


A Message from the President

RAYMOND M. HUGHES, President

RESIDENT RAYMOND M. HUGHES was graduated from Miami University at Oxford, Ohio, in 1903. After teaching science for two years in the Hamilton High School he held a teaching fellowship in chemistry at the Ohio State University for two years and studied chemistry at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology during the following year (1897-98). He then was called back to his alma mater as Professor of Chemistry and Physics in the fall of 1898, where he served successively as Professor of Chemistry and Registrar, Dean of the Liberal Arts College, and President until 1927, when he resigned to accept the Presidency at Iowa State College.

During this period he has been active in the service of the Association of American Colleges, the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the National Association of State Universities, and the American Council on Education, in each of which organizations he has at one time served as secretary.

Hygiene Department Student Health Service

Graduates of fifteen years ago would scarcely recognize the college infirmary of their day, tucked in, as it is now, behind our modern hospital. The old hospital is now used only for contazious diseases.

The first or north wing of the newer hospital built in 1915, has a capacity of forty beds and includes the kitchen and dining rooms and operating rooms. The cast wing, built in 1924, more than doubled the capacity and gives added dispensary and laboratory facilities so that now the college has ample facilities for earing for those needing hospital or ambulatory care.

The Hygiene Department is also a teaching department and gives classroom instruction in hygiene to all freshmen in Industrial Science and Home Economics.

It must not be thought, however, that the care of the sick is the only or even the most important part of the work of the Department of Hygiene. It is even more important that it prevent illness and improve the health of the students while here and give them positive knowledge of health principles and practices.

As the first step, all entering students are given a careful "once over" during the entrance physical examinations. Such as show physical defects or health impairments are followed up in further conferences, and advice and treatment are given with a view of correcting or improving their condition. The students are given another physical examination before entering their junior year and again before graduating.

Library

The College Library is designed primarily to serve the needs of the faculty and the students of Iowa State College in their research and study.

The library is the most used building on the campus, loaning on an average of three books per student per month during the college year.

The new building, opened for the use of the public in the spring of 1925, is designed to meet adequately the needs of both graduate and undergraduate students. The library affords facilities for bibliographic research in the scientific literature of the departments giving graduate instruction. The single class subject offered may be allowed as either major or minor credit in any department.

The library collections consist of about 170,000 carefully selected volumes. A special attempt has been made to strengthen the library in sets of periodicals and society publications. The library is receiving currently over 3,000 periodicals, principally in English, French and German, although nearly every language is represented. The collections in the library adequately represent the specialized research work of the college.

Extension Service

Iowa State College has become a great repository of scientific information concerning agriculture and home economics. This information has been gathered through extensive experimental and research investigations in Iowa and through access to the work of investigators in other states, including the United States Department of Agriculture. The Extension Service is conducted in order to make the workable part of this information available to the people of the state. Its purpose is to place within reach of farmer and homemaker the latest and best information concerning agriculture and home economics.

In order to accomplish this purpose a staff of workers representing each department in the Divisions of Agriculture and Home Economics and certain phases of Industrial Science and Veterinary Medicine are maintained at the college. These workers are available to the people of the state for lectures, demonstrations and consultation.

The Extension Service of Iowa State College continues to extend the benefits of its experimental and research work to the farmers of the state. Under the direction of Mr. R. K. Bliss and Mr. P. C. Taff, the Extension Service has reached nearly every township in Iowa. Information concerning livestock, clothing and poultry projects continues to lead in the number of townships reached, but the work of the entire service comprises many more projects than these three.

The work of the scientific information such as is disseminated by the Extension Service can scarcely be over-estimated. In actual dollars and cents, it saves the farmers of Iowa many times the cost of the entire service.

Division of Agriculture

The Division of Agriculture comprises the following departments: Agricultural Engineering, Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology, Animal Husbandry, including Dairy Husbandry and Poultry Husbandry, Dairying, Farm Crops and Soils, Genetics, Horticulture and Forestry, Landscape Architecture, Floriculture and Vegetable Crops, Technical Journalism, and Vocational Education.


For many years, beginning with the founding of Iowa State College, all the work of the Agricultural Division was under the supervision of two departments, which were called the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Horticulture.

Four-year collegiate courses are offered, embracing the work in all of the major lines, and research work is conducted in practically all phases of technical and practical agriculture.

The enrollment of students in the Division of Agriculture is the largest in that subject in the United States. The enrollment of graduate students in agriculture is in excess of 100. Many students from other institutions and foreign countries come to Iowa State for graduate work.

Student judging teams afford opportunity for twenty-five to thirty men to participate in Intercollegiate Judging Contests annually. The consistent winning of our teams has brought distinction to our college.

In addition to the buildings and laboratories and other extensive equipment, the various departments of the division have over 1,500 acres of land used for educational and research work.

Division of Engineering

Undergraduate instruction in the Division of Engineering is given in ten four-year courses, which have uniform requirements for entrance: Agricultural Engineering, Architectural Engineering, Ceramic Engineering, Chemical Engineering, Givil Engineering, Electrical Engineering, General Engineering, Mechanical Engineering, Mining Engineering, and Trades and Industries (Industrial Arts). Each of these courses leads to the B. S. degree.

In addition to this instruction, the Division of Engineering carries on work in Engineering Extension and Engineering Experiment Station Research. Iowa State College was the first engineering institution in the United States to systematically organize its work along these three major lines.

In each of the collegiate branches of instruction except Industrial Arts, a year of graduate work has been definitely outlined, completion of which entitles the student to a M. S. degree. In addition, two years of graduate work, leading to the Ph. D. degree, are offered in several courses. An increasingly large number of students are taking advantage of these additional years of training.

The student activities of the Engineering Division are directed by the Engineering Council. Members of the council, at the end of their sophomore year, serve two years. Each of the nine departments has two representatives, and the Iowa Engineer and the Cardinal Guild each have representatives.

Division of Home Economics

The Home Economics Division is housed in a building which competent authorities claim has no equal in the country. In addition to the main building, there are two nursery schools and four home management houses. The entire plant is in operation throughout the four quarters of the year.

Courses leading to both the bachelor of seience and the master of science degrees are offered in the following departments: Applied Art, Foods and Nutrition, Home Management, Institutional Management, Child Development, Household Equipment, Textiles and Clothing, and Home Economics Education. In addition, work leading to the Ph. D. degree is offered by the Department of Foods and Nutrition.

The courses in Home Economics aim to prepare students for intelligent citizenship, efficient homemaking, and economic independence. Graduates from these courses are securing positions as high school and college teachers, extension workers, dictitians, institution managers, nursery school directors, home service directors for utility companies, research workers in commercial laboratories, and members of editorial staffs of publishing companies.

The enrollment for the past collegiate year exceeded 1,100, about 70 of whom were in the graduate school. That of the summer session was over 500, of which two-fifths were in the graduate school. The staff of the division numbers over 80 instructors. During the entire year 243 B. S. and 51 M. S. degrees were conferred upon students of the division.

Division of Industrial Science

The Division of Industrial Science serves as an administrative unit for those departments whose work, while not in itself technical, is neeessary to a well-rounded education in any of the technical courses at Iowa State College. These departments comprise Bacteriology and Hygiene, Botany, Chemistry, Applied Economies and Social Science, Geology, Mathematics, Military Science and Tactics, Physics, Zoology, and Entomology. In addition, the work of the departments of English, History, Psychology, Modern Languages and Public Speaking is under the supervision of the Dean of Industrial Science.

In the early days of Iowa State College, when no distinction was drawn between the different divisions now existing, all of the instruction offered in the institution was given by this Industrial Science Division. When the growing need for specialization and the number of students enrolled made this administrative scheme inadequate, the four other divisions were created. When, in 1879, the Division of Veterinary Medicine was created, the Division of Industrial Science assumed the status it possesses today.

The Industrial Science Council is made up of students of the different departments, who are elected at the divisional convocation in the spring quarter. The council acts as a governing body for the Industrial Science Division and sponsors such activities as the Industrial Science Barbeeue, the Industrial Science Club and the Divisional Open House during Veishea.

Division of Veterinary Medicine

When the Veterinary Medicine course of Iowa State College was made a separate division and a Dean of Veterinary Medicine appointed in 1879, Dr. Walker, the first Dean of the division, was confronted with the impossibility of obtaining competent instructors. It became necessary for him to establish a graduate course, the chief purpose of which was to train instructors for Iowa State College.

The twenty years from 1880, when the first class in the division was graduated, to 1900 were full of advancement for the science of Veterinary Medicine. Growth has been steady and at the present time the work of the division comprises: Anatomy, Medicine, Pathology, Physiology, Surgery, and Veterinary Investigations. Each is a separate department, and, together offer the instruction which was originally administered by a single unit.

In 1884 the Veterinary Medical Society was first established. The membership is composed of all students enrolled in the division. Meetings are held in the Auditorium of the Veterinary Building twice each month and are presided over by the president, who is elected from the senior class. Various committees are appointed to consider matters of special importance. Outstanding events of the year are: the freshman mixer during the fall quarter and the faculty picnic held during the spring quarter. Faculty members aid in planning and suggesting interesting programs for meetings, but the meetings are always conducted by and for the benefit of the student members.






Rifle and Pistol Teams



Love has, in the meantime, found its way into the life of the adopted daughter and a nephew of one of "The Fools," and it is thus that the play ends—in a happy romance.









The Engineers' Minstrel Show





Facing Coach Noel Workman at the beginning of the 1930 season were two big obstacles; one was a long, difficult schedule, without doubt the stiffest in Cyclone grid-history, and the other was a jinx of undeserved defeats from the previous year which threatened to continue unless nipped in the bud by winning over the powerful Illini in the opening contest.

The 1930 record found this same cruel fate of defeat clinging unrelentingly to Iowa State grid teams, but also left in its wake some of the most thrilling contests the Cardinal and Gold have ever engaged in. Though the Cyclones went down to defeat on nine consecutive occasions, it can truly be said, without showering the team with any undeserved credit, that they lost gloriously, and were the source of fully as many thrilling plays as any of their opponents.

At the end of the 1930 season, Coach Workman submitted his resignation to the Athletic Council. It was with deep regret that Coach Workman's associates learned of his leaving, for in the five years he has been connected with Iowa State, he won the respect and friendship of the entire school and city. Not once during the discouraging run of defeats did the student body attempt to throw the blame on Coach Workman's shoulders. On the contrary, Big Six

critics declared the Cyclone mentor to be one of the brainiest in the conference.

Iowa State opened her 1930 season at Champaign, where they did battle with the heavy Illinois eleven, and after four quarters of exceptionally close playing. dropped the contest 7 to 0. Coach Workman had but two weeks in which to shape a team to face the more thoroughly drilled Zuppke men; however, when the two teams lined up against each other in the Illinois stadium, they battled on the evenest of terms from

start to finish. One error on the part of an Iowa State back, who fumbled on his own 24 yard line, allowing an opposing lineman to recover, gave the Big Ten team the impetus for the only score of the game. The work of Gordon Nagel at center, and Roger Bowen as a kicker assured Coach Workman of a dependable lineman, and excellent punter for the remainder of the season.

A week later the conference season got under way for the Cyclones, when Nebraska University, conference champions a year ago, invaded State Field, and carried away a 14 to 12 victory. The first half of this contest caused Cyclone fans no little disappointment and worry, for the Cornhusker "powerhouse" offense pushed over two touchdowns. The first came after an Iowa State kick was blocked near its own goal, from where Nebraska pushed over the few remaining yards, and the other came after a long drive, with Red Young scintillating, down to the north goal. However, the second half was a reversal, with Iowa State holding the upperhand throughout. The insertion of Dick Grefe, blond sophomore back, proved the spark that sent the Iowa State eleven on its way to scoring. Following a series of brilliant gains by Grefe, the Cyclones uncorked a baffling passing attack that left the Nebraska team in a daze. Twice they pushed over touchdowns, only to miss the added point. With the time fast nearing an end, Coach Workman's men started a third drive which had rapidly progressed to the Nebraska 20 yard line when the gun ended the game.

In spite of their sensational second half comeback in the Nebraska game, the Iowa State team failed to click properly in the crucial moments of their first away from home conference game against Kansas University, and lost by a 20 to 6 score. The fourth quarter aerial attack of the

beefy Kansas team proved the undoing of the Cyclones. When the final period was well underway, the score was 7 to 6, with victory in anybody's grasp. The Jayhawks changed their driving game to one in the air, and with but five minutes to play, scored two more touchdowns by the aerial route. The Cyclones' score came as a result of a 59 yard sprint by Dick Grefe, who caught a Kansas punt in midfield, and ran behind splendid interference to the one yard line, where he was forced out of bounds. Tegland smashed over from this point. On another occasion, Trauger and Wells, the respective elusive and speedy Cyclone backs, carried the ball on successive plays from their own 38 yard line to the Kansas 9 yard line. However, the 200 pound Jayhawk line tightened at this point, and took the ball on downs.

The Homecoming game was next in line, and this battle with Oklahoma University, resulting in a last minute defeat for Iowa State by a 19 to 13 score, was one of the highlights of the season. With the score tied at 13 all, and 57 seconds left to play, Oklahoma possessed the ball, and wildly opened a passing attack. One long heave found the arms of a waiting substitute, who scampered for a touchdown to add glory to his name and team. The Cyclones drew first blood in the initial period. Dick Grefe broke away in mid-field on one of his specialty runs, and dashed forty yards before the giant Sooner tackle, Captain Fields, ran him down from behind. From here a pass to Swoboda was completed for a score. The Sooners quickly retaliated, with a long drive down the field, Bus Mills and the speedy Warren playing the chief roles. resulting in a score and extra point to tie affairs. Iowa State was not to be outdone, however, and pierced the Sooner line and pass defense regularly until another pass to Johnny Moen scored again. The half thus ended 13 to 13.



The following week proved to be the lowest point in the Iowa State schedule. Facing only a mediocre Missouri University team at Columbia, the Cyclones launched their attack with effectiveness only once during the game, and allowed the Tiger team to win 14 to 0 in the latter's first conference victory. Early in the fourth quarter Iowa State made its only threat when Tegland carried the ball 26 yards and 14 yards successively, placing the ball on Missouri's 12 yard line. Here a pass, Wilcox to Farrell, dropped over the goal line, automatically ending a chance to score. The Missouri touchdown came in the closing minutes of the first half, when a Tiger back intercepted an Iowa State pass on their own 45 yard line, Van Dyne straightway passed to Collings, who sprinted 25 yards to the Iowa State goal. Again in the middle of the third period Heitz of Missouri passed to Van Dyne for a second Tiger score.

The next week found three Iowa State regular backfield men on the sidelines with injures, the veterans Trauger, Tegland, and Wells being on the bench. This fact, coupled with the splendid playing of an inspired Kansas Aggie team led by Auker, resulted in a 12 to 0 victory for Coach Bo McMillen's men. The Kansas Aggies started the game in whirlwind style, and scored twice in the first period, with Auker, versatile Kansas backfield star, leading the attack, Early in the game the Kansas Aggies launched their first scoring attack. Taking the ball on their own 15 yard line, Schartz and Auker made it first and ten on their own 25 yard line. On the next play Nigro stepped back and tossed a long pass to Auker, who ran the remaining 25 yards for a touchdown. A few minutes later the Kansas Aggies gained possession of the ball on the Iowa State 25 yard line following a poor punt, and after bucking the line twice to no avail, completely fooled the Cyclone backs on a pass, Auker

to Fisher, which was good for the final score of the game. After this scoring melee on the part of the Kansas Aggies, neither team succeeded in making a dangerous threat.


On November 22, the traditional battle against Drake University took place, and it far outshone most of the previous encounters between the two schools in thrills, and history-making plays. Drake won the game 20 to 19, their final touchdown being made 27 seconds before the game ended. Without doubt this was the most heart-breaking defeat the Cyclones were forced to accept in the 1930 season. A superb line stopped every Drake charge before it ever got under way, and in addition opened mammoth holes in the Bulldog forward wall through which the Iowa State ball carriers galloped ten, fifteen. and twenty-five yards almost at will. Iowa State gained 283 yards from scrimmage as compared with 82 yards gained by Drake by this fundamental method. The Cyclone eleven played as an inspired team in every department of the game save one, the pass defense; and this glaring failure cost them a well earned victory as it had in previous games. The total summary of Drake's part in the game was the completion of three well timed passes, all resulting in touchdowns, one early in the first quarter, another in the second quarter, and the third just before the final whistle blew. Lynn King, the Bulldog ace, performed brilliantly on the receiving end of two of the three passes. Every Cyclone score came as a consequence of brilliant, smashing drives down the field, Ivan Impson, sophomore fullback, crashing through the Drake line for large gains on nearly every play in a spectacular performance. Inability to kick goal on two out of three occasions cheated Iowa State out of even a tie. Following the Drake game, Iowa State as-

sumed the role of ramblers, and invaded the Sunny South for two games, the first being against Loyola at New Orleans, and one a week




later with Rice Institute. Here again, as was the case all season, a poor pass defense spelled defeat, after the Cyclones had outplayed their fellow men in the line. Loyola triumphed 14 to 7, while Rice gained a 13 to 7 victory. At New Orleans Iowa State gained at will in midfield, gaining 12 first downs to Loyola's eight, but lacked the final drive near the goal. The Cyclones scored first, rambling straight down the field in the first quarter to the four yard line, where Bowes carried the ball over on a sweeping end run. Loyola soon evened things up when they scored on a long pass. Late in the third quarter Wilcox's punt was blocked, Loyola recovering on the one yard line. This led to the winning score, for neither team made another serious scoring threat.



In the last nine games of the season, including nonconference games, he averaged eleven points a game. No doubt Jack is one of the country's leading players.

Hawk, handicapped by injuries, received honorable mention as guard and Thomson ranked tenth among scorers of the circuit.

The play this season was extremely close. This is shown by the fact that every team lost at least three games. Scribes refused to select pre-game winners. Iowa State suffers least from graduation, and with all five regulars back next season, the team is expected to make basketball history.





The 1930 fall track season saw a new athletic event, namely the two mile run, take the place of the regular cross-country team event. A six man team running individually composes the team. Eight laps around the quarter mile track, run between halves of the respective conference grid games, completes the race.

The high hopes for a winning distance team for Iowa State were not frustrated at any time during the fall season, and the final meet found the Cyclone runners in possession of the first Big Six championship of the two mile team event. The two returning veterans, Captain Ray Putnam and Walter Thompson, supported by the two outstanding numeral men of a year ago, Earl Labertew and Art Eichelkraut, made up a quartette which copped the first three or four places in the majority of the meets. The remaining varsity men, Nagel, McClarnon, and Chapman, also aided substantially in bringing Big Six honors to Iowa State.

The first meet of the season, held between halves of the Nebraska-Iowa State grid game, resulted in a 36 to 19 victory for Coach Bob Simpson's men. Captain Putnam came in far in the lead in the rather slow time of 9:48. Thompson of Iowa State finished second and Neurnberger of Nebraska third. A week later

the team journeyed to Lawrence, where they defeated the Jayhawk runners 32 to 23. Three Iowa State men led the field to the tape, Putnam winning the event, and Labertew and Eiehelkraut placing second and third, respectively. McClarnon placed seventh and Nagel tenth in the same race. Putnam's winning time was 9:45.3.

Another trip was on schedule for November 1, when the sextette of Cyclones took Oklahoma University into camp by a 31 to 24 score. This race again brought together Captain Ray Putnam and Captain Dawson of the Sooners, the latter having won the Big Six conference race a year ago after Putnam had led the pack of runners over all but the last 100 yards of the course. This time, however, Putnam easily outclassed his old rival, beating him to the

tape in the excellent time of 9:32. Labertew and Eichelkraut placed third and fourth, respectively.

The Missouri dual at Columbia saw a new team record and also a new Iowa State record shattered, when Ray Putnam covered the two mile course in the remarkable time of 9:22.5. Labertew finished second, Schwartz of Missouri third, Eichelkraut fourth, Nagel fifth, and Chapman sixth, to give Iowa State a 37 to 18 win over the Tigers.

The final dual meet of the season was held between halves of the last home grid game against the Kansas Aggies. Putnam, Labertew, and Eichelkraut again finished first, second, and third, with Nagel running sixth and Chapman eighth. The winning time was 9:52, the slowest time of the year.

The 1930 track season left in its wake a sensational list of records established by Iowa State track men unequalled in recent years. Hubert Meier, the Cyclone sprint king, established a world's indoor record of 6.2 seconds in the 60 yard dash, and later in the spring equalled the best time ever made by man in the hundred yard dash, when he raced the distance in 9.4 seconds.

In addition to Meier's world's record performance in the Big Six outdoor meet, two other Iowa State men shattered existing conference records. Bob Hager, Cyclone hurdler, led all competitors to the tap in the 120-yard high hurdles to set a Big Six record of 14.6 seconds, while only a few minutes later Ray Putnam, Iowa State's crack distance man, broke the standing mark in the two mile run, to establish a new one of 9 minutes 30.2 seconds.

Climaxing the season came the announcement that three Iowa State men had been selected by the National Track and Field Committee for places on the special collegiate honor roll in their particular events. The men receiving this distinguished recognition in the athletic world were Meier, cited in the 100 and 200 yard dashes, Ray Putnam in the mile and two mile runs, and Robert Hager in the 120 yard high hurdles. This is the first time

any Iowa State man has ever been selected for this award.

A resume of the season, though not as brilliant as certain individual performances, shows Iowa State high up in conference standing. Victories were registered in the triangular meet with Drake University and Grinnell College, over Missouri University, and over Drake University. The Big Six Indoor Meet found Iowa State in second place, and the outdoor affair netted them a third. Also, high honors were won in the Kansas City Athletic Club Games, and in the Illinois and Kansas Relays. The only dual meet defeat came at the hands of Nebraska in an indoor contest at Lincoln.


clone runners completely outclassed the runners from Drake University and Grinnell in the annual meet held at Des Moines. The final standing was Iowa

State 77, Grinnell 31, and Drake 22. Eight firsts were chalked up by Iowa State men, including shut-out victories in the high jump and broad jump.

The only defeat of the season handed Coach Simpson's men came the following week at Lincoln, Nebraska, where the Corn-

huskers won a dual contest beteen the two schools 68 to 36. Meier won the 60 yard sprint, Wells placing third. Putnam took individual honors by winning the mile and two mile runs, and placing second in the half mile event. M. R. Soults tied with Ossian of Nebraska for a new pole vault mark of 12 feet 6 inches. Hager won first in the high hurdles, and M. R. Soults tied for first in the high jump.

The Big Six Indoor Meet at Columbia, Missouri, was featured by the performance of Hubert Meier of Iowa State, in establishing a new world's record in the 60 yard dash of 6.1 seconds. In completing this sensational race Meier sustained an ankle injury which kept him out of active competition until late in the spring. In a little contest of their own, Putnam, of Iowa State, and Dawson, of Oklahoma, broke even, each winning one of the two distance events in which they were entered. Dawson led Putnam to the tape

in the mile run in the time of 4:27.6, but just a few minutes later Putnam won the two mile race in 9:48.9. Bob Hager took first and second in the 60 yard lows and 60 yard highs, respectively. Maurice W. Soults placed second in the pole vault to Os-

The final indoor competition of the year was the Illinois Re-

lays meet. Only two Cyclones made this trip, both placing in their respective events. Putnam won the special 1,500 meter race, setting a record in the event of 4:00.4. Hager, getting off to a slow start, placed third in the 75 yard high hurdle event in which Sentman, of Illinois, set a world's record of 9.2 seconds.

The Kansas Relays formally opened the outdoor collegiate track season for 1930. Ray Putnam, fleet Cyclone distance star, again led the field in the special 3,000 meter run, winning the event in 8:54.3.

A week later Coach Simpson took his proteges to the Drake Relays, but failed to gain the usual number of gold medals there. Meier, a sure point winner in the dashes, was still suffering from an ankle injury, and did not make the trip. Nearly all of the other likely point winners were below par condition due to a prevailing cold epidemic. Bob Hager led Sentman, of Illinois, to the tape in a preliminary heat of the 120 yard high hurdles, but the final

but succumbed to Martin early in the second mile, and finally to Manning as they neared the tape. Martin won the race in 9:26.2. The 400 yard shuttle race proved a repetition of the previous year, Illinois winning the event and Iowa State placing second.

The annual Missouri-Iowa State dual held in Ames, proved to be the closest meet the two schools have ever faced each other in. The final score was 661/2 to 64, and credit for the marginal points of victory goes to Diek Wilcox, whose third toss in the final event of the day, the javelin throw, netted Iowa State a second in the event and victory. Iowa State seored clean sweeps in the 100 yard high hurdles, and pole vault, while Missouri copped all points in the

440 yard dash. The best mark of the day was chalked up by Ray Putnam, who won the meet record, and also the Iowa State track record, in the mile run, when he covered the distance in 4:19. Bob Hager broke a second meet record, one established in 1916 by the Iowa State track mentor, Bob Simpson, when running under the colors of Missouri. This new mark was in the 220 yard low hurdles, which Hager ran in 24.5 seconds. Hubert Meier, running his first race following injury in the Big Six Indoor Meet in

March, won the 100 yard dash in 10 seconds flat.

On May 14 the Drake trackmen proved no match for the Cyclones, and dropped the meet to Iowa State by a score of 91 to 40. Iowa State won all three places in the two mile run, shot





put, high jump, and broad jump. Drake scored a slam in the 440 yard dash. Meier and Hager both made exceptionally good time in their respective events. Meier stepped the dash event in 9.9 seconds, and Hager was clocked at 14.8 seconds for the 120 yard high hurdles.

The Big Six Outdoor Meet held at Lincoln turned into a literal record breaking fest. Iowa State men were responsible for the most sensational, as well as the greatest number of records broken. In the first event of the day, Hubert Meier, Cyclone sprint king, shattered all records to cover 100 yards in 9.4 seconds. The only other person ever to equal this time was Wykoff, of California, who ran the century in exactly the same time. Bob Hager, just a few minutes later,

brought more fame to Iowa State, when he broke the tape in the 120 yard high hurdles in 14.6 seconds to smash the former Big Six record, and establish himself as one of the nation's best hurdlers. Ray Putnam, the Cyclones' consistent distance winner, was not to be outdone by his team-mates, and later in the afternoon set a new conference record in the two mile run of 9:30.2.

Jim Bausch, the all-around Kansas athlete, won individual honors, and brought his team the conference championship, by winning first in the shot put, pole vault, and javelin, and placing third in the discus throw. Wells, of Iowa State, ran an exceptionally fine race in the hundred yard dash, and placed second to Meier in the record breaking heat. He also took third in the 220 yard dash, likewise won by Meier. Maurice W. Soults placed third in the high hurdle event, copped by his team-mate, Hager.







Coach Otopalik's men hung up a remarkable record, both as a team and individually, during the 1931 season. As a team it won nine victories and lost 1 match. On an eastern invasion the Cyclone team scored three shut-out victories in two days, piling up 106 points over the best teams in the east without the loss of a point. A fourth white-wash victory was scored over Nebraska University later in the season.


Iowa State opened the conference season with Oklahoma University. The Soon-

The Cyclones outhit the victors and were leading 1 to 0 up to the ninth inning by virtue of Holtgrewe's base on balls, his steal of second and Wells' timely single to right, scoring Holtgrewe. In the ninth, Thrift, who had replaced Gustafson, walked Joyce. Then ragged fielding on the part of the Cyclone outfield permitted two runs to cross the plate and the game was lost.

The Iowa State team made its first home appearance against Drake, trouncing the Bulldogs in easy fashion 8 to 3. Al Heitman had his fast one working in great shape and as a result 17 Bulldogs marched up to the plate and waved their bats frantically in


approved Casey Jones style. Adland, star backstop, got three hits out of four attempts, and Hawk had a perfect day, getting three hits and two walks.

On May 2, Iowa State journeyed to Lawrence and conquered Kansas University by the score of 5 to 2. It required three Cyclone pitchers and some fast double plays by the infield to keep the score down. The Jayhawk pitchers could not find the plate and walked fifteen of the Cyclone batters. Timely hits by Towne and Wells accounted for the margin of victory.

The Cyclones swept the series by winning the second game 4 to 2. Gustafson was steady in the pinches and after the fifth, the Kansans never threatened. Iowa State sewed up the game in the eighth by scoring two runs after counting twice in the sixth. Singles by "Gus," Wells, and Huntbatch, and a double by Hawk accounted for the winning runs. Hawk, with four hits in four trips to the platter, led the Cyclone offense.

The next game was with Missouri University, the Cyclones losing by a 3 to 4 score. The Cyclones won the game in the sixth and threw it away in the ninth. In the sixth, Oldham singled and was forced at second by Huntbatch. Hawk drove one down the third base line for two bases, scoring Huntbatch. Heitman scored Hawk with a drive that was too hot for the Tiger shortstop to handle. Al advanced when Rieke was safe on an error and scored when Holtgrewe came through with a pretty drive to right field. Going into the ninth with a lead of one run, the Cyclone defense blew up long enough for the Missourians to push two scores across, and that was the ball game.

The Cyclones evened the series by trouncing the Tigers in the second game, 6 to 0. Gustafson pitched airtight ball and had the Missourians helpless. Four-

Huntbatch was safe when the play on his grounder was made too late, and the bases were full. Hawk hoisted a long fly to left and Wells scored. Heitman's hit scored both Towne and Hunthatch.

As part of the Veishea celebration, Nebrasks was entertained in a two game series. The Cyclones trounced the Cornhuskers in the first game 5 to 3. Thrift permitted only three hits in seven innings and Gustafson finished the game, allowing three more. Iowa State was never in difficulty. Adland opened

The second game of the series was a comedy of errors played in a sea of mud. The Cornhuskers proved to be the better mud horses and won 12 to 8. The game was featured by the activities of Tommy Sloss' wheelbarrow gang in keeping the mud in the pitcher's and batter's box wadcable and the verbal battle carried on between Grace-Nebraska's Art Shires-and the bleachers. Witte, Nebraska outfielder, led the batters with four hits. Fielding features were provided by Wells, who made two sensational shoestring catches,

Right at an inopportune time, the Kansas Aggies came along and swept a two game series, winning 7 to 1 and 16 to 1. The games were featured by the masterful pitching of the Aggie hurlers. Wilcox was the only Cyclone who could hit the offerings of the Aggies.

When Oklahoma University arrived for two games, sore arms were taking their toll among the Cyclone hurlers. By virtue of hits by Oldham, Heitman, and Huntbatch, Iowa State led in the sixth inning of the first game, 7 to 3. In the seventh the storm broke, and before Thrift, who replaced Heitman, could stop the rampage, five runs were scored. In the eighth, an error and six hits gave the invaders seven more runs.

The second game of the series was another rout, the score being 9 to 4 in favor of the Sooners. The winners stepped right out in the first and were never

Witte then lashed a hit past White for two bases and Row followed with a single over second, scoring Williams. Errors by Heitman and Blohm allowed the winning counters to be scored in the fifth inning. The Cyclones scored five runs in the sixth. 

Big Six champions, winners of major honors in the A. A. U. meet, and undefeated in the season's dual meets, is the season's record for the Cyclone swimming team. It is a record to be proud of and too much praise cannot be given Coach Jake Daubert for his untiring efforts, which placed the Cyclones on top of the heap. George Unser, major "1" man, and minor lettermen Captain Smith and Gibbard are the only men lost through graduation. Their loss will be keenly felt, but Cyclone followers are predicting another championship team for next season.

The first dual of the season was with Grinnell in State Pool. Iowa State was never headed, winning 58 to 26. Sands, sophomore flash, started his record breaking career by setting a new tank mark in the 200 yard breaststroke race.

Nebraska, defending Big Six champions, were next overwhelmed 55 to 29. In this meet Sands established a new Big Six record for the 200 yard breaststroke, and Unser also lowered the Big Six time in the 440 yard free style swim.

The following week-end, competing against the pick of the middle west in the A. A. U. meet at Omaha, the swimmers wearing the colors of Iowa State captured practically every event they entered. Intramural Athletics

Intramural Athletics at Iowa State are promoted by the Department of Physical Education, for every male student on the campus.

The immediate organization for the program is under the direction of Harry J. Schmidt as Intramural Director, with the assistance of a corps of student managers, headed this year by James A. Brockelsby, senior manager, and Clifford Atkinson as associate senior manager. Three junior managers, Willard Robinson, Armand Mettler, and Harold Paul, have each had charge and the responsibility of managing one quarter of sports. Assisting the junior managers are sophomore manager candidates working for promotion to the posts of junior managers. In addition to the departmental managerial staff are unit managers, each representing and taking charge

of relations of the department with their respective units. These representatives are members of the Fraternity Ward Intramural Association, which meets in regular monthly meetings to decide policies and procedure for carrying on the many phases of the program.

There are four main groupings of competition concerning the undergraduate student body, namely : fraternities, fraternity freshmen, ward and divisional class. Each of these groups is composed of playing units representing the fraternities in the first two, definite residential districts in the ward group, and the classes of the various divisions of the college in the last. The great problem in this work has always been how to make the slogan, "Athletics for All," a reality because the students not affiliated with fraternities could not be organized into teams in sufficient numbers to give that half of the student body its representation. The ward system as it has been put into operation this year, divides the entire residential district adjacent to the campus, into twenty divisions called wards, each having approximately sixty students wihout other affiliations. In addition to these twenty, the three wings of the Men's Dormitory and the Alumni Hall dormitory on the campus, form four more wards. In all, twenty-four playing units have been definitely established through which the unorganized students can enter into the Intramural program to the man.

The program of athletics is divided into three classes:

Major sports include speedball, basketball, indoor track, playground ball, and outdoor track; minor sports—pentathlon, swimming, tennis, and volleyball; while the fall relays, handball, wrestling, and horseshoes are classified as special sports. Numerous meets, tournaments and leagues in each sport gives each student who is interested an opportunity to compete.

Awards consisting of trophies, charms, and ribbons, are given in the various sports. Point systems for the units in fraternity groups, and the individuals in the ward group, reward the participant for all around participation.

The main objectives of the program may be briefly outlined to be: to offer regular physical recreation to the greatest num-



The objects of the society are the advancement of the science of engineering, the professional improvement of its members, and the encouragement of better relations with students of civil engineering and practicing engineers.




