No sex bias shown

Senior women at Iowa State last year did not think they were discriminated against, according to a report given at the Monday meeting of the University Council on Student Affairs (CSA).

CSA members asked graduating senior women to fill out a questionnaire last spring concerning sex discrimination at Iowa State. Robin Murray, assistant director of admissions and records, presented a preliminary report on the survey to the CSA which indicated a majority of those answering the survey said they had not experienced sex discrimination while attending Iowa State.

Of the 706 questionnaires sent.

to graduating women, 193 were returned, or about 27 per cent, Murray said. In a survey of this type a 10 per cent return is considered good, she added.

IN OTHER business, Vice-President for Student Affairs Wilbur Layton reported a "significant" increase in the enrollment of new minority students at Iowa State. He said about 75 new undergraduate minority students are enrolled, and about 30 new graduate minority students are enrolled this year.

Layton also reported that undergraduate enrollment had increased about 10 per cent from last year. He described the housing situation both on and off campus as "tight." The supply of housing in the Ames community has been decreasing in the past several years, he said.

This year CSA will study topics including student seating in the new football stadium, temporary student housing, student financial aids, funding of university lectures, use of the Iowa State Center, systems of academic advising, parking on campus, and problems of commuter students.
