Committee to review ISU policies on women

The newly-formed University Committee on Women, which will review university policies toward women students, faculty and staff personnel, outlined its goals, guidelines and responsibilities during its second meeting Thursday.

The committee was appointed by George Christensen, vice-president for academic affairs, and is chaired by Marguerite Scruggs, assistant dean of home economics.

The committee can only recommend policy and is not a grievance committee, Scruggs said. But students or university personnel are welcome to visit with the committee members on any problems concerning women in the university.

The committee's goal is to assemble factual material on policies regarding women and then recommend policy changes or new program initiation if there is a need for this action.

"The first step is to inform the people that we will receive their areas of concern," Scruggs said. Then the committee can act on these concerns if necessary.

The committee hopes to select an ombudsman or "ombudswoman" with whom to file complaints. The members want to find a way of letting as many

people know about them as possible. Participation is needed in order to find out if any problems about concerns of the committee exist on campus.

All nineteen members volunteered their help in any area they are interested or had experience in. These areas are divided according to students, academic and non-academic employment and the university community.

The five members belonging to the subcommittee of women student policies are: Cornelia Buck, textiles and clothing; Linda Burdette, D. St.; Mary Uban, Applied Art; Virginia Thomas, home economics education; and James Schwartz, journalism and mass communication.

These members will gather information about classes that may bar women, policies of placement services and living conditions, salaries and wages. These are only a few of the suggested areas of review, but none of these areas are necessarily problem areas according to Scruggs.

Members of the subcommittee concerned with women academic employment are: Carol Meeker, a graduate student; Marita Jones, Dean of students office; Elizabeth Windsor, library; Edwin Lewis, psychology; and Clifford Smith, industrial education.

Responsibilities of this area include investigation of such things as the active

recruitment and retention of women, salaries, maternity leave and fringe benefits.

The committee on non-academic policies for women are: Joanna Anderson, from the personnel office; Anna Lee Morrison, from the printing department; Vivian Murray, residence halls dietician, Warren Madden, assistant vice-president for business and finance; and John Pesek, agronomy. These members will also look into recruitment, salaries, benefits and other areas of non-academic women employees.

Rowena James from the I.S.U. Press; Margaret Johnson, foreign languages; Ann Weir, a graduate student; and Ronald Powers, family environment, are members who will investigate the university community. They will look into participation of women on standing committees and policy making groups and administrative appointments besides others.

Miscellaneous areas of study, including facilities, and day care services will be assigned to committees at a later date.

Any other areas of concern will be welcomed by the committee from students and university personnel, Scruggs said.
