson to Champaign, Illinois, for the fourteenth annual Illinois Relays held on March 14. Hager, ill for the preceding week, placed only fourth in the 75-yard high hurdles, which was taken by Sentman of Illinois. In running this race,

Sentman created a new world's record for the event. Nagel, Eichelkraut, Labertew and Putnam, however, won the only event in which they were entered—the four-mile university relay. The time was 7:54.2.

The last week of March found five Iowa State runners and Coach Simpson competing in the Texas and Rice Relays. In the University Class Four-Mile Relay event the revamped Iowa State team, consisting of Chapman, Labertew, Nagel and Putnam, took first. Chapman ran in place of Eichelkraut, who left school. Hager took second in the 120-yard high hurdles here.

The Rice Relays brought strong competition for hurdlers and Hager was forced to be content with a second in the 220-yard low hurdles event, but the four

other Cyclone cindermen trotted to easy victory in the University Two-Mile Relay. The mile run was substituted for the four-mile relay event. Putnam won this race for Iowa State in 4:28.5.

The Kansas Relays found the same five Cyclone runners, who had starred for Iowa State in the southern trip, running at Lawrence. Hager took second in the 120-yard high sticks event, which was won by Sentman at the terrific pace of 14.6 seconds. One of the greatest four-mile relays ever run was won by Illinois, who was forced to take three seconds off the existing world's record in order to defeat the Iowa State quartet. It was anyone's race up until the last 125 yards, Putnam finishing two seconds behind the Illinois runner to take second for the Cyclones in the event.

The Drake Relays were next on our schedule. Running a record-breaking medley relay, the Iowa State quartet of Nagel, Henderson, Labertew and Putnam, beat the crack Washington State crew out of first place. Running the fastest time of his track career in the 120-yard high hurdles, in the first event on Saturday, Captain Hager upset the dope and led Sentman, who had beaten him several times previously during the season, to the tape in 0:14.7 to break his own mentor's 14-year-old record by one-tenth of a second. Repeating their performance at the Kansas Relays, the Illinois four-mile quartet again nosed out the Iowa State team at Drake. Tossing the javelin 180.5 feet for a third place in that event, Ripper was the only other Iowa State man to place.

The annual Missouri-Iowa State dual meet held at Columbia on May 1 resulted in an 83 to 47 victory for the Cyclones. Putnam's fastest and record-breaking mile was the feature of the meet. Iowa State's easy win was evinced by the fact that the Cyclones took nine firsts to their opponents' five. Wells was first in the 100-yard dash and second in the 220-yard dash. Putnam was first in the mile run; Hager led the finishes of both high and low hurdle events; Bob Smith took first in both the shot-put and discus throw. Heddens finished first in the high jump and Ripper cleaned up in the last of the field events, the javelin throw. Labertew and Nagel, running for the Cyclones in the half-mile run, took first and second, respectively.

A week after the Tiger annihilation,

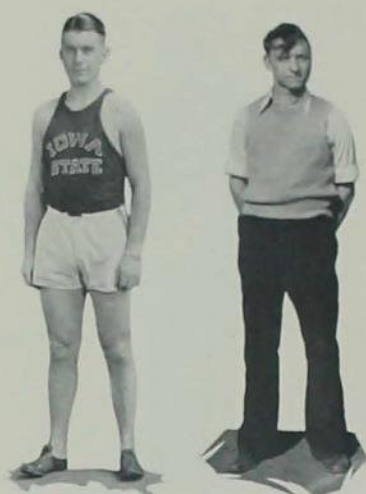
Iowa State came from behind in the last event of the day in her clash with Nebraska and prevented the Cornhuskers from taking home the victory by tying the meet  $65\frac{1}{2}$  all. The Cornhuskers were five points ahead when the last event, the mile relay, was called. Henderson, Wessling, Nagel and Labertew cut 4.6 seconds from the old record to win in 3 minutes and 23 seconds and tie the meet. Eleven meet records were broken in the 15 events, thus well demonstrating the caliber of the two teams. Coach Simpson's men were strongest in the distance runs, while the Huskers excelled in the dashes and weight events, and scored a slam in the broad jump.

Captain Hager, in his last home appearance for Iowa State, set two new hurdle records, cutting 2.3 seconds from

the 16-year-old low hurdle record of 24.6 seconds set by Packer of Iowa State. In the high hurdles he cut .9 second off the existing record. Heddens of Iowa State added a half inch to the high jump mark made by Myers of Nebraska in 1914, going to 5 feet,  $10\frac{1}{2}$  inches.

May 16 the Bulldogs came to State Field and surprised Iowa State by winning 67 to 63. The result, however, was no discredit to the Cyclone team, for its best dashman, Wells, was absent, being on a baseball trip. Besides this, five former Drake-Iowa State records were broken during the course of the meet. The Cyclones scored slams in the two-mile, broad jump and javelin. The Drake mile relay team pulled the meet out of the fire in the last event, when they set a new meet record of 3 minutes and 25

seconds to nose out the Iowa State quartet. The time clipped nearly six seconds from the old record made by Drake in 1930.

On Friday and Saturday of the following week-end Coach Simpson took his track students to Lincoln for the annual Big Six track and field meet. Only Kansas, who finally took the meet, was able to best the Cyclones in the track events. Final count granted the Cyclones third honors, with Nebraska second. Of special note was the 14.5 seconds spurt made by Captain Hager in the 120-yard high sticks event on Saturday, in which he tied his own conference record. Laber-tew's 1 minute 49.6 seconds 880-yard

run was another outstanding feature of the meet. Fighting it out to the last few yards, as usual, Dawson of Oklahoma defeated Putnam in the two-mile event by a small margin and was forced to set a new meet record of 4 minutes 22 seconds for the mile in order to finish first.

The last week of May, Iowa State competed in the Drake bowl at the state meet. For the ninth consecutive time Iowa University took the meet, coming through in the last three events to nose the Cyclones 57 to 50, Drake trailing with 39.

The final meet of the season was the National Collegiate Athletic Association track and field meet held at Stagg Field, Chicago. Out of the eighty colleges entered in the meet, Iowa State finished in a tie for eighth place with Miami University with 16 points apiece. Putnam's sensational running gave him first place in a field of the country's best milers, which included his old arch-enemy, Dawson of Oklahoma. This was conceded to be the most thrilling of all the races in the meet finals. Nipping Hill of Oregon at the tape to get the decision by inches, Putnam ran the distance in 4 minutes and 18 seconds on a soft track. Hager's third in the 120-yard high hurdles with sickness staring him in the face scored the remaining points for the Cyclones. Iowa State's 1931 track success found a fitting climax for itself at this meet, for within its engagements it had made a record which had not been attained since track became an established sport at the Cyclone institution.

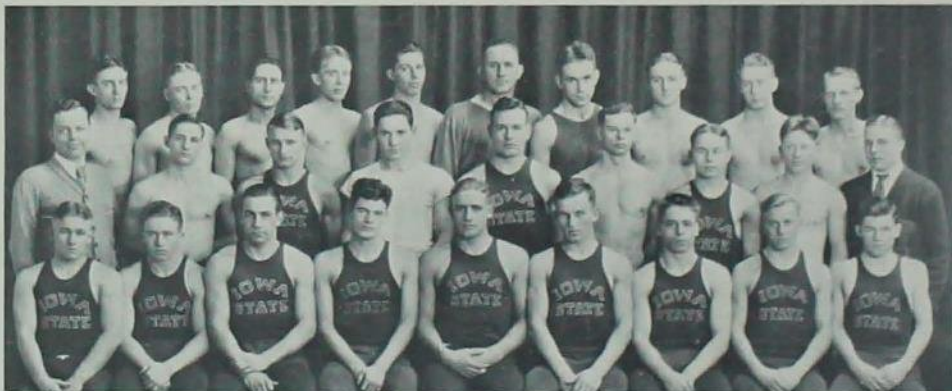

## Varsity Wrestling

At the close of the 1932 wrestling season we again find the Cyclones one of the outstanding wrestling teams of the country. Starting the season with four lettermen, Coach Otopalik again built up a formidable outfit that tied for second in the conference, won first in the state meet, placed third in the National Intercollegiate Meet, and produced three Mid-West A. A. U. champions and one National Intercollegiate champion.

Bob Hess, wrestling in the 174-pound class, brought that national title to Iowa State. In winning this title, Hess threw Cosneck, Illinois University Big Ten champion; tossed Basham, Oklahoma University Big Six champion, and undefeated in five years of high school and college wrestling; won decisions from Sintic, Ohio University, champion of the Ohio Conference; and in the finals defeated McGuirk of Oklahoma Aggies, the defending champion. Bob made a great record this season, piling up six falls in dual meets, three of which were in the unlimited class, where he was outweighed all the way from 25 to 100 pounds. His only loss was to Mehringer, Kansas Aggie heavyweight, in an overtime match. Hess was outweighed 36 pounds, but had his opponent in danger in the early part of the match, only to tire late in the match to lose a decision to his much heavier opponent. Bob is eligible to compete in the Olympic trials, and supporters at Iowa State are sure he will continue his success there. At the close of the season Hess was elected honorary captain for the year.

George Martin, in his second year, also compiled an enviable record, going through the dual season without a defeat, winning the Mid-West A. A. U. crown in the 158-pound class, the state title in the 165-pound class, the Big Six 165-pound class title, and losing in the finals of the National Intercollegiate Meet to

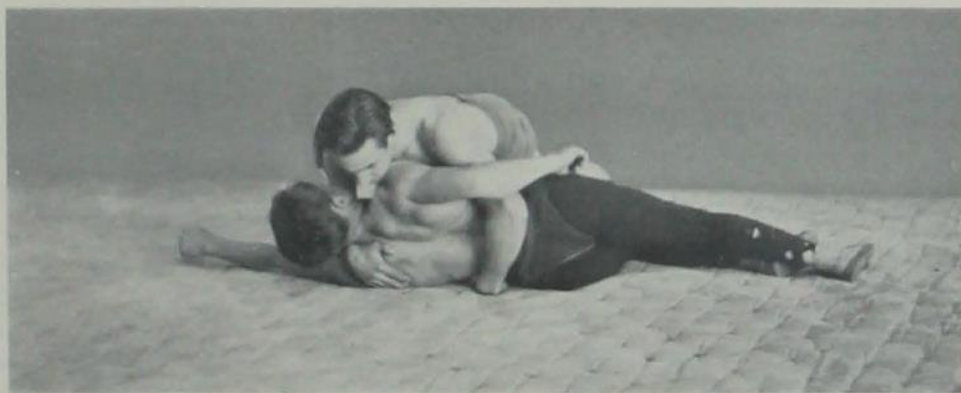

the great Michigan captain, Dugovinto. George will also go to the Olympic tryouts, where much is expected of him.

Another outstanding man on the Cyclone squad was Roland Lillie, sensational sophomore 118-pounder. Lillie ran up a record of seven straight falls in dual meets, winning the Big Six title, then rode through his class in the Mid-West A. A. U. Meet to take the title, won the state title with falls in all of his matches, but was finally decided in the quarter-finals of the National Intercollegiate Meet by Stout of Southwestern State Teachers in the biggest upset of the meet. Lillie gave advance notice of his prowess early in the season when he replaced Gibson, veteran 118-pounder and Big Six champion.

The fourth champion on the Cyclone squad is Golden, another sophomore. Golden wrestled

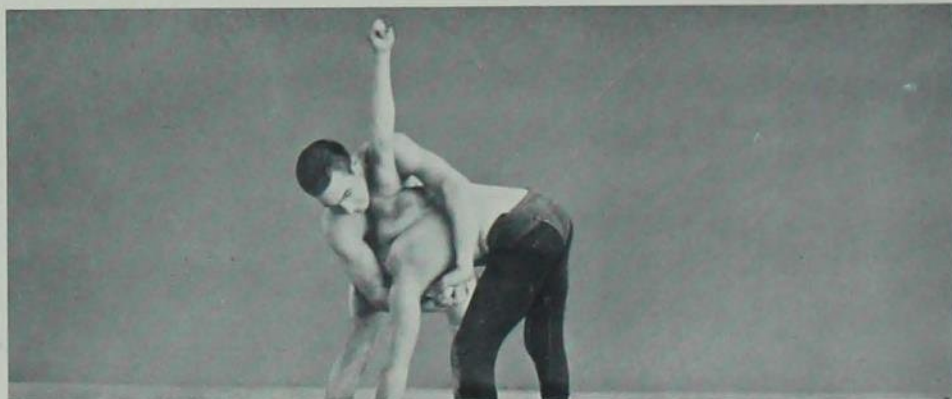
in only one dual, winning that by a fall. He then entered the Mid-West A. A. U. tourney, where he took the title in the 126-pound class. A week later he added the state title to his list by winning all his matches by falls. Much is expected from Golden next year.

The veteran, Walter Thomas, lost only to Harman of State Teachers and Aloyle of Kansas State during the season and was thereby awarded the conference 135-pound crown. In those three matches he wrestled out of his weight in the 145-pound class and so remains undefeated in the lower weight.

Otopalik's sixth champion is Frevort, 155-pound sophomore, who won the state title in that weight. Frevort lost only one match throughout the season, that one being the second match of his college career. Frevort was

awarded a medal by Coach Otopalik for showing the most improvement during the season.

Iowa State's first dual meet was with Iowa State Teachers, which the Cyclones won easily 28 to 6. In this match the veteran Dory Williams threw Sherman in 5:40, with Lillie, Martin, Hess and Mechem also winning by falls. Hess' victim was Luker, Mid-West A. A. U. champion. State Teachers scored points on Harman, A. A. U. champion, over Thomas, and Brindley's victory over Erickson, a new man. The feature bout was between Mechem and Gerber. Mechem, although outweighed 30 pounds, finally pinned his opponent's shoulders in 7:30. The advantage changed frequently in this match. This was one of the few duals in which Mechem wrestled, as the Big Six authorities threw out the 175-pound class this year,

which pushed Hess into the heavyweight class for conference duals.

The following week the grapplers journeyed to Manhattan, where the defending champions scored an upset to defeat the Cyclones 16 to 13. The upset of the evening occurred when Burbank of the Aggies threw Doris Williams with but 30 seconds of the match to go after Williams had piled up a big time advantage over his opponent. This defeat cost the Cyclones a tie for first place as Oklahoma University later defeated the Aggies, and, as the Cyclones did not meet the Sooners, their record was kept clean. However, in the national meet, the Cyclones showed their superiority over this year's conference champions.

The next match found Missouri an easy victim. The score was 30 to 3. In this match the

Cyclones scored falls in all matches except the 145-pound class, where Sappington, Big Six champion, decisioned Perry of Iowa State. Martin threw his opponent in 1:47, while in a split bout Martin threw his man twice in four minutes.

Cornell proved to be tougher, but was subdued 26 to 6. The Morford brothers scored decisions for the losers, over Williams and Perry.

In the Kansas match, which the Cyclones won 24½ to 4½, Hess lost his only bout of the year. During the first five minutes he looked like a sure winner, but his lead at the end of 10 minutes was not sufficient for a decision and in the overtime period Hess succumbed to the superior weight and strength of his opponent.

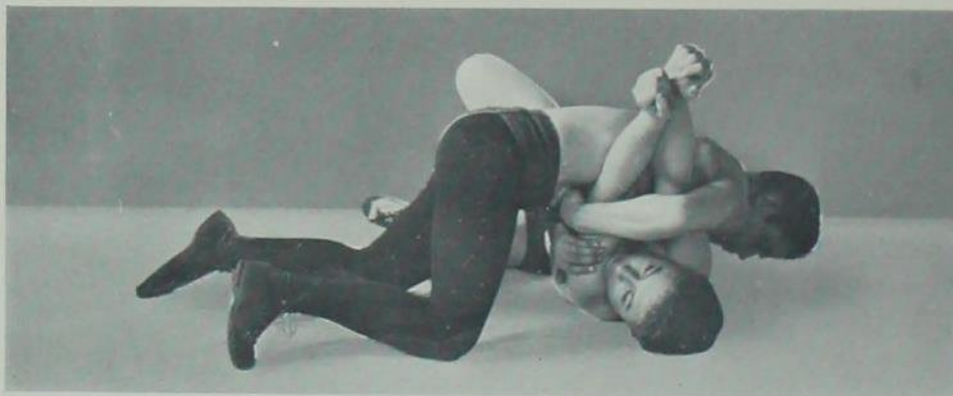
In a return match with the State Teachers the Cyclones again were victors 21 to 13. An unexpected fall on Williams and the use of a substitute 135-pounder, Fromm, resulted in the losers' additional points.

In the final dual of the year the Nebraska Cornhuskers fell before Otopalik's toe-twisters 24 to 3. Nebraska's only victory was Shirley's time decision over Perry. The fastest match of the evening was the final between Hess and Hulbert, Nebraska football star. It was a furious battle while it lasted—the giant Nebraskan towering over the Cyclone. Suddenly Hess slammed Hulbert to the mat with a hip roll and the surprised Cornhusker was unable to escape from the fall, which came in 2:43.

March 18 and 19, a state wrestling tournament was held, sponsored by the Ames Ameri-

can Legion. Teams from Cornell, State Teachers, University of Iowa and Iowa State were entered. Iowa State scored 31 points to 12 for Iowa University, who placed second. Cornell was third with 11, and State Teachers scored 10. Lillie, Golden, Frevort, Martin and Hess won their weights, while Thomas and Mechem were runners-up. Mechem, after throwing Gerber twice in duals this season, lost an overtime decision in the finals to him.

This section should not be closed without mentioning the high honor given to Hugo Otopalik, who has made wrestling what it is at Iowa State. Otopalik was named head coach of the United States Olympic wrestling team. The student body of Iowa State extends its best wishes to "Oto", with the feeling that his team will place higher than the team of 1928.

## 1931 Baseball

At the start of the season Coach Menze was faced by a shortage of lettermen, only six veterans returning. Promising reserve material and several good sophomores brightened prospects at this time. Due to a shortage of good catchers, Coach Menze was forced to place Al Heitman in the backstop position. This meant that another steady pitcher had to be uncovered as Heitman was one of the most effective hurlers last year.

Only two veteran hurlers returned, Gustafson and Thrift. They were supported by Harder, Coons and Loufek. The latter was a valuable man at any time, for his hitting power gained him a position in the outfield when he was not feeding fast ones to opposing batters. The veterans, Wells and Wilcox, completed the outfield. Rieke also saw service in the outer gardens. Shea, a new man, was at first, Capt. Huntbatch at the keystone sack, the versatile Bowen at shortstop, and Johnson completed the infield at the hot corner.

The conference season was rather abbreviated due to several postponed games. Oklahoma finished in first place, with Iowa State in fifth position. The Cyclones defeated Nebraska twice, lost two to Oklahoma and Kansas U. and one to Missouri. Outside the conference Central was defeated, while Luther and Baker U. turned in triumphs over Iowa State.

A two-game series with Luther opened the season. Iowa State used three pitchers, Gustafson, Harder and Coons, but lost 12 to 6 in the opener. In the second inning Huntbatch slashed a single to left, Heitman was given a base on balls, Rieke was safe on an error at second and the bases were full. Loufek walloped the ball into deep center for two bases, scoring three men ahead of him. In the seventh Rieke sailed the ball into deep right cen-

ter for three bases and scored on Johnson's out. In the eighth an error, hit batter, followed by Huntbatch's long single, scored the final two runs.

On the following day Asse pulled the iron man stunt and again faced the Cyclone batters. This time he was even more effective, allowing only two hits and striking out 14 men. The final score was 15 to 0. The hard hitting Norsemen were too much for Thrift and Loufek, who allowed 11 hits and 10 bases on balls. Maddiek and Johnson were the only ones to garner safe hits for the Cyclones. Tagstad, with a homer and two singles, led the Luther attack.

After Nebraska, Missouri invaded State Field, May 8. The Cyclones had the game won and then lost it. Leading 7 to 6 and with two men out and a runner on first in the ninth, Thrift permitted Fruit to walk and then fed

one to Emboj that he liked, the ball coming to a halt against the east stadium, permitting two runs to score while the batter raced to third.

Iowa State's big inning was in the fourth, when four runs were scored on two errors, a walk and hits by Wells and Johnson. Coons struck out six Missourians, Thrift three, and Wagner whiffed eight Cyclones.

Nebraska played host to the Cyclones on May 1 and second to open our conference season. The wearers of the Cardinal and Gold celebrated the event by trouncing the Cornhuskers 12 to 5 and 4 to 0. In the first game Coach Menze's heavy artillery unleashed a barrage of 15 hits on the usually effective Armatas. The Cyclones enjoyed a big fourth inning, scoring six runs. Rieke opened the inning with a tremendous wallop that went for three bases; Wilcox, not to be outdone, did likewise; Culver was safe on an error, as was Johnson. Shea then drove out a single, to be followed by a similar hit by Bowen. This set the stage for Huntbatch's triple, which scored two more runs.

Loufek and Thrift pitched for the winners. Shea, with two doubles and two singles, led the Cyclone attack. Wilcox also had his batting eye, lashing out two triples.

The next day Coons was in fine form, allowing the Nebraskans but five hits. Iowa State won the game in the third by scoring three runs. Johnson worked Wondra for a walk to open the inning. Shea followed with a three base knock to deep right field. Bowen was safe on a fielder's choice and Huntbatch scored Shea with a single. Bowen scored on Loufek's sacrifice. Shea again led the Cyclone attack.

A non-conference game was the next on the schedule, the Cyclones meeting Baker U. at Baldwin, Okla. In a hard fought game, Baker came out on the long end of an 8 to 7 score. A rally in the sixth inning brought Iowa State within one run of tying the game up. Shea was safe on a bobble by the second baseman, Bowen, Huntbatch and Loufek all singled in order. Then Rieke picked out a pitch that looked good and parked the ball in the tall grass beyond center fielder, clearing the bases.

The Cyclones had three men on in the eighth, but scored only one run when Heitman followed Loufek's double with a single. Loufek, with three hits in four trips to the plate, led the batters. Coons and Thrift did a nice job of hurling, while Rolfeourt and Wilkinson pitched for the victors. The latter won his own game with a home run in the eighth.

The next two days the Cyclones were the guests of Oklahoma U. Not being very hospitable, they spilled their guests twice, 12 to 5 and 3 to 2. In the first game Gustafson's wildness kept him in trouble all of the way. "Gus" walked seven men. The Cyclone attack did not function until the ninth, when they scored four runs. Loufek walked to open the inning, Wells, Heitman and Gustafson singled and Shea came through with a triple to deep center to finish the Cyclone scoring for the day. Wells, with three hits, featured the Iowa State play, while May and Mills produced circuit clouts to lead the Sooners to victory.

A great pitchers' battle between Cannon and Loufek featured the second game. Shea, the

second man to face Cannon, dug in his cleats, swung on a fast one and lifted it outside the playing field to put his team in the lead. The Cyclones clung to their slender lead until the seventh, when Mills followed a base on balls with a home run to score two runs. The Cyclones tied the score in the eighth on two errors and two infield outs. Then in the ninth the Sooners filled the bases on two singles and a walk. In this pinch Loufek faltered and walked May to force in the winning run. In spite of eight hits and nine walks, the Sooners' score was held down by fast fielding on the part of the Cyclone infield.

After losing three games the Cyclones came back to the home diamond to defeat the fast Central College nine 5 to 4. Loufek and Neifert shouldered the pitching burden for the two teams. Neifert struck out eight, walked three and allowed eight hits, while Loufek struck out two, walked one and allowed seven hits. Central did most of their scoring in the first inning and added one more in the eighth.

The Cyclones went into the ninth inning three runs behind and things looked very dark with two men down and Johnson on first. Shea walked and Bowen followed with a slashing triple to the stadium to score two runs. He scored a minute later when Neifert messed up Huntbatch's easy roller. Gibby immediately stole second and brought in the winning run when the Central right fielder failed to hold Loufek's high fly.

Later in the week Kansas University came to Ames for two games and went home victorious in two hard fought battles, the scores being 8 to 6 and 5 to 2. In the first game Kansas had one big inning featured by home runs by Smith and Cooley, which put the game on ice. Smith's home run was a tremendous wallop carrying out onto the cinder track in the stadium. Iowa State never seriously threatened, although they were never out of striking distance. In the first inning Shea doubled and scored on Loufek's single. Farther scoring activities were cut short when Rieke was caught at second by a quick throw from center field

while attempting to stretch his hit into a double. In the eighth a rally fell two runs short. Rieke singled, was advanced to third by Bowen's hit and scored on Wells' fielder's choice. Heitman then singled and Wells went to third on Gustafson's fielder's choice. Johnson brought Wells in with the final run on his single to left.

The second game was featured by a triple play executed by Kansas. In the seventh inning Shea and Bowen walked. Huntbatch then hit a liner past second that looked like a hit. Ross, Kansas second baseman, made a spectacular leaping catch of the hit, threw to second base and doubled Shea; the shortstop then relayed the ball to first base before Bowen could get back and the side was retired. Coons and Gustafson handled the pitching assignment for the Cyclones and Kraemer hurled for the winners. Eighteen bases on balls were issued during the game. Iowa State's failure to hit in the pinches cost them the game, as five Cyclones were stranded on third base during the game. Bowen gathered two hits, while Hooibald with a home run led the Kansas assault.

The 1932 swimming season at Iowa State College proved to be another winner for the Cyclone tankmen, coached by Jake Daubert and led by Captain William Weld. Besides winning the Big Six championship for the third time in the past four years, Coach Daubert's men were the victors in all of their three dual meets.

Although no medals were given by the Big Six Conference for record breaking performances in swimming this year, Iowa State swimmers hold the following conference records: 220-yard free style, held by Fraser; 440-yard free style, held by Fraser; 200-yard breast stroke, held by Sands; 320-yard relay race, held by the Iowa State relay team.

On February 8, 1932, our closest swimming competitors and oldest tank rivals, the Cornhuskers, came to Ames from Lincoln to receive a 49 to 35 trouncing in the first meet of the year. Iowa State led in scoring all through the meet. It was at this meet that two pool records

of long standing were broken. The 300-yard medley race record was broken by the fast trio of Weld, Sands and Petsch in the time of 3:26.5—6.2 seconds faster than it had ever been swum before in the State Gym tank. Sands continued his fast pace that day and broke the old pool record in the 200-yard breast stroke race, turning in the new time of 2:45.9.

The following week the Cyclone paddlers invaded the Creighton camp at Omaha and emerged from the fray with the long end of a decisive 63 to 21 victory.

February 27 found Coach Daubert and his men arrayed against the Pioneers at Grinnell. This meet, the last of the dual clashes, resulted in another one-sided victory for Iowa State, the Cyclones having scored 50 points to their opponents' 33.

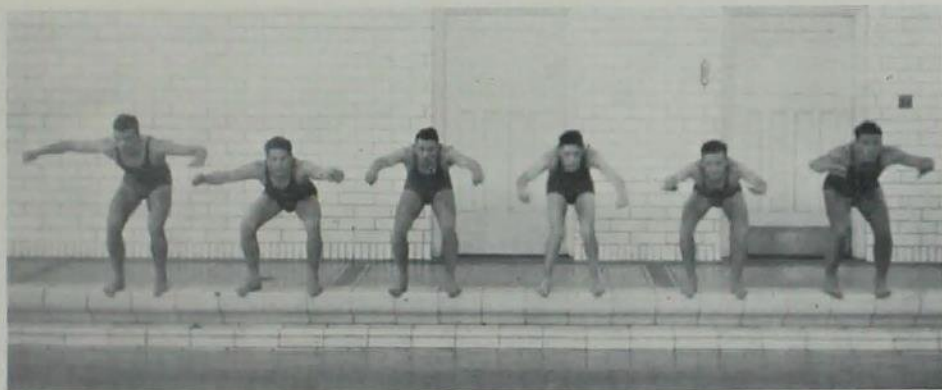
The Big Six Conference Swimming Meet, held March 5 at the new Nebraska field house pool, proved the fact that the Cyclones were by far the classiest group of swimmers in the conference, they taking the meet 11 points ahead of their closest opposition, the Nebraska Cornhuskers, and 25 points ahead of Oklahoma, third place winners. Kansas U. was fourth with a total of 7 points. Kansas Aggies and Missouri University were unable to score in the meet.

Of this year's group of veterans, all but Captain-elect Thoburn Sands and Charles Lowder will be lost by gradua-

tion. All minor letter men, however, will be back with the squad next season. Besides these men, Richard Flieg, Big Six Conference and A. A. U. low board and high board champion, will be back with the squad after an absence of one year. Coach Daubert feels very optimistic concerning the 1933 season, especially since this year's freshman swimming team was such a stellar group. The preps won handily from the Washburn College varsity swimmers at Topeka, Kansas, in a telegraphic meet. The Washburn team had previously won from the Nebraska varsity 44 to 40, so from that comparison, the Cyclone prep tankmen could have defeated the Nebraska varsity had they tangled during the season.

In 1931-32, Iowa State College presented the most extensive intramural program in its history. More sports were introduced and more men took part in the contests than ever before. The interest was intense throughout the year. Harry Schmidt, assistant football coach and head of the Intramural Department, should be given credit for most of the department's recent development.

This year, more than ever, every male student in school was encouraged to take part in the athletic program. Leagues and contests were so arranged to not only attract the members of organized houses

on the campus, but also men living in the wards. For the first time, freshmen competed for honors in separate leagues from the upper classes, and the personnel of the various wards was organized, teams put on the field and ward champions determined.

Assisting Mr. Schmidt in this extensive program was a group of student managers; one senior manager, Armand Mettler, with Harold Paul as assistant manager; three junior managers, Clarence Lieb, Norval Shearer and William Lanz; and three sophomore managers, Roscoe Rector, George Steinmetz and David Maloney. In addition to these men, every organization entered in intramural activities has a manager who represents that organization in meeting with the Intramural Department officials. In these meetings, committees are appointed such as trophies and rules committees, the leagues are divided and schedules drawn up. In other words, the students practically draw up their own program for the various activities.

This year, one will find instead of one champion in each sport, three titleholders, the fraternity champions, the ward champions, and the freshman champions. Athletics in divisional class activities have also been sponsored by the Intramural Department, although not under its direct supervision. Such sports as basketball, wrestling and track were included in this group.
