# Human sexuality symposium set at ISU Nov. 5-7

The fourth annual Human Sexuality Symposium will feature a full schedule of guest speakers, workshops, and informal discussions in Iowa State University's Memorial Union, Nov. 5-7.

The three-day program, is co-sponsored by the symposium committee and the ISU Lectures Committee.

Purpose of the event, the symposium committee reports, is to provide a forum in which responsible information, a consideration of human values, and open, sensitive dialogue contribute to the total educational experience at the university.

Five guest speakers will lead workshops and lectures on various areas of human sexuality.

Gerhard Neubeck, professor of family social science, Family Study Center, University of Minnesota, is the featured speaker Tuesday, Nov. 5. Neubeck, who has published numer-

ous articles in the areas of marriage, family relations, and human sexuality, will speak at 8 p.m. in Great Hall. Earlier in the day, he will direct two workshops, at 9 a.m. and 3 p.m., both in the Gallery.

A physician on the John Hopkins Hospital staff in Baltimore, Md., Claus Wiedeking, will lecture at 8:15 p.m., Wednesday, in Great Hall. Wiedeking, whose areas of research and interest include gender identification, hermaphroditism, and sex education, will also lead workshops at 9:30 a.m. and 3 p.m., Wednesday, in the Gallery.

The author of a forthcoming book on human sexuality, Pepper Schwartz, will speak at 8 p.m., Thursday in Great Hall. Schwartz, an assistant professor of sociology at the University of Washington, Seattle, will also lead an informal discussion at 2 p.m., Thursday, in the Gallery.

Other visiting speakers will include Betty Ebert, field coordinator and

board member of the Nation Prison Center in Iowa City, and Tom Maurer, lecturer and counselor in the program in human sexuality at the University of Minnesota Medical School.

One panel, of interest to parents and parents-to-be, on sex and your children, will be discussed by Rev. Gary Putnam, Collegiate United Methodist Church; Hester Fassel, assistant professor of zoology and entomology at ISU; William McCormick, Ames pediatrician; and Larry Zwagerman, counselor in the Ames school system, at 4:30 p.m., Wednesday, in the Sun Room.

Others participating in the workshop sessions are Betty Toman, ISU dance coordinator and professor of physical education; Phyllis Lepke, ISU instructor of dance, Kay L. Carey, women's health coordinator, campus YWCA; Terry Jones, ISU office of student life; and Joe Franko, a Des Moines cab driver.
