Alumni Association






There are thirty-one active local associations of the general alumni association, thirteen of which exist in the state of Iowa.

1914 Football Review

The season of 1914 was seemingly one of hard luck, as injuries played an important part in all of our games. Starting with six new men in the line-up, Coe was easily defeated, but Minnesota, going a mid-season pace, set the boys back. The Missouri game, two weeks later, showed the boys were hitting their stride, and a great improvement over the Minnesota game was in evidence. The Nebraska game found Ames at her best, but the injuries received were a blow from which we never fully recovered.

Lack of relief material was our greatest bandicap in the season of 1914. Our revised coaching system should be qualified to remedy this deficiency next year. All in all, the season of 1914 showed a game bunch of fighters with the possibilities of a great team in 1915. All the regulars, except the two tackles, Mattison and Captain Reeve, will return, leaving these important positions to be filled from the fine-looking Reserve team.

OCTOBER 3-AMES 27, COE 6

Coe, light and fast, ran up against a line much too heavy for them. Neither were they able to stop the wide, sweeping end runs by Moss and Kinnick. Coe's feature was a fifty-yard run by Bailey, left half, to the one-yard line, where a smash put the ball over for their score. There was no forward passing by either team. The game went to show that Ames' style was toward the open, running kind of game.

OCTOBER 10-AMES 0, MINNESOTA 26


Meeting a team working in mid-season form with an exceptionally powerful line, Ames was unable to get their end runs started. Most of the time Ames was kept on the defensive within their own territory and unable to use forward passes. Minnesota used a complicated variation of the famous Minnesota shift, repeatedly boxing Ames tackles and ends for good gains off tackle. The feature of the game was a thirty-yard forward pass from Moss to Jones, who made a total gain of sixty-five yards. Neither team could gain consistently with open football.

OCTOBER 24-AMES 6, MISSOURI 0

Before a huge homecoming crowd, Ames came back at Columbia and beat the Tigers on a slippery field. Missouri was unable to stop Ames' end runs and forward passes. In this game Ames' new pair of ends, Packer and Jones, commenced to show the defensive ability expected of them. Missouri was never dangerous and it was only the soggy condition of the field that saved them from a bad defeat. Dury Moss was the star of the game, repeatedly circling the Missouri ends for long gains. Packer, Jones and Deffke played great defensive games.

OCTOBER 31-AMES 7, NEBRASKA 20

After outplaying the wonderful Nebraska "Steihm" roller for three and one-half quarters, with the score 7 to 3 in Ames' favor, injuries to Uhl, Wilson, Packer

and Mattison left Ames unable to stop the heavy Nebraska backfield and they were defeated 20 to 7. In this game the Ames team was at its best during the season and but for unfortunate injuries the game would have gone down in history as one of Ames' greatest victories. Quarterback Moss and Fullback Uhl were the great offensive factors. On defense, Packer and Jones again lived up to their reputations made in the Missouri game, and from tackle to tackle Ames more than held her own. The team never fully recovered from this gruelling game. Mattison and Packer were on the hospital list the remainder of the season. The lack of first-class substitutes was keenly felt in this game.

NOVEMBER 7-AMES 69, CORNELL 0

Using every eligible man, Ames overwhelmed the plucky Cornell team on State Field. But it was a costly victory, as Uhl was practically put out for the rest of the season with a badly wrenched ankle. Features of this game were long end runs and forward passes by the Ames team. This game demonstrated the folly of using forward passes in the enemies' territory, as three of Cornell's passes were picked by the Ames defense and carried for touchdowns.

NOVEMBER 14-AMES 6, IOWA 26

Supported by the great homecoming crowd, Ames was defeated by their ancient rivals from the State University. A bad pass in the first few minutes of play gave Iowa her first touchdown, after which Ames received the kickoff and by brilliant end runs by Moss, off-tackle bucks by Wilson and Uhl and a forward flip from Moss to Jones, carried the ball the length of the field for a touchdown. A penalty to the one-yard line gave Iowa her next chance. After putting up a great uphill battle and after the loss of Uhl and Wilson, Ames was forced to accept defeat at the hands of one Sammy Gross, the Iowa quarterback. The feature of the game was the offense of the two quarterbacks, Moss and Gross, and until Uhl and Wilson left the game it looked as if the Ames star would get the decision. But the loss of these important cogs seemed to break up the Ames interference, which had been so effective all season.

NOVEMBER 21-AMES 52, DRAKE 0

Playing for second place in the state and Missouri Valley, the Cyclones swept over Drake in the greatest landslide victory in the annals of the two schools. Wide end runs, split bucks, off-tackle bucks and trick plays and the fierce defense offered by the Ames team were too much for the Blue-Jerseyed boys and the season ended with Ames in second place in the State and Missouri Valley Conference. In this game Moss, after catching a punt on his own twenty-five-yard line, and following the wonderful interference of Packer, duplicated the feat of Hurst in 1912 and Brennan in 1913, racing seventy-five yards for a touchdown.

The 1914 Track Season

Altho not a success because of victories won, the 1914 track season was successful from the standpoint of the team which Coach Merriam developed from the material at hand at the beginning of the season. The loss of Captain Manning, who made such a good showing in the State Meet in 1913, was a blow to the team. Since Manning's injured foot kept him off the track, "Pop" Haggard was elected captain of the 1914 squad.

Soon after Christmas vacation Captain Haggard issued a call for track men, which resulted in thirty men coming out at once for daily workouts on the dirt floor and the indoor track of the gym. Not long after this Coach Merriam announced an indoor dual with Drake to be held in the near future.

This meet, on March 7th, was the first of its kind to be held at Ames. Injuries and illness kept Dickenson, Kaiser and Snyder out of this meet. Drake won by the score of 50 to 35.

Four teams went to the Drake Relay Games on April 18th. The competition was strong in this meet and our teams did some good fighting. The four-mile team, two-mile team, mile team and half-mile team placed fifth, fourth, fourth and fifth, respectively.

Much interest was aroused in the Home Meet on April 25th, which the Freshmen won without much effort. Several prospective stars showed up among the Preps in this meet.

A week later Ames made the "Tiger" eat her dust. The whole team fought hard, but the wonderful running of Collins was the feature of the meet. He won the 100 in 10 flat and then stepped off the 220 in 21½, this being the fastest time ever made in that event in the Missouri Valley. After helping win the mile relay, Collins won the day for Iowa State in a thrilling battle with the Missouri man in the half-mile relay. This race was the final event and totaled the score 64 to 63 in favor of Ames.

The "Cornhuskers" got away with the meet at Ames on May 9th with the score of 70 to 44. At this time the team was weakened because Collins was not in his usual form the rest of the season following the Missouri Meet.

The following Saturday the "Ducklings" entered our camp, and with a well-balanced team defeated us 69 to 58. Shearer, with his all-around work, starred for the visitors.

Ames took second in the State Meet at Des Moines on May 23d, Drake winning first honors. The team did consistent work in this meet.







Cross Country 1914

With Captain McWhorter, Maakestad, Horne and Seder of last year's team as a nucleus, Coach Merriam put out another winning cross country team last fall. After several weeks of hard training, much of the time in bad weather and over muddy roads, Ned's "Hikers" took the Missouri Dual, won the Missouri Valley championship and placed second in the "Big Nine" Conference Meet.

The first tryout was held October 17th over a heavy course. The first sixmen to finish were McWhorter, Maakestad, Seder, Horne, Scroggie and Bourland.

These men "swamped" the Missouri team at Columbia, October 24th. The course was exceptionally fast. Maakestad, Seder, Horne and McWhorter finished in the order named and were closely grouped at the finish, Maakestad covering the course in 27:6%, which is 14 seconds under the conference record. Scroggie finished seventh and Bourland eighth.


Two weeks later, November 7th, the same team, except that Williams ran in Bourland's place, won the Missouri Valley run by a large margin. Rodney of Kansas took first place in 28:10. Ames finished as follows: Maakestad, second; Seder, third; Horne, fourth; McWhorter, fifth; Scroggie, seventh; Williams, ninth. The score was: Ames, 21; Kansas, 46; Missouri, 61, and Nebraska, 102.


On November 21st, Maakestad, McWhorter, Horne, Scroggie and Seder took second place in the "Big Nine" Conference run at Lafayette, Ind. The team ran as consistently in this meet as they did all year. Watson of Minnesota won the run in the fast time of 26:25, breaking the conference record. The Ames team finished: Maakestad, seventh; Seder, ninth; Horne, fifteenth; McWhorter, twenty-first, and Scroggie, twenty-sixth. The scores of the first four teams were: Minnesota, 45; Ames, 79; Illinois, 98; Ohio, 116.

A Freshman cross country run was held November 18th and was won by Hawthorne, with Kreber second.

"Bill" Maakestad, who led the bunch in every run last fall, is captain for 1915.




The Season

On April 14th, Missouri defeated Ames in their conference game by the score of 9 to 2, mainly thru the hard hitting of the Missouri team. This was Rumley's first varsity game, and due to inexperience he could not stop the Missouri offense. The Ames team showed possibilities of a good fielding team, good base running, fair pitching and fair hitting. The feature of this game was the hitting of Third Baseman Palferman of Missouri, his batting record for the day being a home run, a two-base hit and a single. McBride led in hitting for Ames with a two-base hit and a single.

The second game at Columbia, April 15th, resulted in a victory for Ames thru the pitching of Bob Okey and the hitting of Kerrigan, Bangham and Kinnick. Okey demonstrated that he could handle his share of the games in good shape. The Ames team's fielding was again in evidence, as they put up a sturdy defense for twelve innings, till three hits in a row turned the tide toward Ames, 6 to 3.

The contest with Simpson, April 24th, was the first game for Pitcher Peterson. His pitching, with errorless support and the hitting of Kinnick, McBride, Bangham, Kerrigan and Brennan gave Ames their first shut-out victory.



On May 8th, Ames again met Missouri. The feature of this 4 to 0 victory over Missouri was the wonderful pitching of Rumley, who struck out sixteen men, and the faultless support given him by the Ames team. In this game Rumley allowed two hits, while Ames got six off of Capp of Missouri.

The next day Bob Okey again showed his mastery over the Tigers, and with brilliant support he defeated Missouri for the second time in an extra inning game, 2 to 1.

May 16th, Simpson was again shut out by the Ames nine by the score of 8 to 0. The feature of this game was the pitching of Okey and the fielding of the Ames team.

On May 19th, Iowa was defeated by Ames thru the pitching of Rumley and the hitting of Kenneally, the peppery Irishman driving in both of Ames' runs. Rumley retired ten Iowa men on strikes and allowed them but three hits. Ames' field-

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
ing and base running was in evidence and showed far superior to that of Iowa. Score, 2 to 1.

May 21st, Ames was defeated for the Missouri Valley title by the strong team from the University of Kansas, mainly thru the hitting of Delange and Bishop, who drove in all of Kansas' runs. Rumley retired ten Kansans on strikes and allowed seven hits, while Snee of Kansas struck out four Ames men and allowed seven hits. In this game the Ames defense did not show up to form, Ames having three errors to one for Kansas.

The following day Kansas again defeated Ames 10 to 7, tho Okey struck out twelve men. The hitting of Snee, Bishop and Somers was very timely. For Ames, Kenneally, Bangham and Davis played the best ball, Kenneally leading with three hits:

In the first Cornell game, May 26th, Ames won in ten innings after being held scoreless for eight times at bat. The feature of the game was the hitting of Bangham, McBride and Davis. Rumley struck out seven men.

Two days later, May 28th, Ames was defeated by the Cornellians, at Mount Vernon, 5 to 4, errors by the Ames infield being largely responsible. The hitting of Dayis, Bangham and Brennan featured the game for Ames, Dayis knocking the longest home run ever hit on the Cornell diamond.



May 29th, Grinnell was beaten for the state championship by the slugging of Kerrigan, Kinnick and Davis and the wonderful pitching of Rumley. In this game First Baseman Kerrigan started things with a three-base hit with the bases full in the second inning. In that frame seven Ames men hit safely in succession, settling without question the state championship.

The final game of the season was with Iowa at Iowa City. Following the reaction of the Grinnell game, Ames was defeated 7 to 2, mainly thru the hitting of Jacobson, Baird and Snyder. The Ames infield seemed to be off form and the high water mark in errors was reached. This game closed a very successful season from the Ames standpoint, winning first in the State and second in the Valley Conference.

The outlook for 1915 is very good. Captain Brennan, left field; Hansel, short stop; Rumley, pitcher, and Peterson, pitcher, are the only men lost, and with several first-class men from the Freshman class, it looks like another winning team for the Ames fans.

The Season

Basketball started with a great outlook, but sickness, ineligibility and accidents changed the personnel of the squad so fast that team work was slow in developing.

The season opened with the championship team from Kansas University, which defeated Ames in two close games by the scores of 29 to 22 and 27 to 23, the second game being won in an overtime period. These games were featured by the fast floor work of the Kansas forwards and center and the basket shooting of Cramer and Arp of Ames.

Nebraska next defeated Ames at Lincoln in two games, 32 to 15 and 23 to 12. Inability of the Ames team to adapt themselves to the small floor at Nebraska proved their downfall. Cramer was again the star of the games, his basket shooting being a revelation to the Nebraska team.

Grinnell was defeated by Ames, for the second time in the history of the two schools, by a running shot by Morgan in the last few minutes of play. Cramer's work again stood out as being the most spectacular ever seen on the Ames floor.

Nebraska defeated Ames for the third time, 24 to 12, mainly thru the poor handling of the ball by the Ames quintet, the personnel of which had been entirely changed thru the loss of three of the Ames regulars.

Looking like a different organization, Ames came back the next night and defeated the Nebraska team in easy fashion by the score of 25 to 11. In this game the Ames team seemed to have struck their stride, and the work of Holmes, Cramer and Boynton was the feature.

Iowa won over the Ames team at Iowa City by the score of 27 to 12 in what proved to be the poorest game of the season for Ames. Inability to handle the ball was the chief cause of the downfall.

Drake was next defeated by Ames on their home floor by the score of 21 to 20 in the second overtime period. The fast floor work of Cramer, Boynton and Holmes featured this game.

The Kansas Aggies came for their first appearance on the Ames floor and were defeated 15 to 14 and 25 to 19 in two fast and spectacular games. The work of Cramer, Boynton and Porterfield was the outstanding feature.

Drake followed and were forced to take another licking at the hands of Ames by the score of 18 to 13. The playing of Cramer, Holmes and Porterfield for Ames and that of Wieser and Thomas for Drake was outstanding.

Ames played Iowa for the state championship in the last game of the season and were forced by the fast Iowa team to accept second place. Score, 23 to 18. The schedule of nine games in three weeks seemed to have been too heavy for the fighting Ames team, for with the score 16 to 16 and six minutes to play, the Ames team tired badly and Iowa was able to pull up ahead. Cramer, Boynton and Swiney starred for Ames and Bannick, Parsons and Jacobson played the best game for Iowa.

Cramer led the team in baskets and his work was the outstanding feature of the season. The speedy guard scored thirty-six field goals and held his opponents to twenty-one.

OUTLOOK FOR 1916

Cramer is the only loss from the 1915 team and Aldrich, Tomlinson, Shirey, Harper, Bertelson, Hahn and Thomas from the Freshman squad and the long list of ineligibles of 1915 should insure a strong team in 1916.

Women's Gymnasium Work


This department is under the supervision of Miss Winifred R. Tilden, Director of Women's Athletics. She is assisted by Miss Ruth Edgerton, a graduate of Kansas State College and Teachers' College of Columbia University.

The Freshman and Sophomore girls are required to take gymnasium work, which includes marching tactics, calisthenics, fancy dancing, and apparatus and playground work. During the first six weeks in the fall and the last six weeks in the spring, outside work is substituted and two hours a week of basketball, tennis, golf or hockey is required.


In the spring, cups are given to the girls showing the most improvement during the year and doing the best work in the indoor exhibition. An "A" sleeve band is awarded to any girl who makes an average of 95 in gym classes.


This year has seen a large increase in the number of girls taking gym work. There are six divisions of Freshmen of about thirty-five each, which is twice the number last year; two divisions of Sophomores taking apparatus work; three divisions in aesthetic dancing, and one division in playground work.

Several needed improvements and additions have been made to the gymnasium in the past year. A new floor has been laid, and in the basement, showers and 324 new steel lockers have been installed. A half of the basement has been reserved for a swimming pool, which will be put in later.

Women's Athletics

The Women's Athletic Association, for which every woman in the college is eligible, has for its object the promotion and control of all women's athletics at lowa State College. A part of its organization is the Women's Athletic Council, which is made up of the Advisor of Women, the Dean of Home Economics, the Physical Director, four women from the faculty and the officers of the Athletic Association. This Council has control of the affairs of the association and the athletic clubs, hockey, basketball, tennis and golf. The constitution of the association governs the awarding of medals, A's and cups.

Medals are awarded once a year for work on the hockey and basketball teams, and twice a year to the winners in singles and doubles in tennis and to the winners in singles and twosomes in golf.

Any girl winning three medals is awarded the official A sweater and any girl winning medals in three different sports receives a silver cup.

This year a new award of an All College "A" is offered to any girl who holds a position on any team for two years. This A may be worn on a sweater or on a blanket.

A recognition star is given to the captains of the various teams.

The Annual May Festivities are under the auspices of the Athletic Association and the receipts from them go toward the support of the women's athletics.

Soon after the coming of Lieutenant Lincoln to Ames, enough interest and eagerness to learn were manifested among the students in the Corps to warrant the organization of a Special Company of volunteers, who would drill two extra hours each week and take up the more advanced work that the limited time space prohibits the regiment from going into.

Consequently, as soon as the department was well enough under way, the call was made, and about a hundred and twenty-five men reported for drill from five to six Mondays and Wednesdays. This number was thinned out until at present there are about eighty-five members in the company. It was thought at the beginning that some sort of a competition might be arranged between this company and a similar one at Iowa City, but continued proposals for such an event brought no response from Iowa, and the matter was finally reluctantly dropped by Ames.

The company has perfected itself as much as possible in the manual of arms, close and extended order drills, and in addition has taken up the rifle drills, the bayonet manual, and other lines of work that come into the many-sided existence of the military man. Credit for physical training is given for work in the company.



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
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IOWA ENGINEER



In individual breeds they secured second in Jerseys and Ayrshires, but in Guernseys they lost 90 points in placing the class besides what they lost on reasons. As a whole, tho, our boys did exceptionally well on reasons.






Push Ball




The ever-cautious Scribe, dubious of anything so rhythmically named as "All-College Christmas Carnival," slipped into a seat near the door and waited.






On the west side of our stadium rise tier upon tier of concrete bleachers—eleven sections out of the desired twenty-one.


But when this was noised about, such a mighty cry arose that Denecurtis saw he could not prevail; so he discreetly held his peace.
