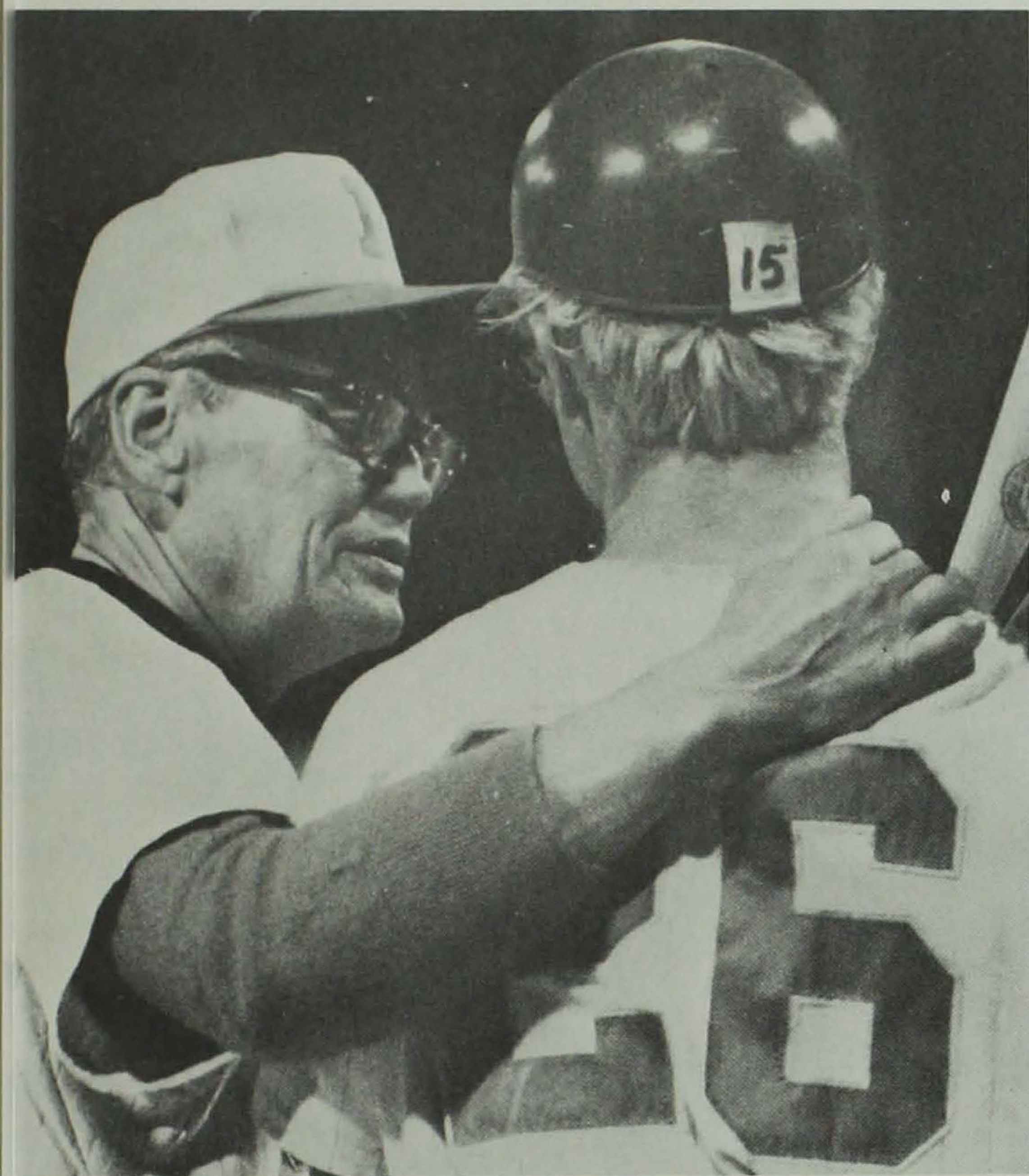

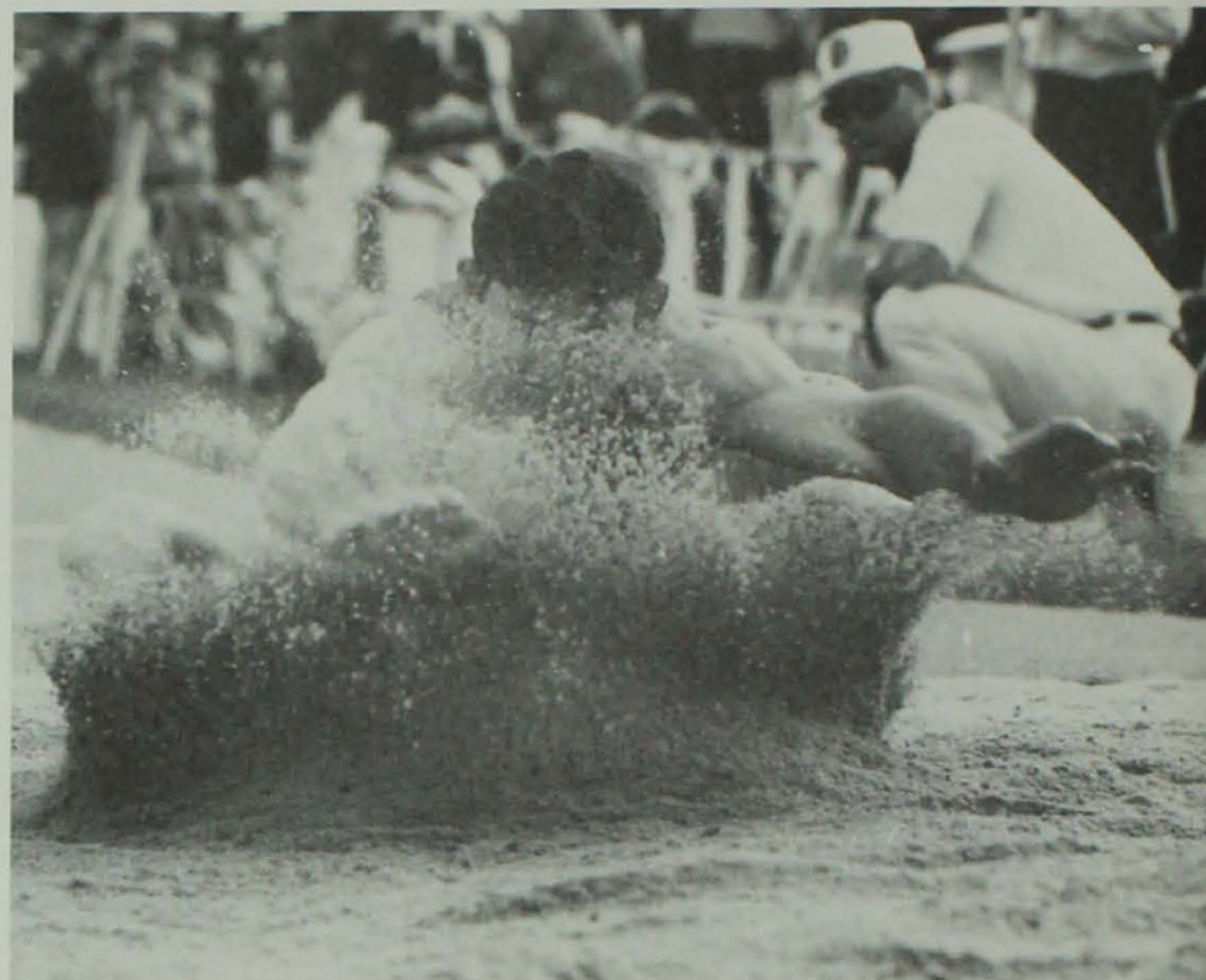

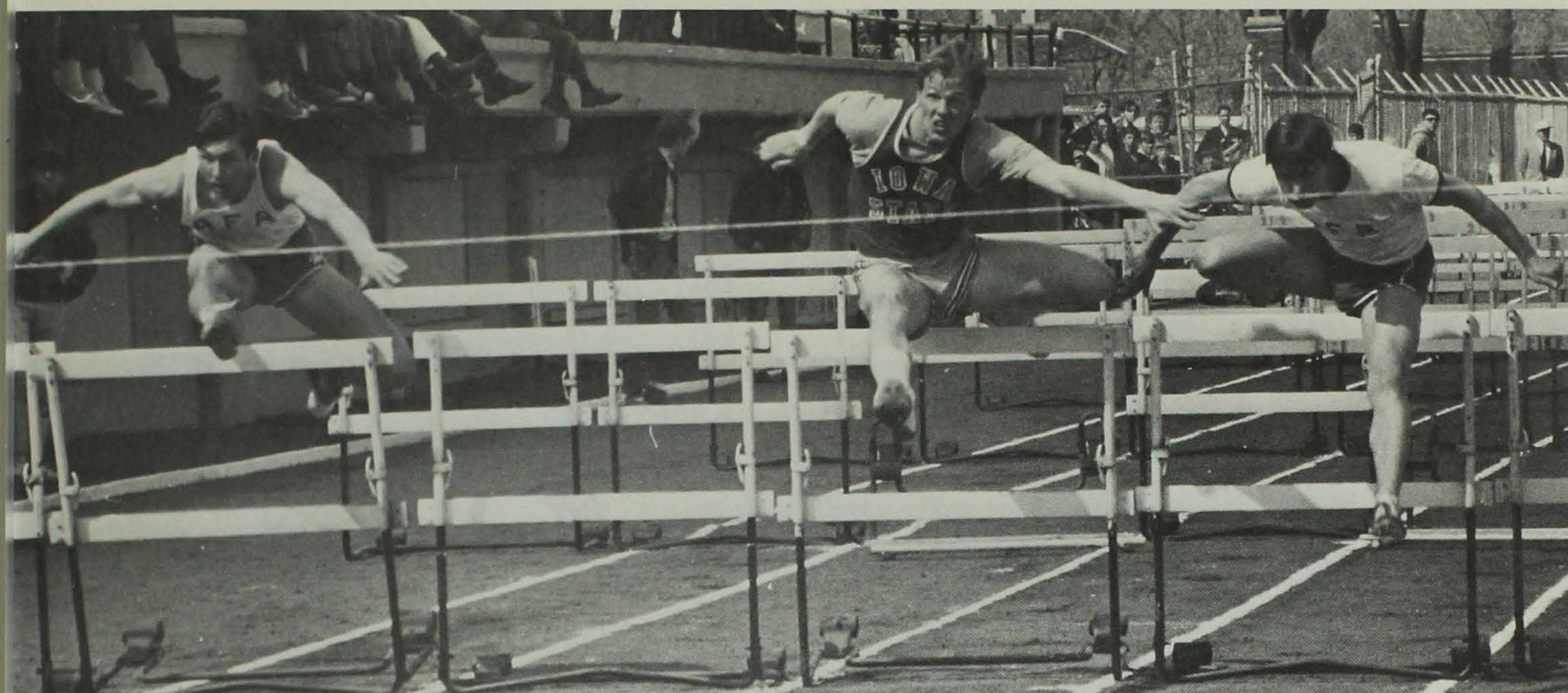

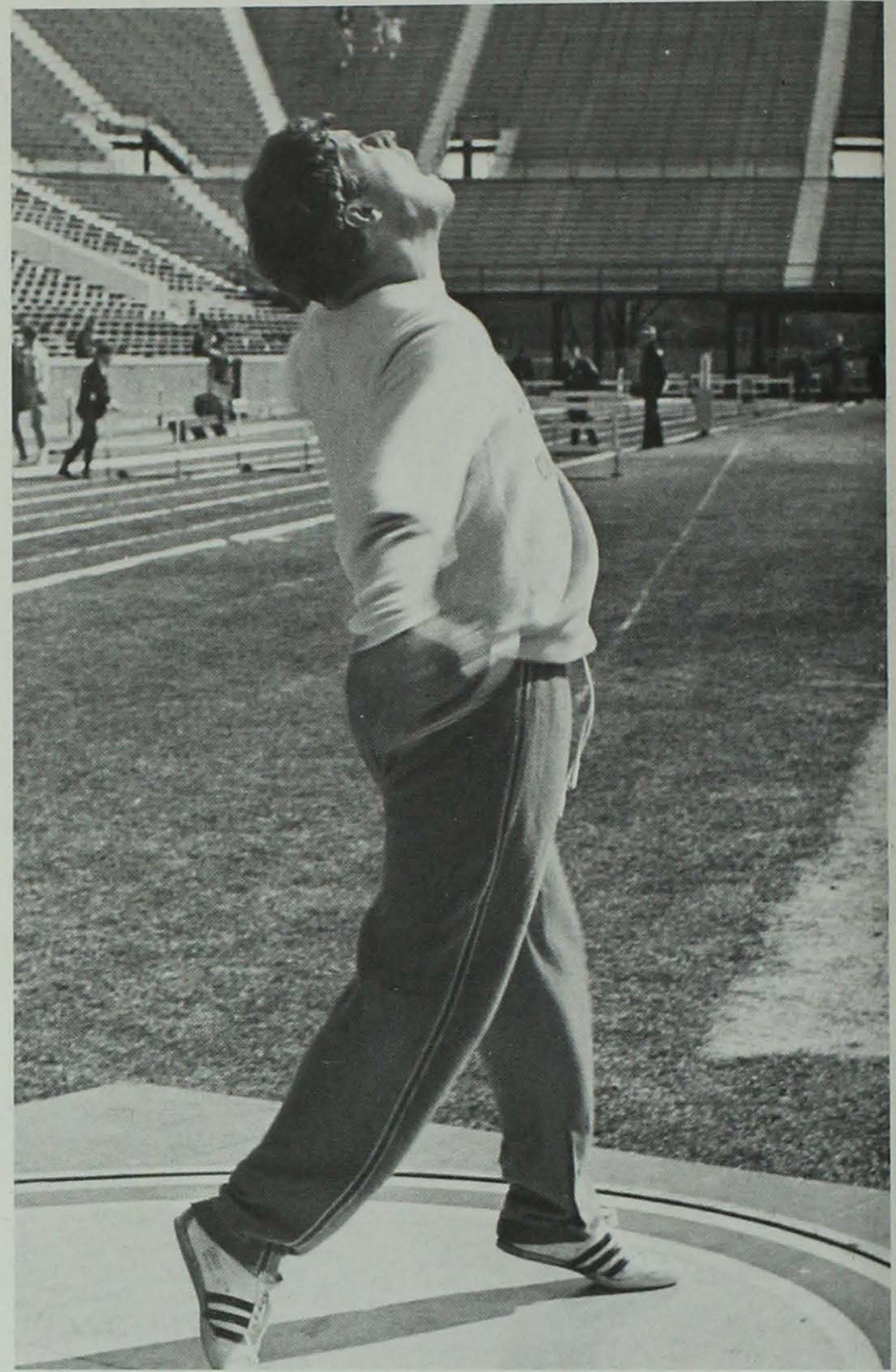

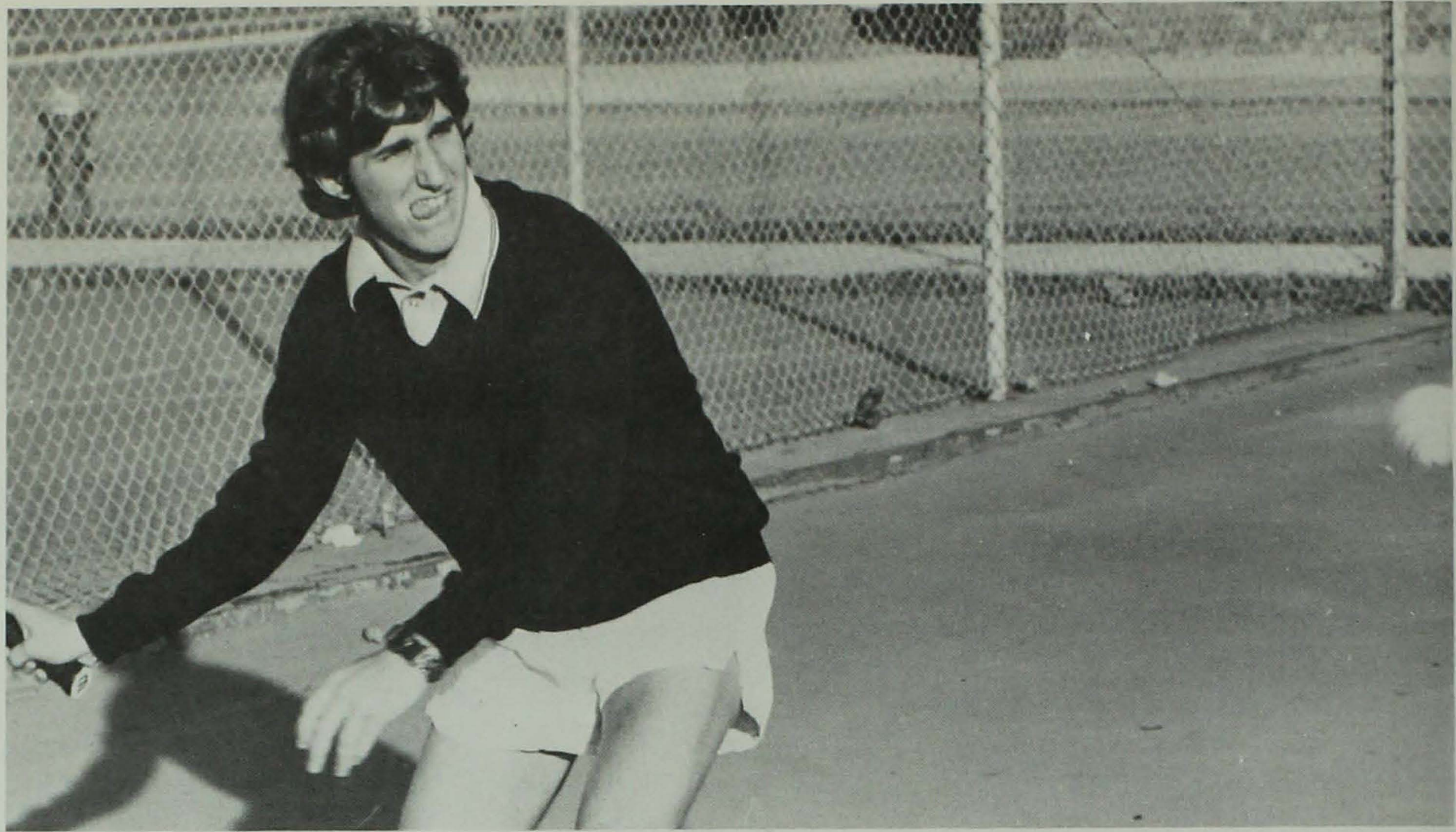
The track and field teams under head coach Jerry Barland broke seven Cyclone outdoor records during the 1970 season.

Three of the records were established by Dennis McGuire in a two mile run of 9:06.4, a three mile time of 13:46.9 (for a Big 8 record) and a six mile mark of 29:12.2. The distance medley team consisting of McGuire, Jim McCord, Fran Long and Dean Twedt raced to a record breaking 9:56.1. In addition McGuire teamed with Randy Stiles, Chuck Schneider and Jim McCord to establish a new two-mile relay mark of 7:39.7.

The mile relay team of Jim Walstrom (Captain), Jim Simpson, Bruce Edmundson and Fran Long, broke into the record books with a time of 4:12.1.

George Amundson hurled the discus 170 feet 5 inches to provide the only new record in the field events.

The thinclads won only one of their dual meets, and placed last in the Big 8 Conference meet.



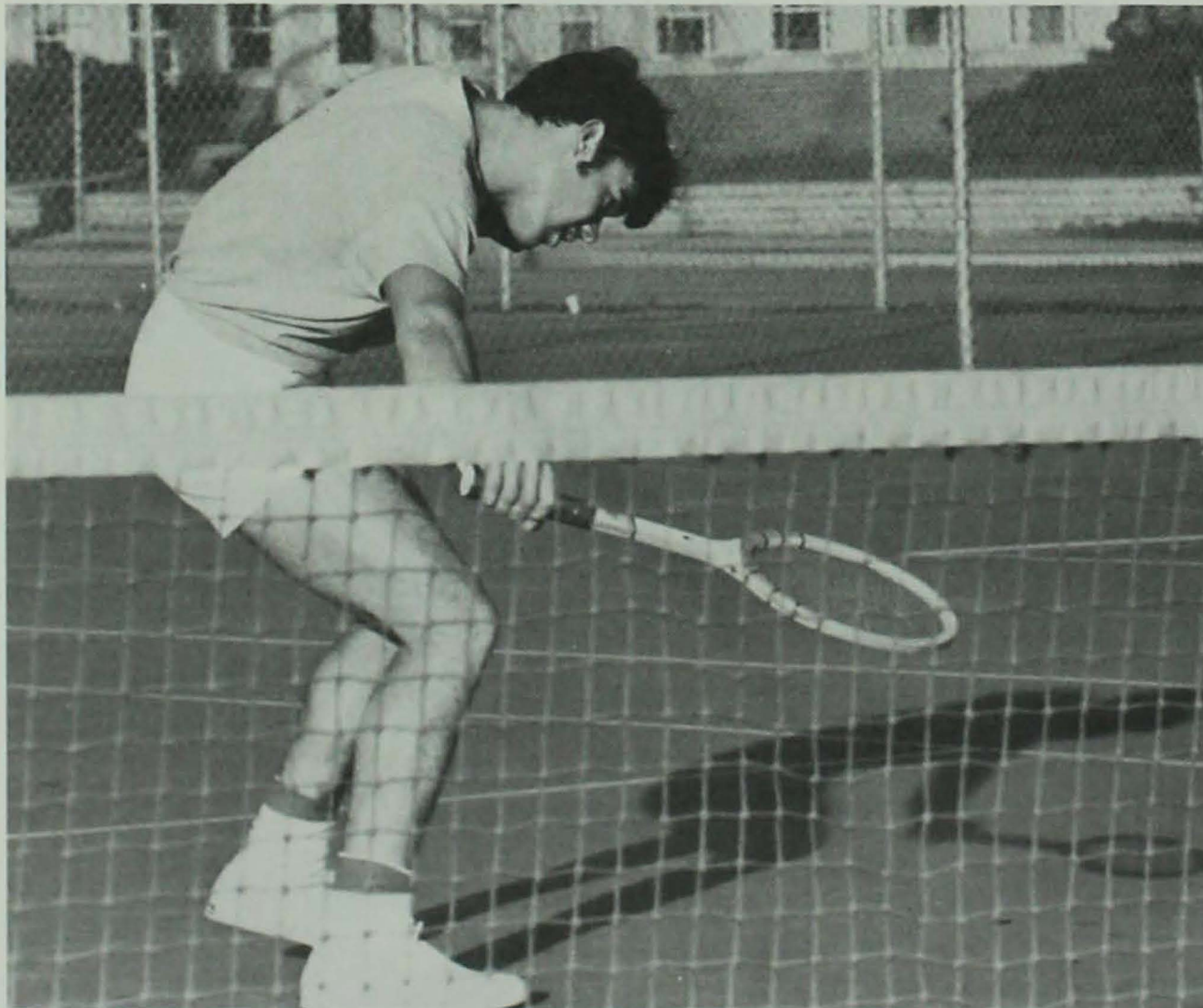

The netmen coached by Dave Flemming finished the spring season with a respectable 8-3 record.

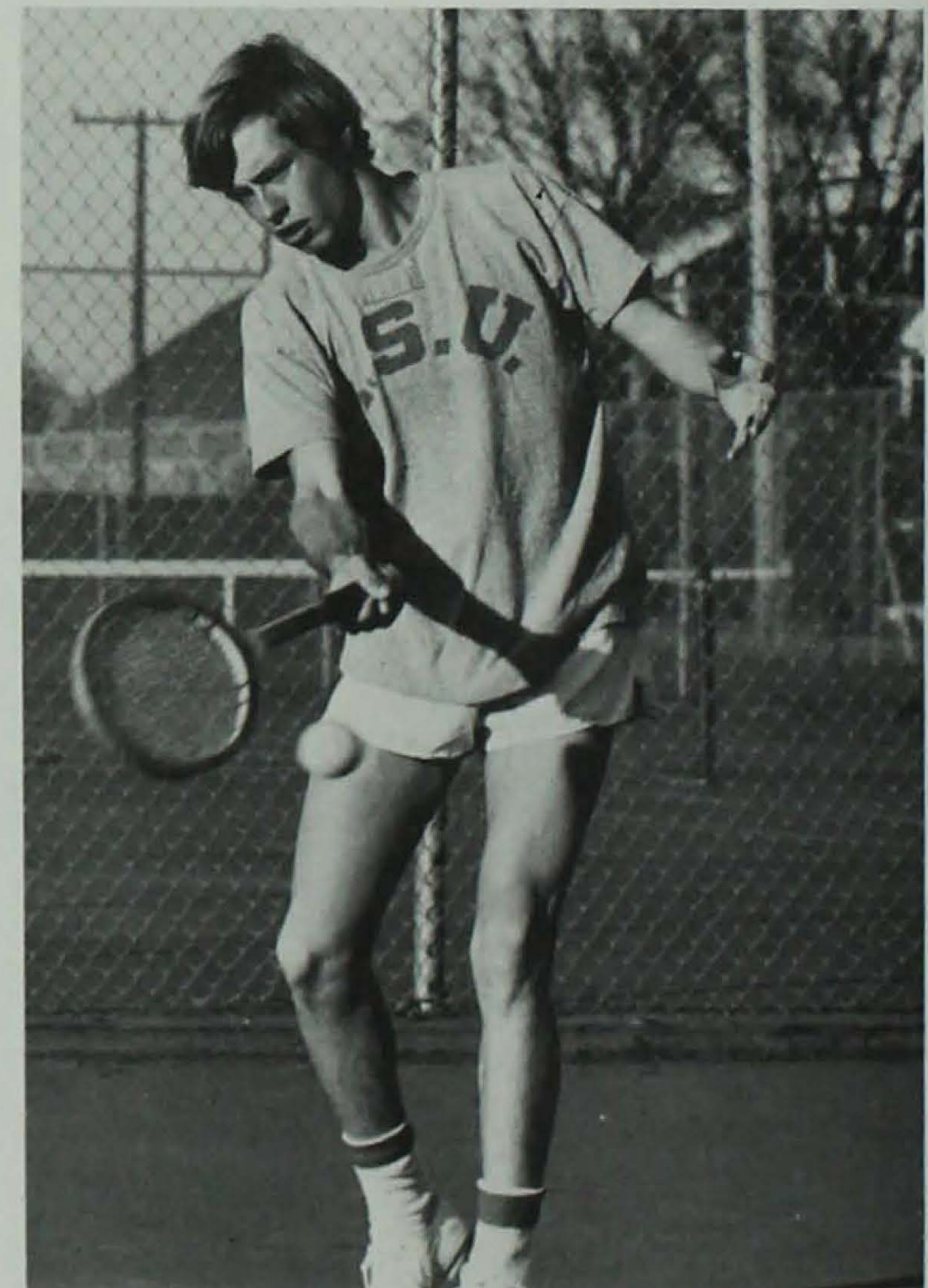

Coach Flemming wound up his second year at Iowa State with three Seniors — Ed Hommema, John Waltman and Rick Wischmeier.

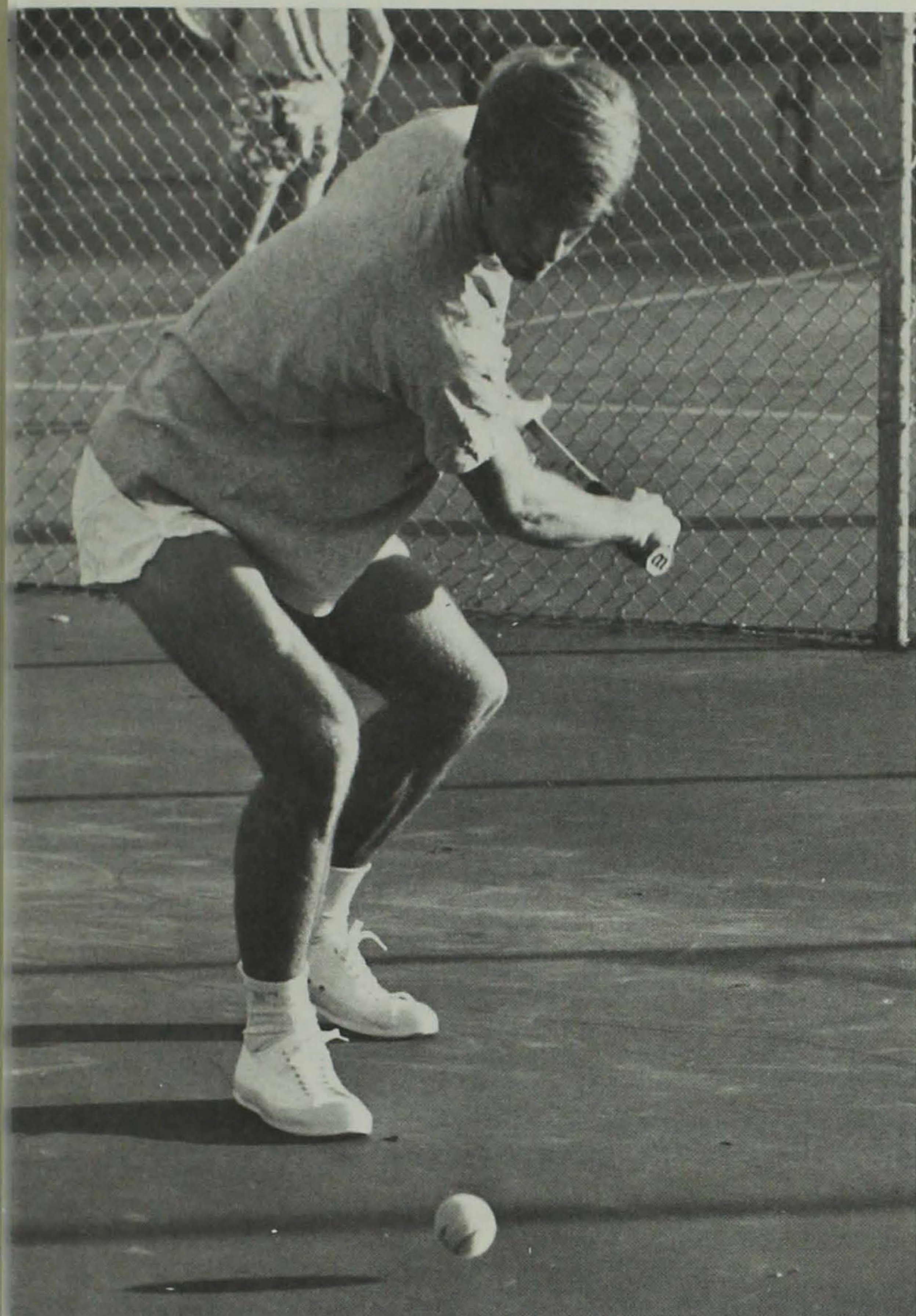

Those who play Soccer at ISU do so because they like the game. Soccer is gaining a lot of interest and last fall more than

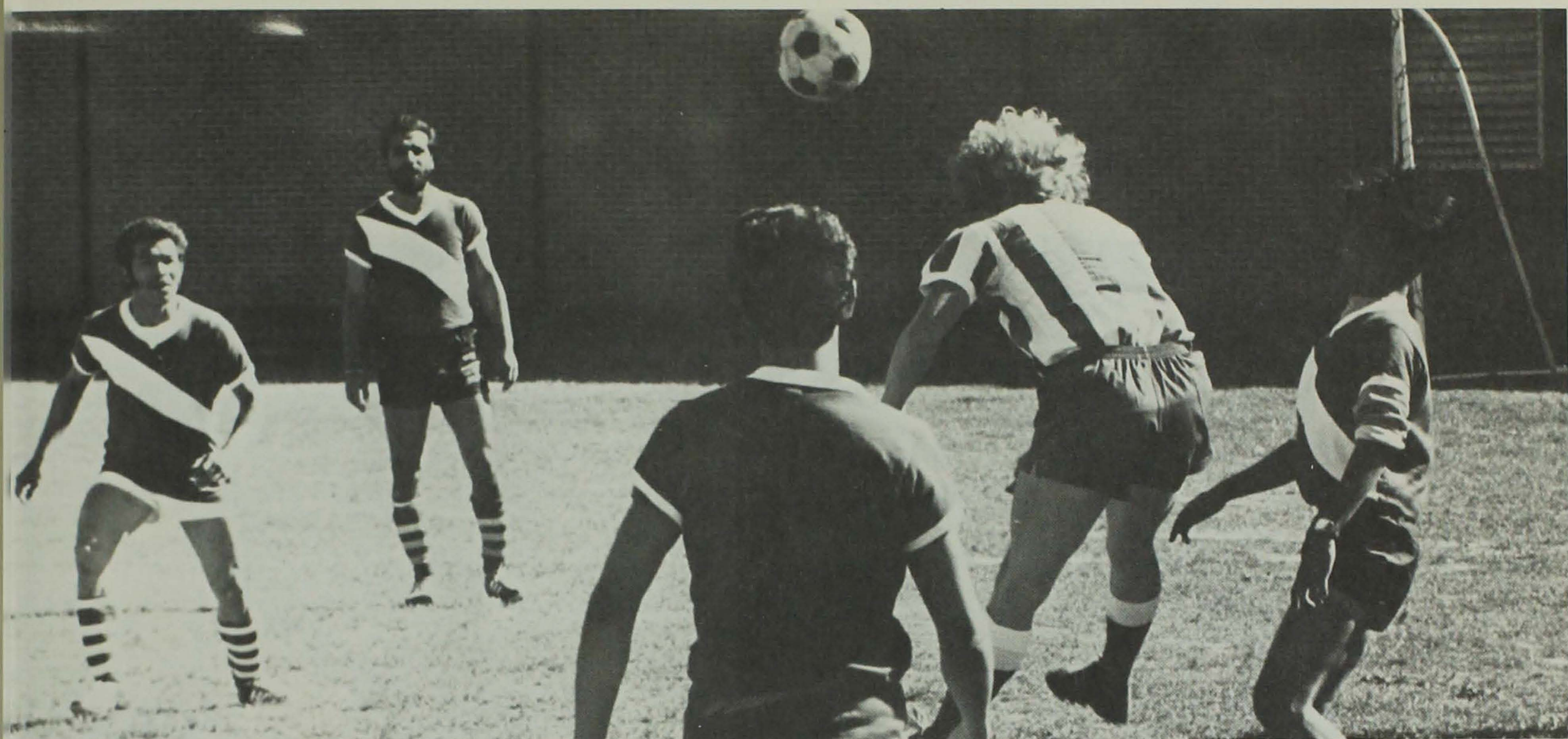
50 men played on three different soccer teams.

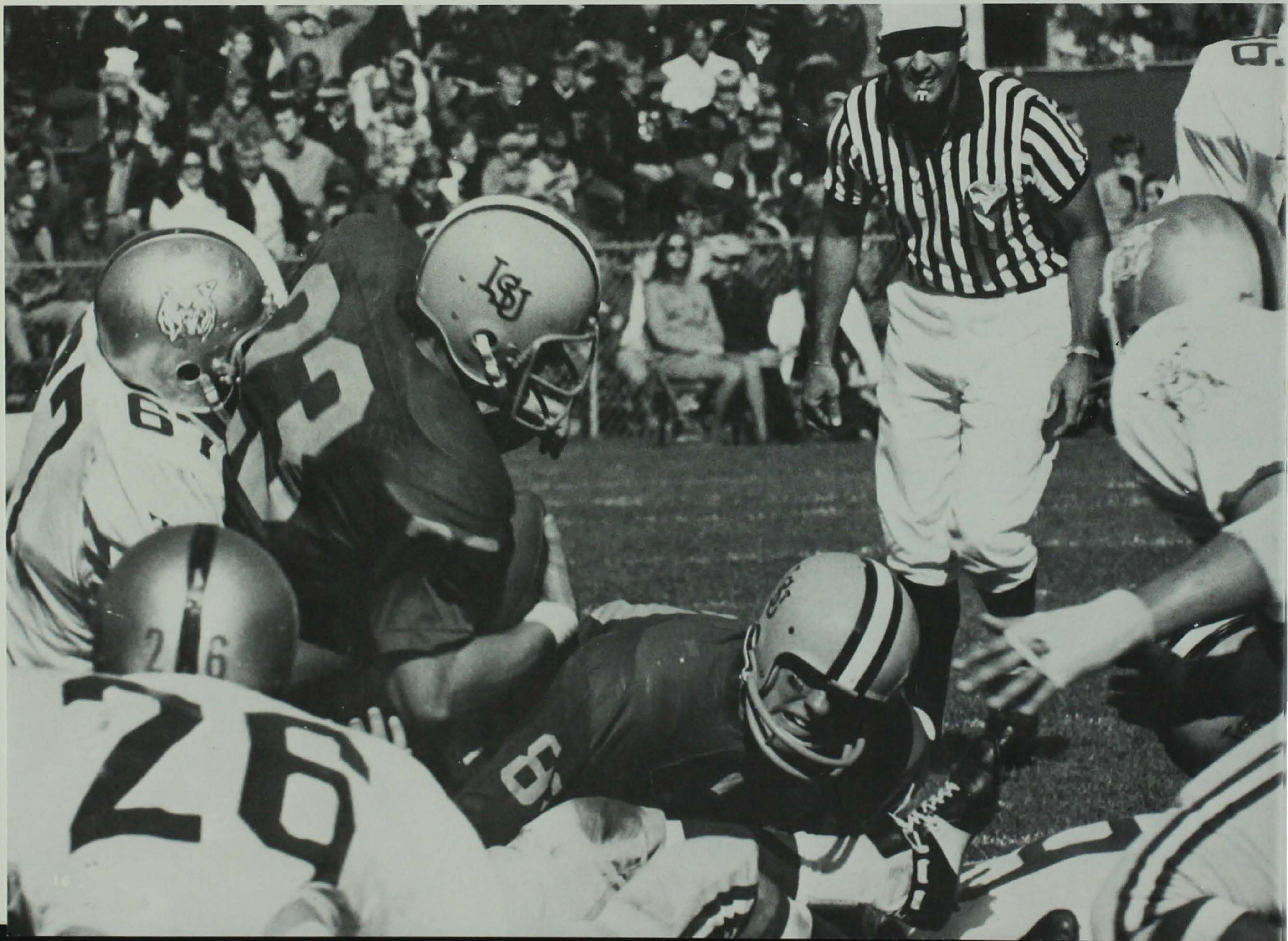

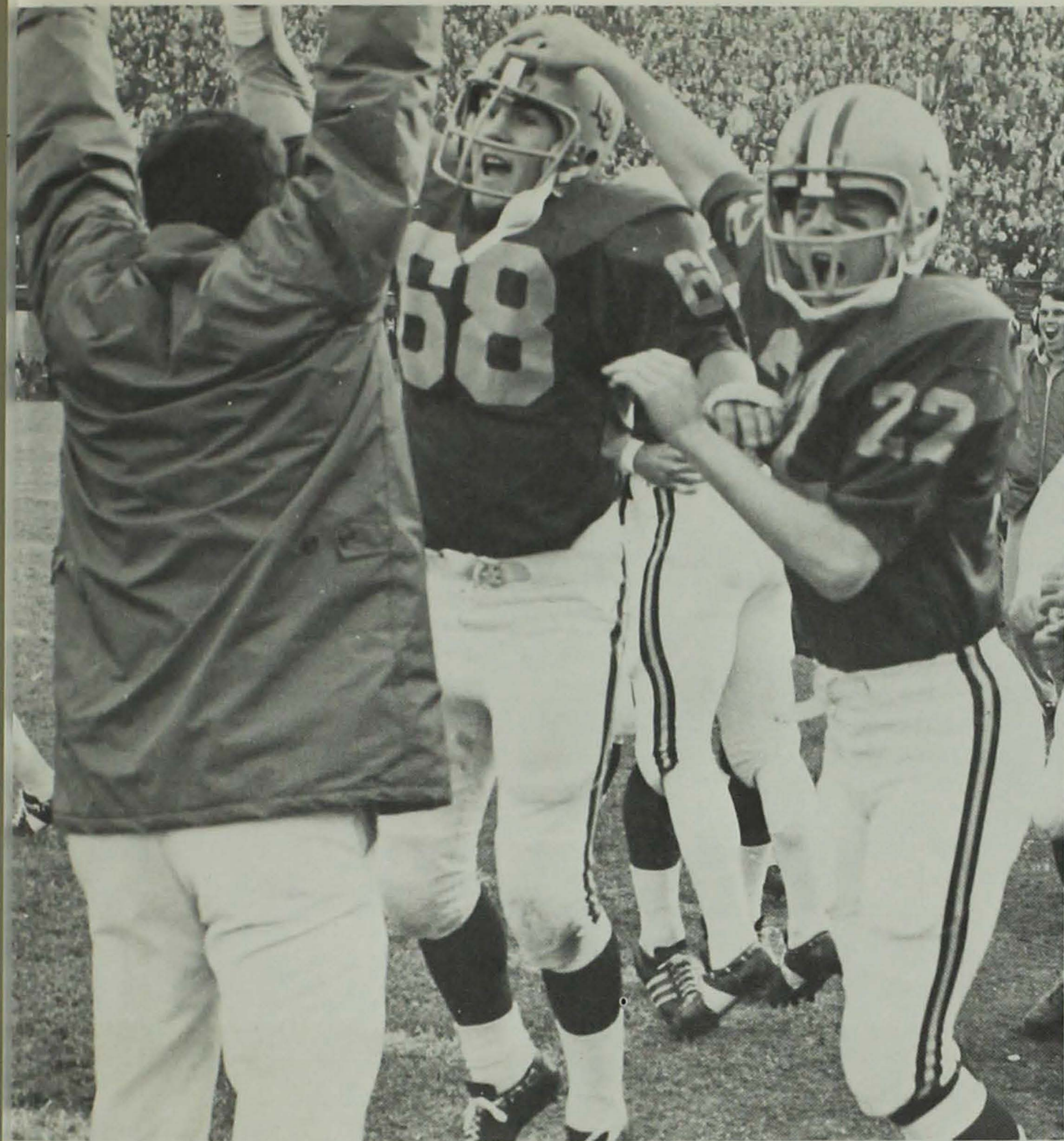

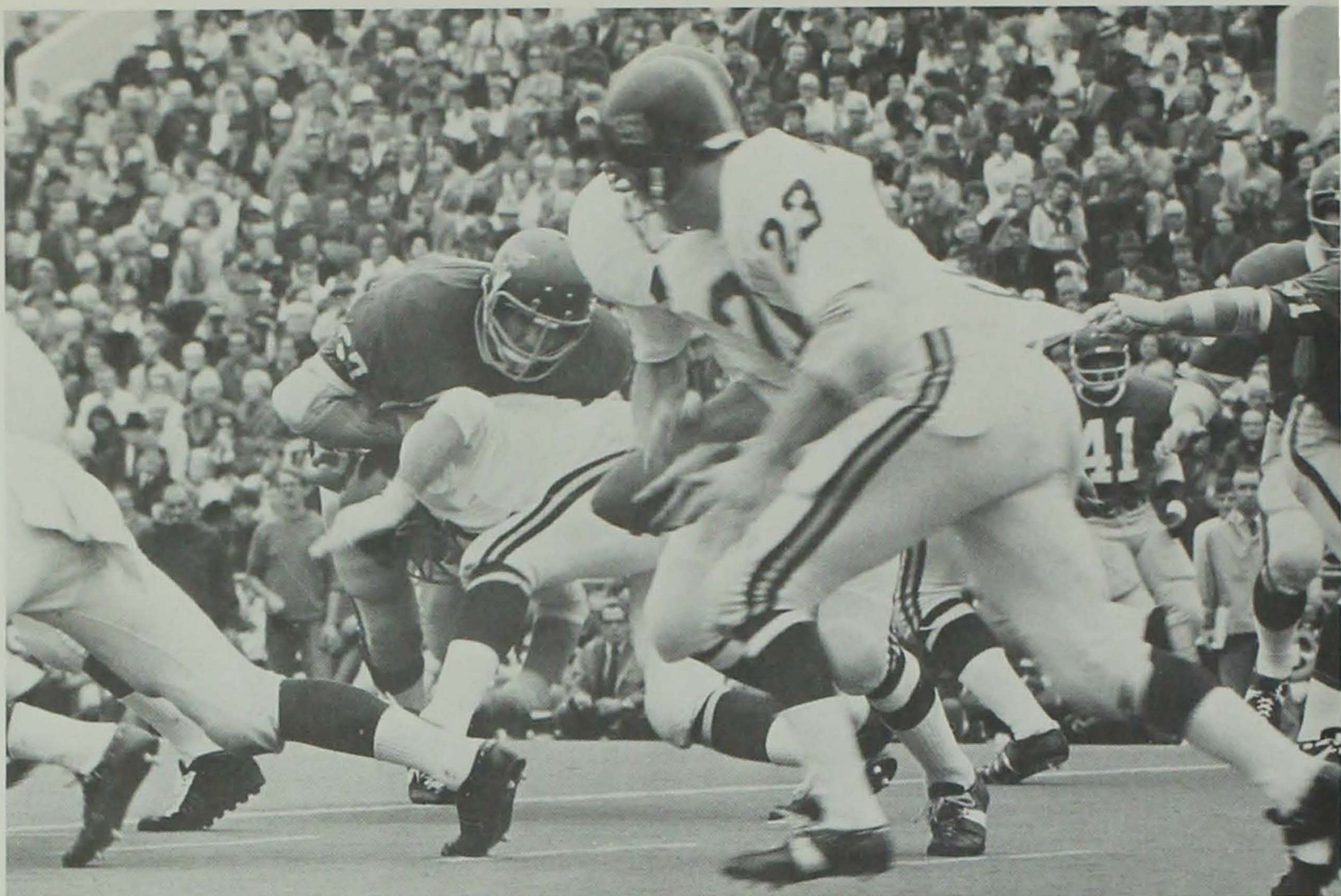

When it comes to football, the Big 8 Conference is one of the toughest in the nation. Nebraska proved that this year when it won the Orange Bowl and became the number one team in the nation.

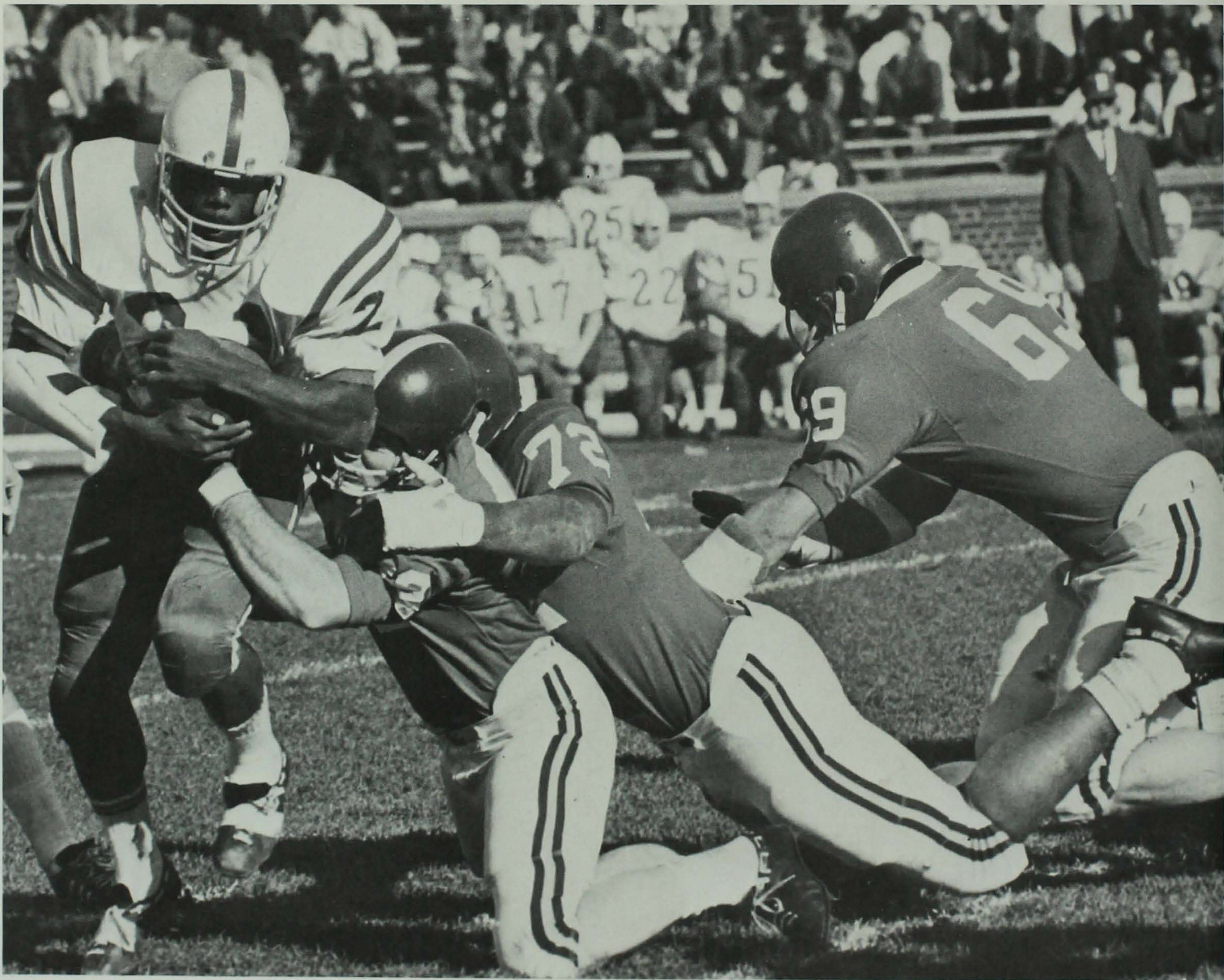
Iowa State was highly underrated when it started its 1970 football season, but they soon made critics take notice when they upset top rated teams in their three opening games. Their opening wins over New Mexico, Colorado State and Utah demonstrated that Iowa State was going to be a rugged and determined team.

The opening game in the Big 8 for the Cyclones was one of the biggest disasters since 1946, as Colorado beat them 61-10. Following this game, ISU went into a 5 game losing streak until they beat Missouri 31-19. They wound up the season by defeating nationally rated San Diego State 28-23 in a non conference game.

Season records can only show statistics, but if they could reflect such things as determination, Iowa State would be number one. Coach Johnny Majors is in the middle of a rebuilding process that should see ISU climb the ranks of college football during the next few years.

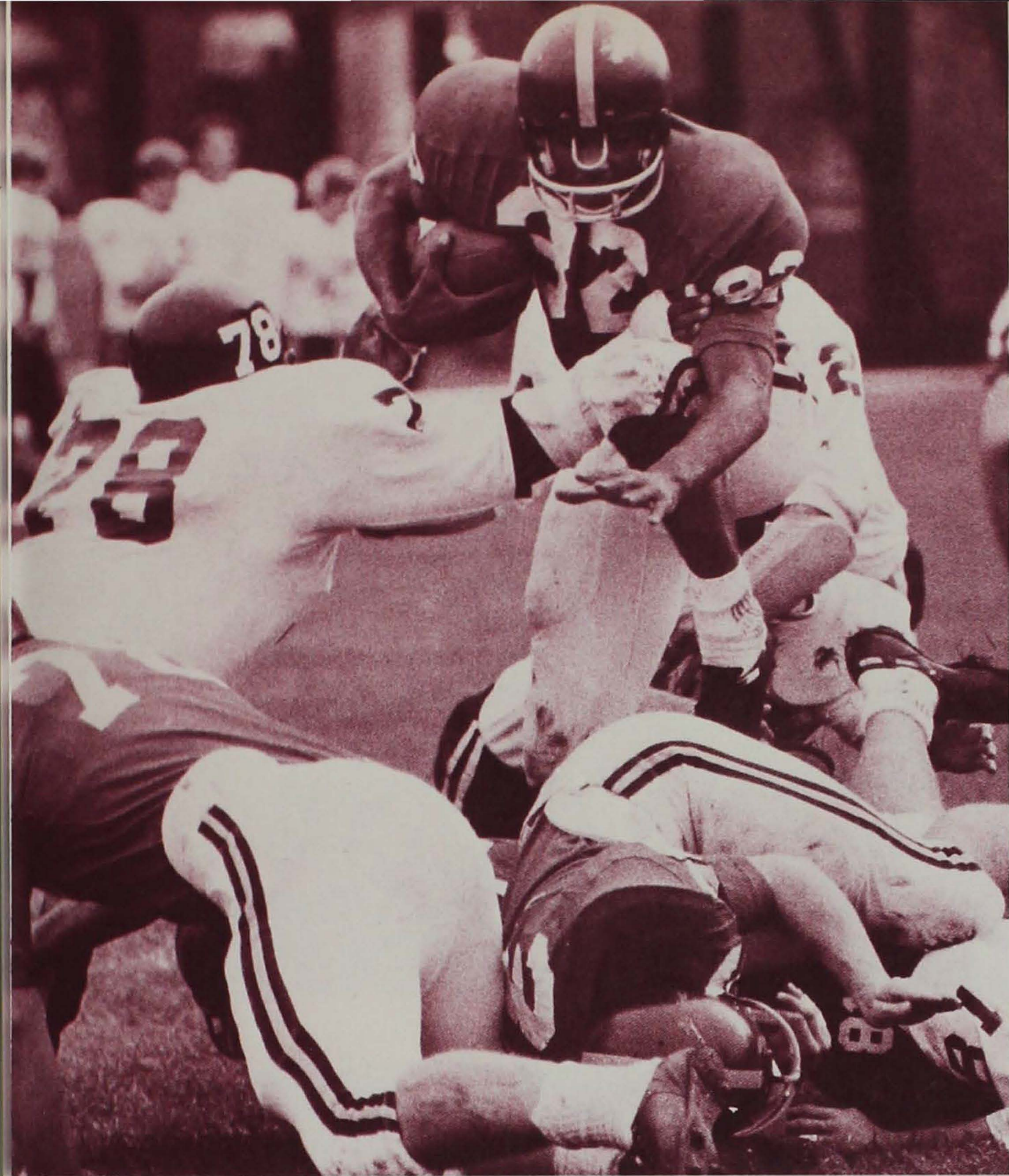
Freshman football gives the young Cyclones a chance to adjust to Big 8 competition. It's a difficult transition to make and some who show good potential in high school never do meet the challenge.

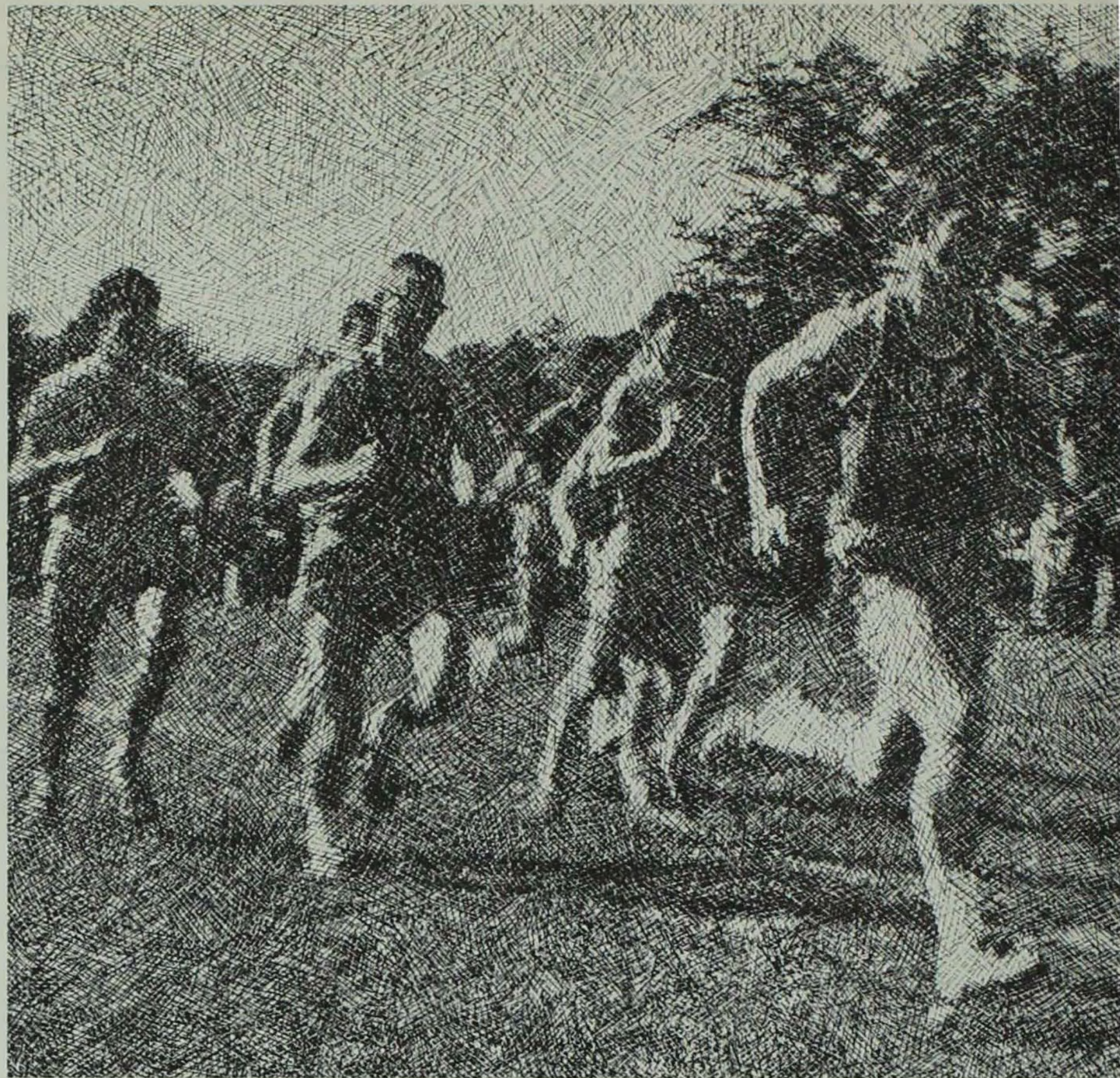

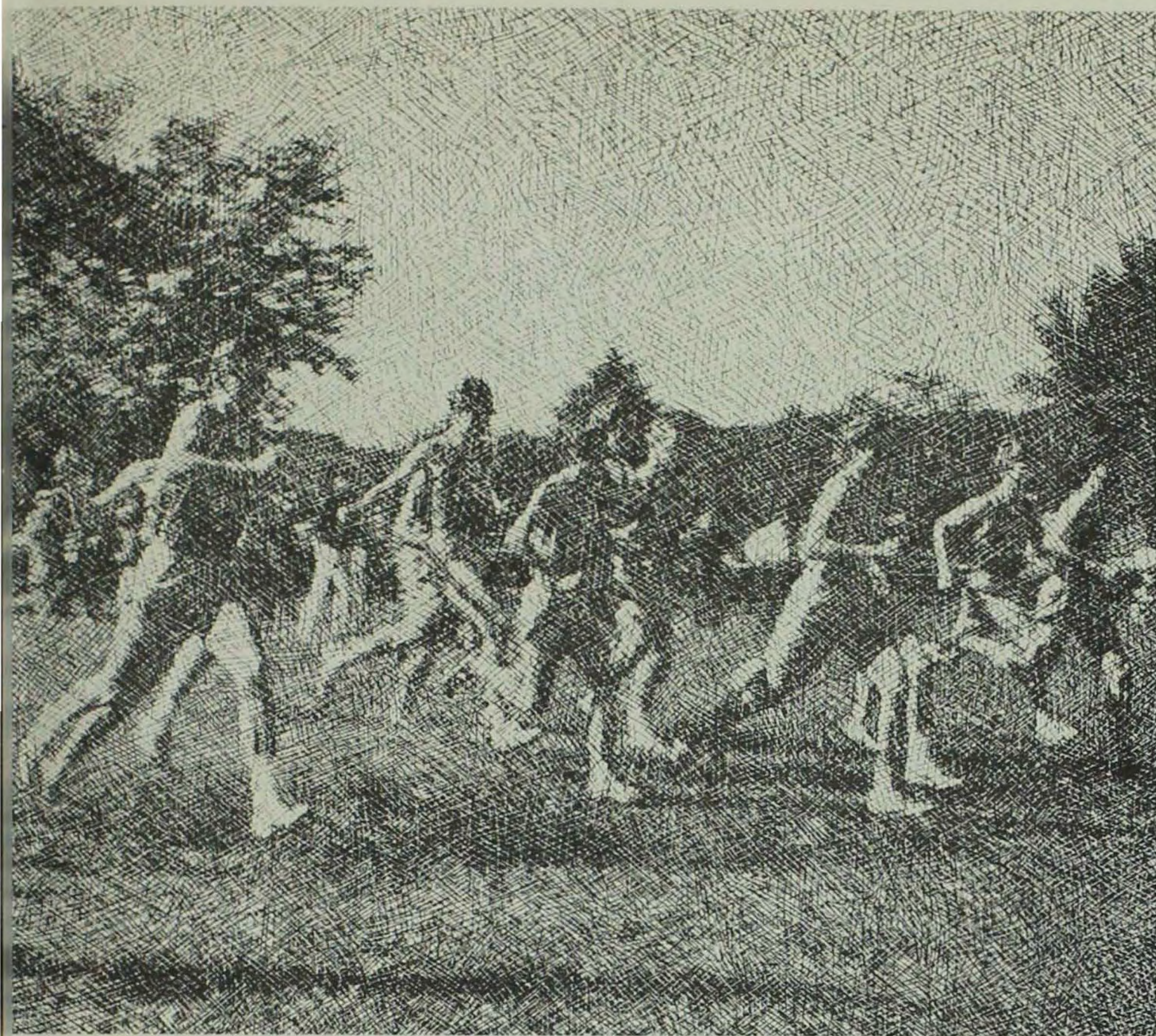

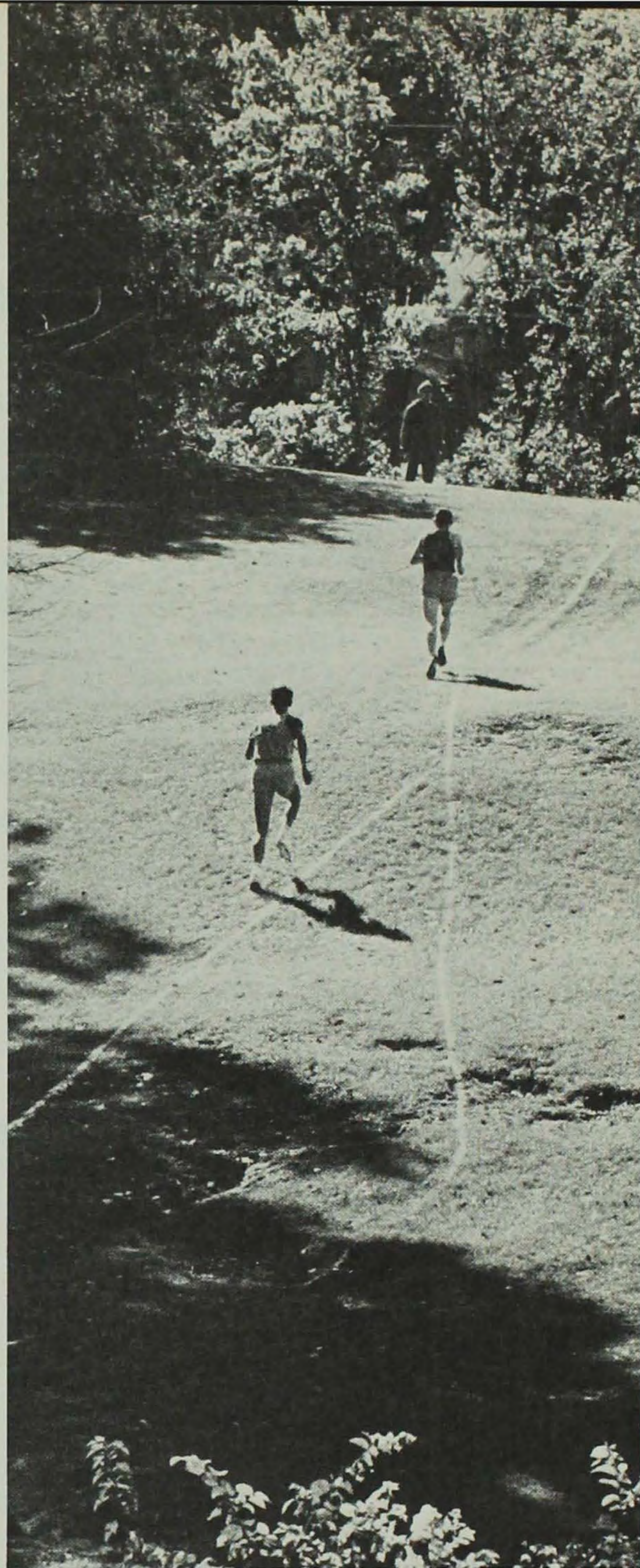

McGuire was the only cross country runner to qualify for the 70 and 71 NCAA meet.

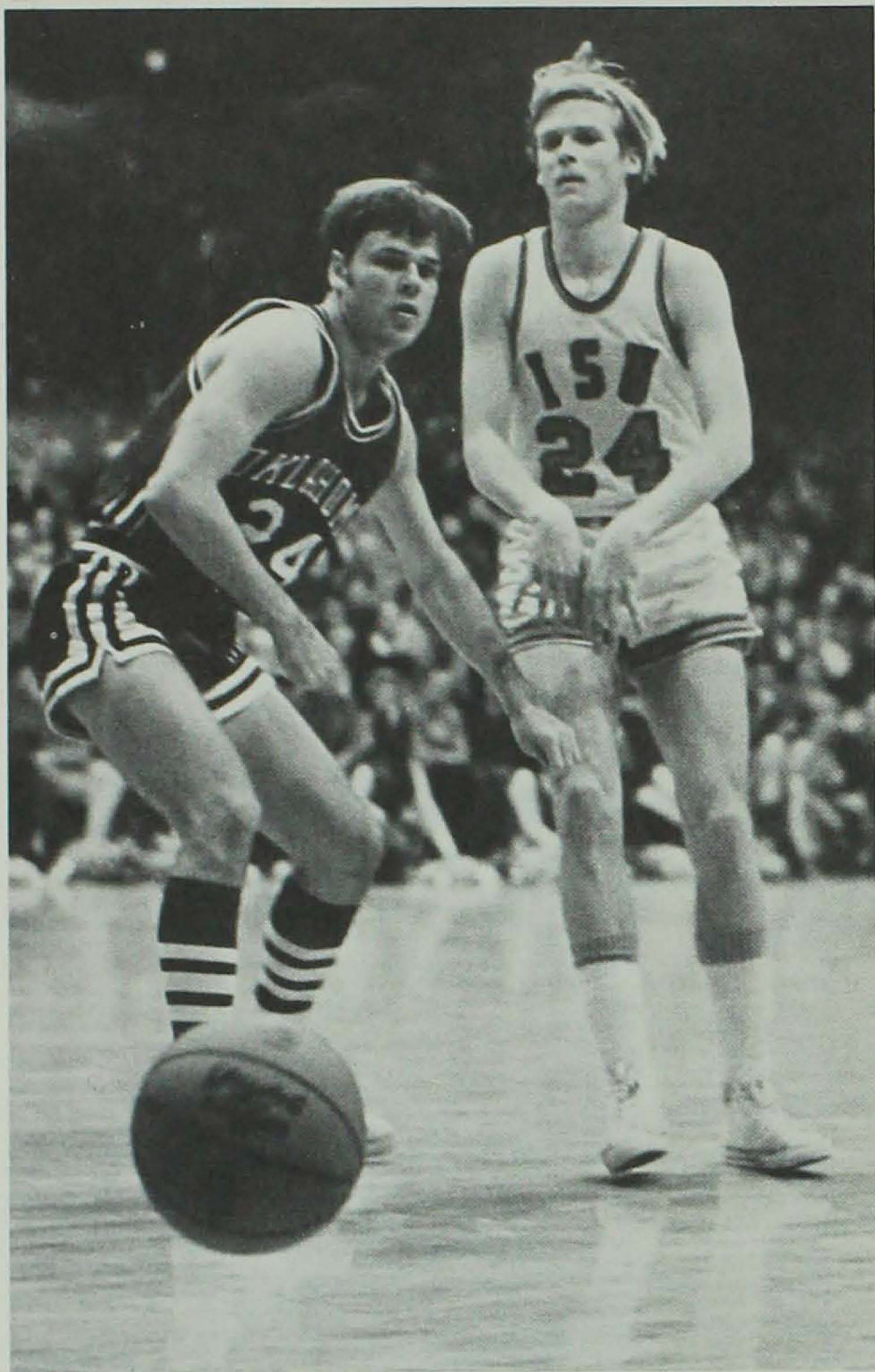




Two time All American Dennis McGuire.

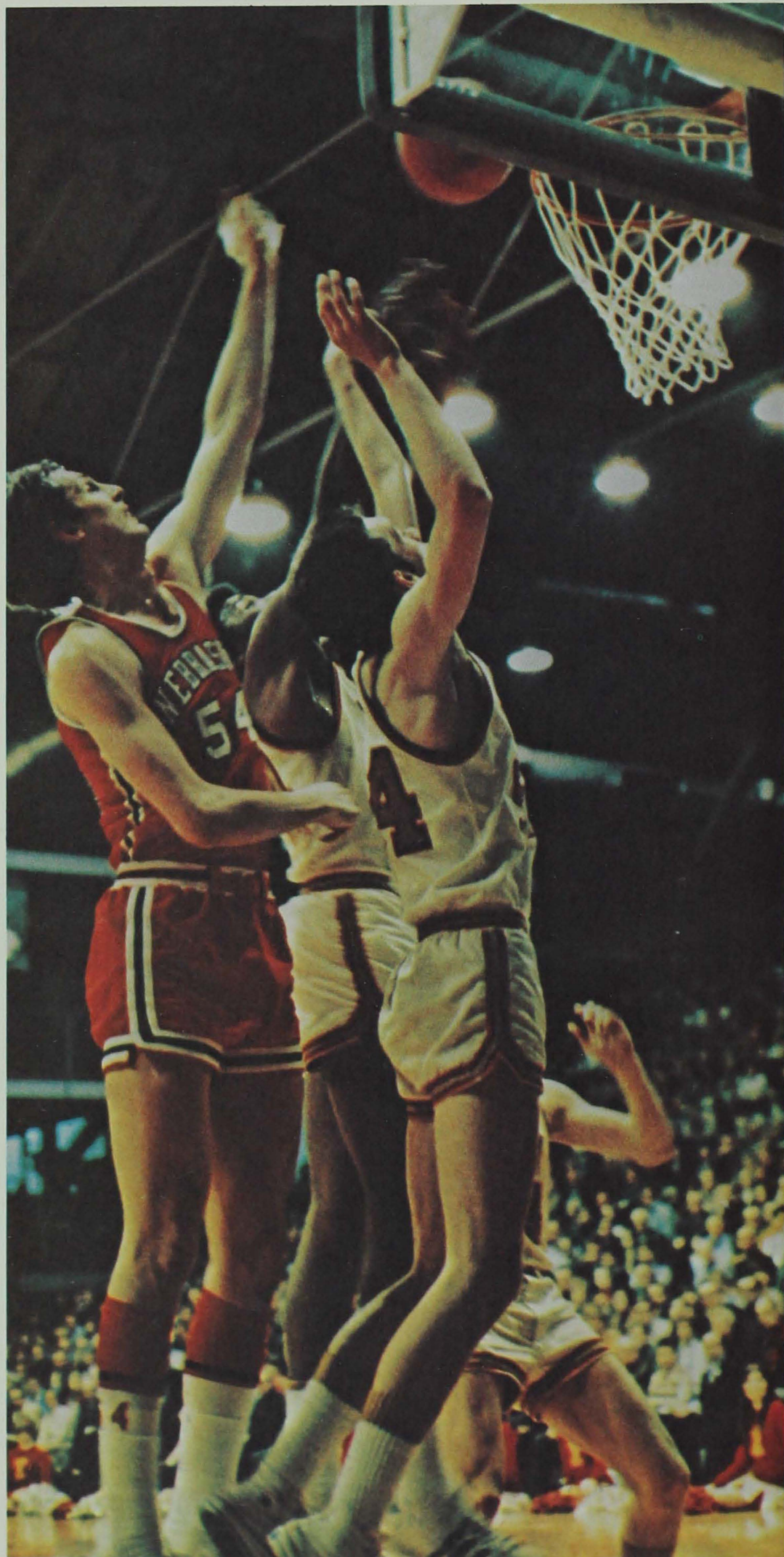


A bird's-eye view of a typical cross country course.

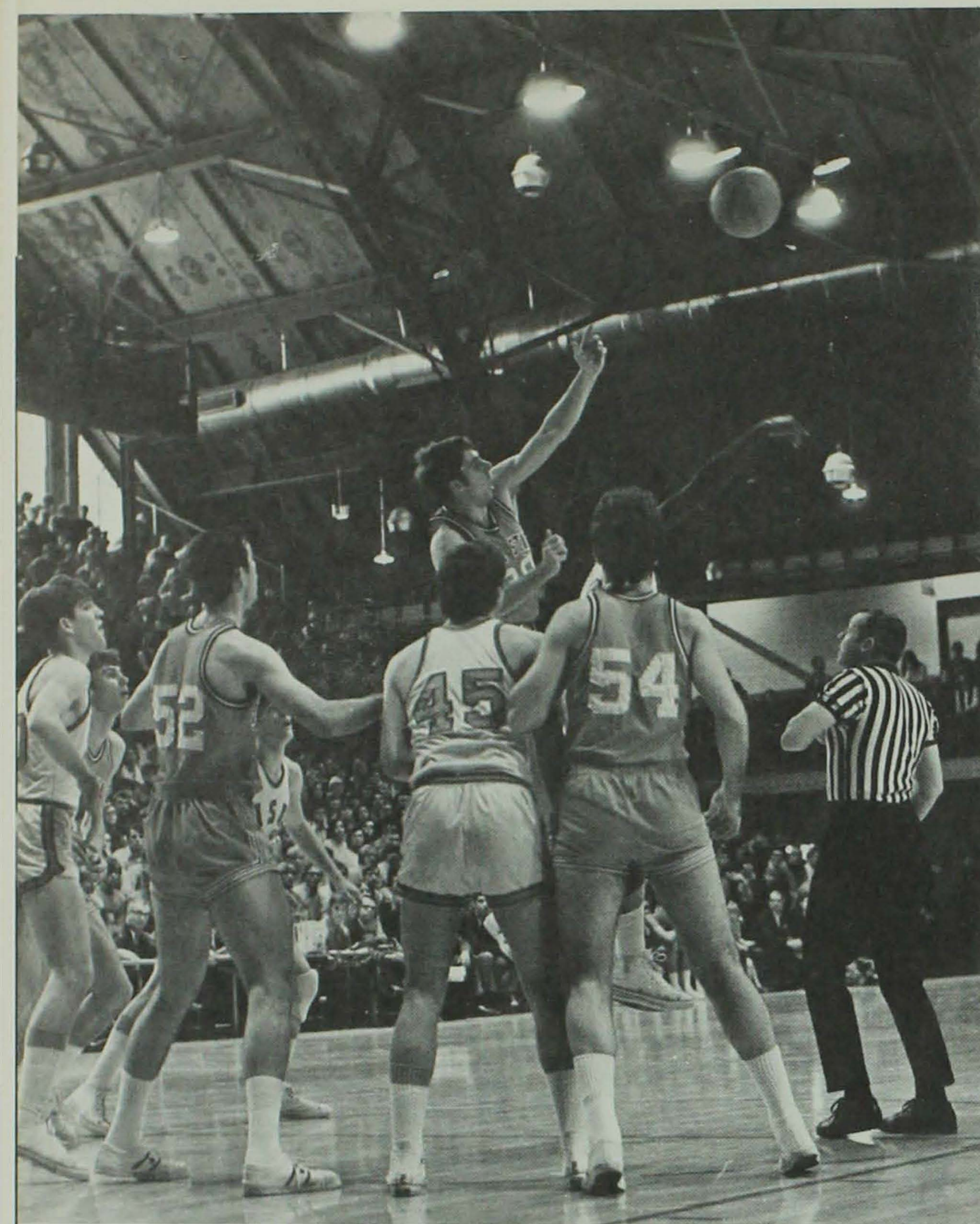

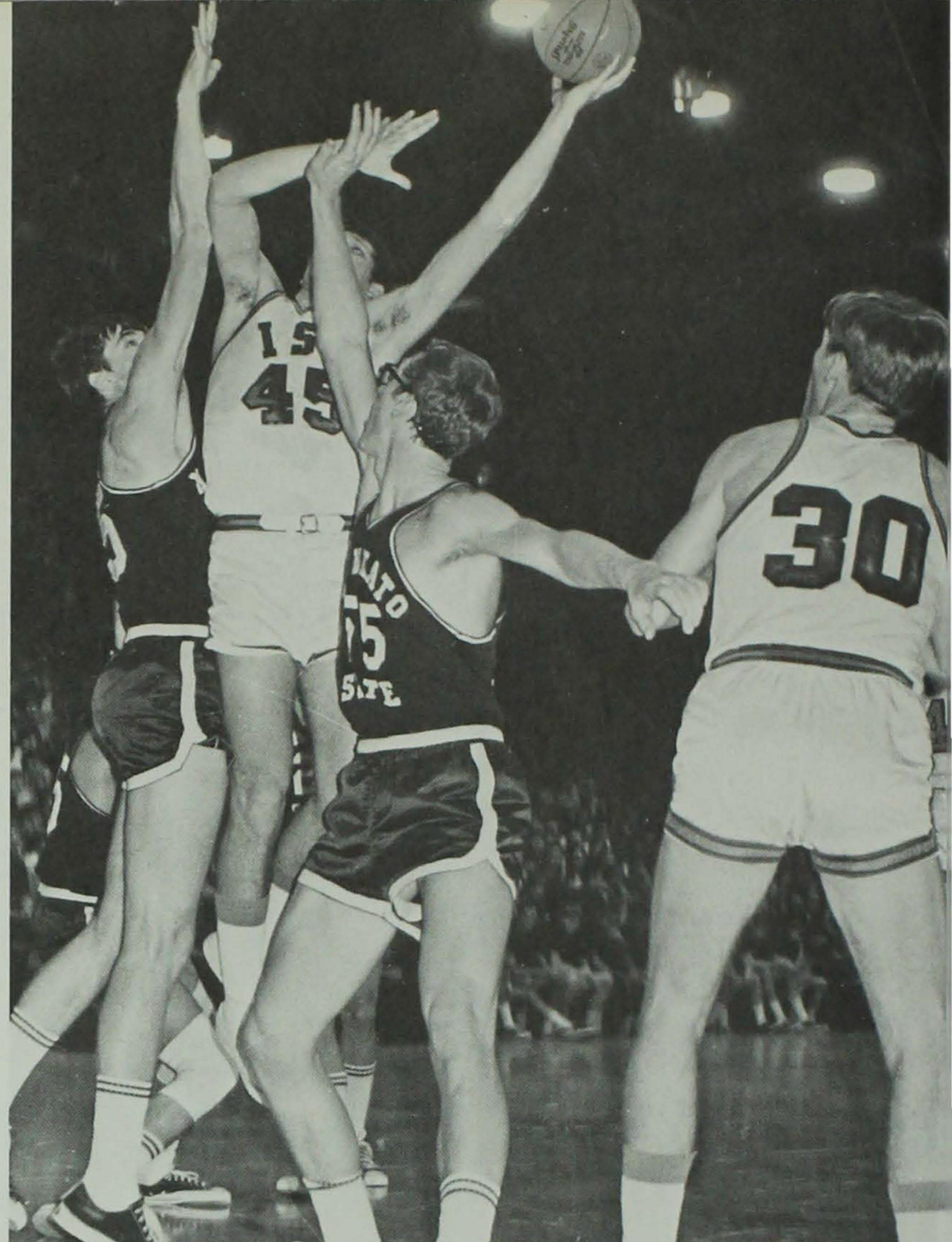

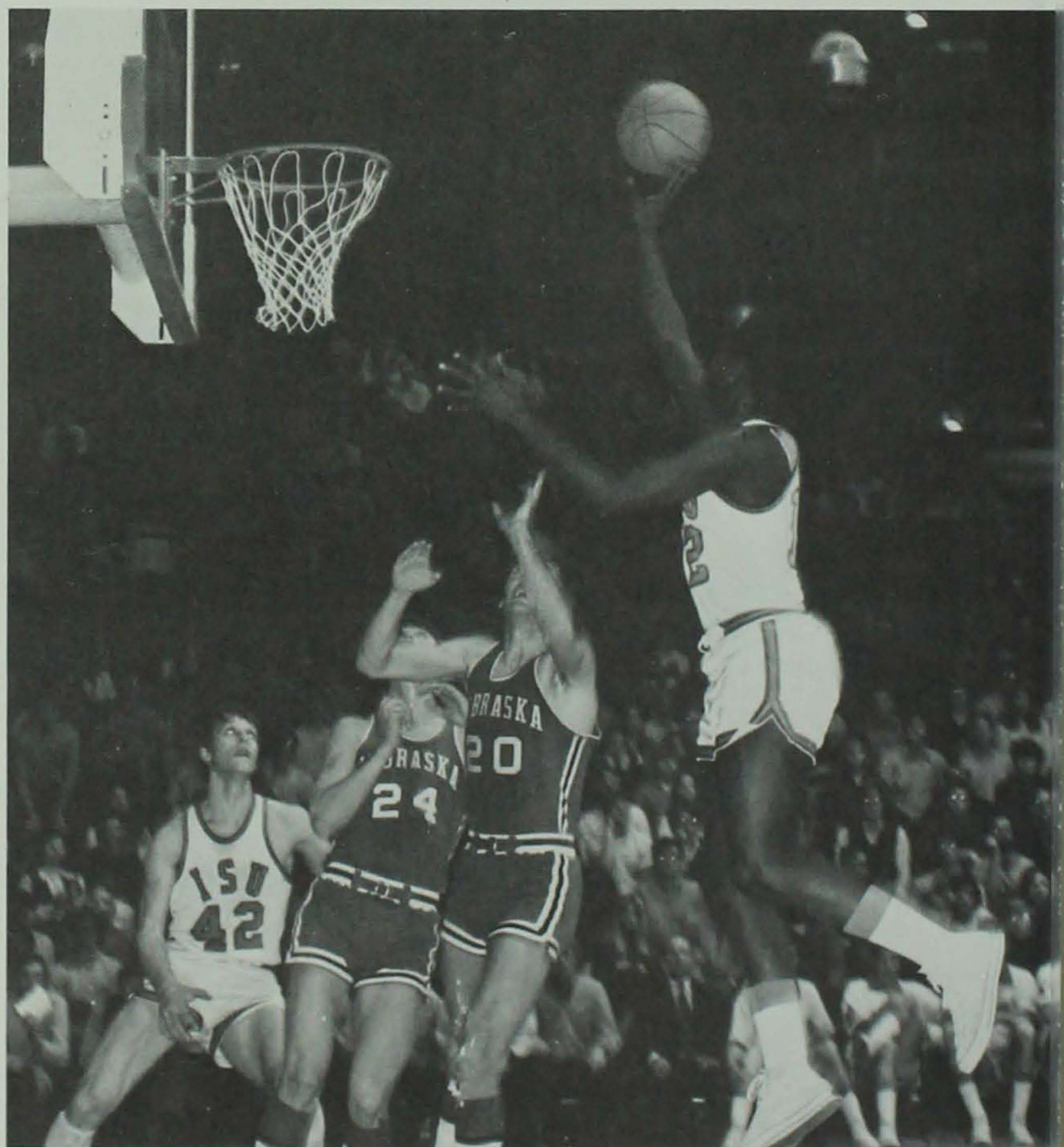

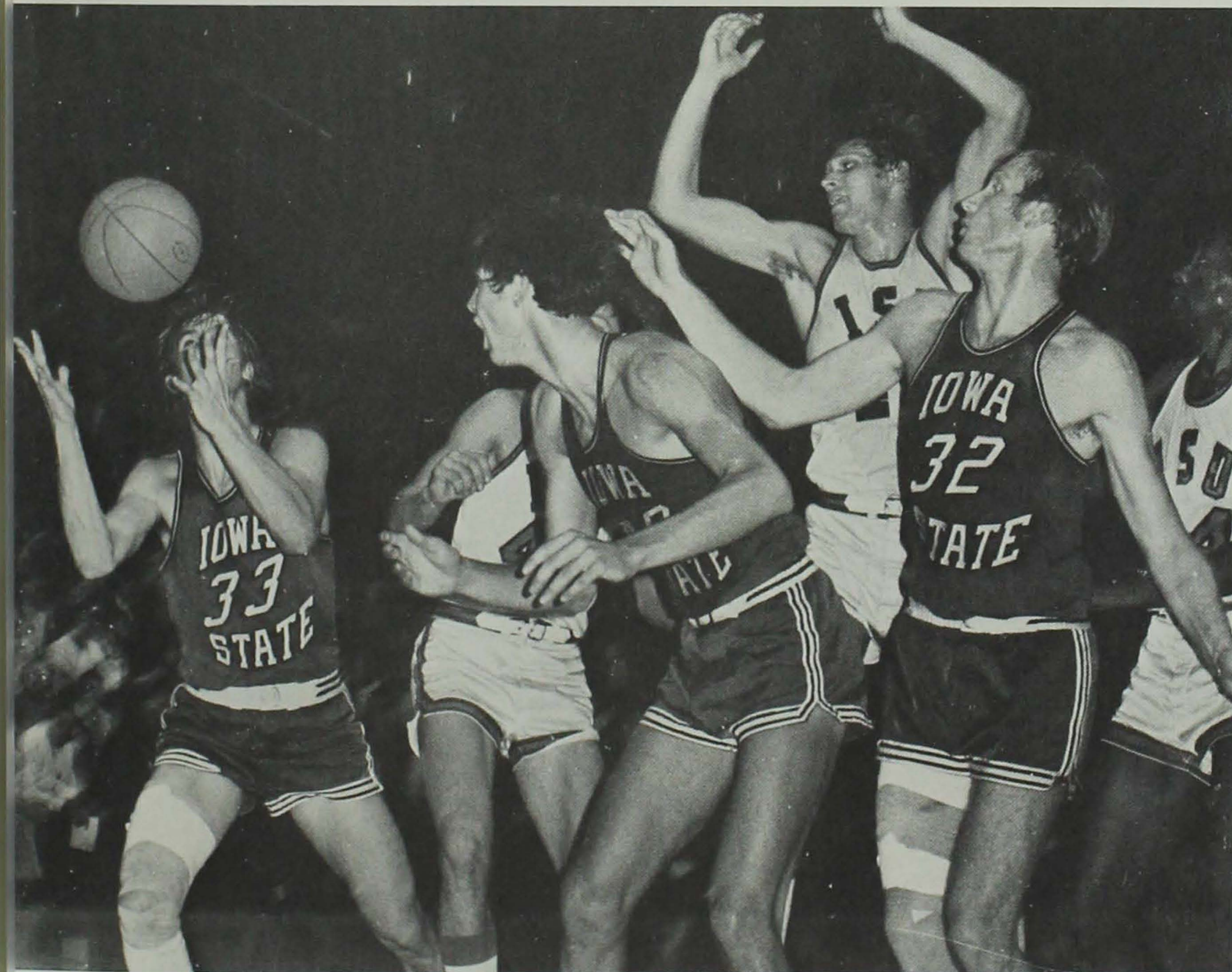
All in all, the young Cagers had an excellent season showing the progress and skill that will be an asset to next year's varsity team.



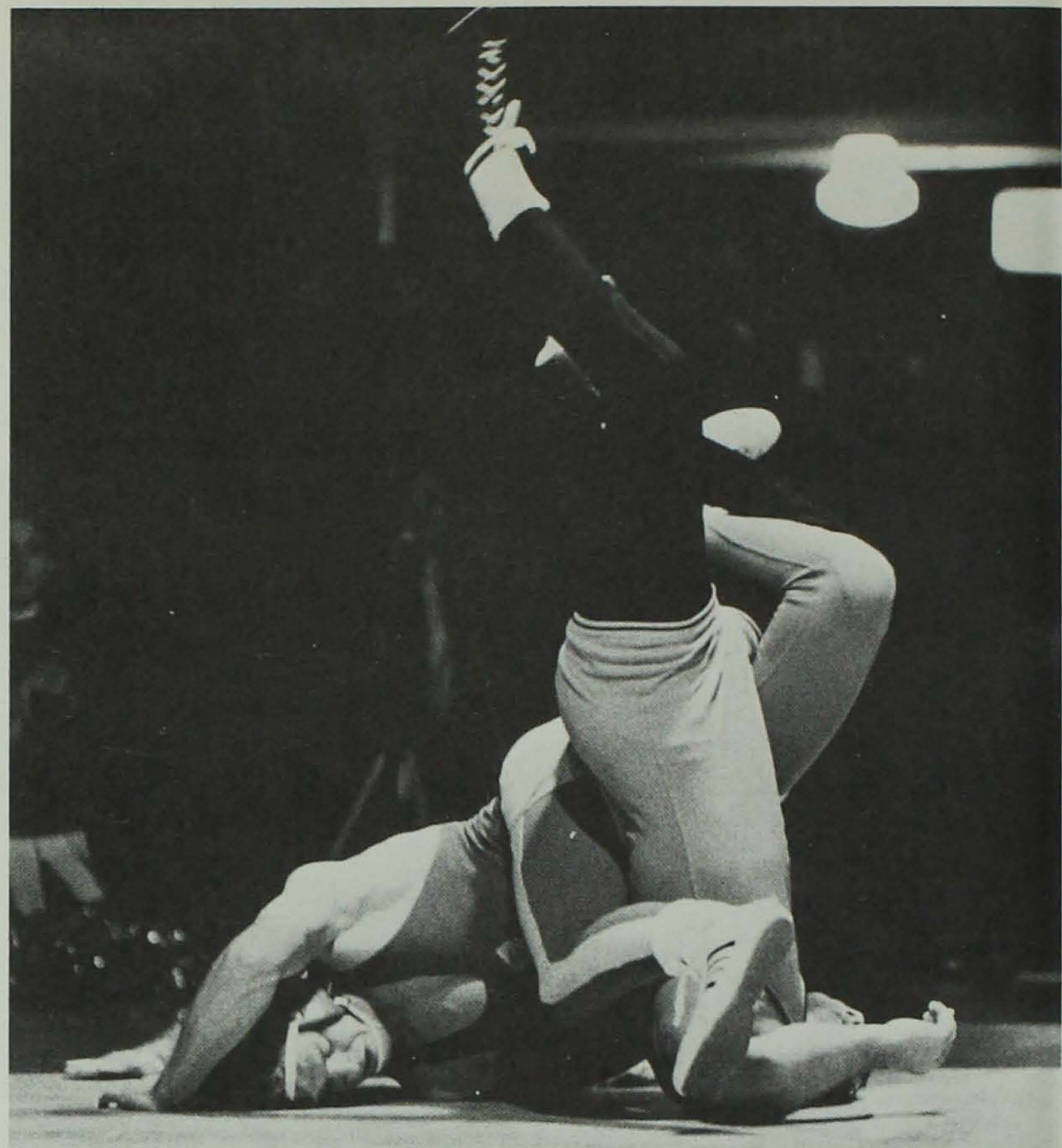

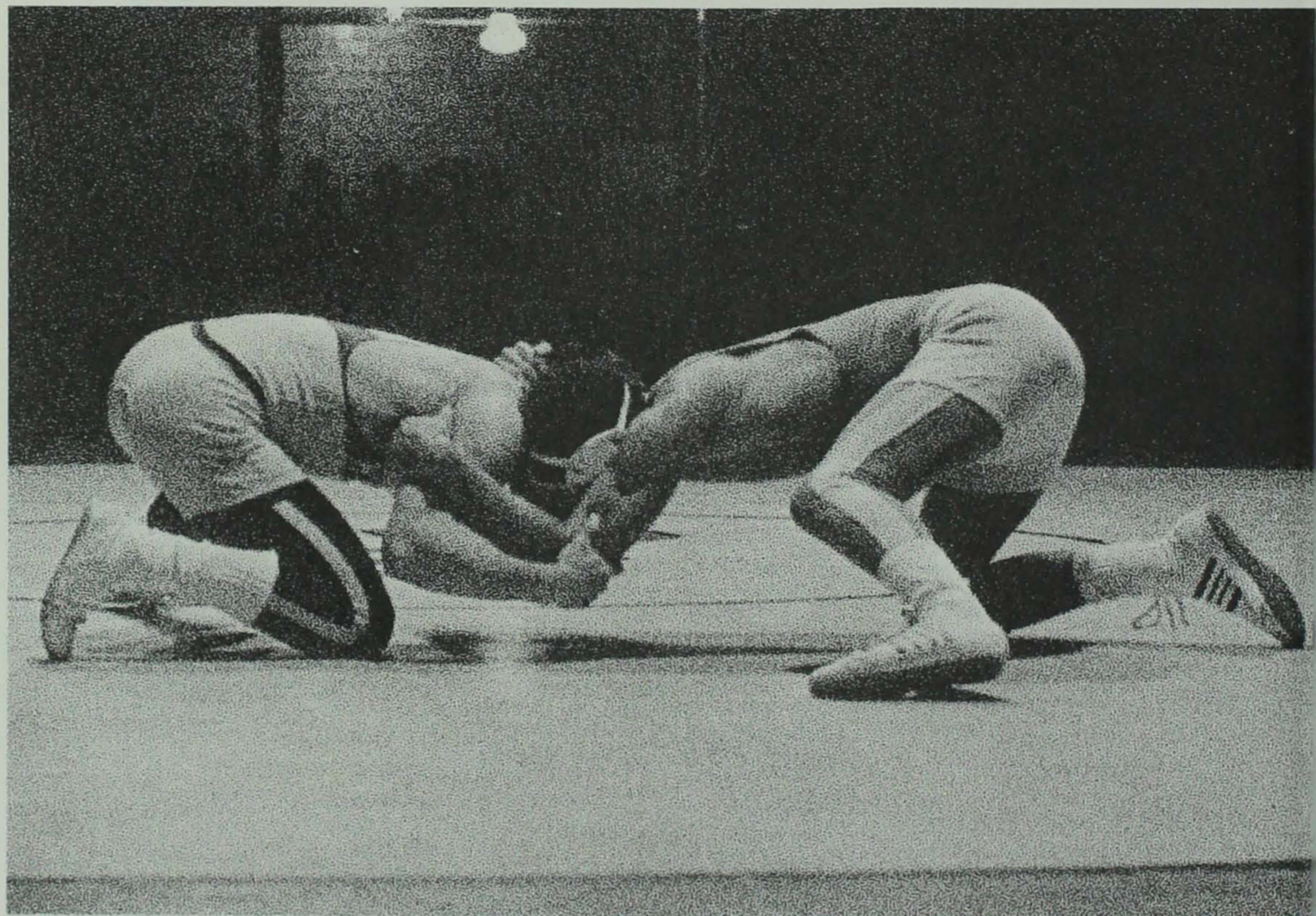

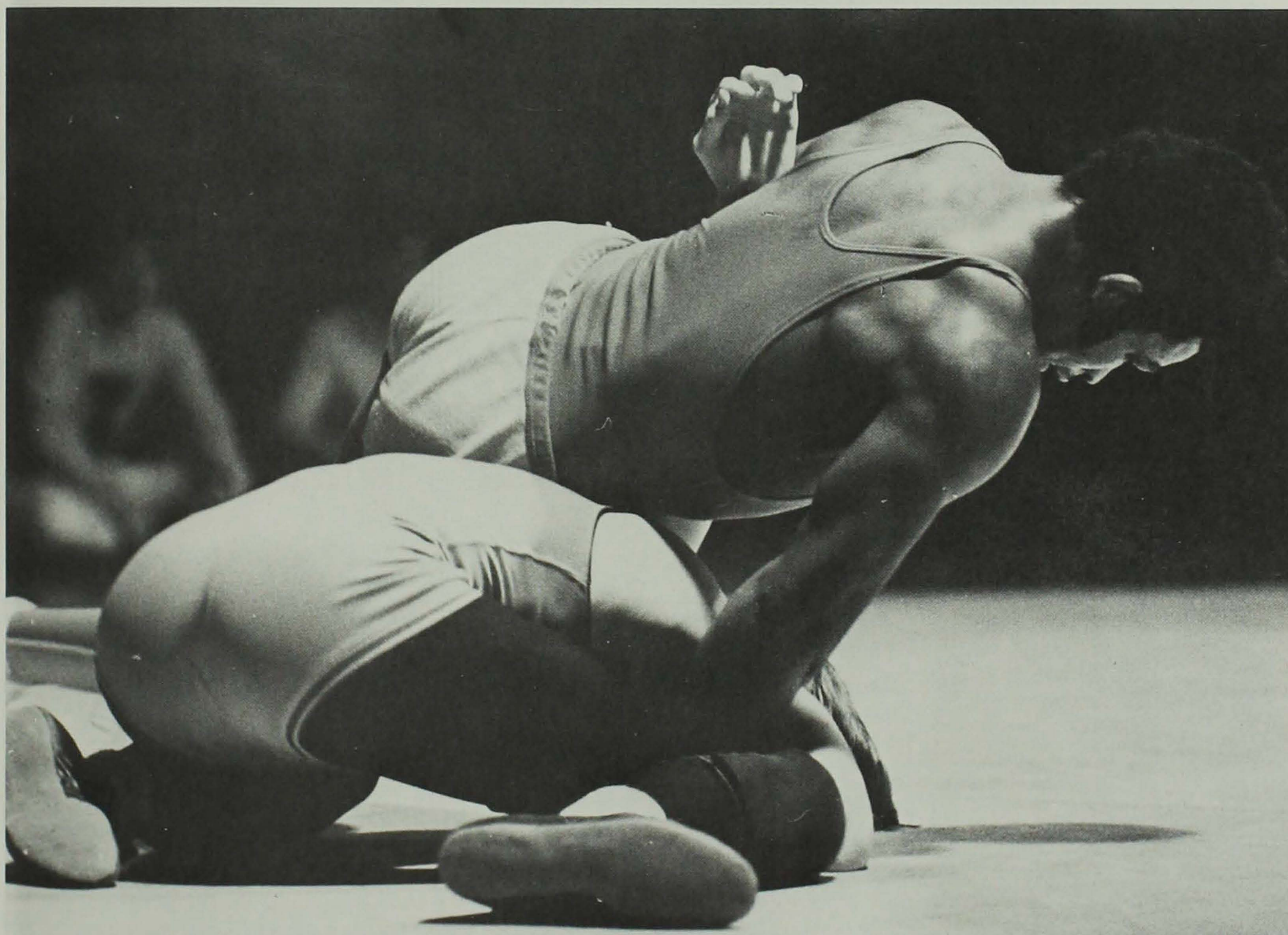
Iowa State won 1970 National Collegiate Athletic Association wrestling tournament at Evanston, Illinois. The meet had over 90 teams with a total of over 500 wrestlers. Three individual championships were brought home along with the team victory. Dave Martin won the 158 pound title, Chuck Jean won the 177 pound championship and Jason Smith topped all comers at 167.

The biggest and most controversial upset of the year, or maybe of the decade, took place during the national tournament.

It was the championship round in the 142 pound weight class. Dan Gable who was undefeated in 181 previous matches walked out to the mat. His opponent was Larry Owings from the University of Washington. When the match was over, Owings had done the impossible by beating Dan Gable 13-11.

Iowa State Wrestling is rapidly forming a tradition of being outstanding. Each year they proved their superiority by winning the Big 8 Conference and the NCAA Championship. Although, they finished second in the Big 8 and NCAA Championship this year, it by no means diminishes the outstanding talent and skill demonstrated by the Iowa State wrestlers.

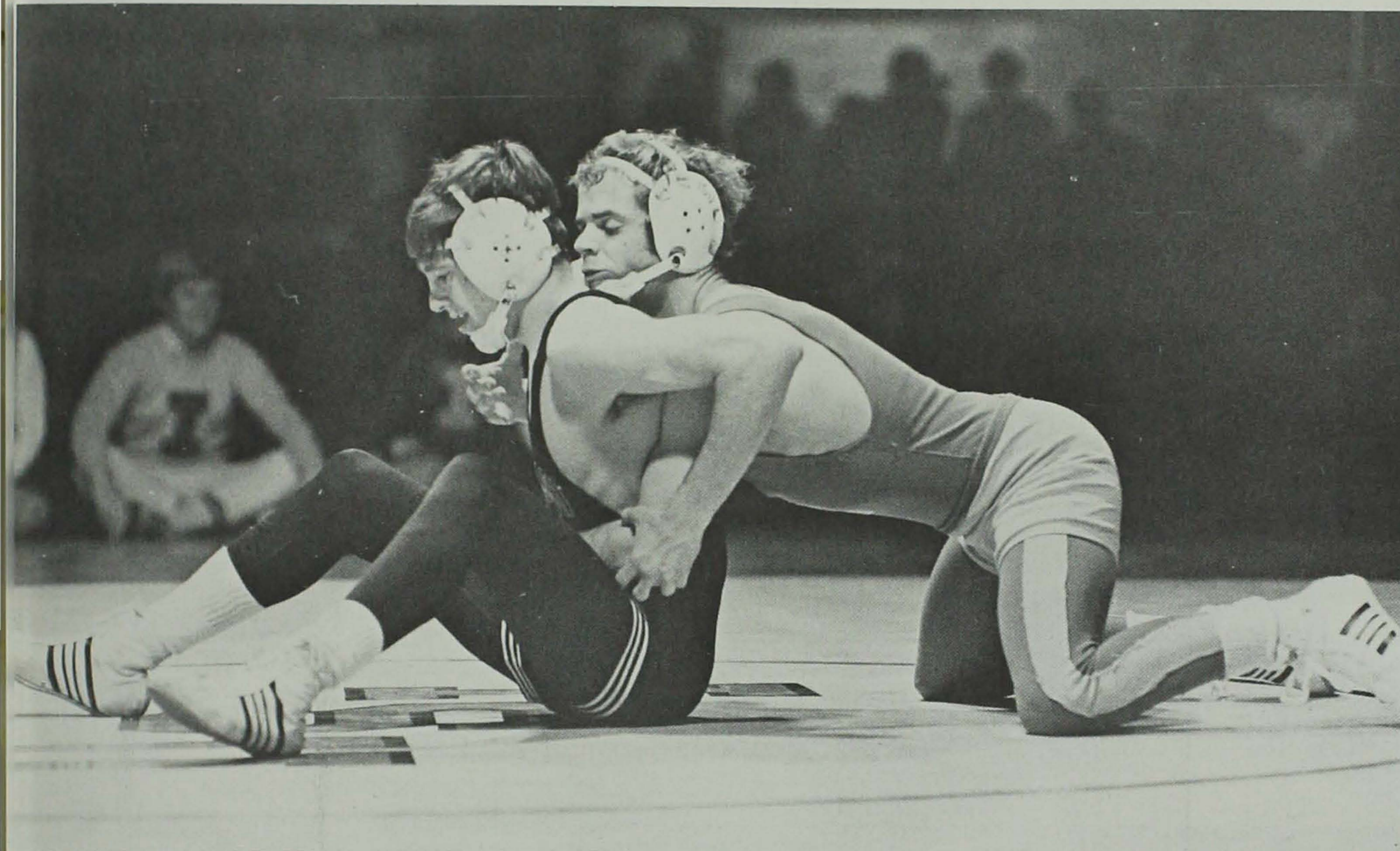

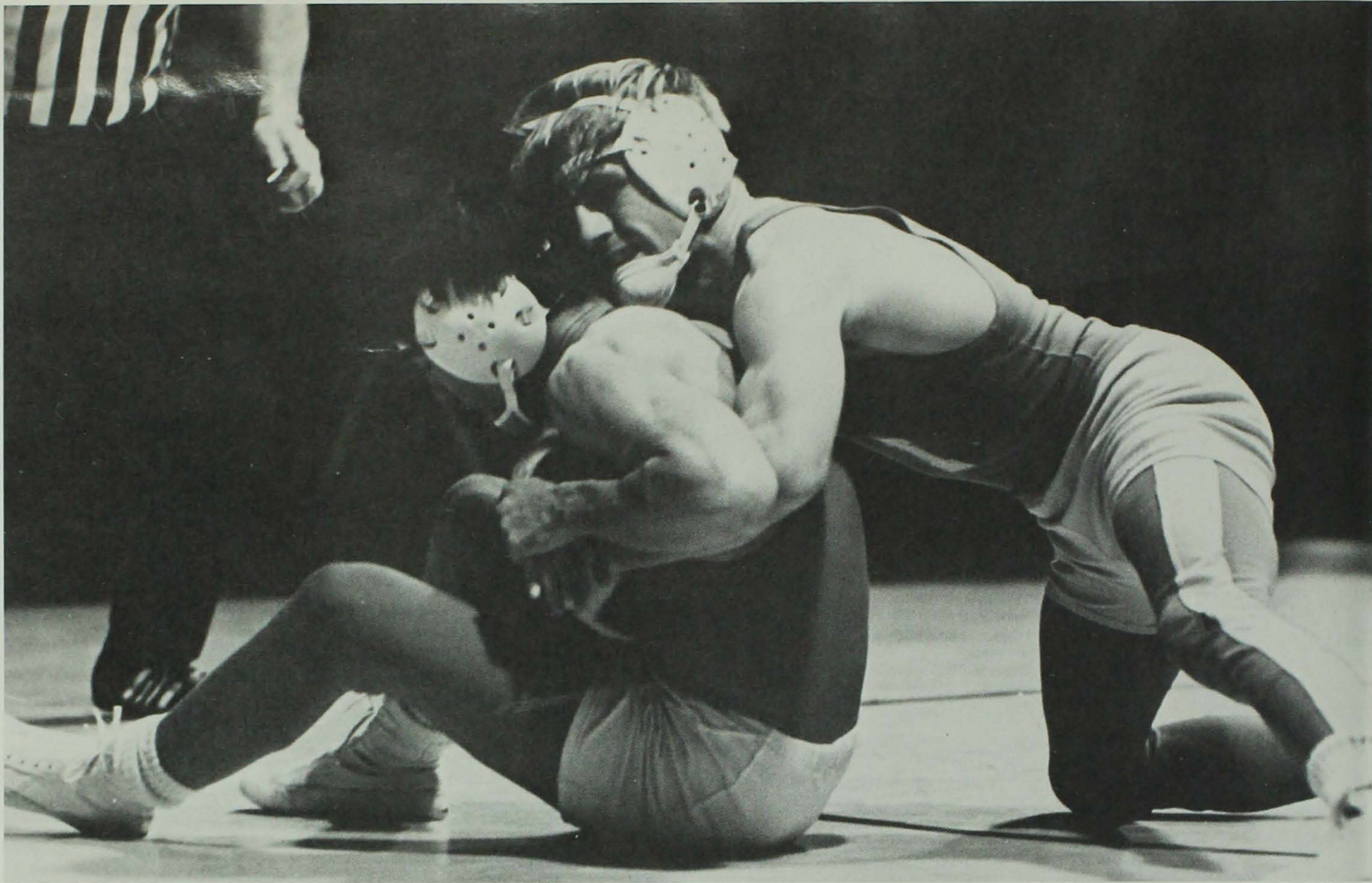

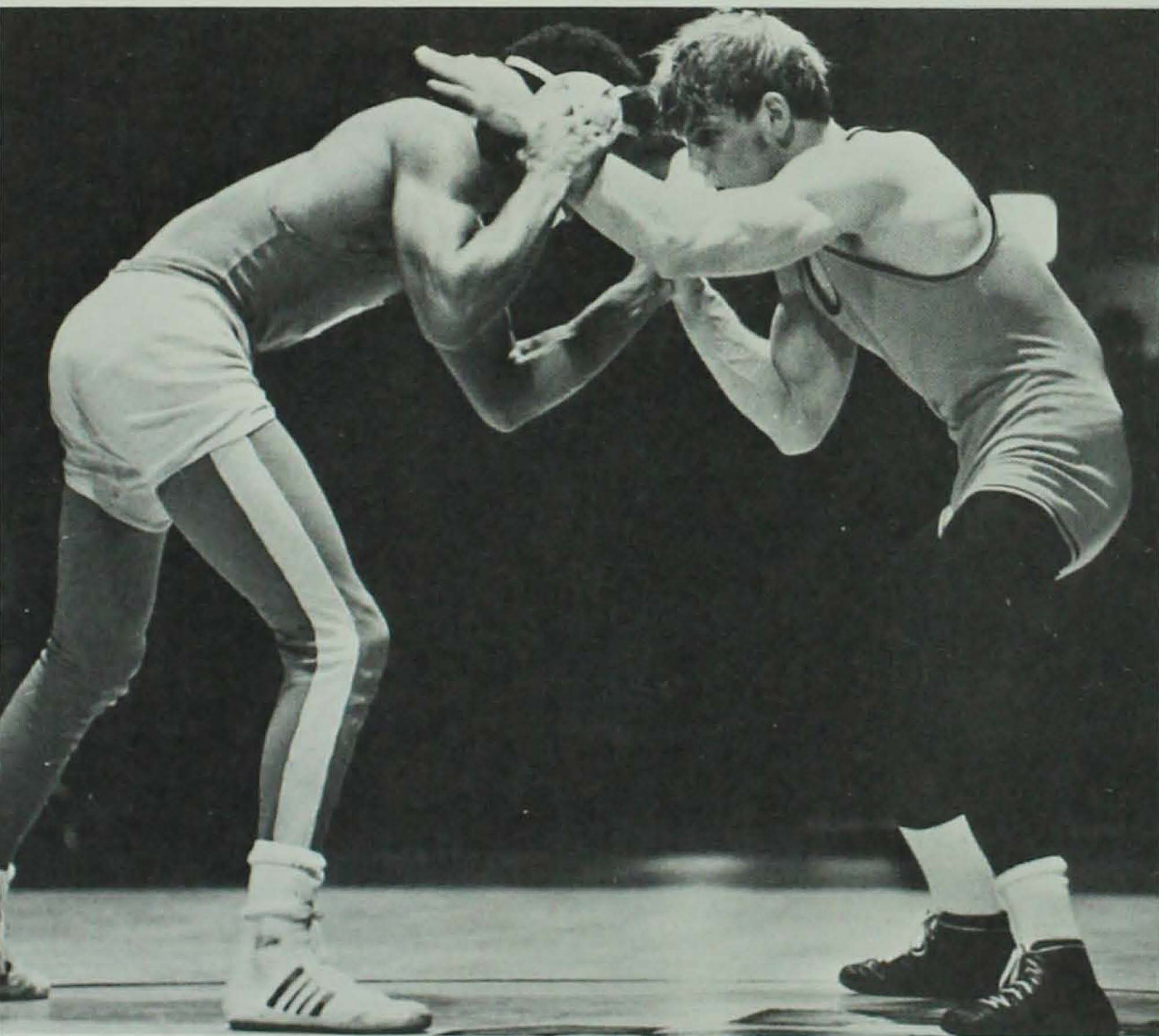

ISU won the Great Plains Tournament and the Midlands Tournament. They then went on to defeat Hofstra College, Bloomsburg State College and Lehigh University.



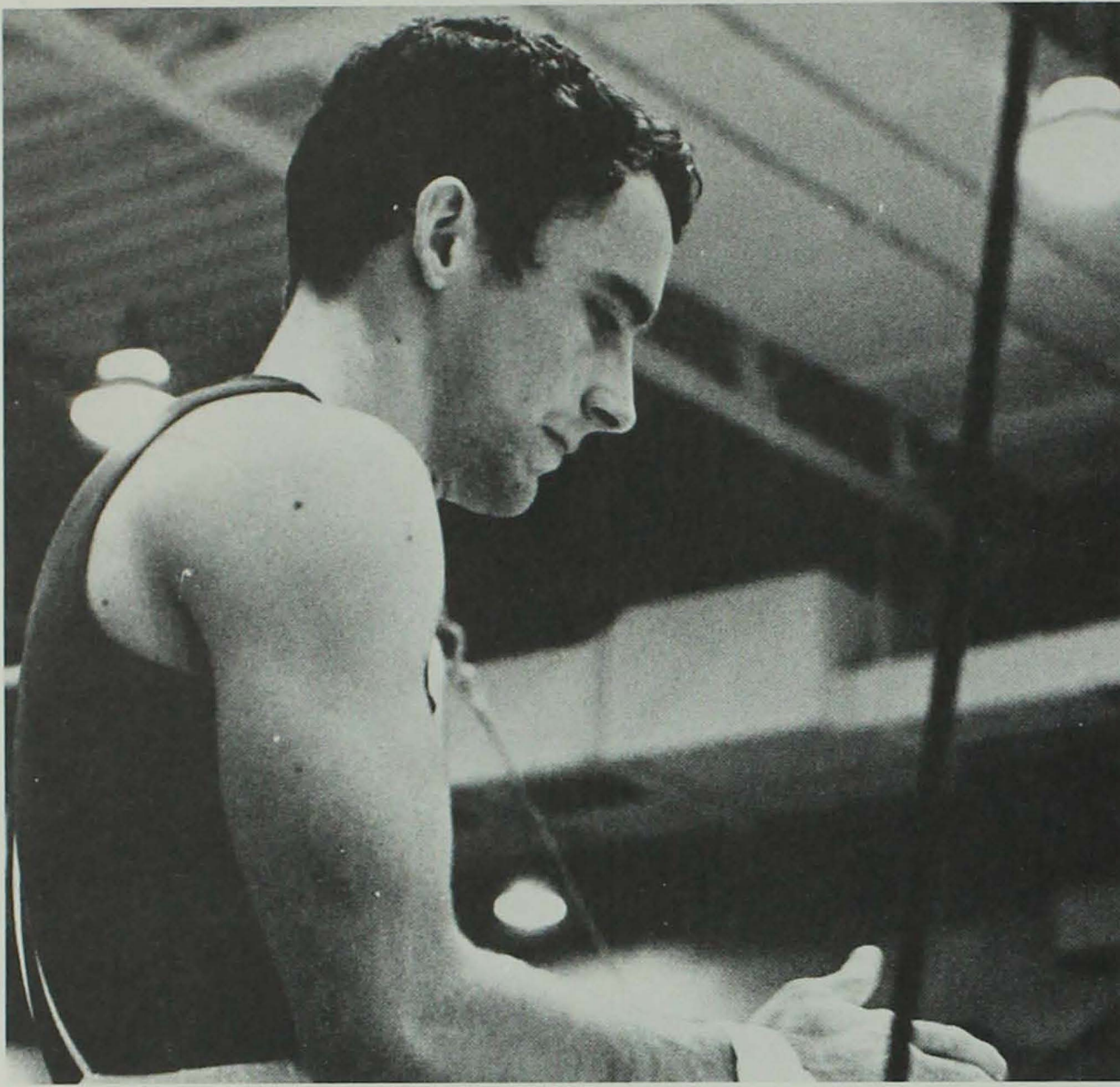

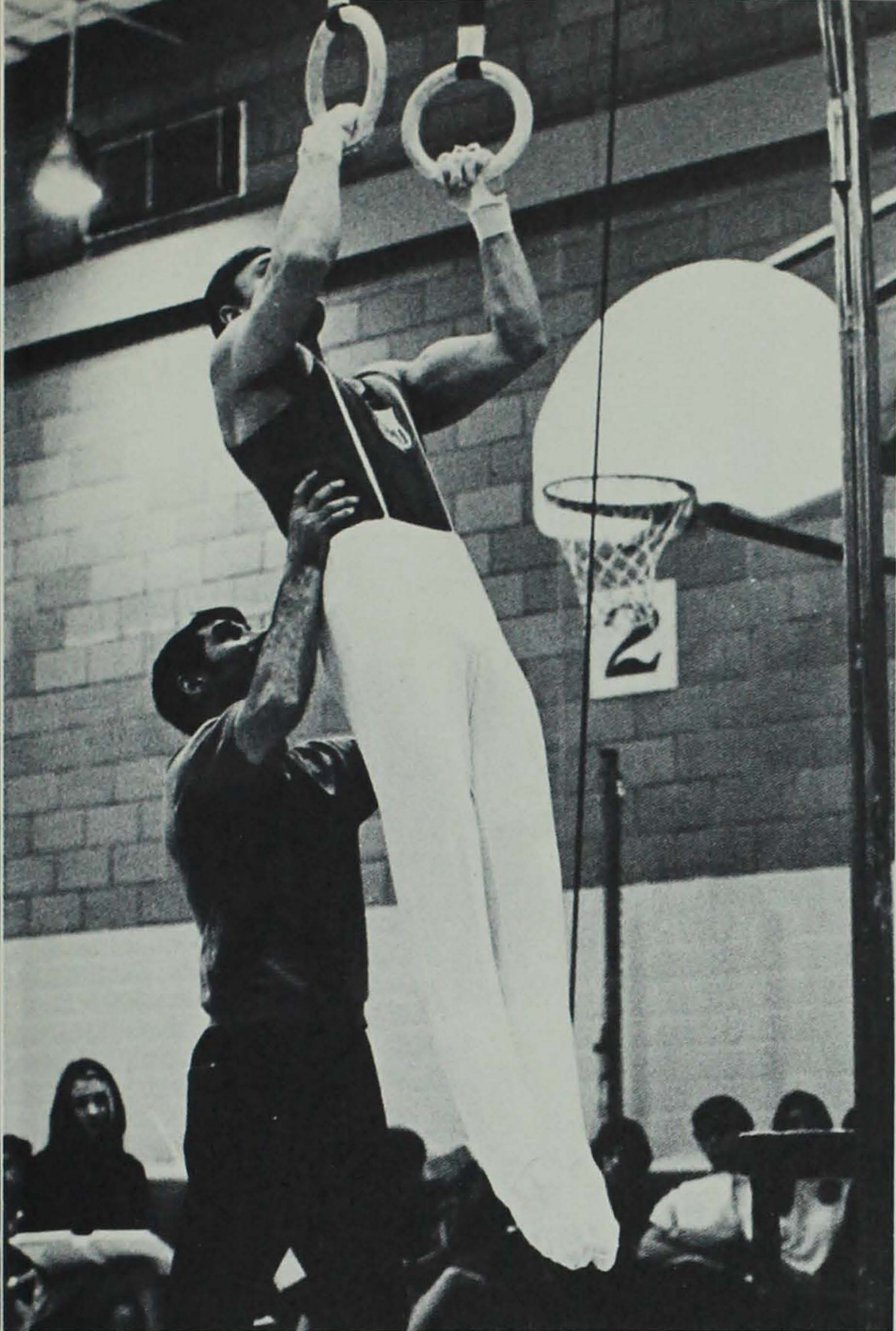

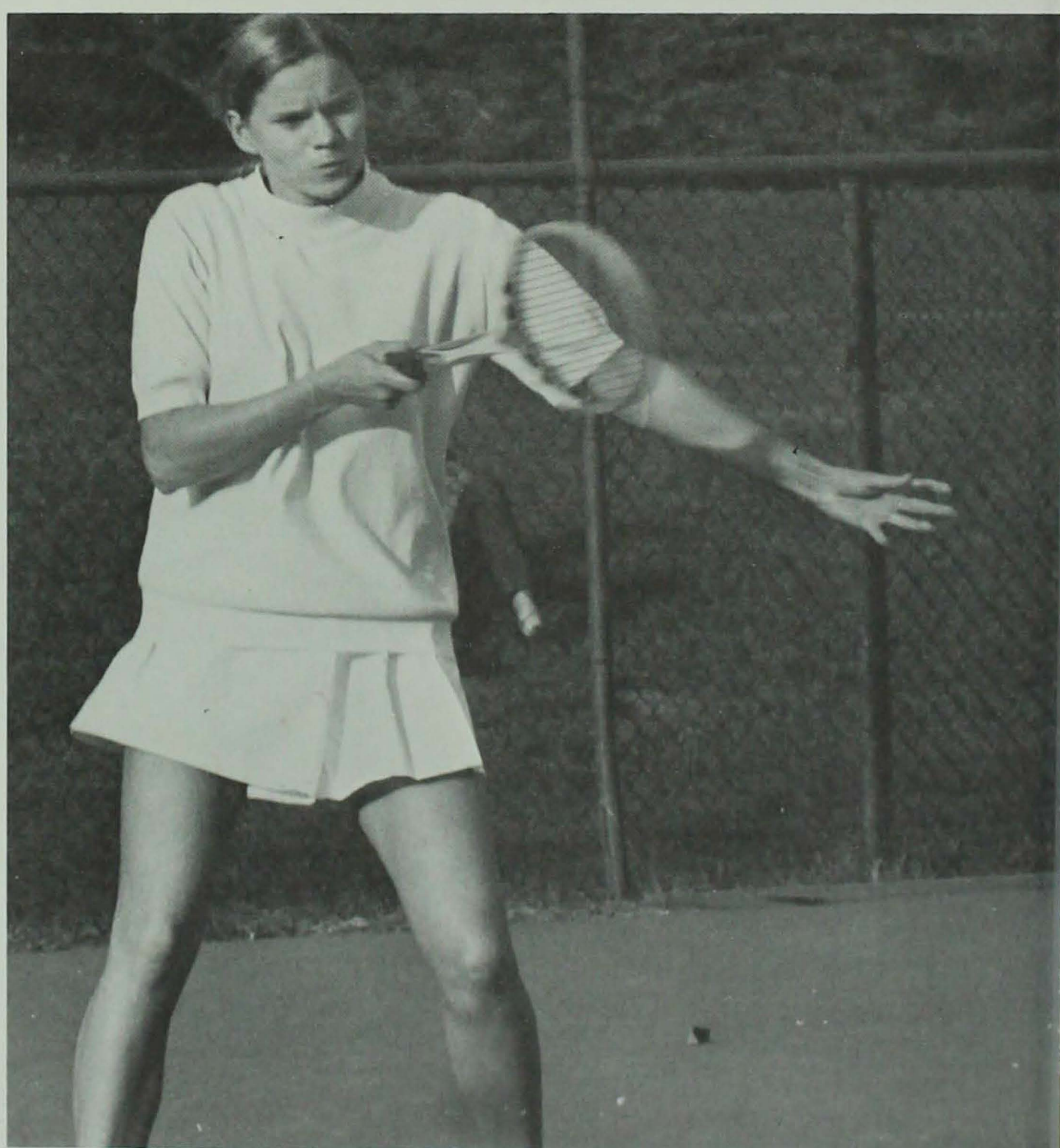

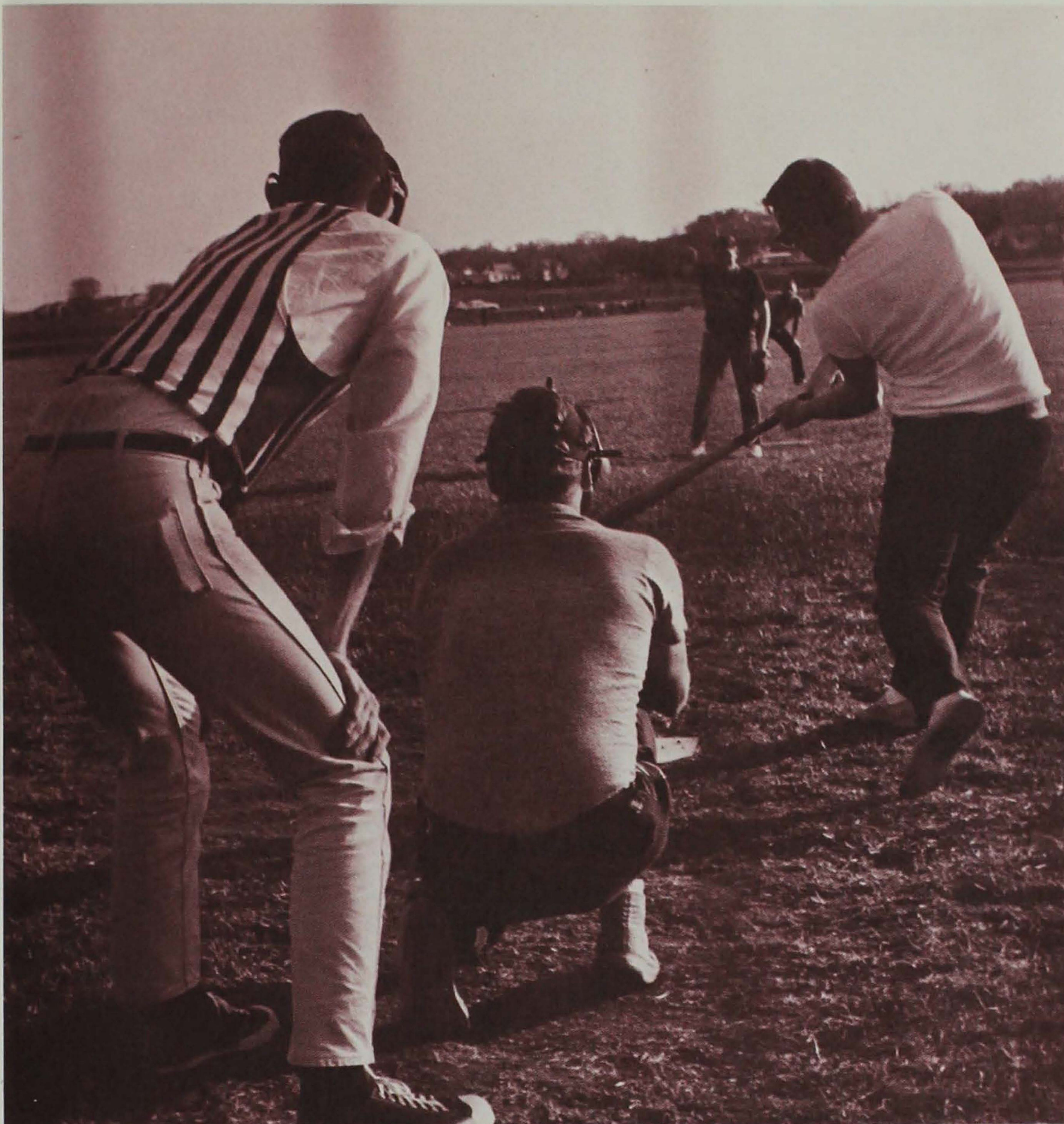
